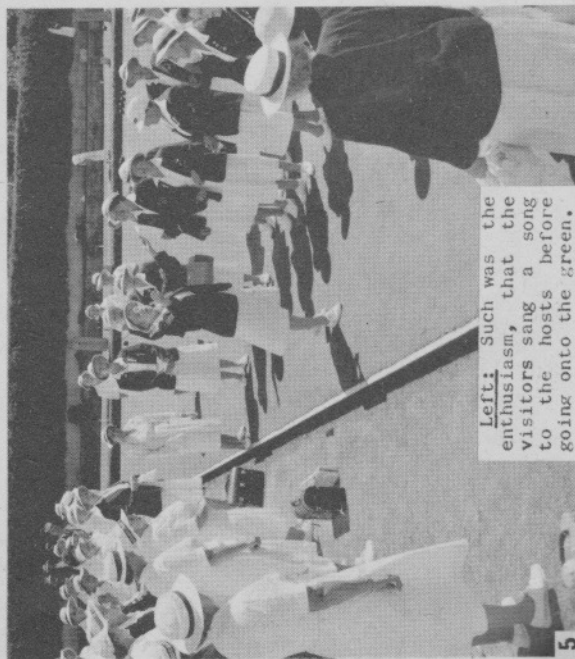


Dannevirke Bowlers Visit Taranaki

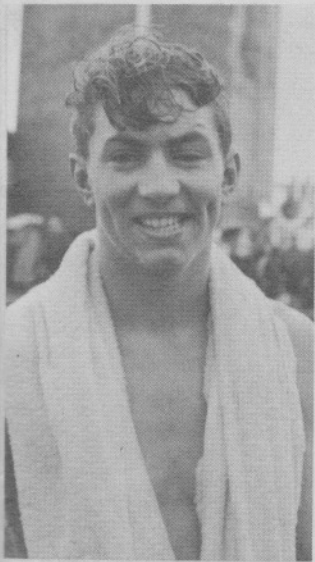

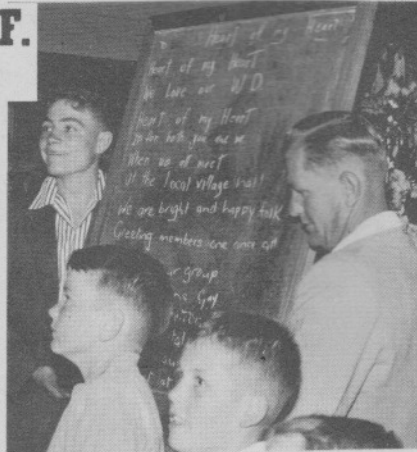

Rahotu W.D.F.F. Autumn Show



