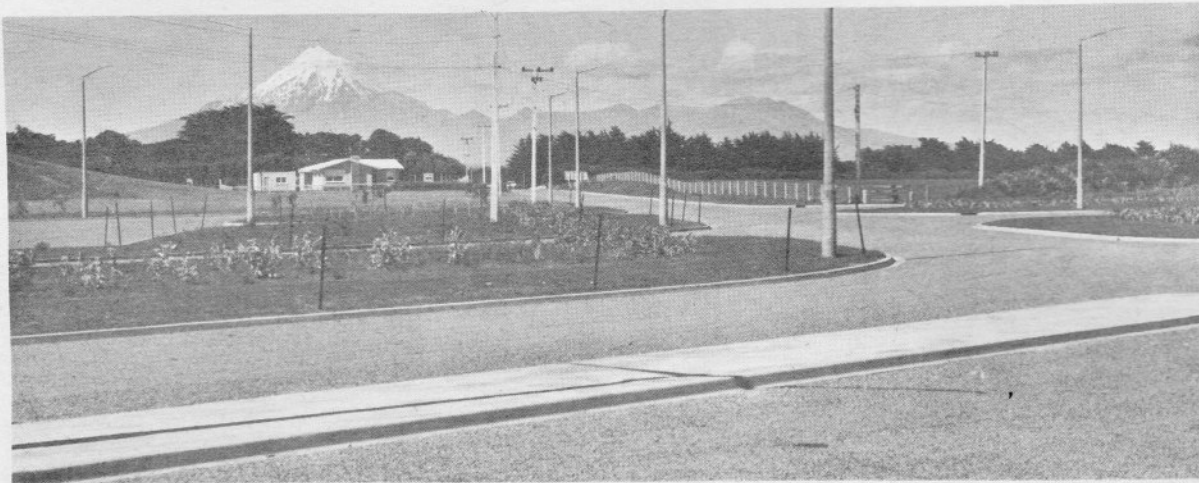
NEW AIRPORT OPERATIONAL

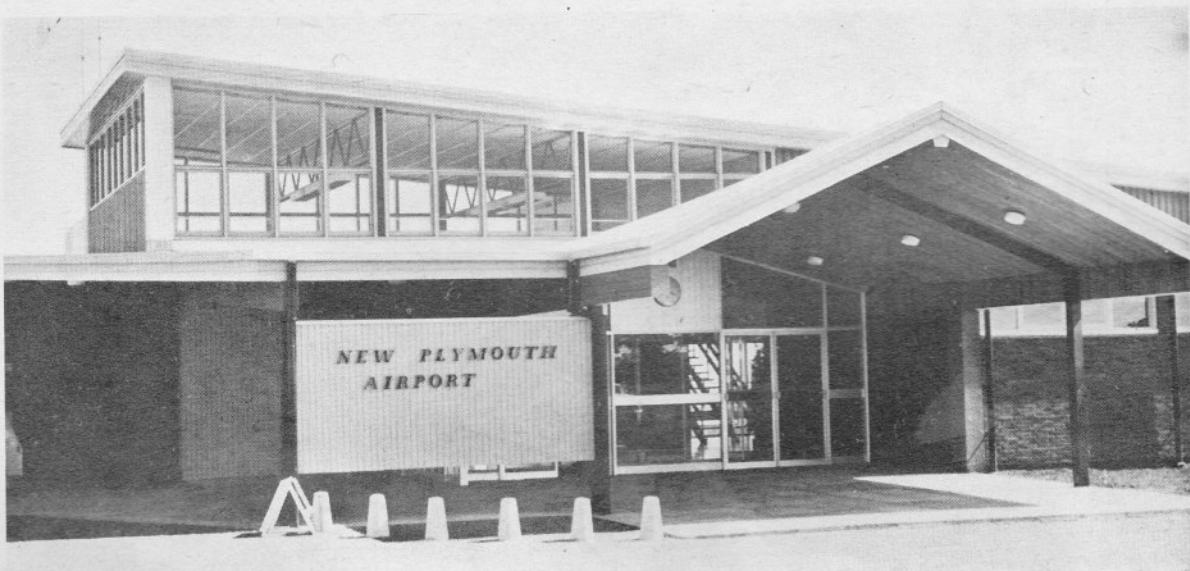
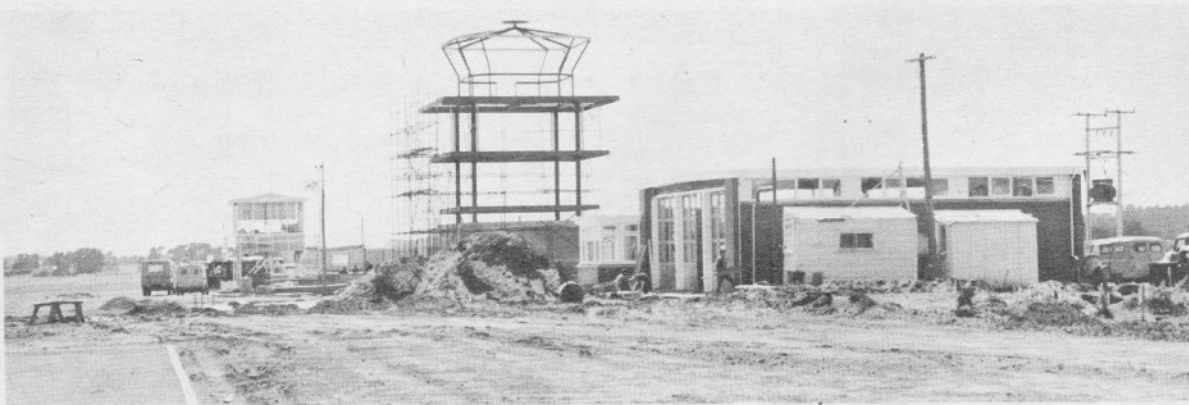

