




Taranaki Well Beaten


Rough Seas Pound Coastline


Some of the roughest seas seen at New Plymouth for many years were recently experienced, when the coast took a severe pounding from the angry waters. Fortunately not much damage was done, but the Harbour Board were perhaps hardest hit, when their pilot launch was holed and sunk at her moorings. Some hundreds of pounds worth of damage was done to the launch, which could not be salvaged until the old 90-ton steam crane could be brought into use.




Stratford's Queens Birthday Races
















Children at Work and Play


