
N.P.-Inglewood Reconstruction


Post-Primary School Swim Championships






Exciting Pairs Final









Speedboat Regatta at Waitara






DISASTROUS FLOODS AFTER DRY SPELL

February promised to be one of the driest on record, but proved to be the wettest when heavy rain fell over the province late in the month, causing very heavy flooding in the Uruti and the Whangamomana areas. At Uruti, floodwaters flowed across the main road north, covering paddocks and marconing stock. Farm houses were cut off for a few days when large slips blocked roads. <u>Above</u>: Cattle were marconed and waded through the flood waters to find food. <u>Below</u>: Sheep were isolated on small islands like this until the flood waters subsided. <u>Bottom</u>: Water flowed over the main road north and was considered serious at one time, until the rain stopped and the situation

eased.





Sea of Logs on Waitara River

After the heavy rain experienced in Taranaki recently, tons and tons of logs and debris came down the Waitara River. So much collected in the mouth on the high tide, that the debris almost reached right across the river. One old resident of Waitara said that it was the first time that this had happened in fifty years. With the river precariously near to the top of the banks at high tide, the cessation of rain saved the situation. <u>Above</u>: Looking toward the mouth, there was little clear water as the tide came in. <u>Below</u>: At the boat moorings at the look-out, masses of driftwood floated in the area. In this picture an idea is obtained of the height of the water, not many inches from the flooding point.


FLANNAGAN CUP RACE




Opunake Catholic Church Demolished

tractors.











Girls High School Swimming Sports
