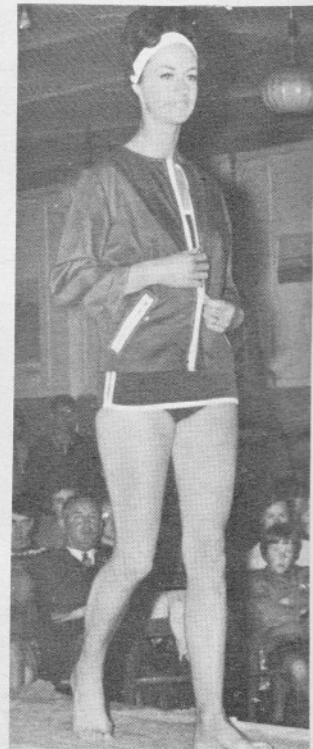
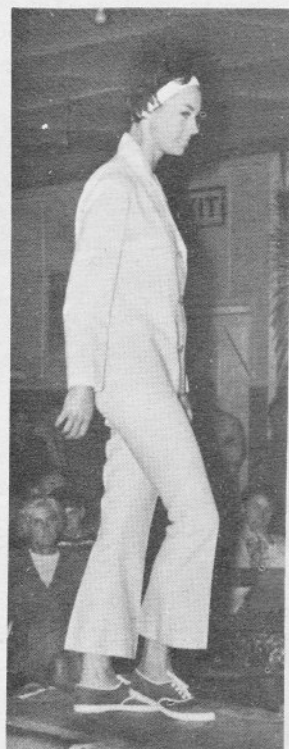
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SUCCESSFUL BOAT SHOW

