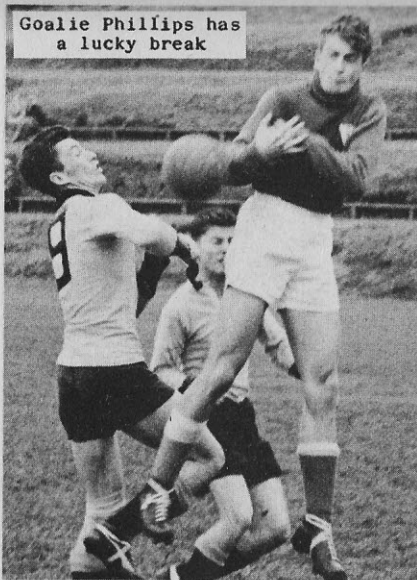

TARANAKI'S LUCKY BROWN SHIELD SOCCER WIN

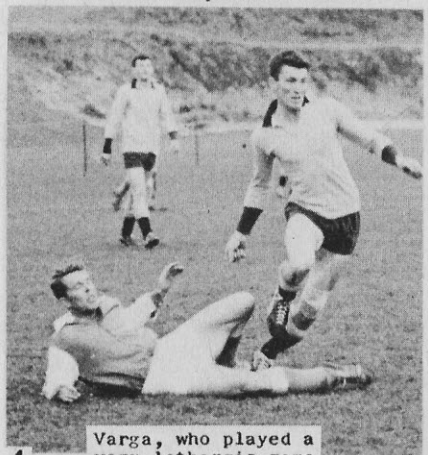

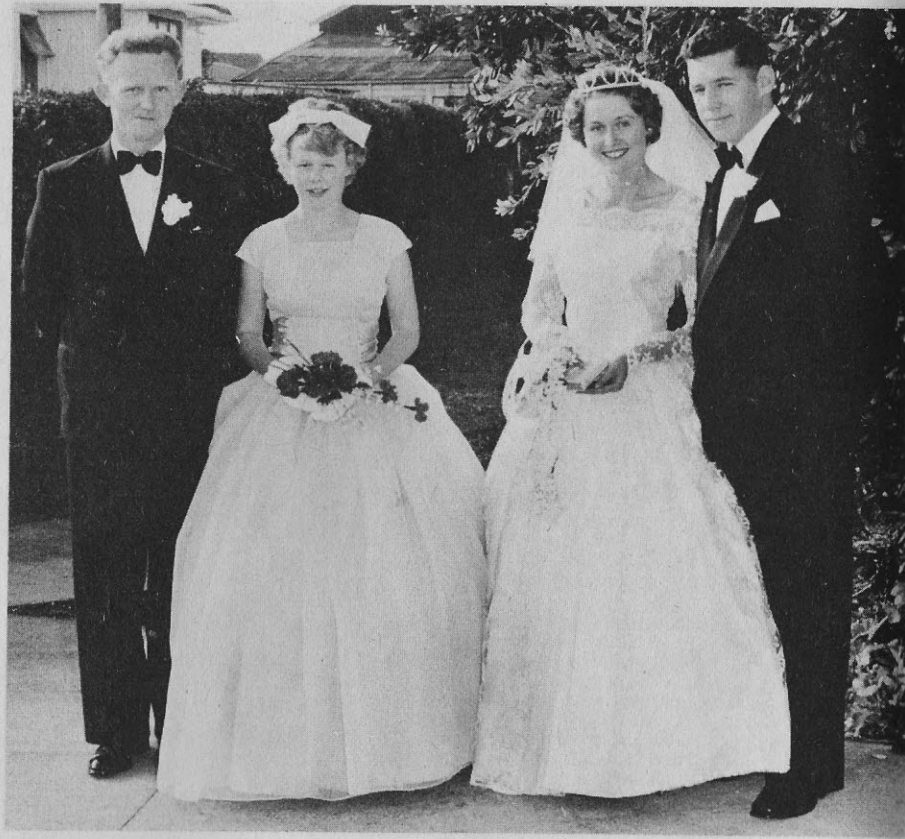

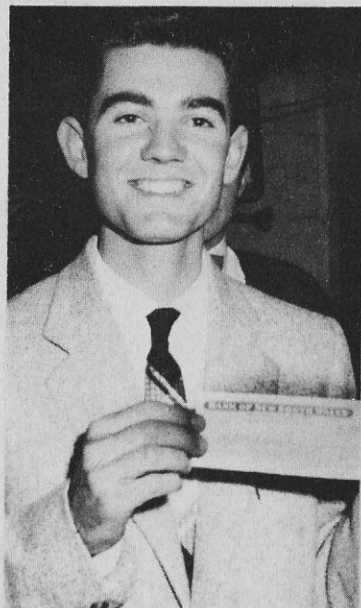

