



MOTORING V ROBBIE



WRAPPING burned distributor points with foil will usually get you to the nearest service station or garage.



To remove a stud without damaging the threads with slip-joint ring the threads with sip-joint pliers, run a nut down until it is flush with the top of the stud, centrepunch a mark at the threads, drill a small hole, and insert a pin. The pin will lock the nut so that you can unscrew the stud with a wrench.



BRAKE-CABLE END



Corrosion can be cleaned from inside distributor cap terminals with a wire brush made from a discarded hand brake cable. Cut the cable near its end and use the threaded adjusting rod as a handle. Unravel a few strands, insert at the terminals, and




HAWERA QUEEN CARNIVAL