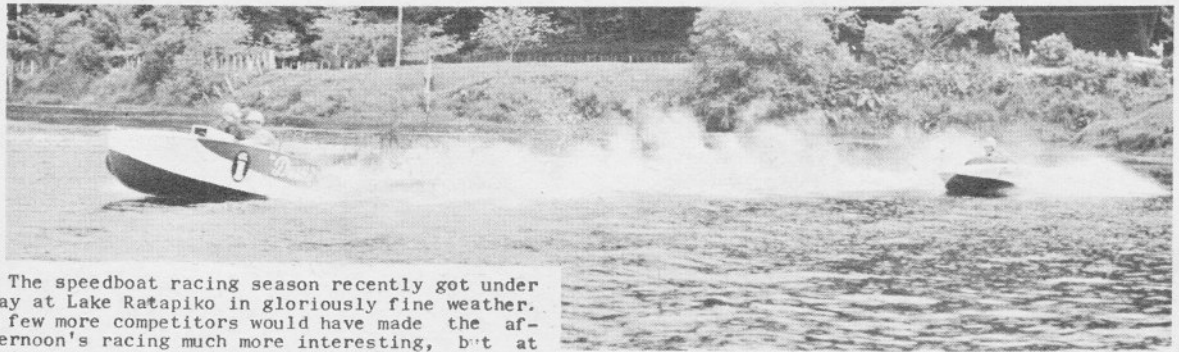
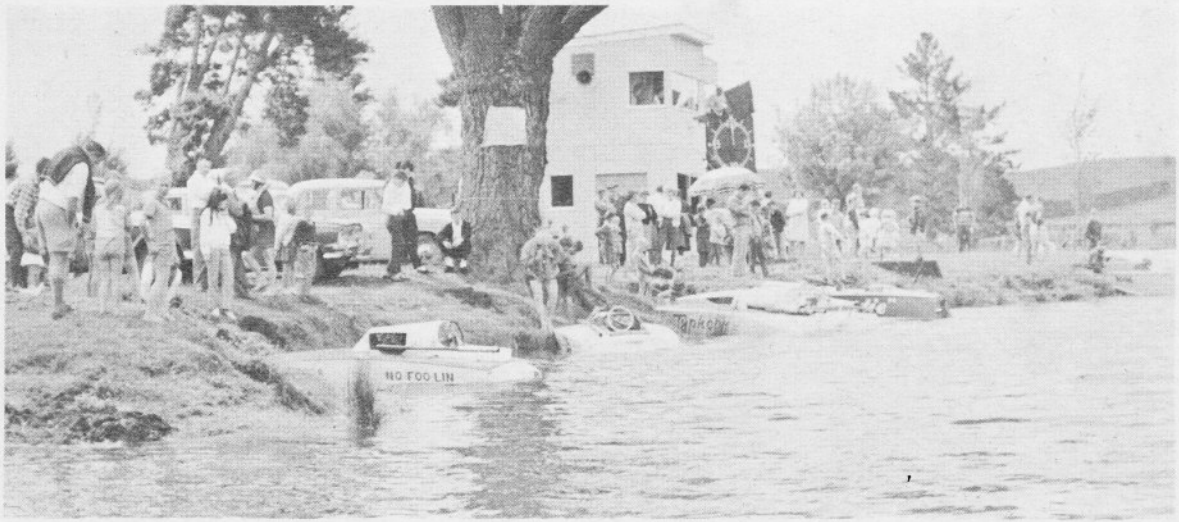
Roving Camera

