
Aftermath of Fatal Fire

Grosvenor Hotel Destroyed By Fire

In the early hours of Sunday' August 9, with 35 guests asleep, fire broke out in the popular Grosvenor Hotel. One of the staff, 23-year-old Joan Morris of Rahotu, lost her life in this very tragic fire. Receiving the alarm at 3 am, the New Plymouth Fire Brigade was quickly on the scene and did sterling work in saving the hotel's annexe, and adjoining buildings. The building was quickly reduced to a heap of rubble, as the flames gradually gained a firm hold.










Moturoa School Fancy Dress







Quick Frozen Tender Chickens
In a New Plymouth factory—the only one of
its kind in New Zealand—fowls go in one door
full of pride and feathers and go out the other as tender, delicious quick-frozen poultry. The factory, Mr D.M. Urquhart's Fresha Frozen Foods, produces 45 varieties of quick-frozen meats, amall goods and poultry. Last season the factory sent out nearly 25,000 birds from its 20-ton capacity quick-freeze chamber.


