




### NEW AIRPORT OPERATIONAL


At last the New Plymouth Airport is operational. First of the NAC flights landed recently, and there was an official opening of the terminal building by the Mayor, Mr A.G. Honnor, to mark the occasion. During the speeches, reference was made to the increased costs of the project, and one speaker implored the public to forget it, as we now had a nice new airport and no matter what it cost, we had something that we never had before. As rate and taxpayers, we would like to know just how the cost of this project has soared so high above the original estimates. 






### Larry's Rebels In Church

"The aim of this service is to show the joys and certainties of the Church today through an idiom of today," said the minister.










### Hundred Feet Four




