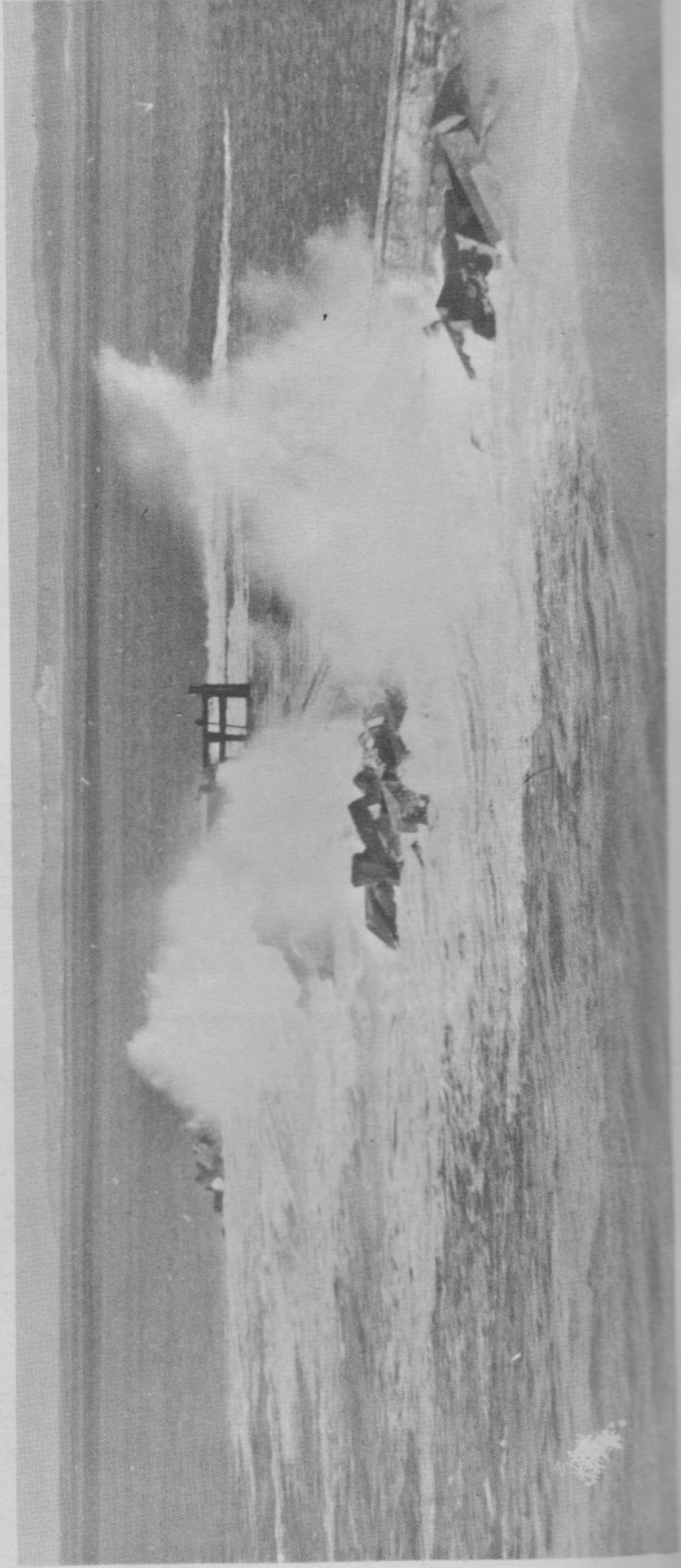
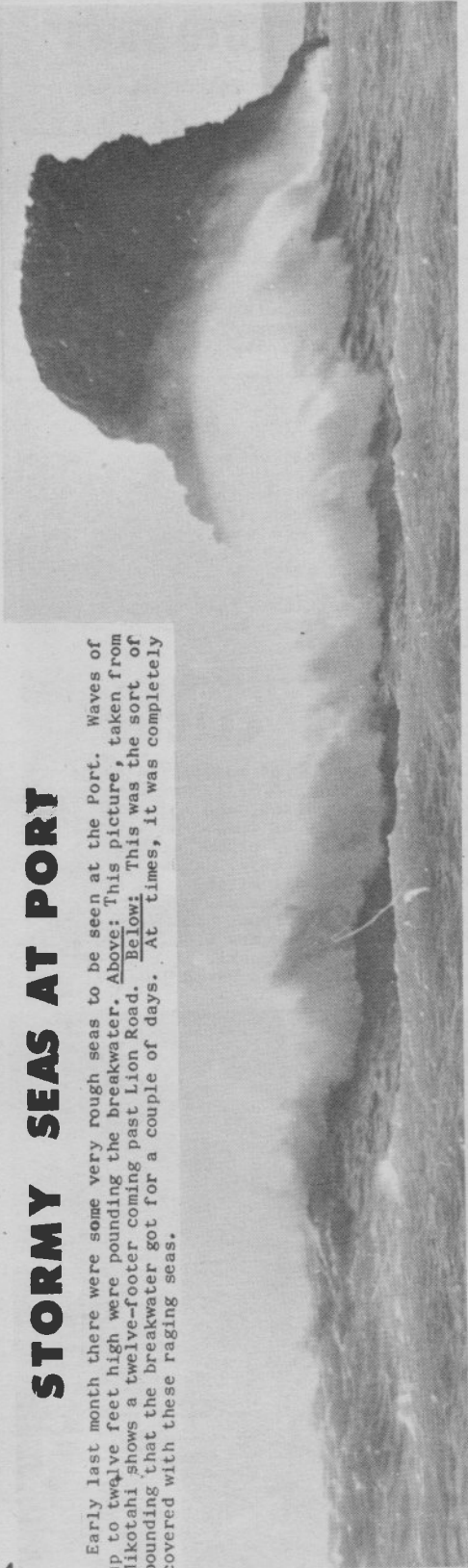