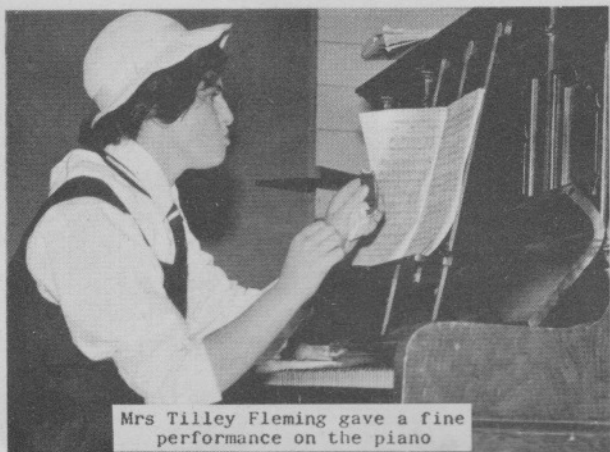

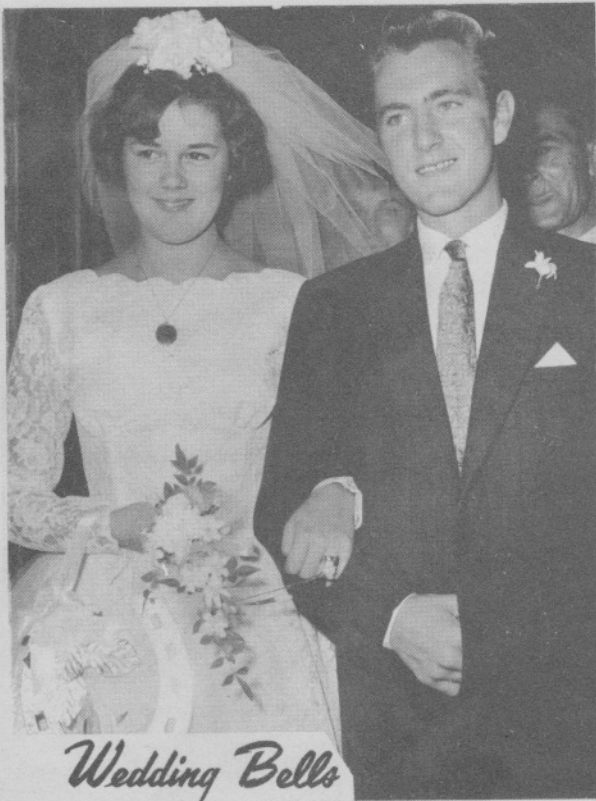
Roving Camera

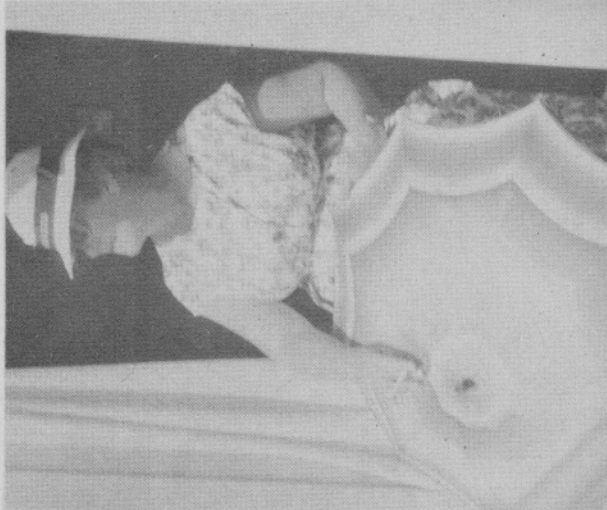

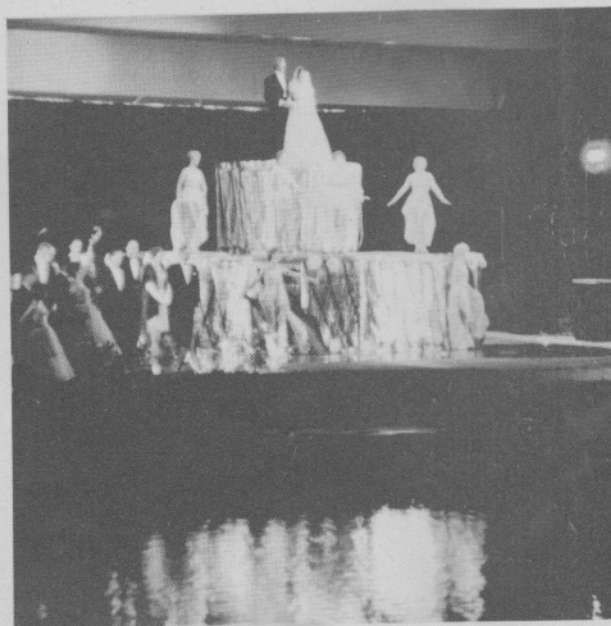