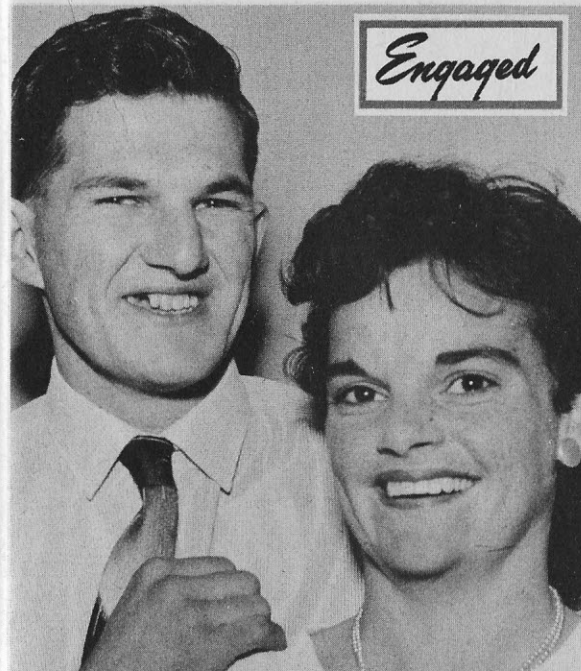

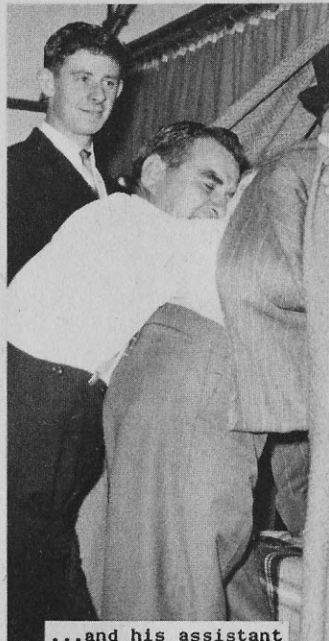


Savages Entertain Old Folks

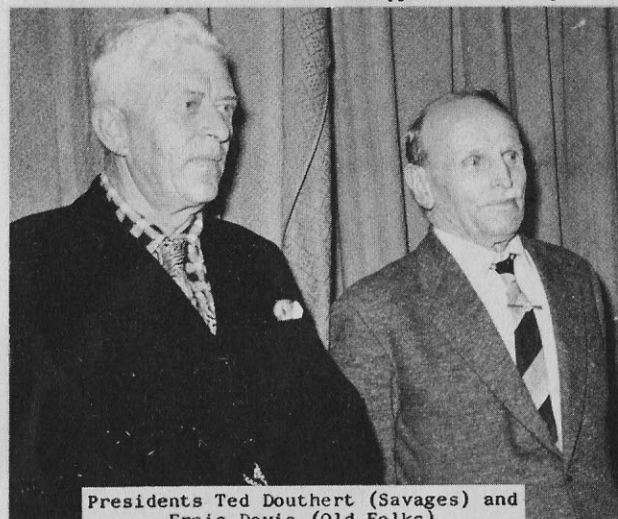


Snow..the mad musician

