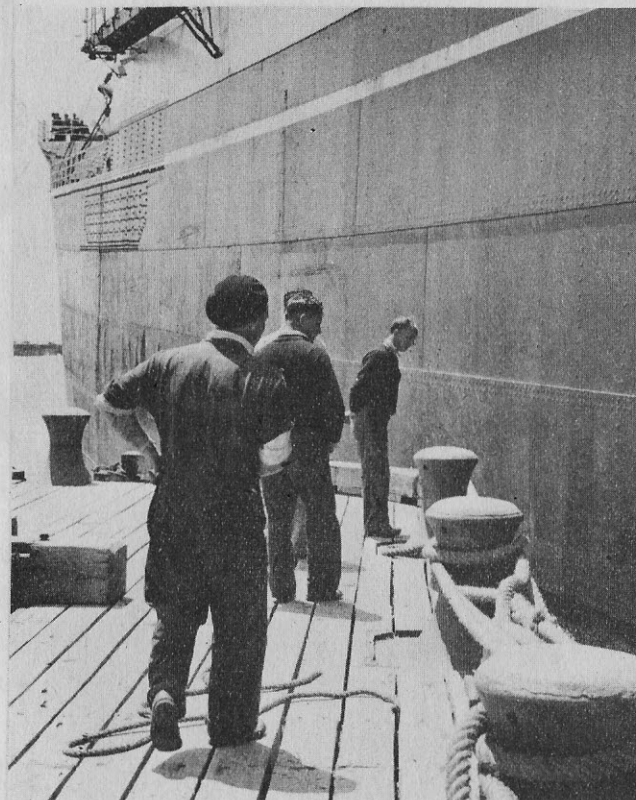

Her Ship Came Home...

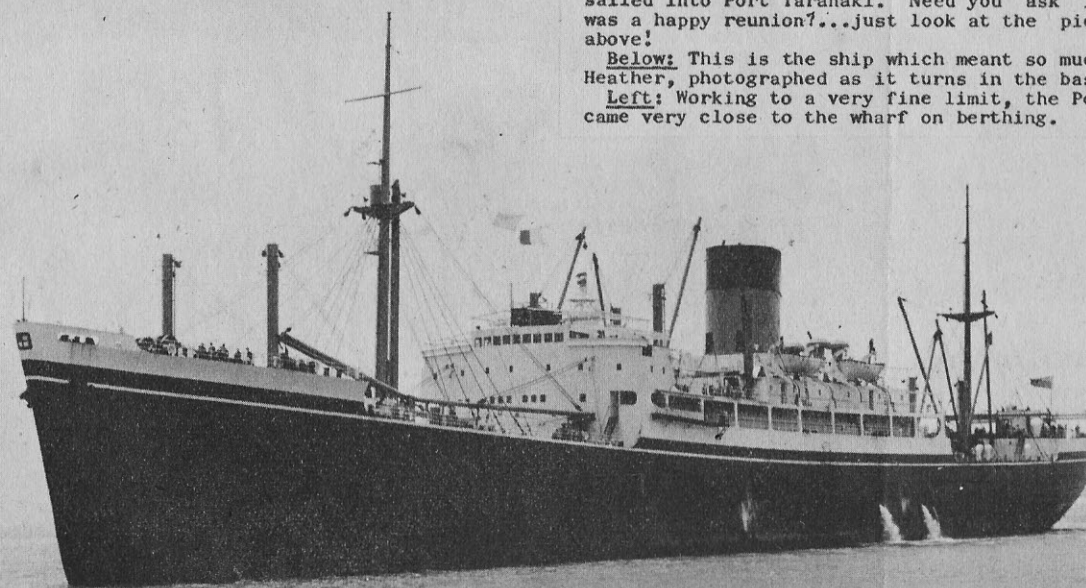
For Heather New, an attractive Opunake school-teacher, it seemed that the 13,600-ton freighter Persic would never reach New Plymouth.