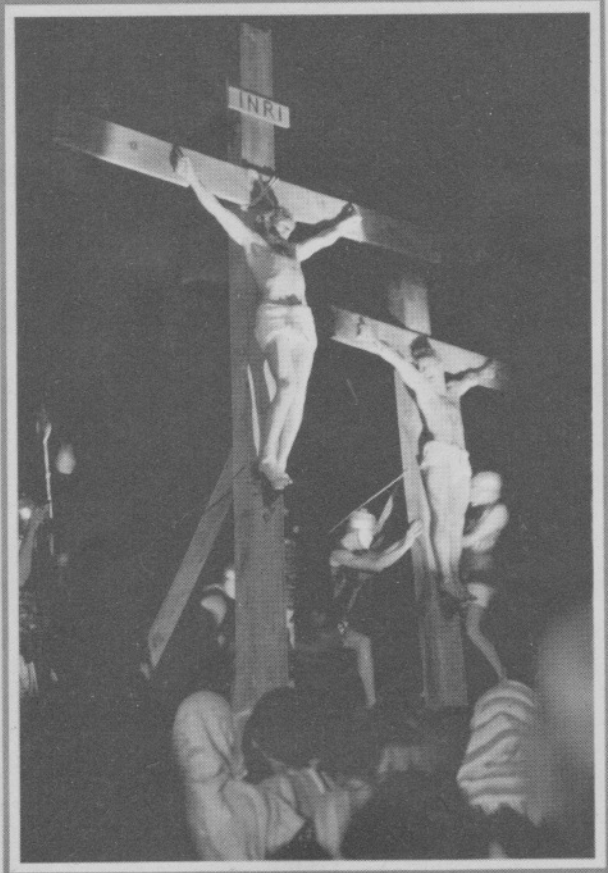

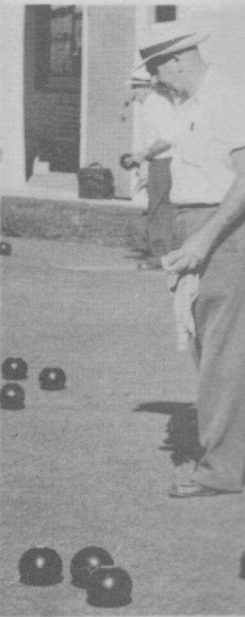

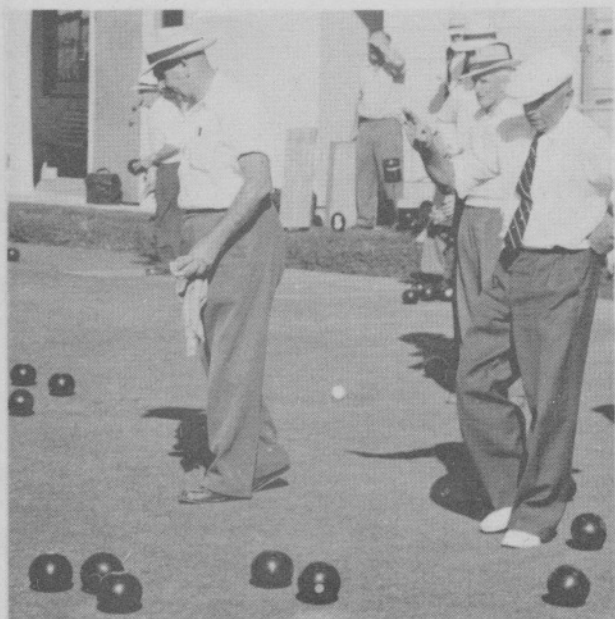

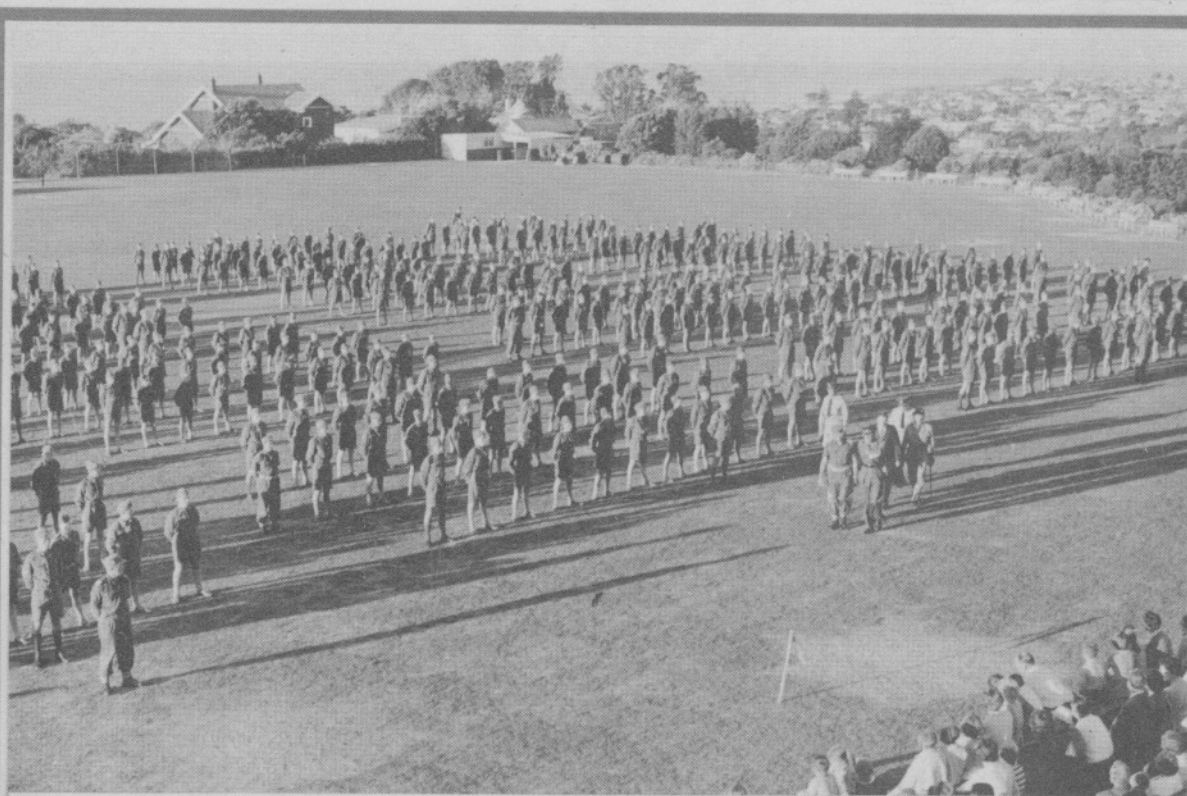

