



First meet of the NP Pony Club this year was recently held at the Racecourse. There was a good muster of riders and ponies, which promises well for the present season.






MADAM' YOU MUST BE MAD!








ST. JOHN SENIOR COMPETITIONS












NEW BUILDINGS FOR OUR CITY