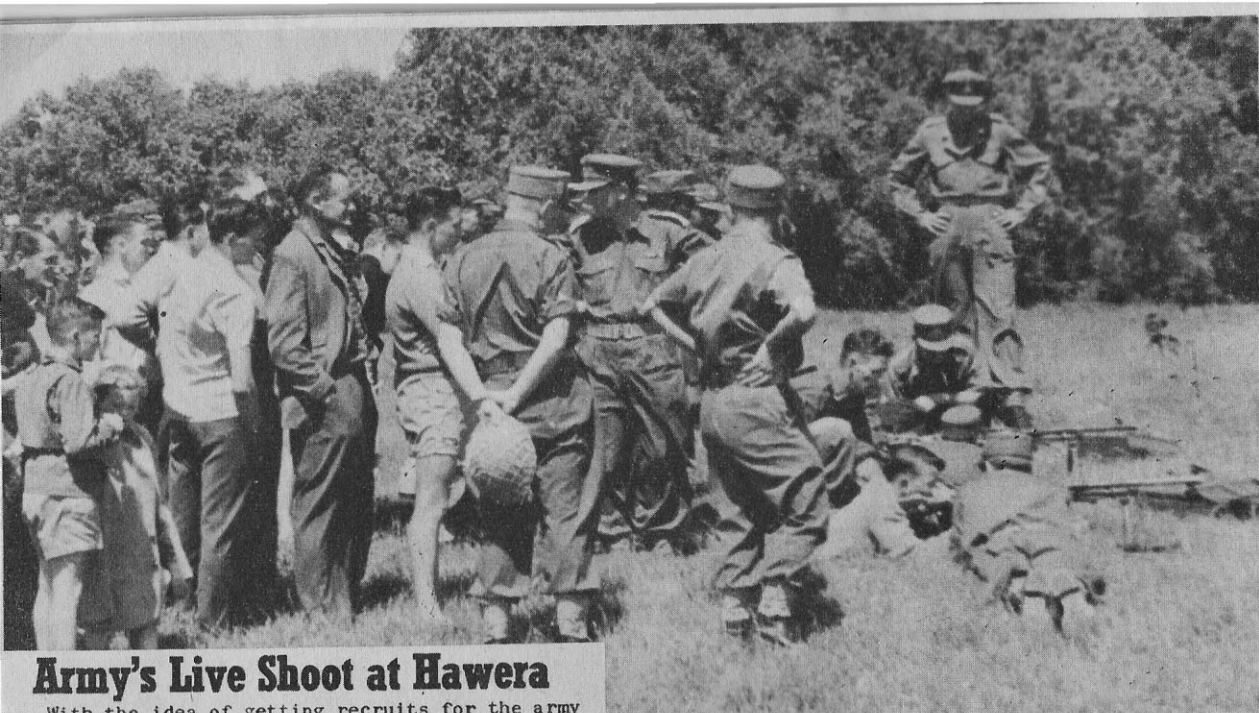
Though very poorly supported by both competitors and public alike, the inter-club meeting held recently at Pukekura Park provided some very exciting competition amongst those who did turn out.

Obedient Dogs

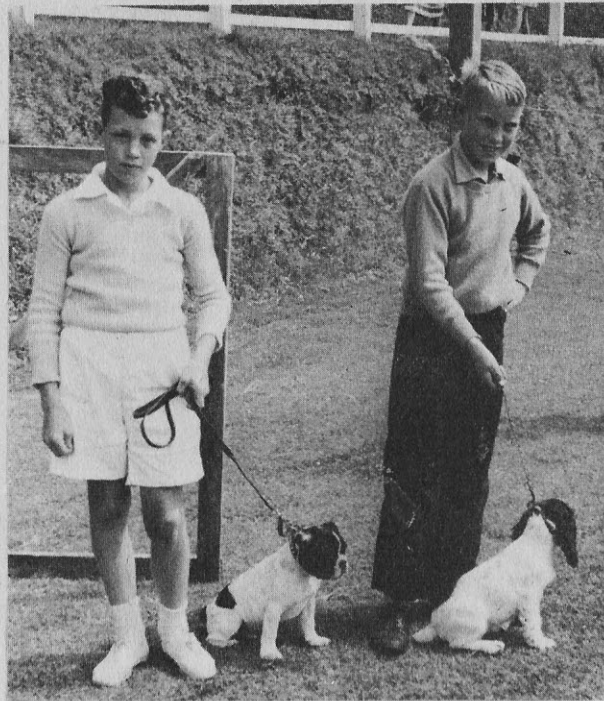
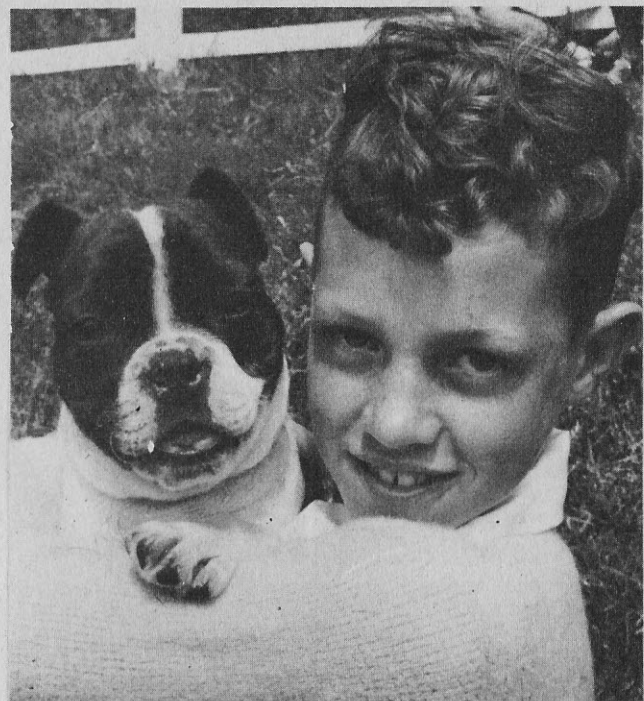

