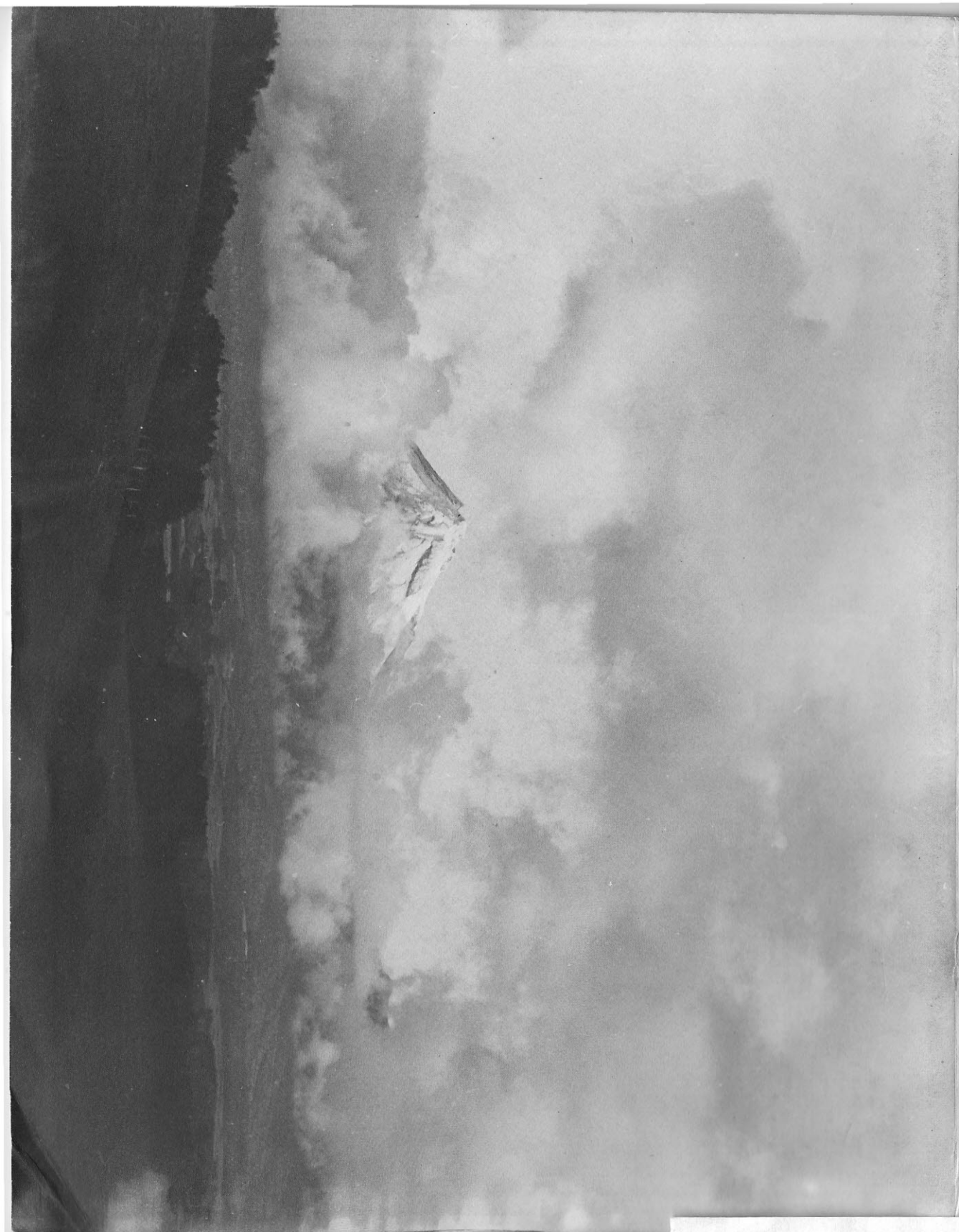

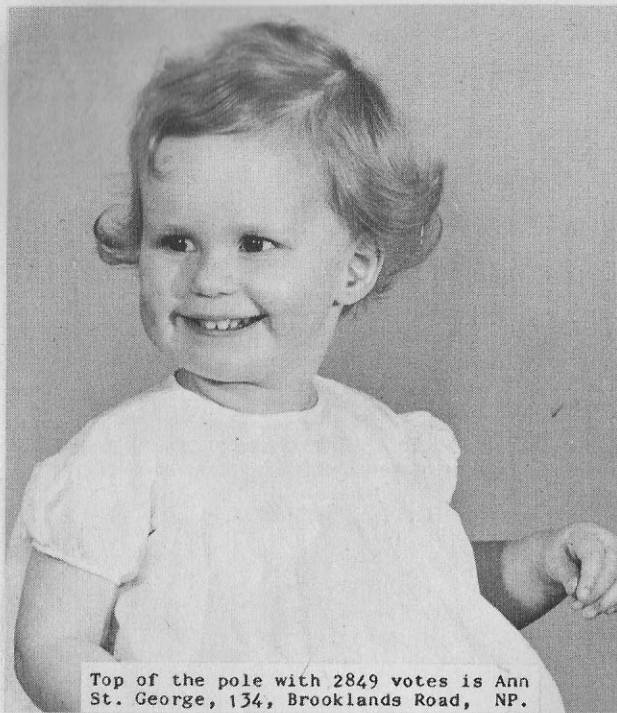


New Airport Site

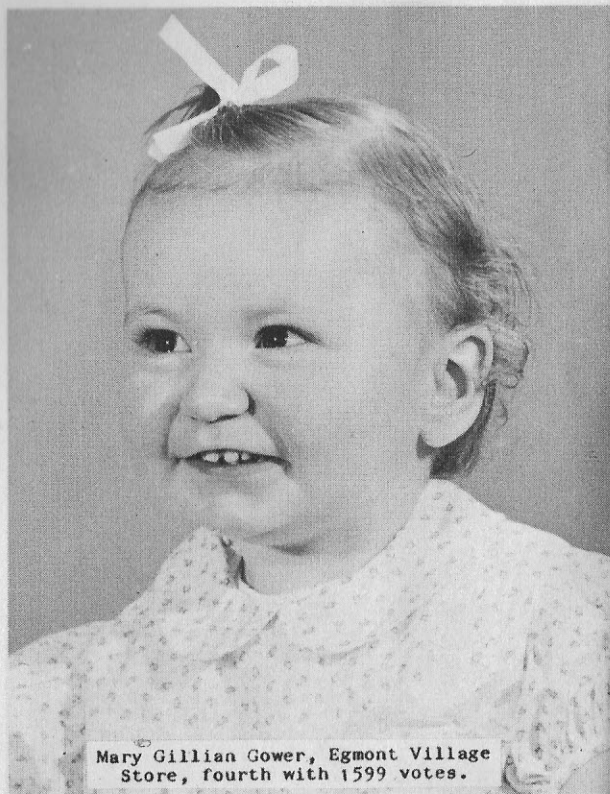

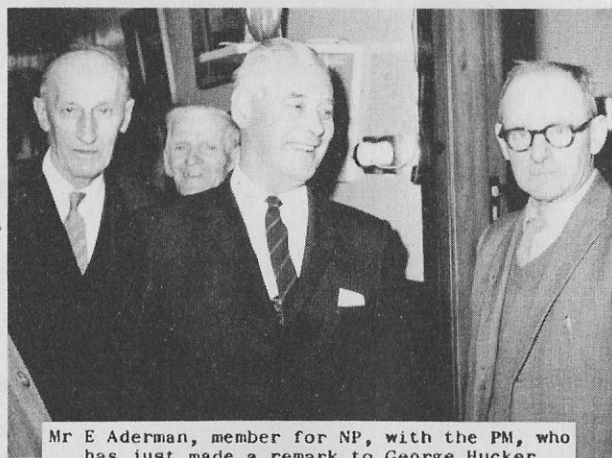
Old Folks Get V.I.P. Visitor

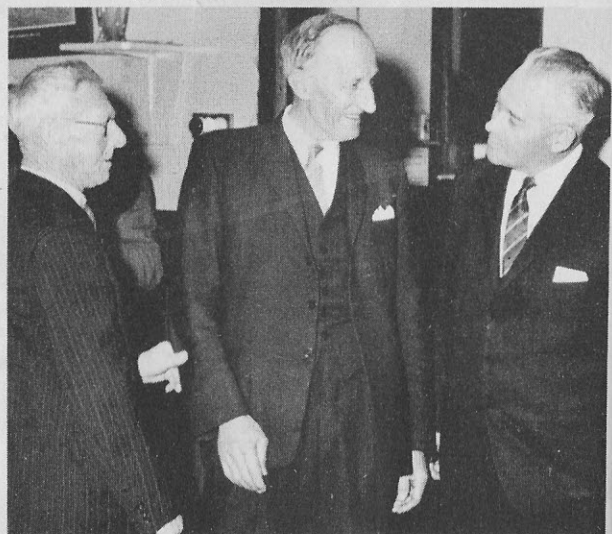

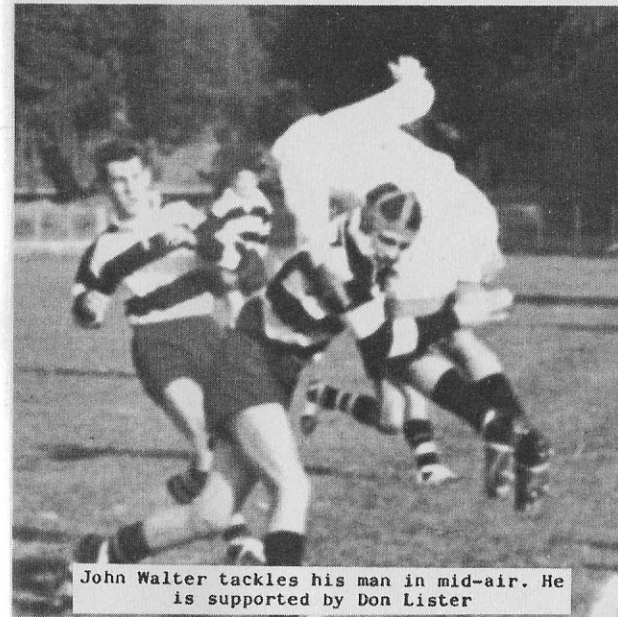