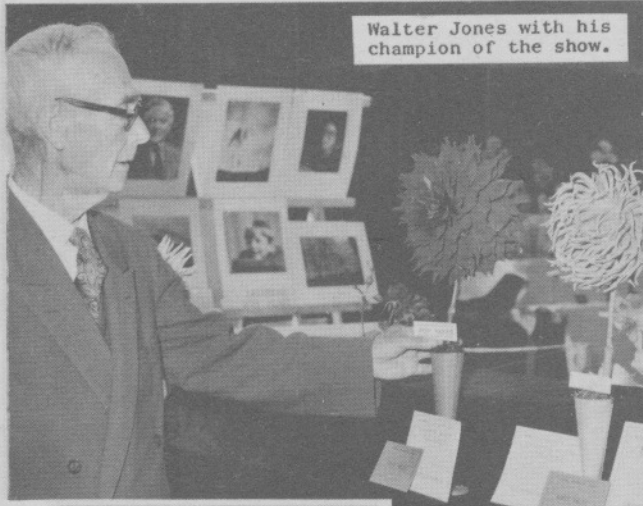

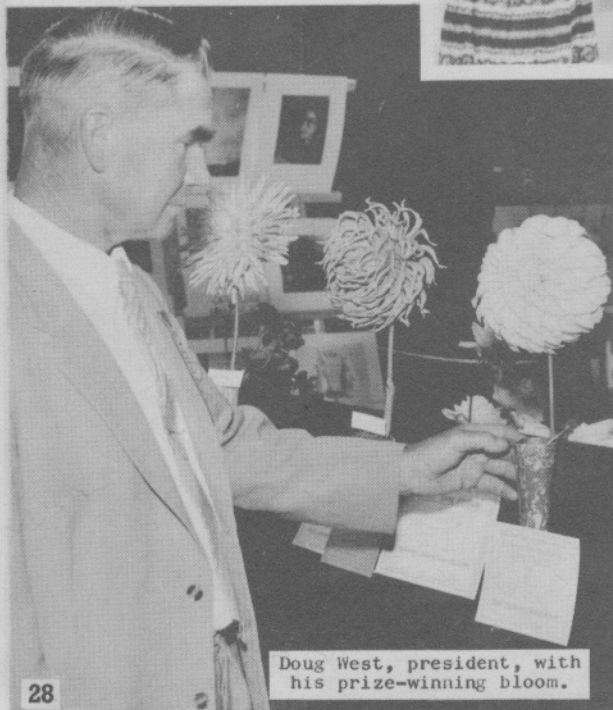

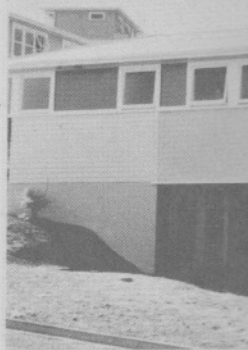


Ten Homes in Parade

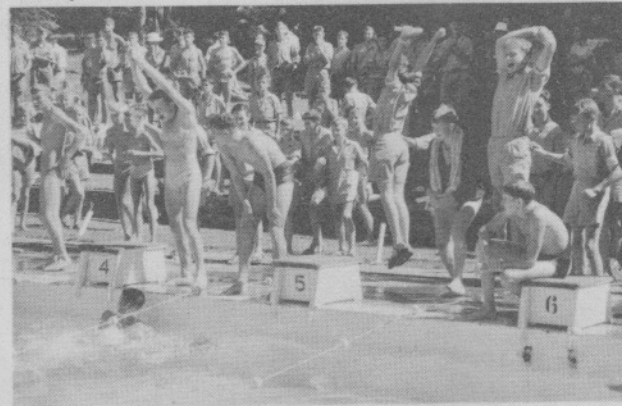