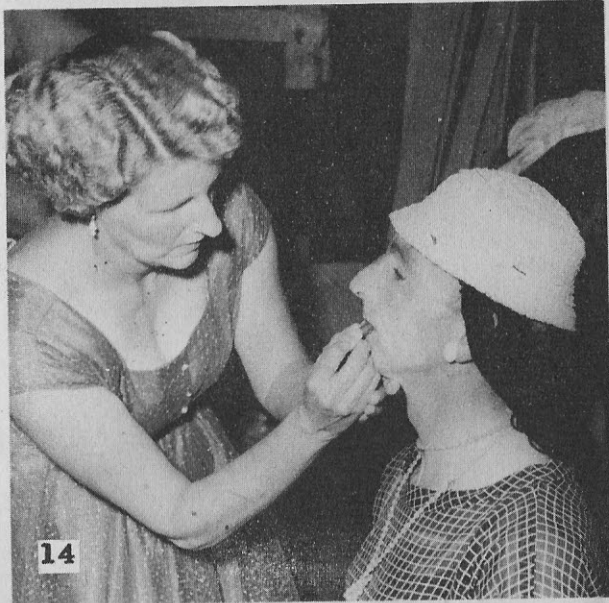
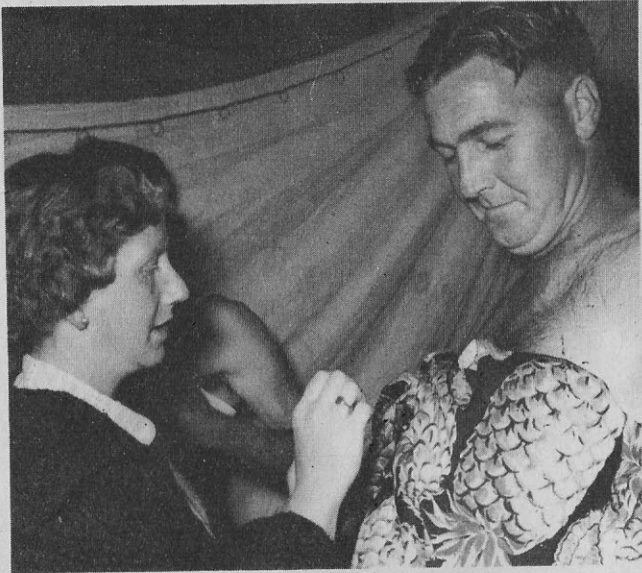




Huiroa "Mannequins"