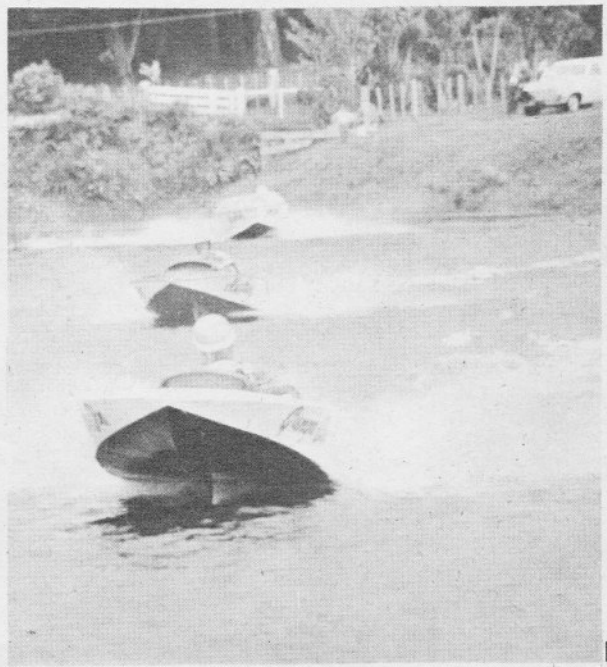

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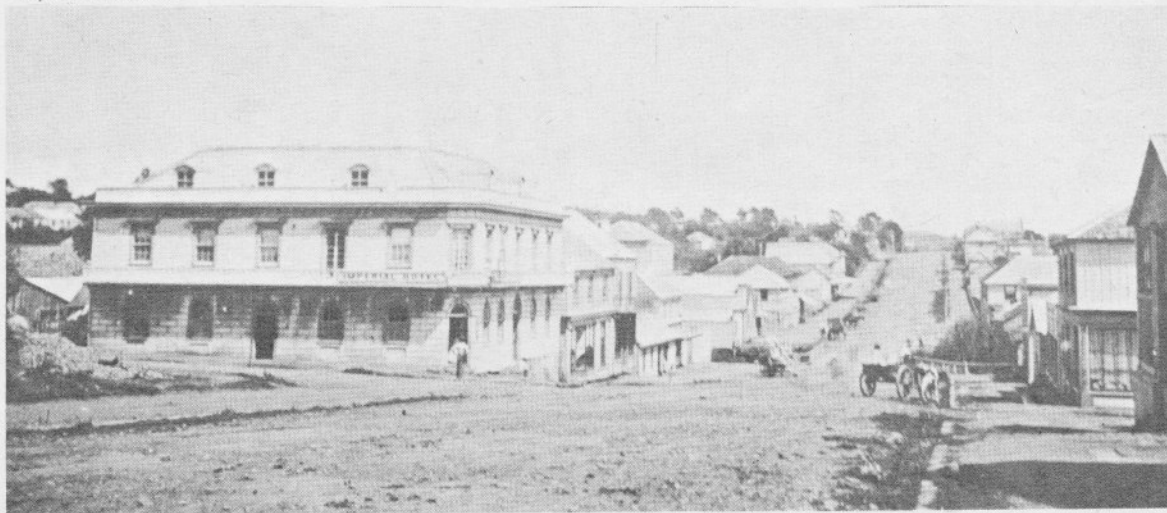


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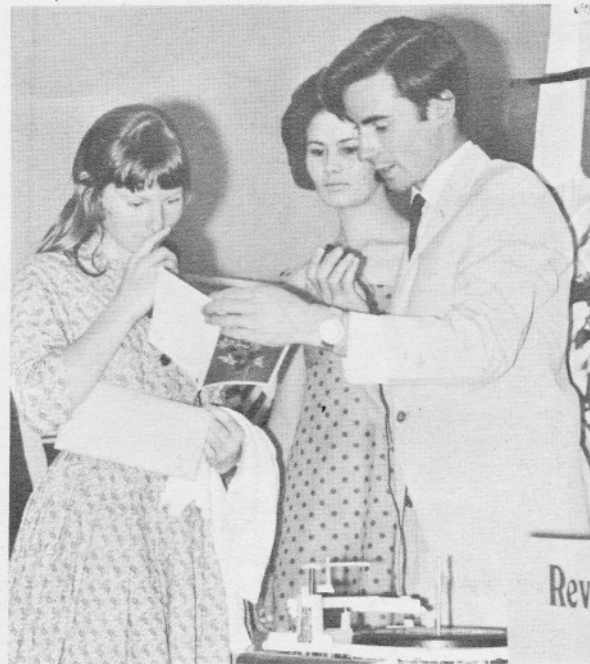
OLD DEVON STREET