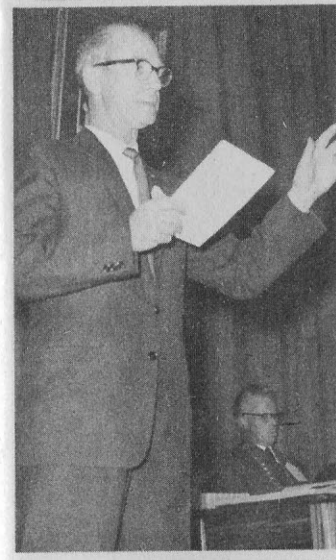

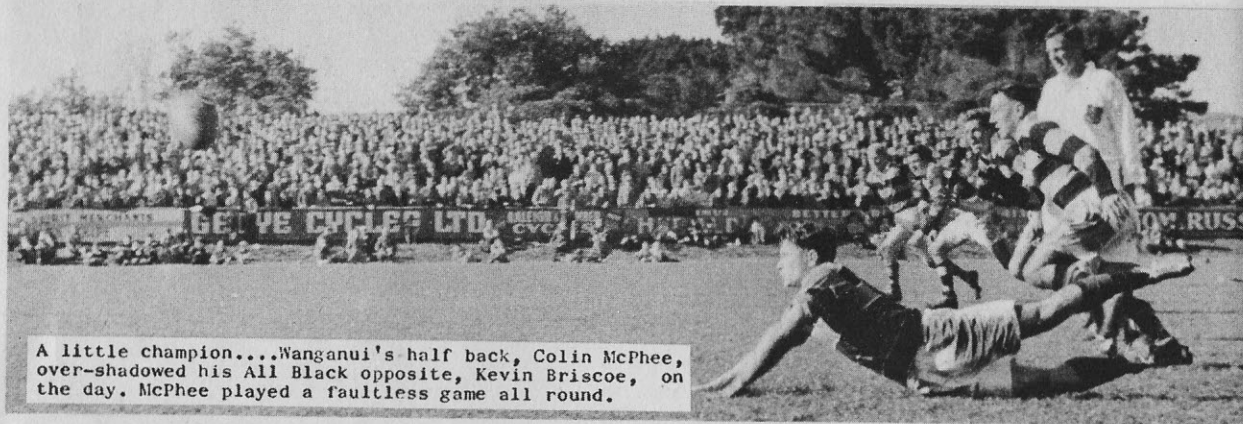

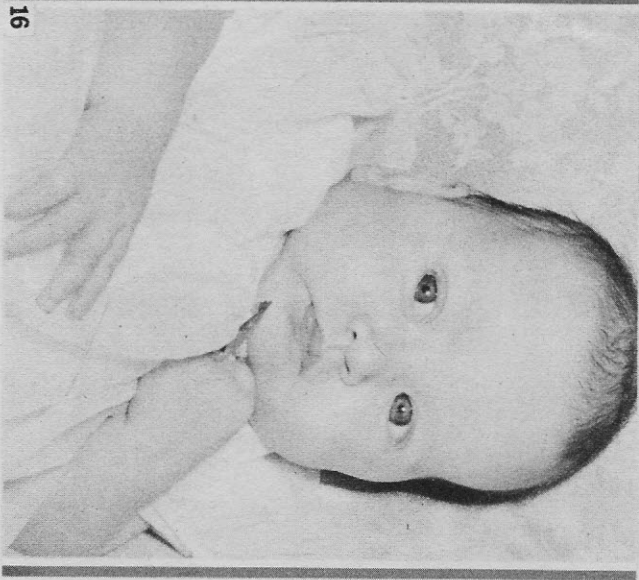

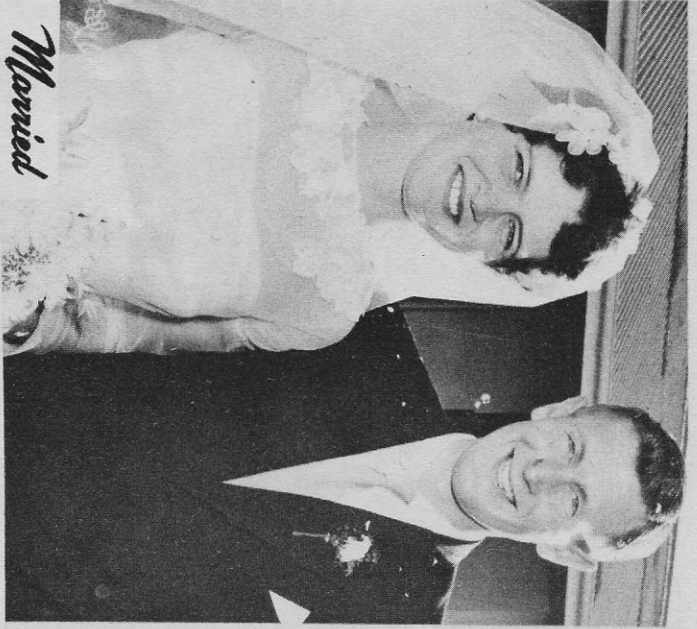

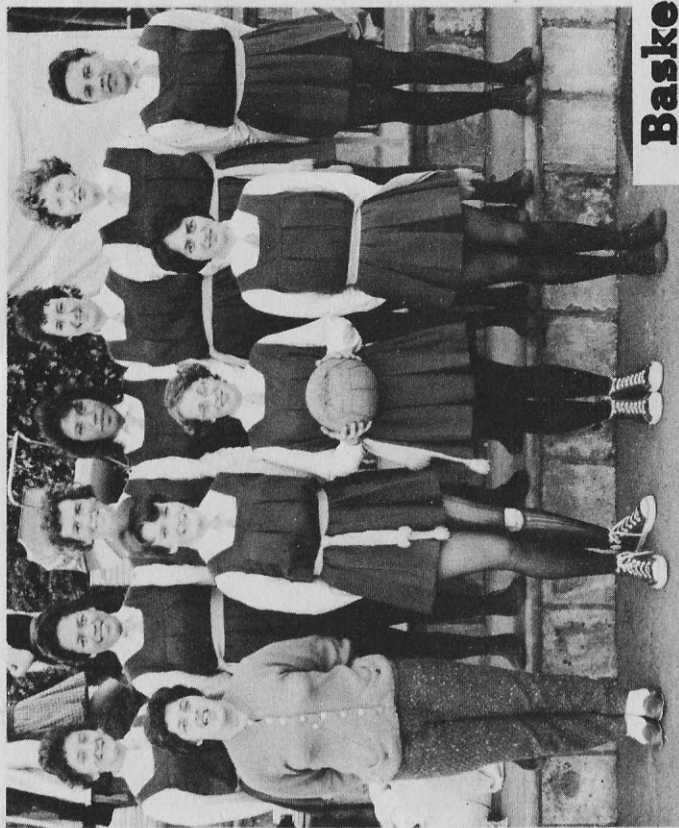