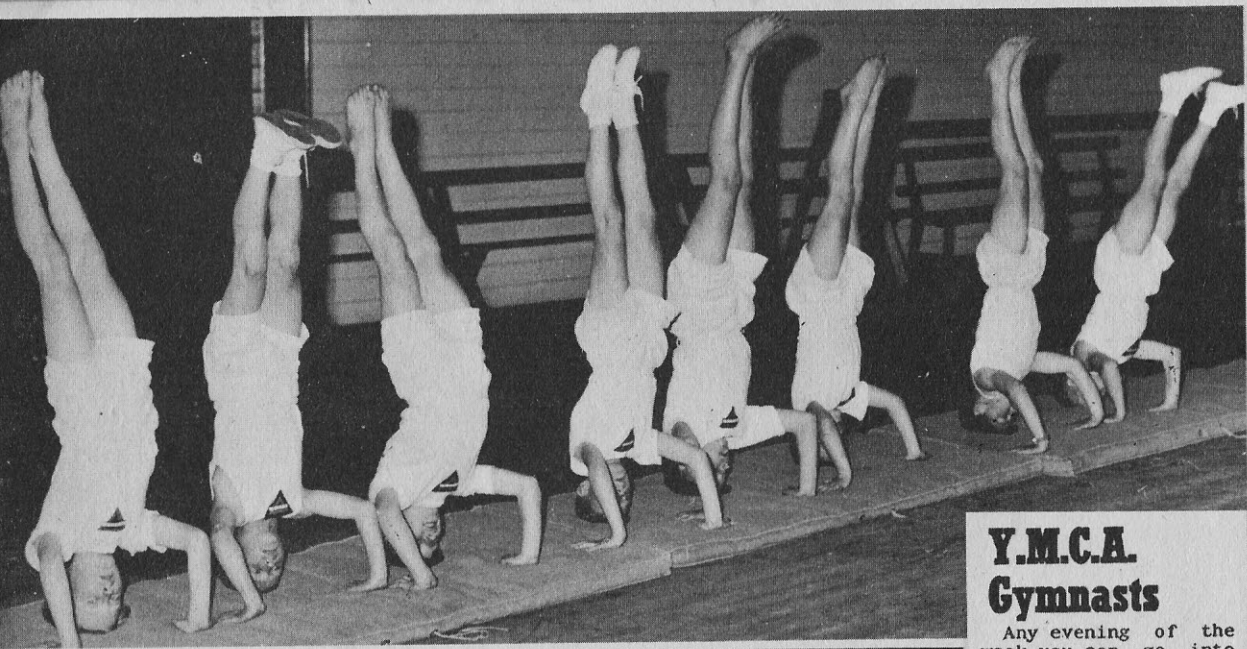

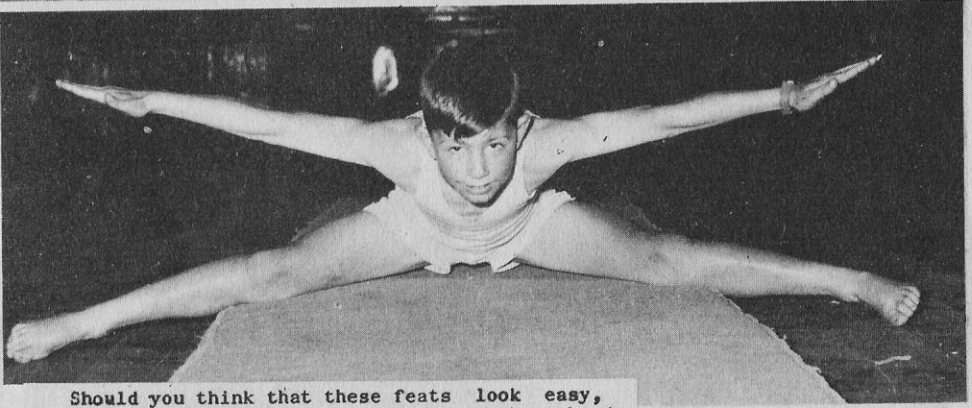

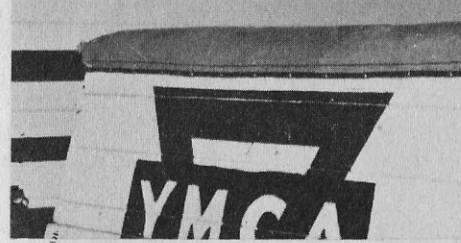
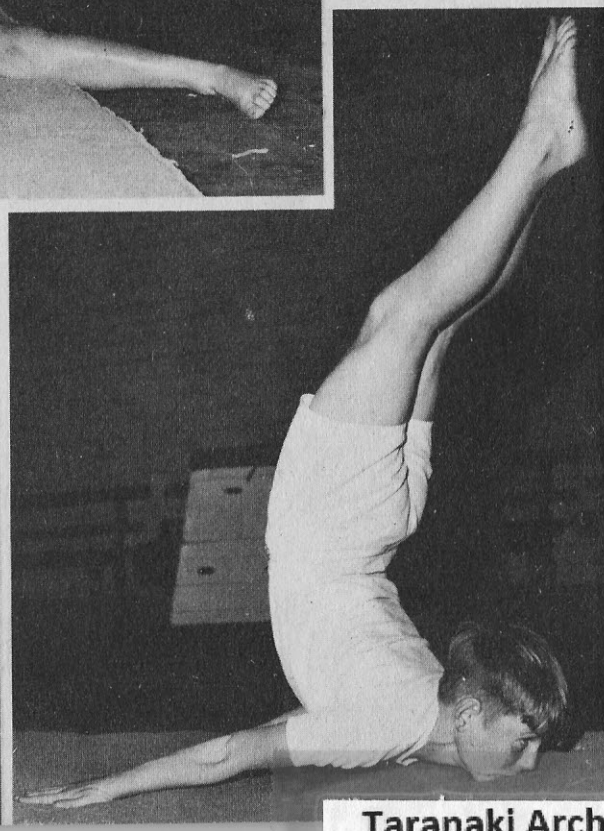
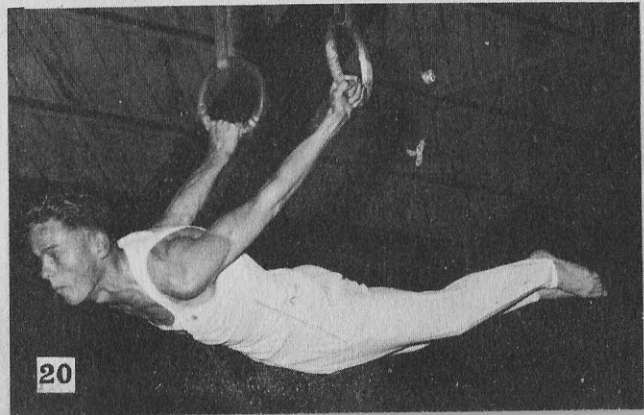