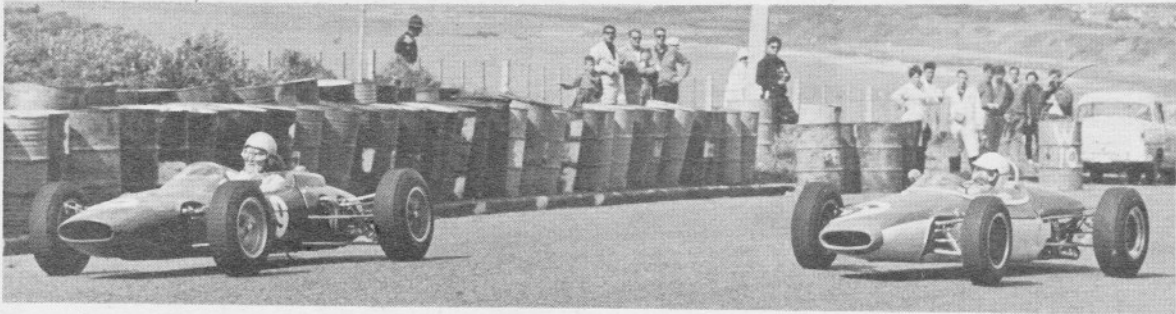

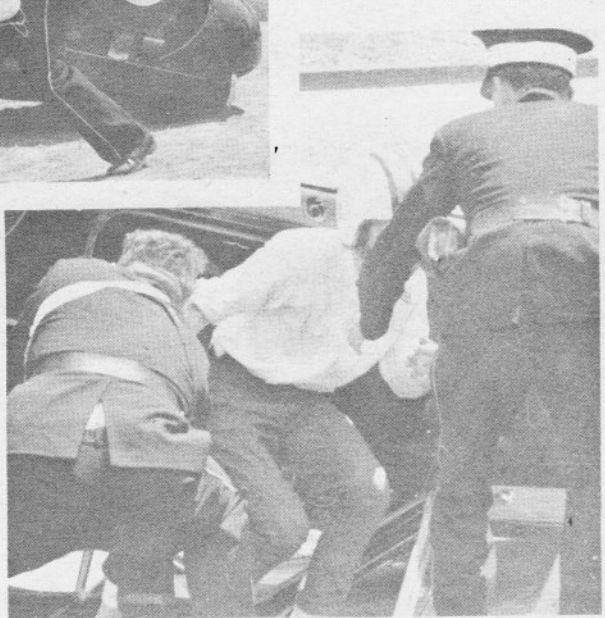

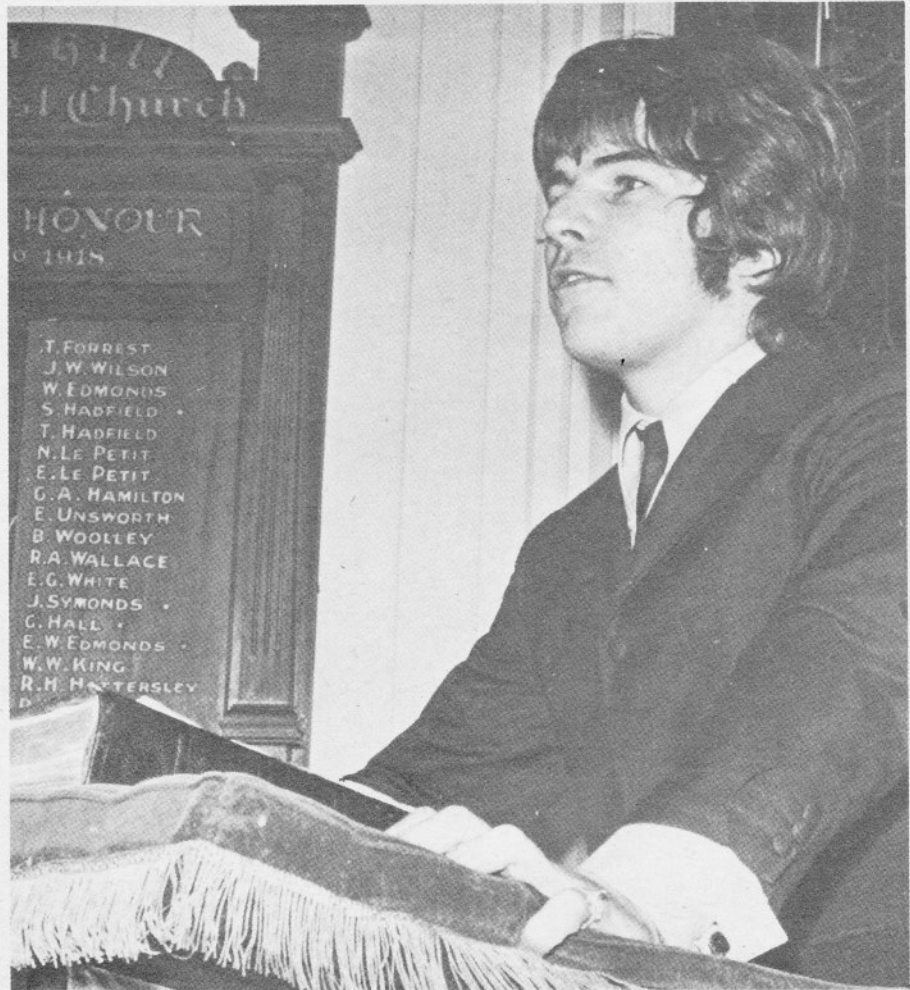
Larry's Rebels In Church

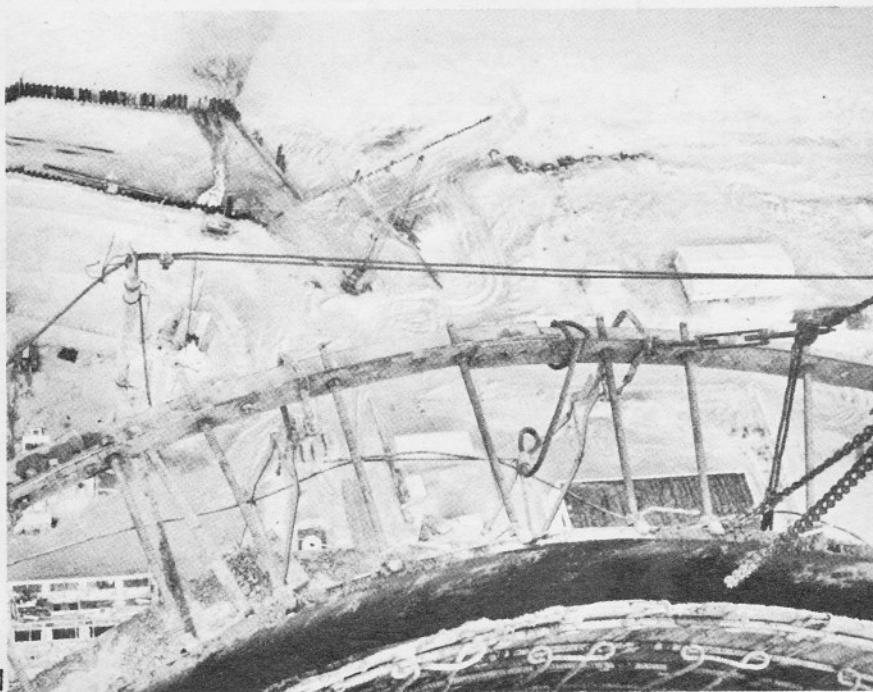