New Plymouth Show was Popular

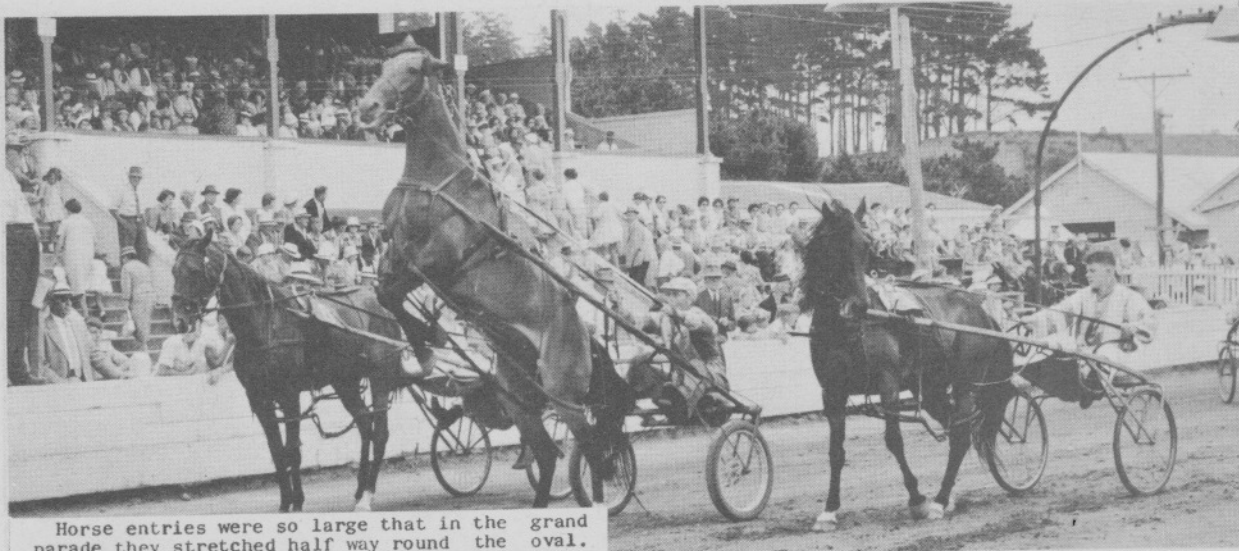

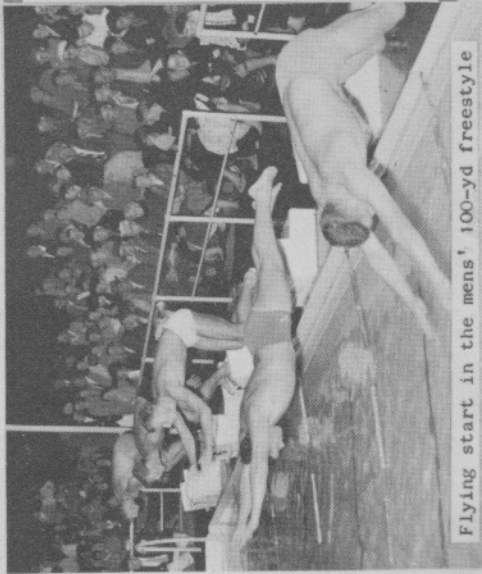

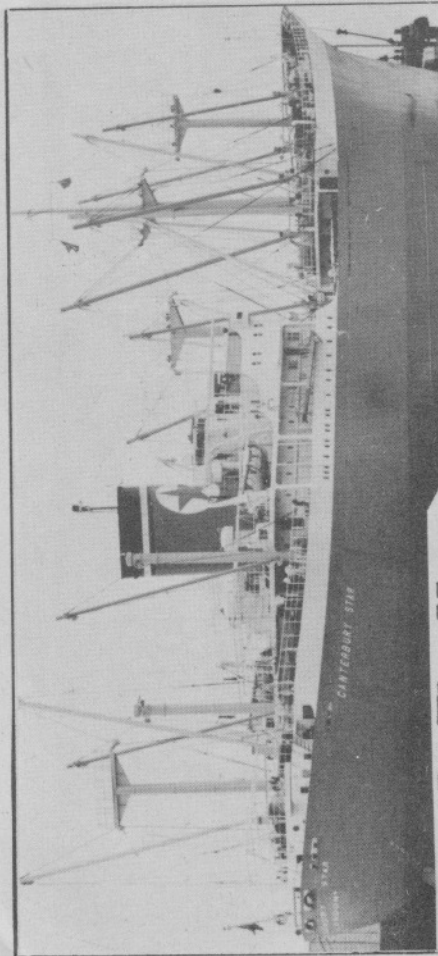
The Stratford pool was crowded to capacity to see the British swimming stars perform against local swimmers. The visitors were a delight to watch, as they broke record after record.

