








The Calm at Waiweranui Point

A violent gale and broken power lines brought the captain and crew of the 787-ton coastal vessel Calm very close to tragedy. Fortunately they were able to walk ashore at low tide. The Calm went ashore at Waiweranui Point, Warea, at 2.10 a.m. on Saturday, 14th July, 1956. It was estimated that over 3000 people visited the scene. With the aid of remarkable seamanship and calm seas she freed herself on the 19th July.

The Transport Department was kept busy (directing streams of traffic) under cold, wet and muddy conditions at the end of Stent Road, Warea.






Pomaderris elliptica or the Golden Tainui is one of the prettiest of our native shrubs. Unfortunately the flowers do not last long but they make up for this with their wonderful profusion. The plant is extremely quick growing but is rather short-lived.



From Japan comes the pretty little Winter Hazel, *Corylopsis spicata*, which is flowering this month. The lemon-yellow catkins are slightly scented and look well in flower arrangements.



Clematis Armandii is a hardy cream - flowered clematis from China. It makes a good cover for a trellis or pergola.



The Star Magnolia has a very long flowering season. The pure white flowers are slightly scented. This is a large shrub finally reaching a height of about seven feet and a spread of the same or more.