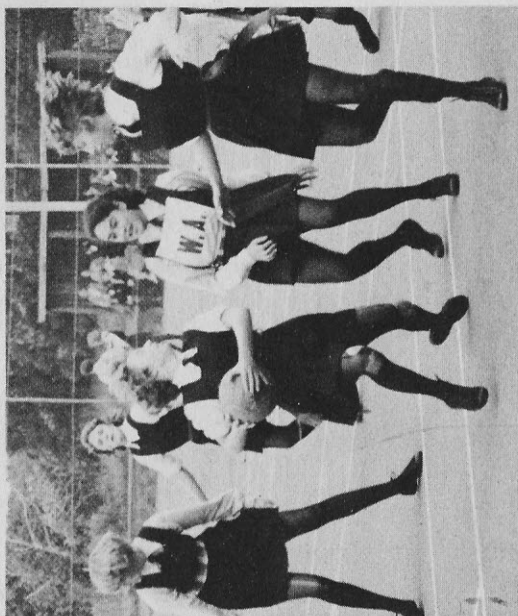


Basketball Tourney

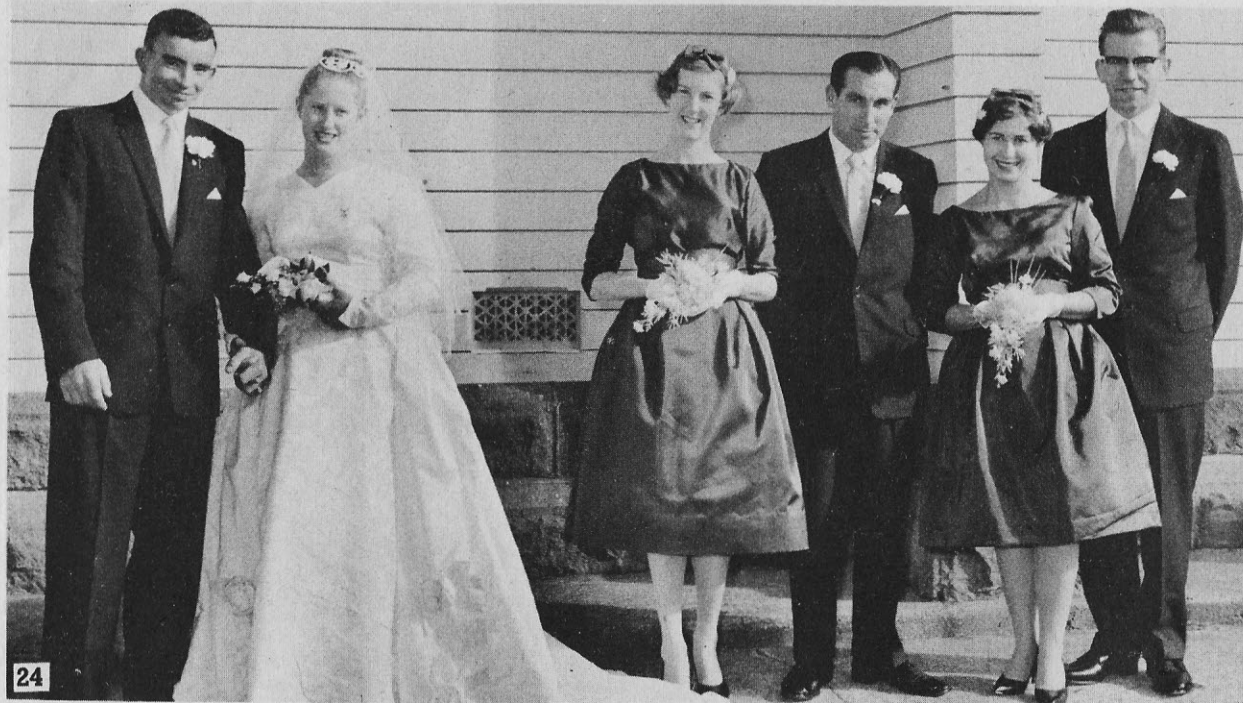

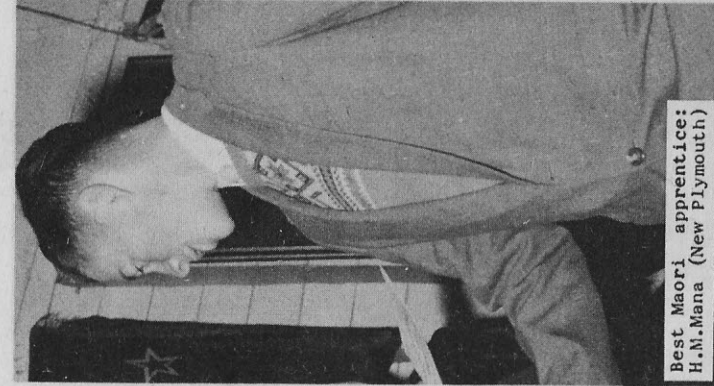

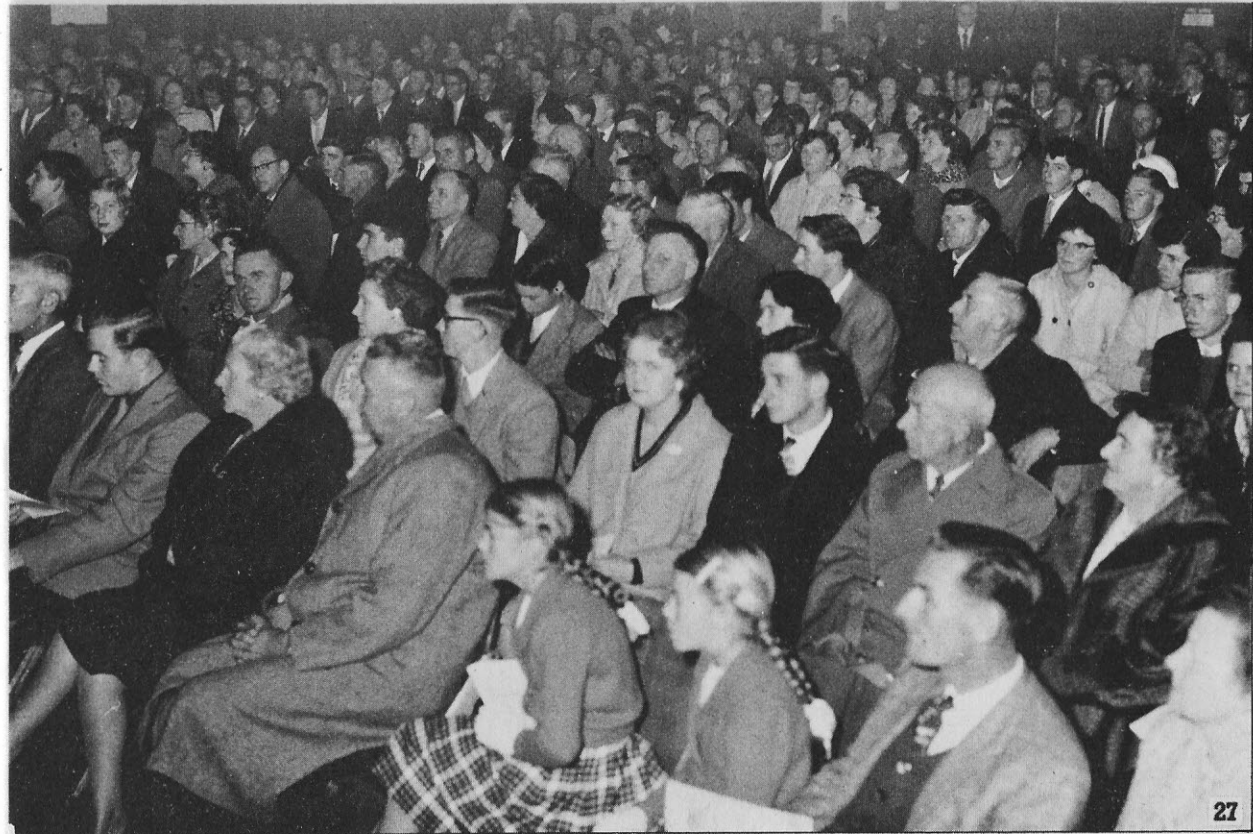