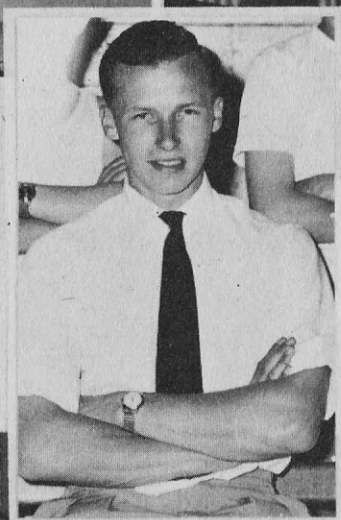
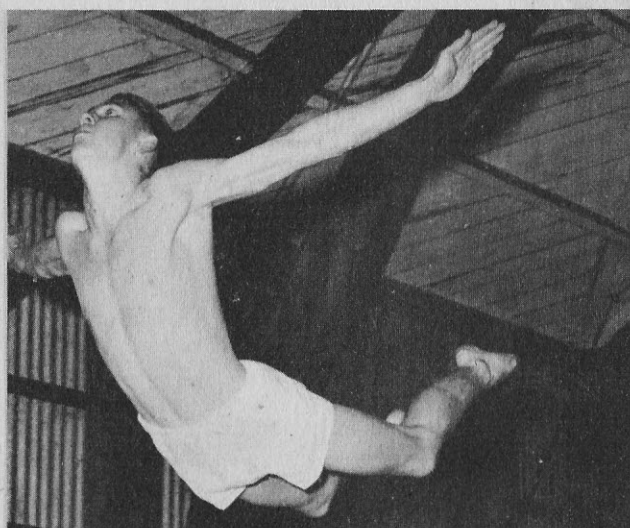
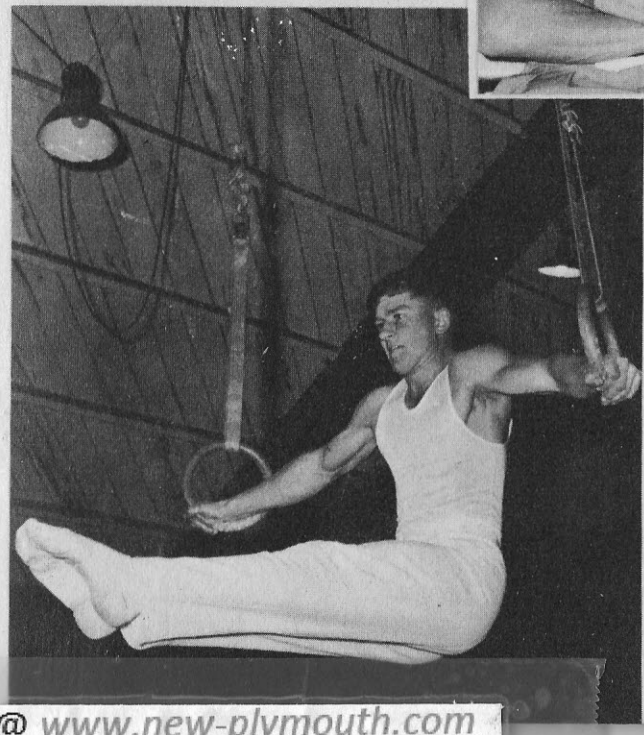