## FIRE AT PURSER BROTHERS

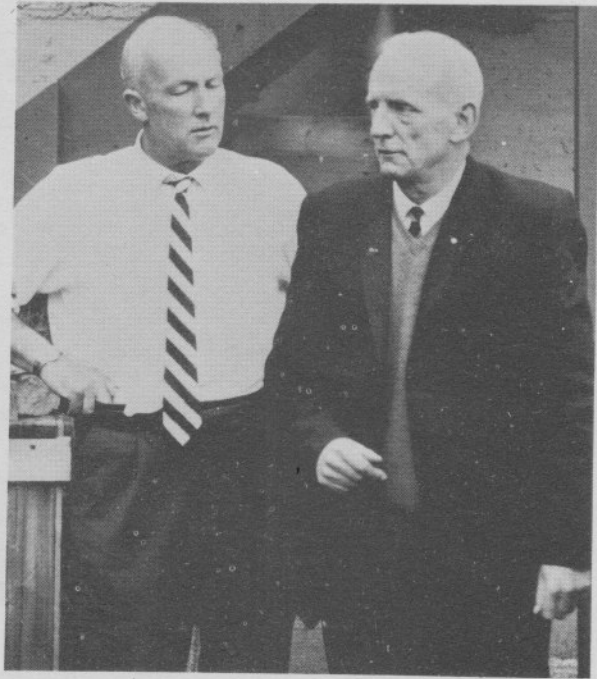

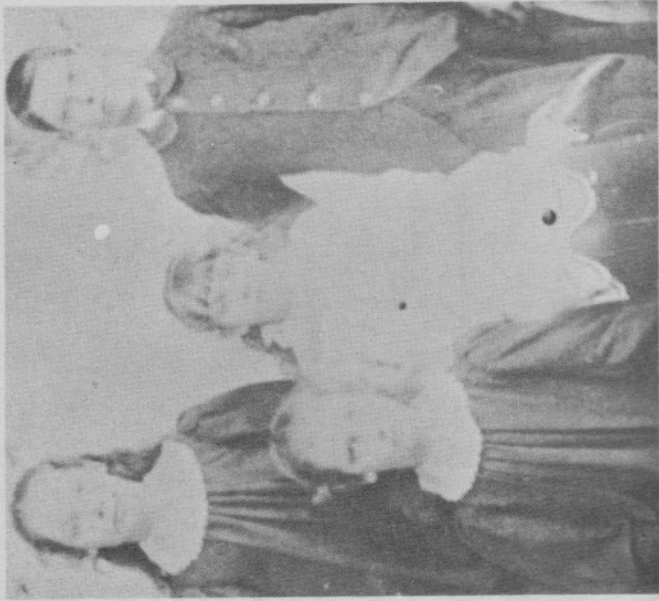

Here's a woman who has seen many changes in her lifetime. She is this month's "Senior Citizen": Mrs. Beatrice Beale, who now lives with her daughter, Mrs. N. Brunning, in South Road, NP. Mrs. Beale came to NP in 1907 from the West Coast with her husband who had been a gold prospector. In fact, the wedding ring she wears was made of the gold that her husband had mined down on the West Coast. The journey from the south was made by boat in those days. This dear old lady, just a tender 86 years old, lives a very full life, making much use of the NP Old Folks' rooms, where she spends about five days a week. She's not lost for something to do in the evenings either, besides making very beautiful scrap books. Mrs. Beale enjoys a game of "Housie", and attends quite regularly.