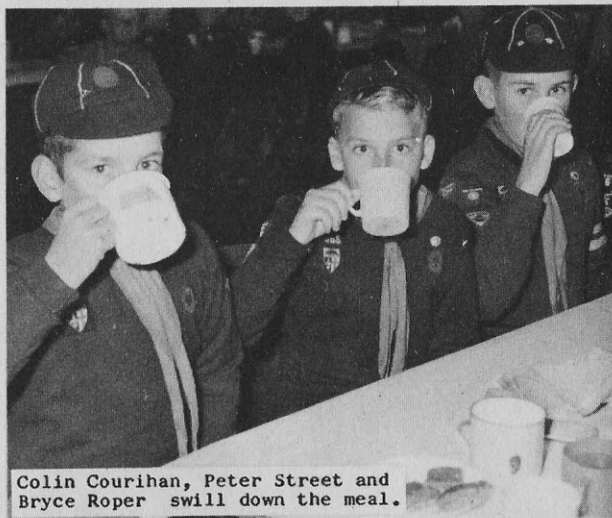




Welbourn Scouts & Cubs Celebrate Birthday

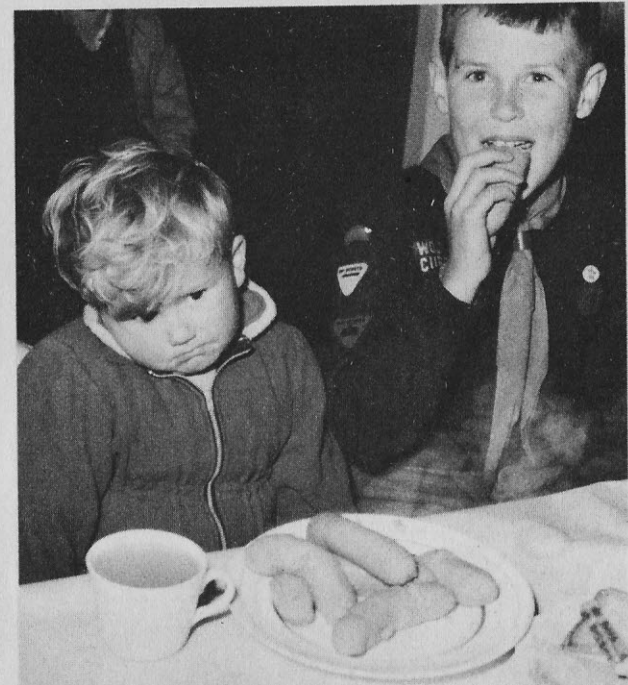

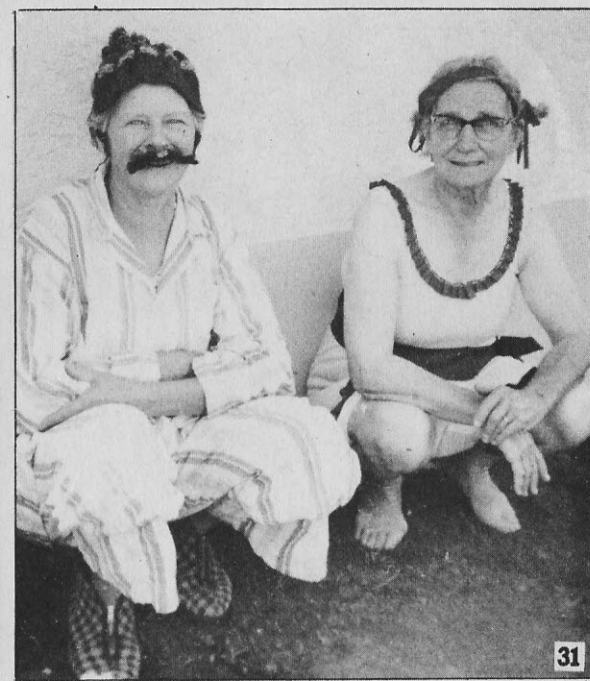
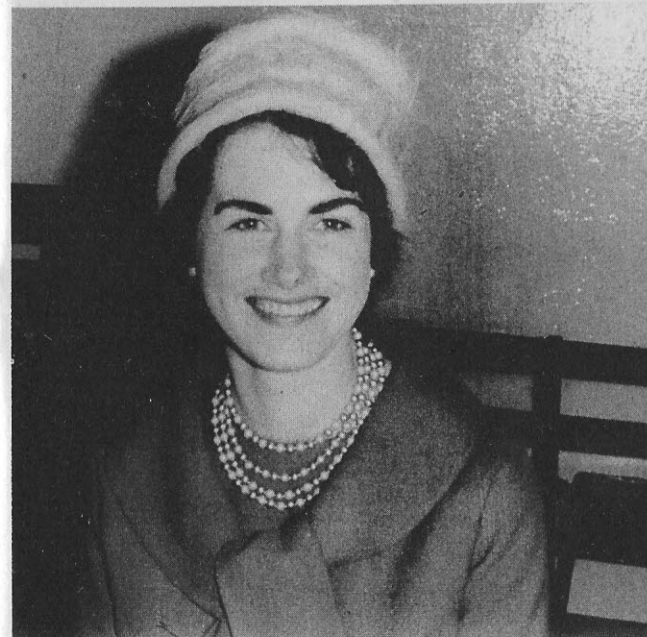