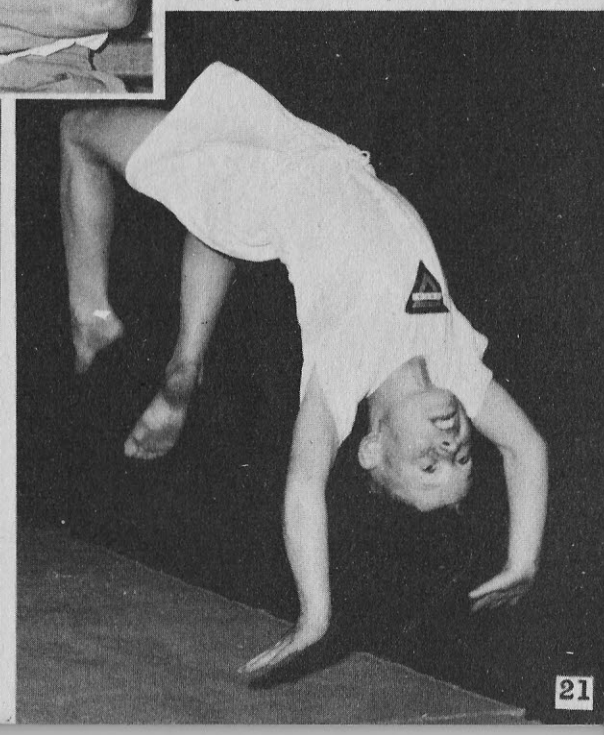

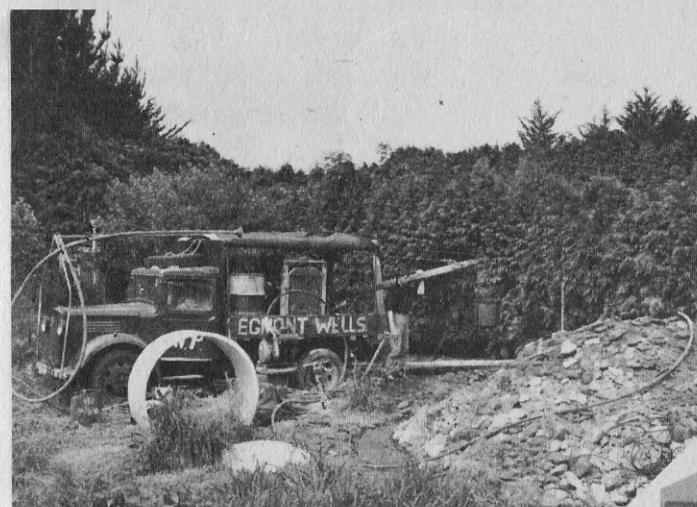


Roving Camera

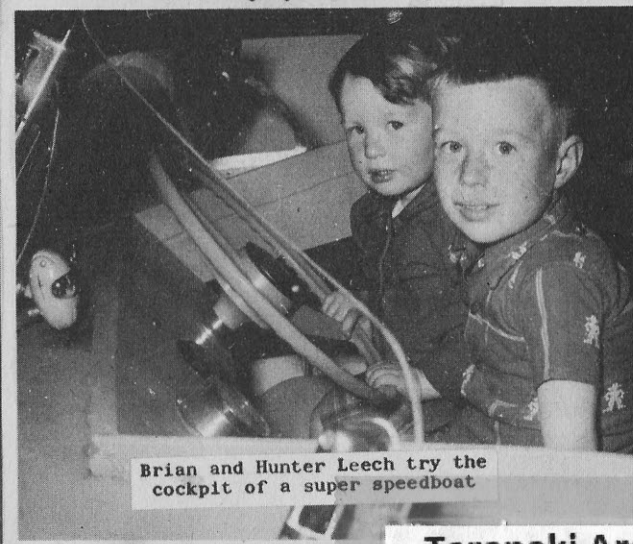

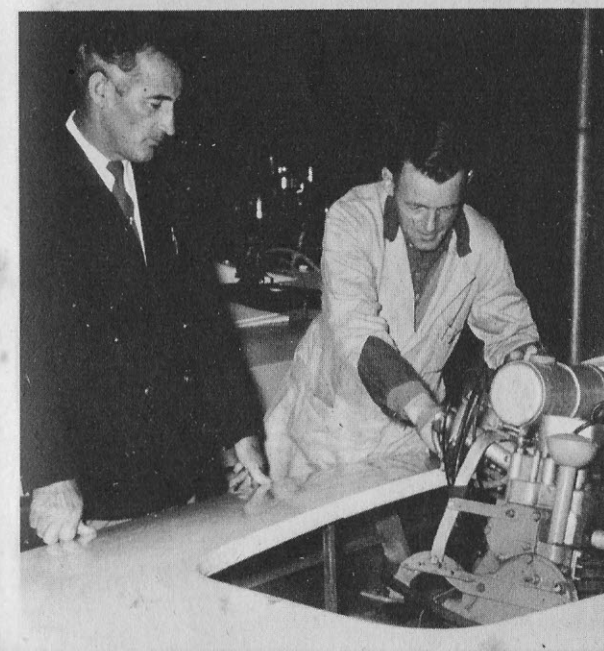