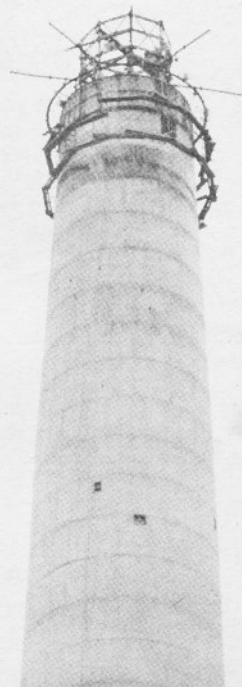
Four Hundred Feet Straight Down

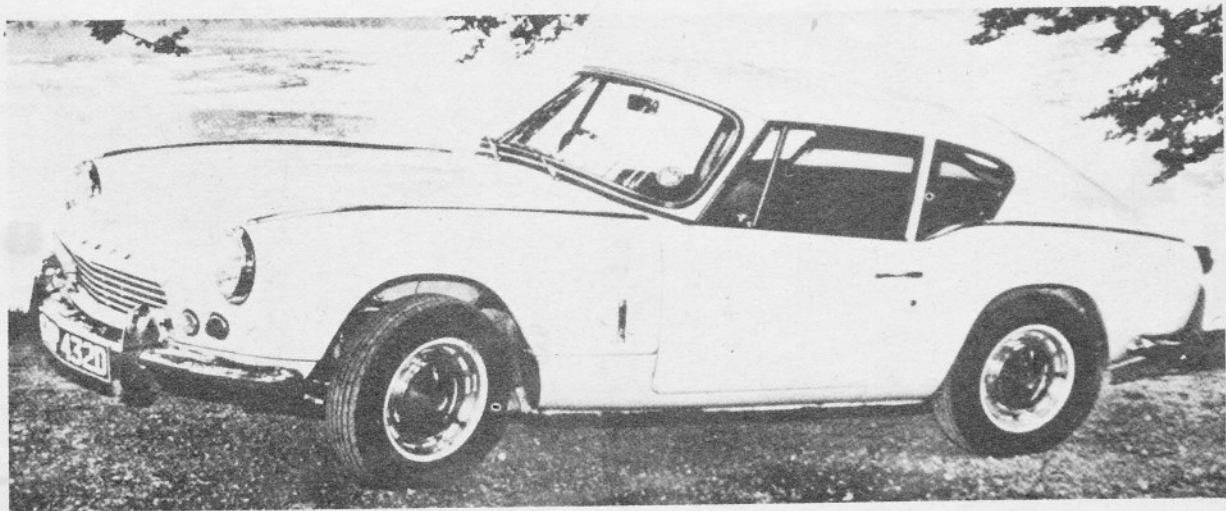
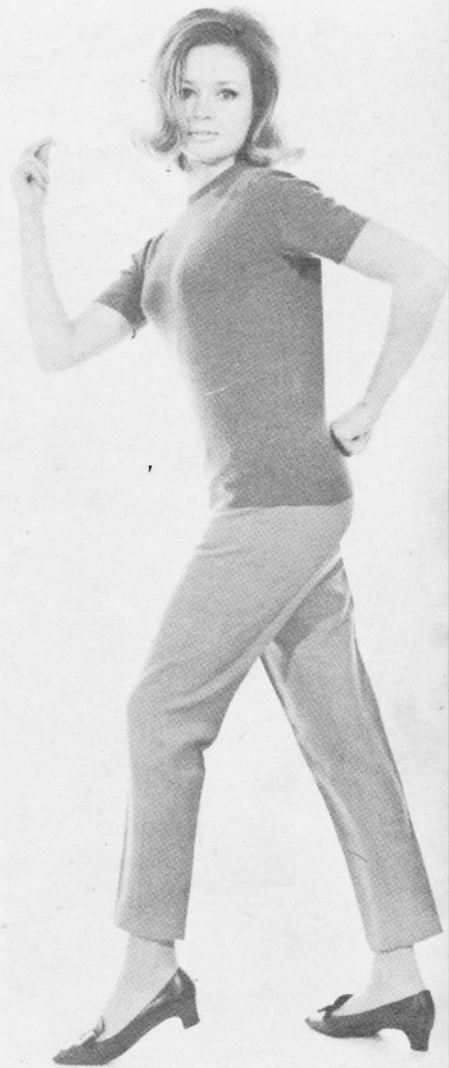