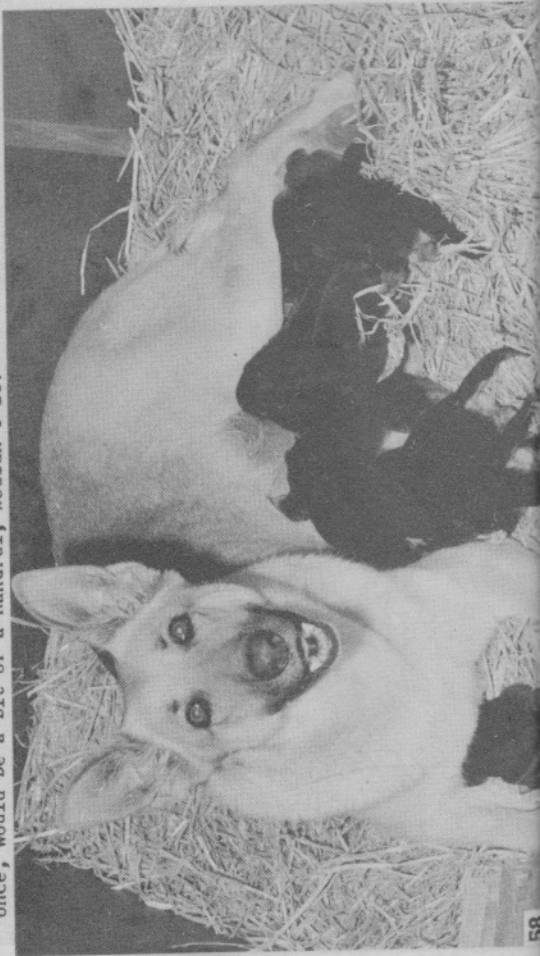

MERRILANDS SCHOOL CAMP

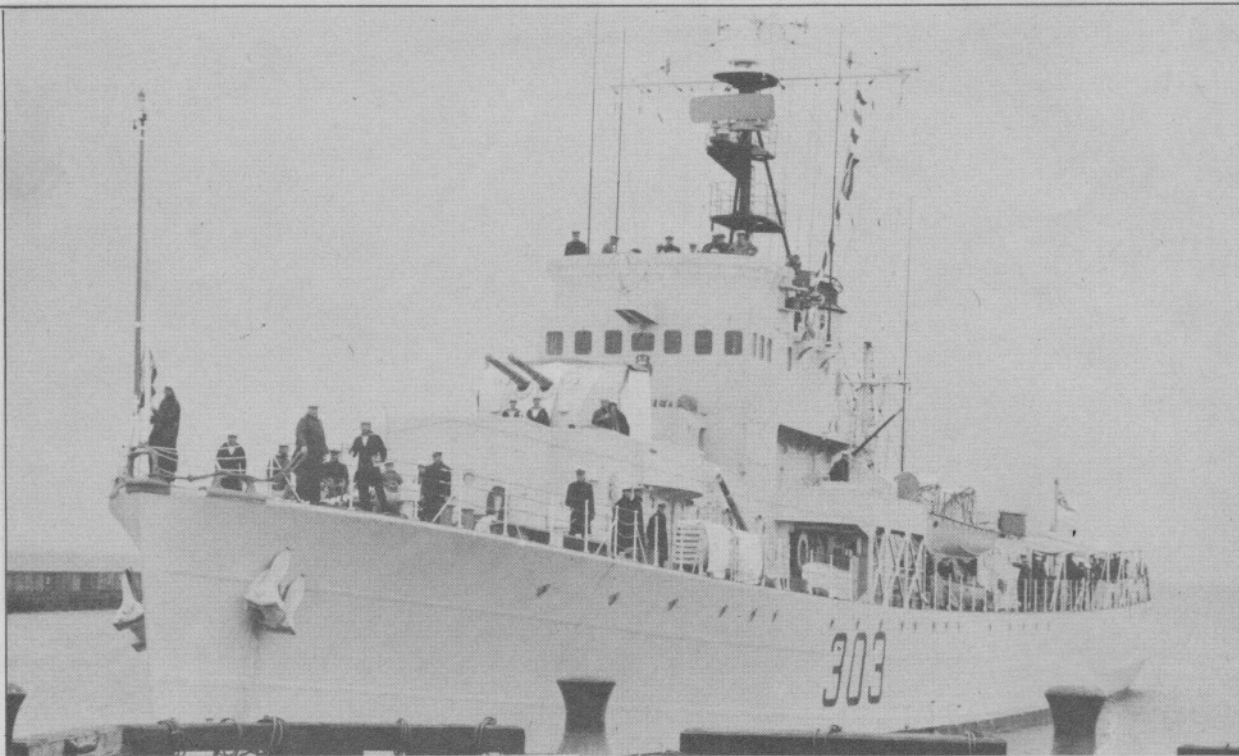

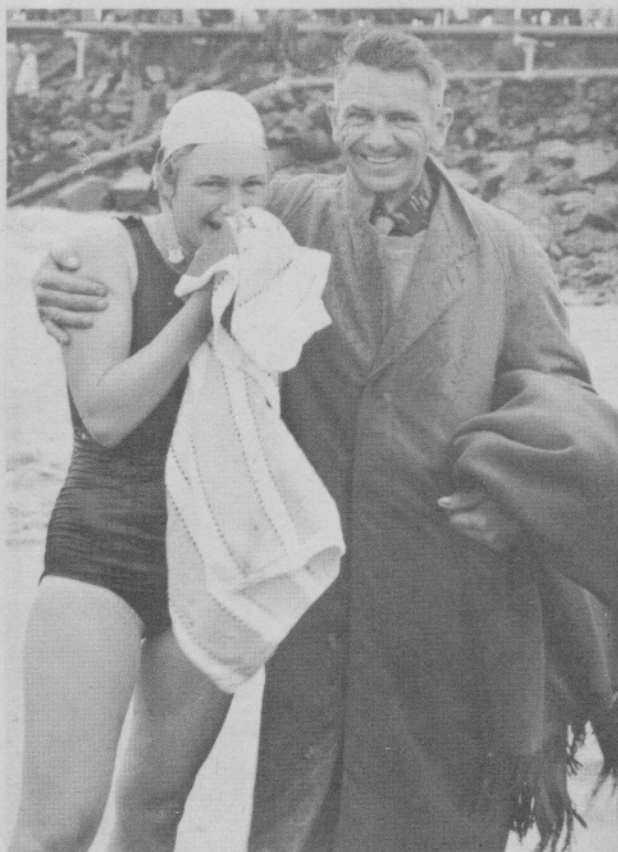