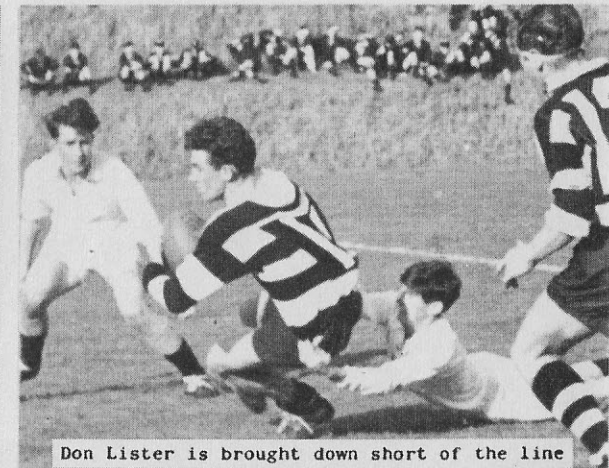

Rugby: B.H.S. Beaten By Collegiate

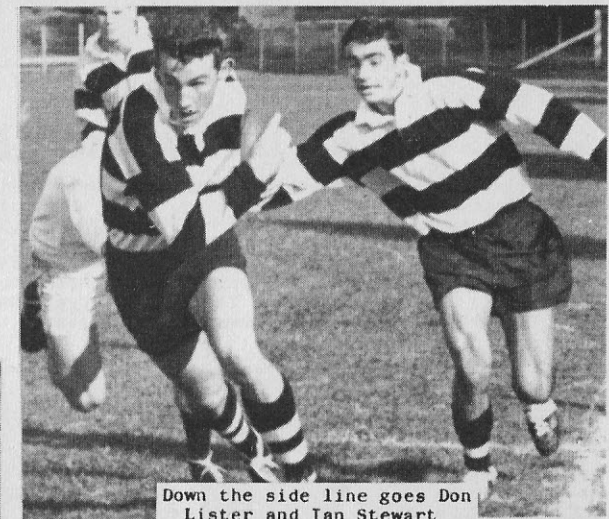

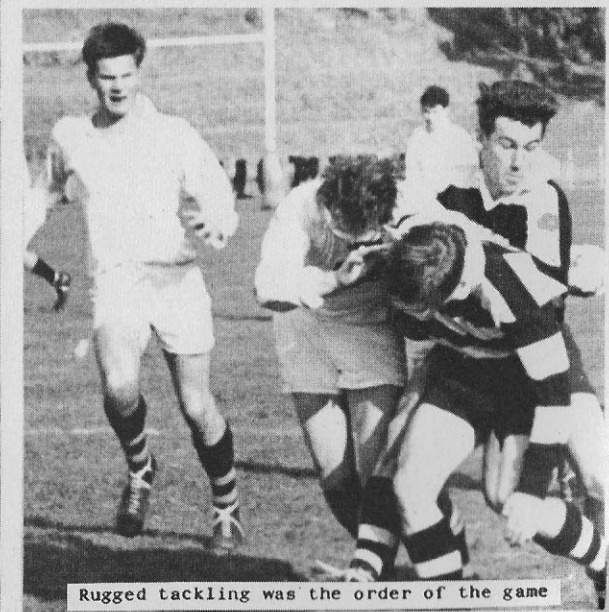

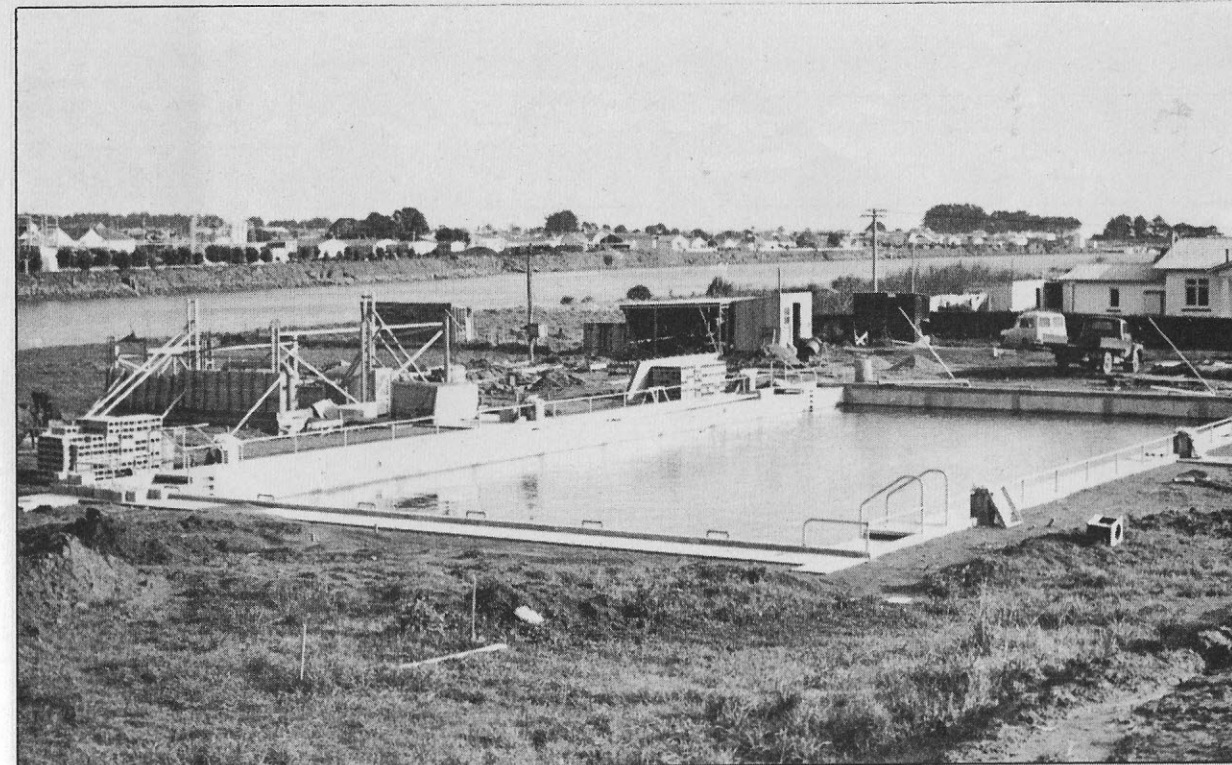




Progress In The City

The two major building projects in the city, the Tasman Hotel and the new Olympic swimming pool at Kawaroa, are now well advanced. There are, of course, many minor operations taking place in other parts of the city, which all help to modernise and fill some of the empty sections in the business area. The Tasman Hotel, above, has become a landmark in the city, with its eight storeys reaching skywards. It dwarfs the present building, shown in the foreground. Not only was the Tasman the first building to use the "lift-slab" method of building, it will be New Plymouth's first skyscraper.