Indian Tourists Played Sparkling Hockey

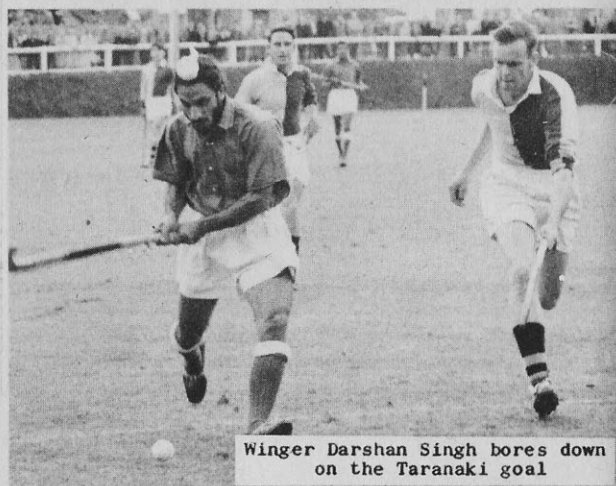

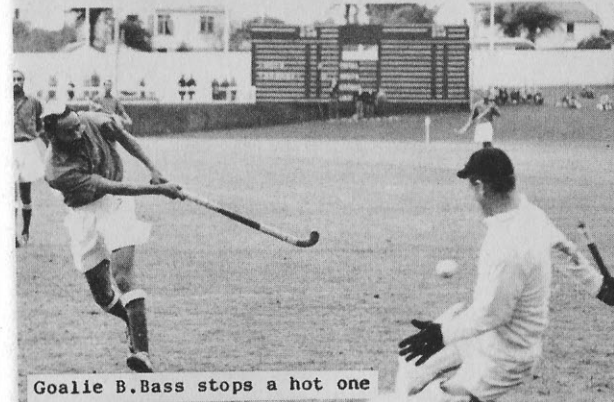

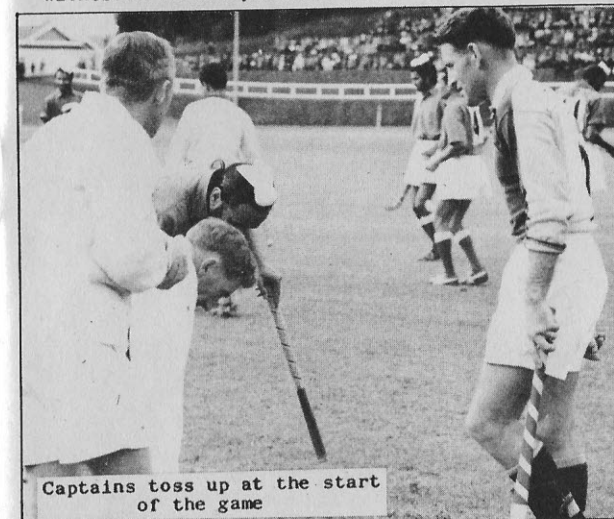

