

A fierce southerly storm which descended on Taranaki last week plunged thousands of homes into darkness, disrupted telephone services, and caused minor damage throughout the prevince.

Hardest hit in the city area was the hardware firm of H.N. Rowe, Itd., in St. Aubyn Street, which was de-roofed by gasts which reached up to 84 m.p.h.








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MARK COMBER Taranakis "Mr Sport"







Bowling greens are reported to be in good order, and the Taranaki Association is looking forward to another successful season.



The symbol of the freedom fighters - the flag of Hungary with a black band across it was prominently dis-played at the gathering. A number of New Zea-


landers joined in the observance of the grim anniversary.




CLIMAX TO MILLION POUND PROJECT

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







The Shield!







With amateur photography an increasingly popular hobby, scores of "shutter-bugs" set out any fine weekend in search of pictures of "the Mountain".


But it would be a lucky photographer indeed who could find a completely new "angle" on Mount Egmont.





Biggest building project at present underway is the £100,000 district war memorial, which includes a civic centre in Albion Street, and a sports hall at the Showgrounds.


Generous donations, a queen carnival which raised £15,000, and a Government grant up to £50,000, are providing the finance for the memorial project.










