






Above: The new store for the National Electrical Company, situated on Devon Street, and costing approximately £9,000.

Bottom: The Bank of New Zealand premises on the corner of Brougham and Devon Streets will cost, when finished, £160,000.




Above: South British Insurance Company's new offices in Currie street, right opposite the new Post Office, will cost £30,000.