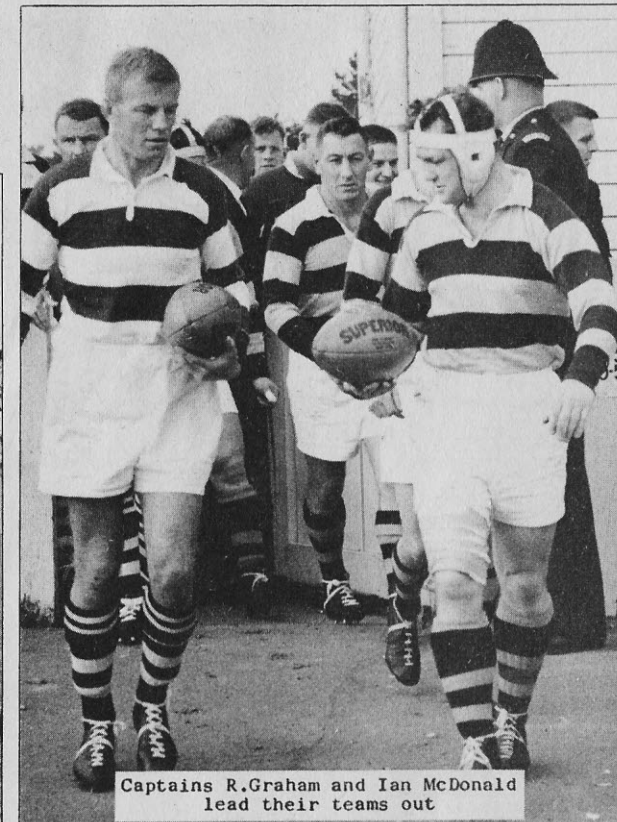


Taranaki Beaten by Auckland 6-5 in Tight, Robust Game

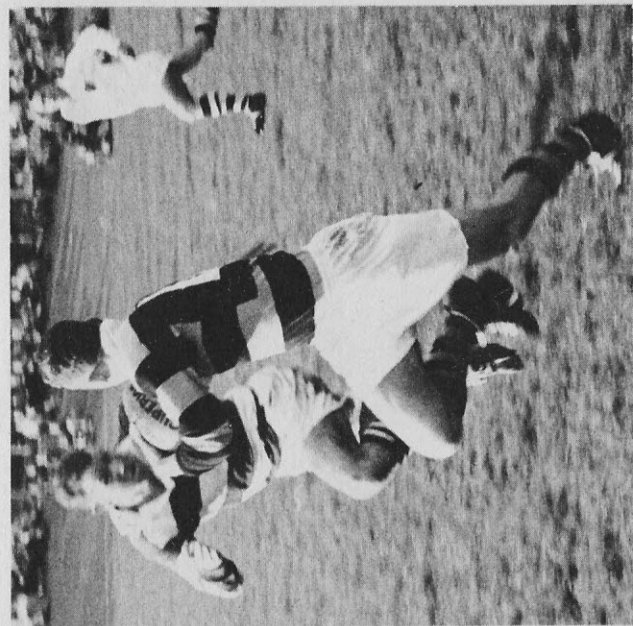