End of a Long, Long Voyage

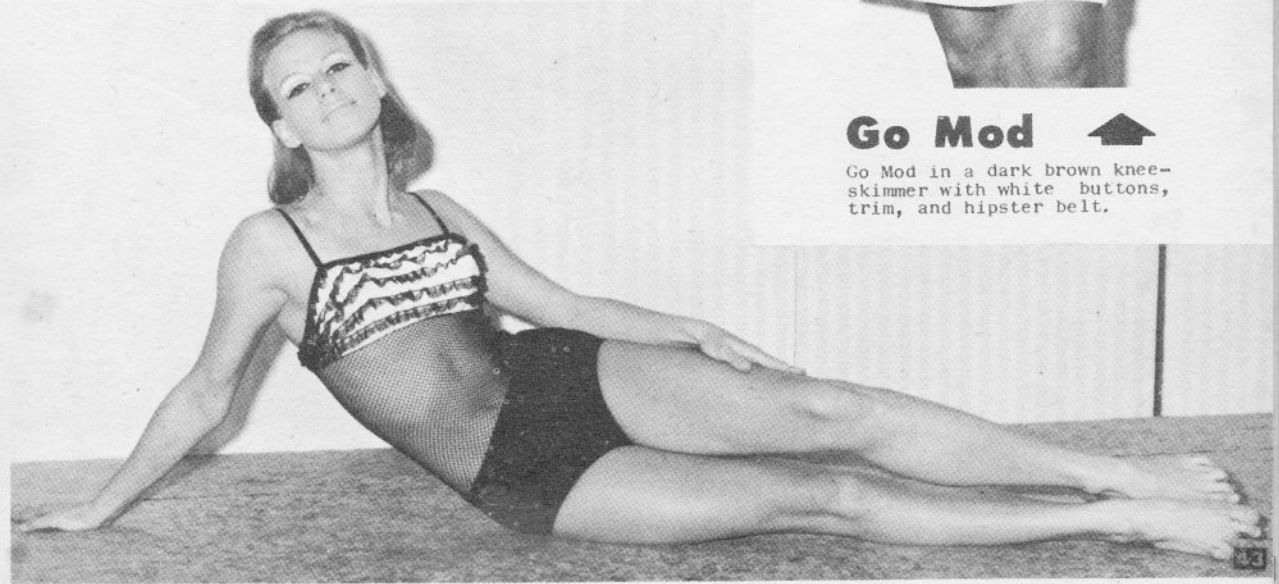