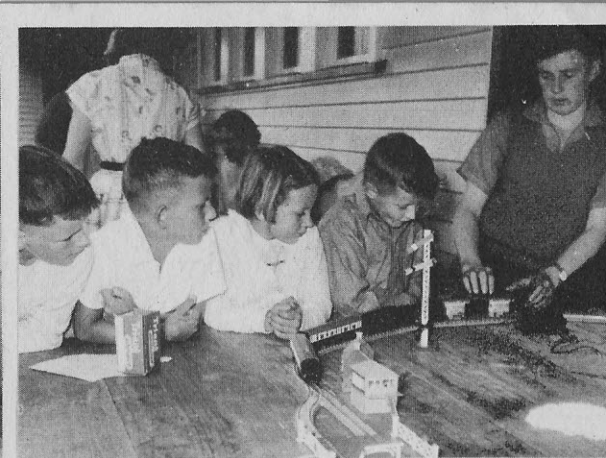

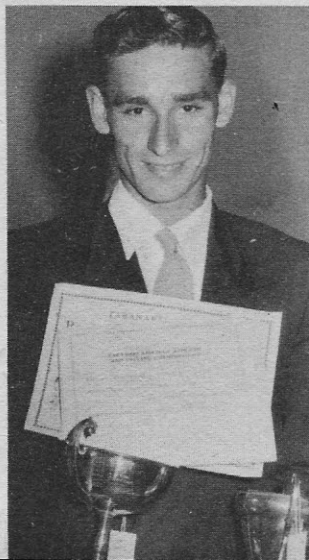

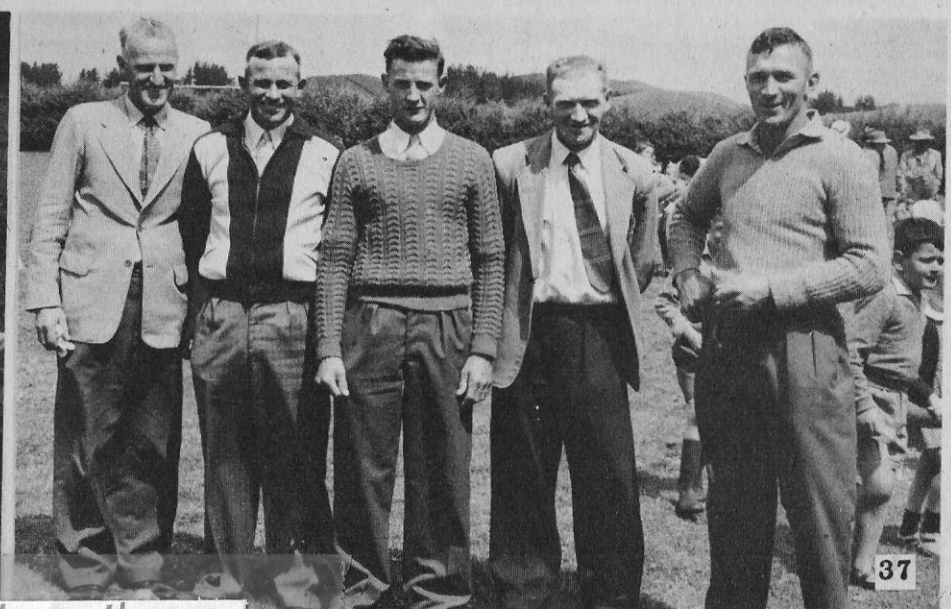

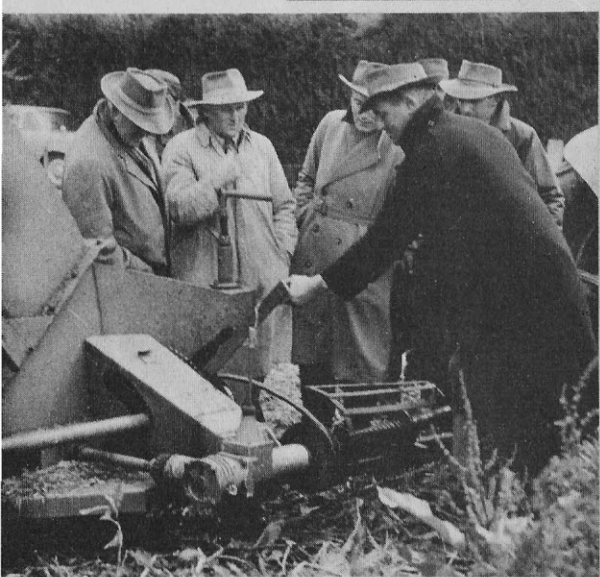

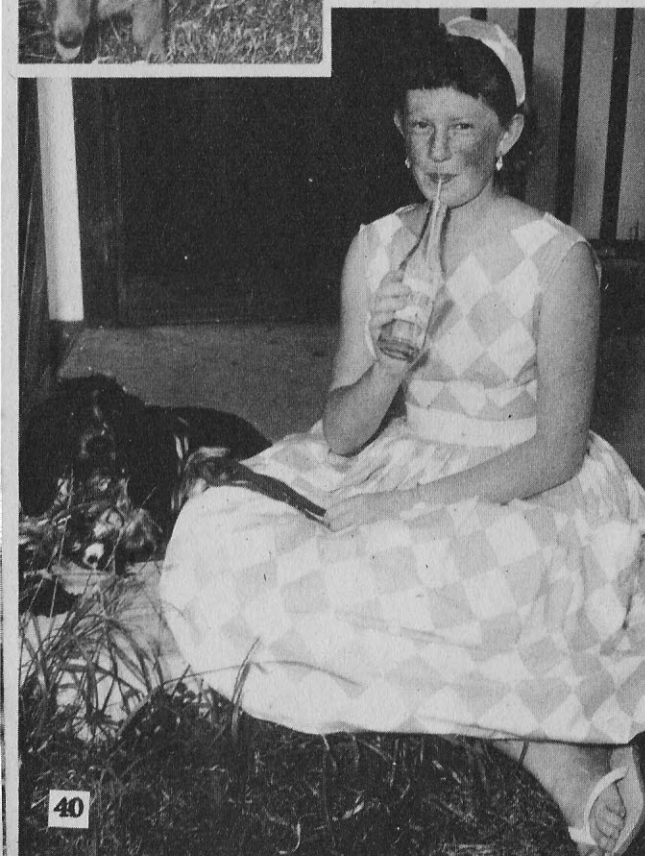

