







WE FOUND THEM HARD TO PICK!

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

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
THEY LIVE LONG IN TARANAKI


We've seen quite a few really old people celebrating their birthdays recently, in New Plymouth, and it would seem that longevity is one of the qualities of the town and province.















GREYHOUNDS AT INGLEWOOD *

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


SPEEDBOATS TURN IT ON










RECIPROCAL CONCERT






CHANGING FACE OF THE CITY * * *





MIGHTY INDOOR BASKETBALL CABARET



























NEW SCHOOL OPENED