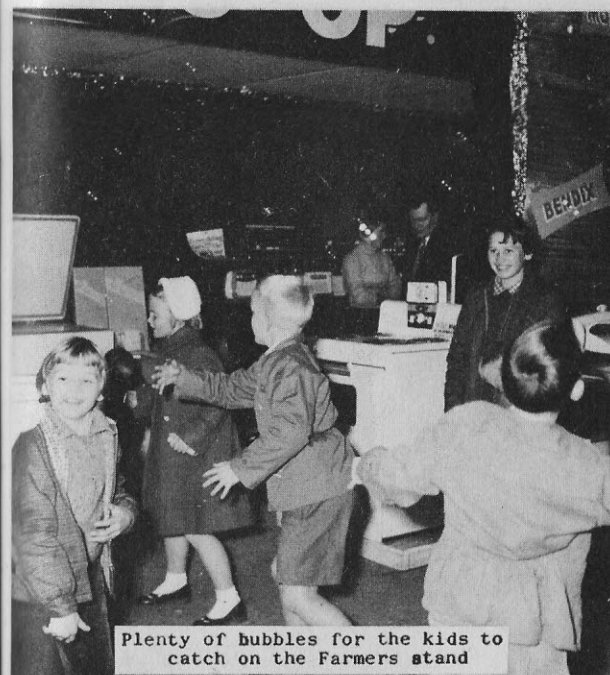

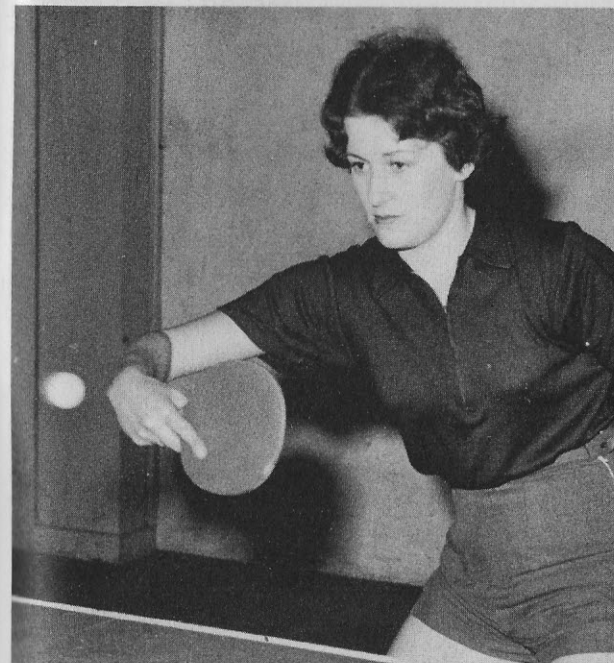

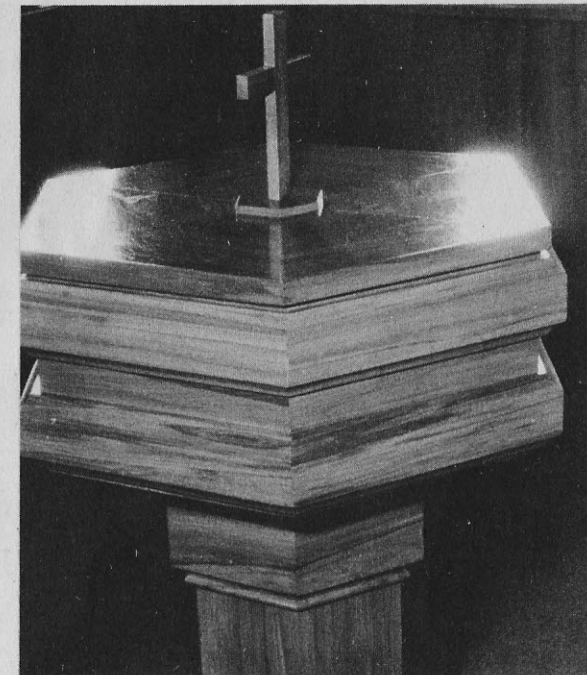

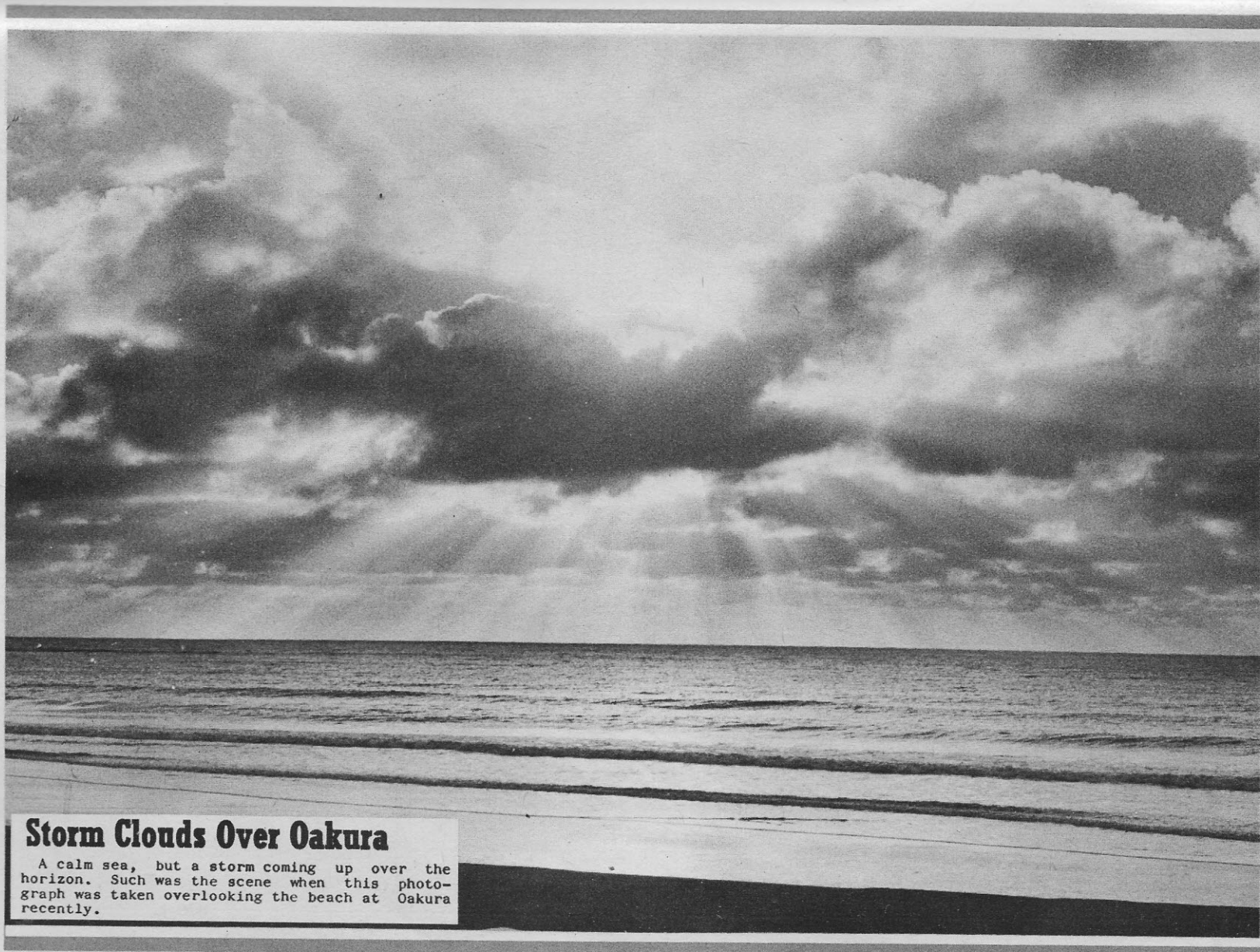