On arrival in NP, she and her husband leased land for market gardening where the NP Hospital Nurses Home now stands. Later they moved to a 15-acre property in Govett Avenue. 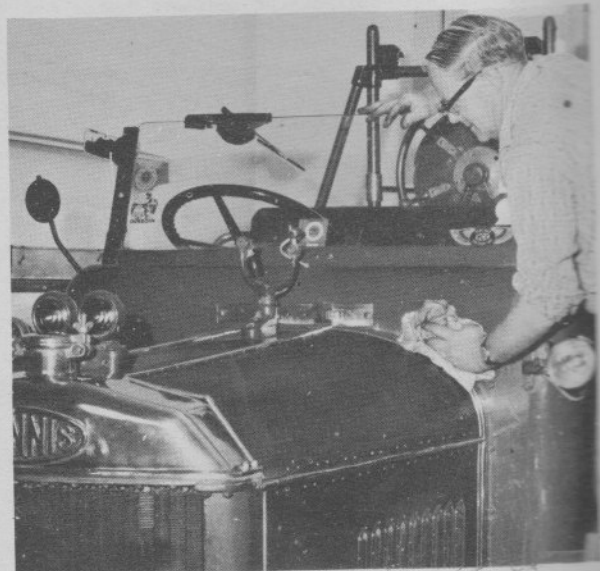
## FIREMEN PREPARE FOR CENTENNIAL

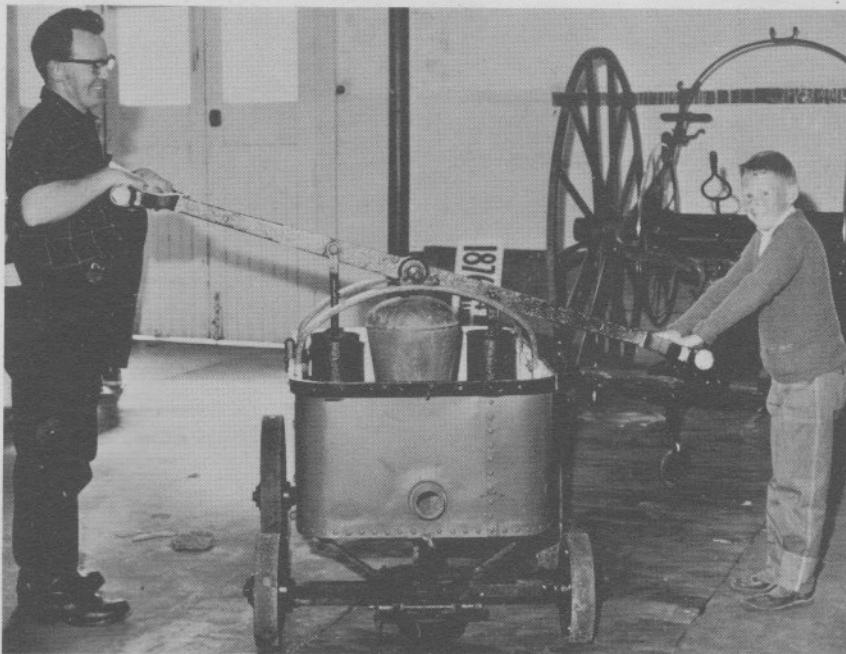

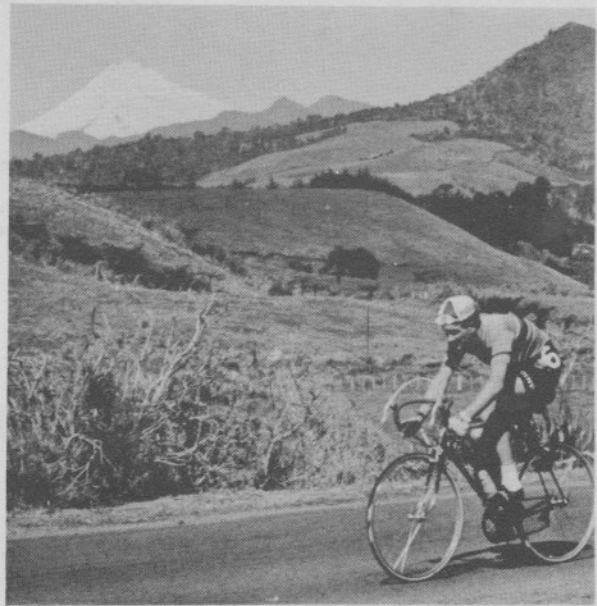
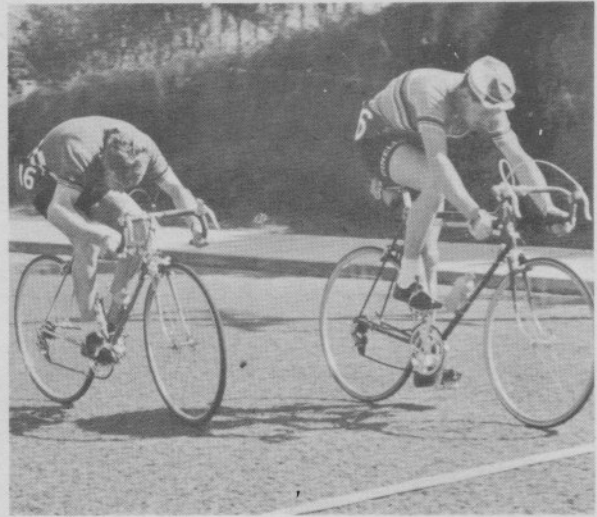