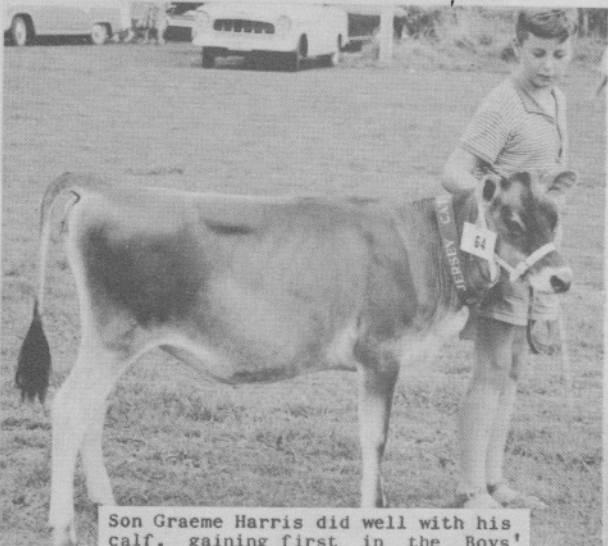

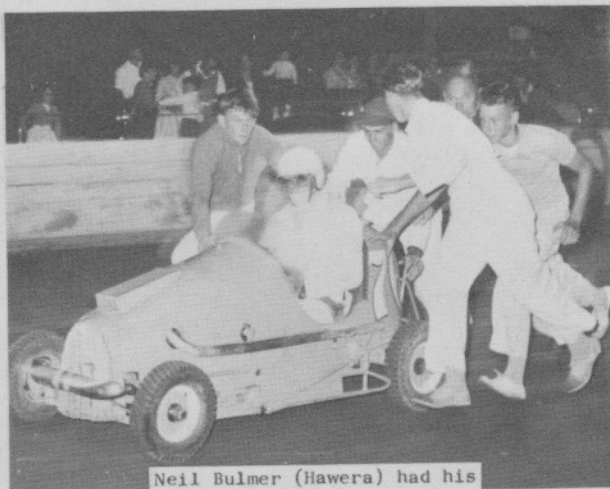
Taranaki Speedway Championships