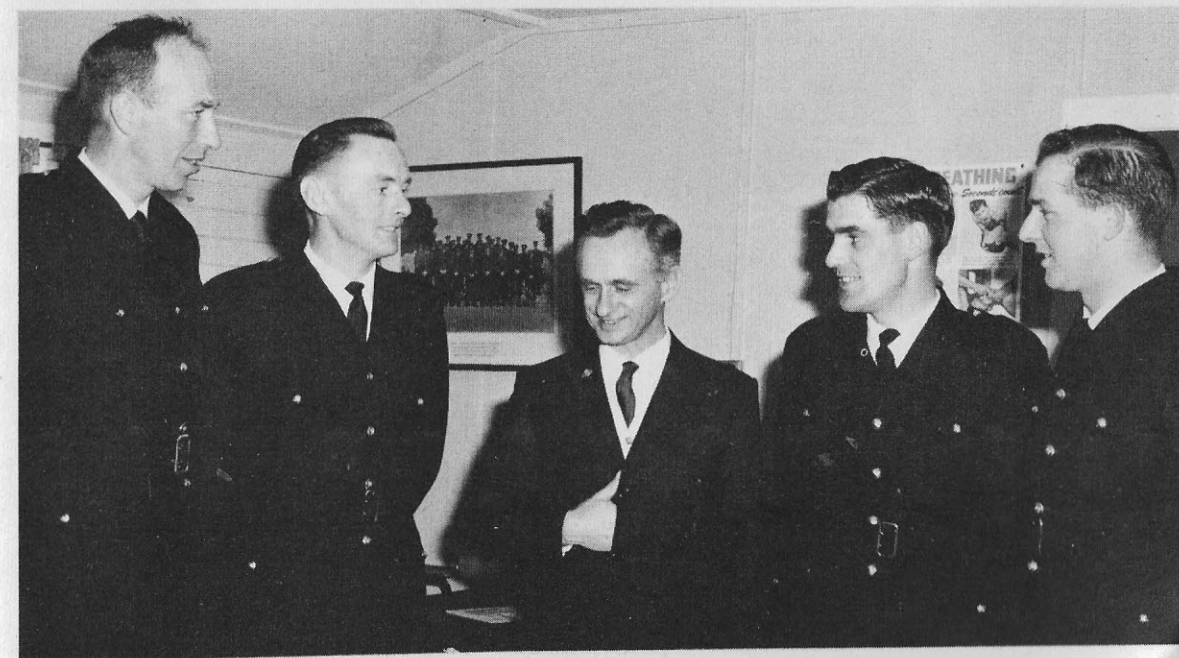

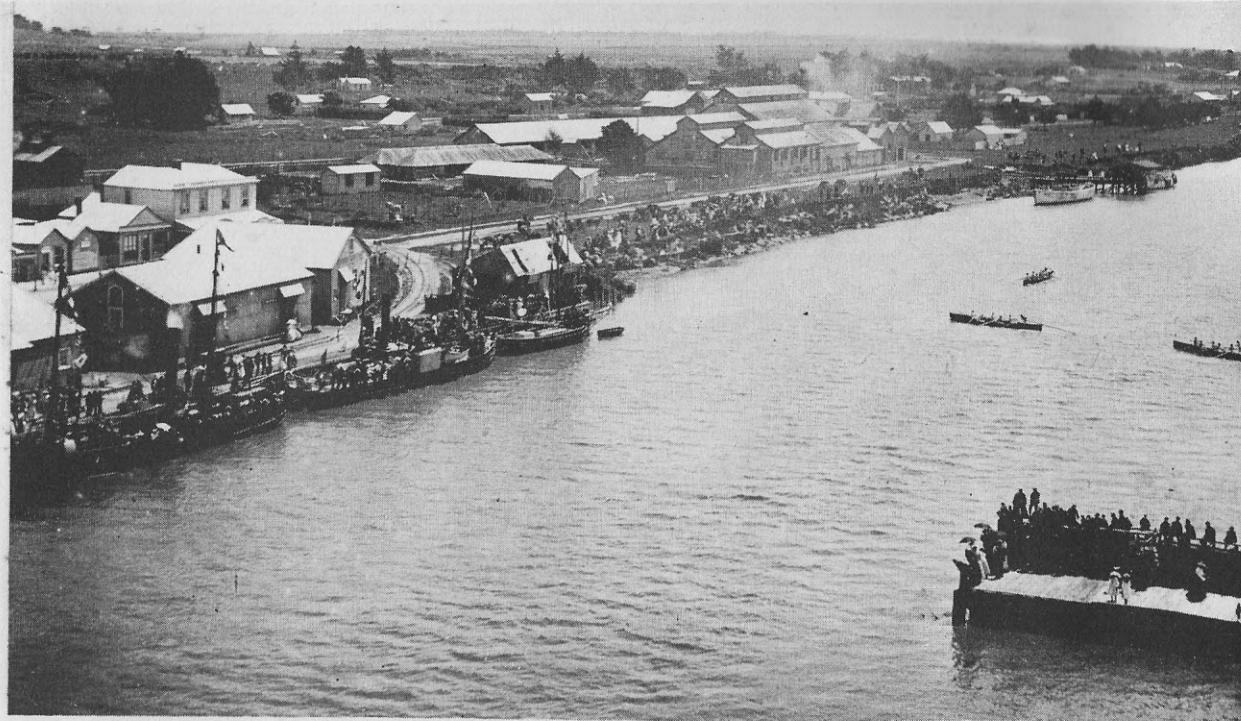

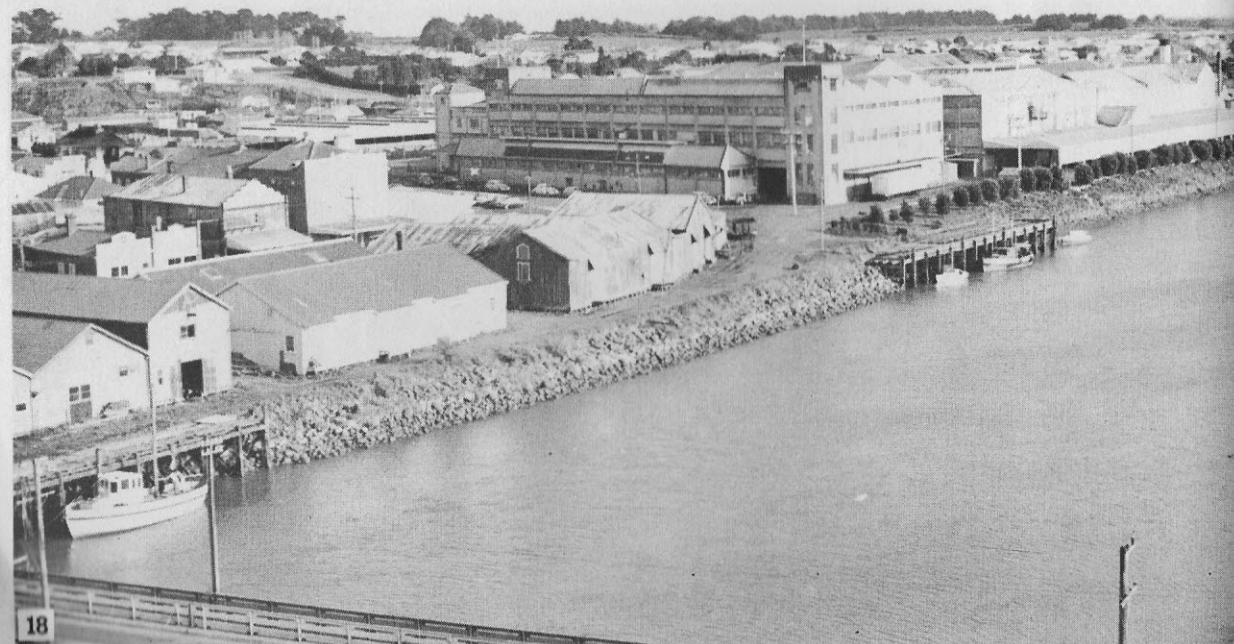

Waitara Has Changed In 60 Years

A great change has taken place at Waitara in the last 60 years as these photographs show. The picture above, taken around 1905, shows the Waitara