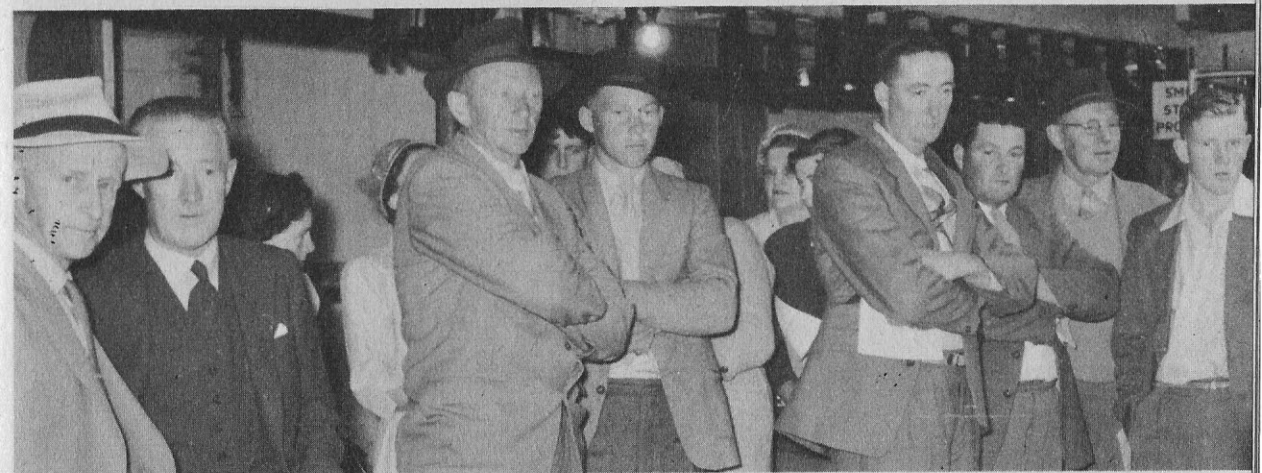


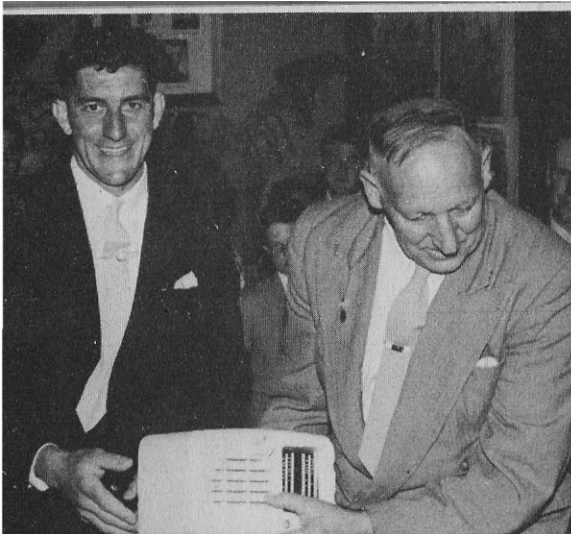

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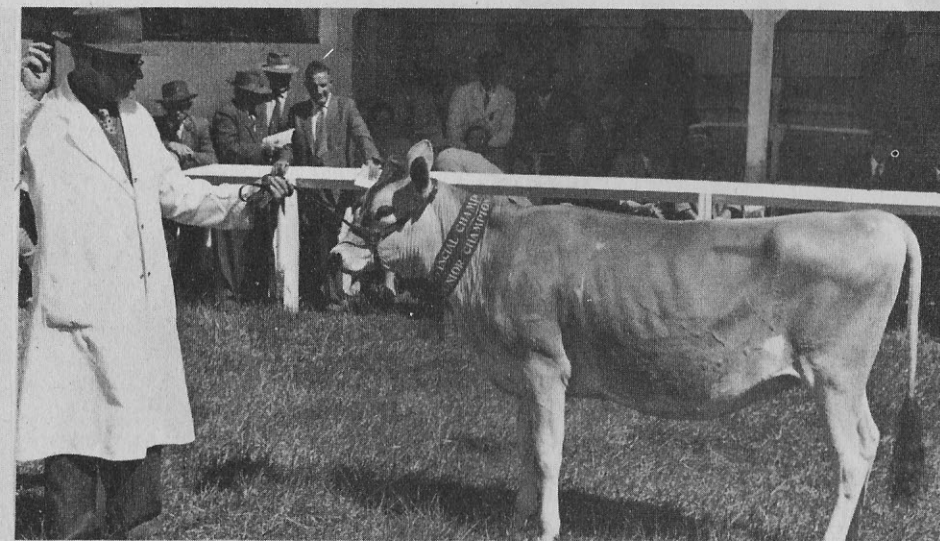