River on Regatta Day. Perhaps not so crowded as regatta days now, but none the less popular. At bottom right of this picture is the old Eastern wharf, whilst on the opposite side of the river is the now extinct Freezing Works wharf. The remains of this are clearly shown in the photograph, below, which was taken recently. It plainly shows the expansion of the works, and also the usage that the town wharf got in those days. But the two sheds by the town wharf are still standing, as can be seen in the modern photograph.

"Mikado" Production Coming To Waitara

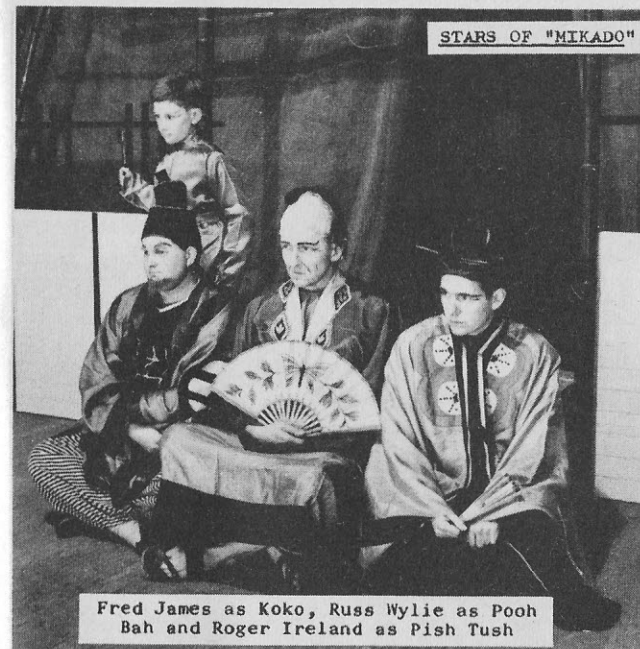

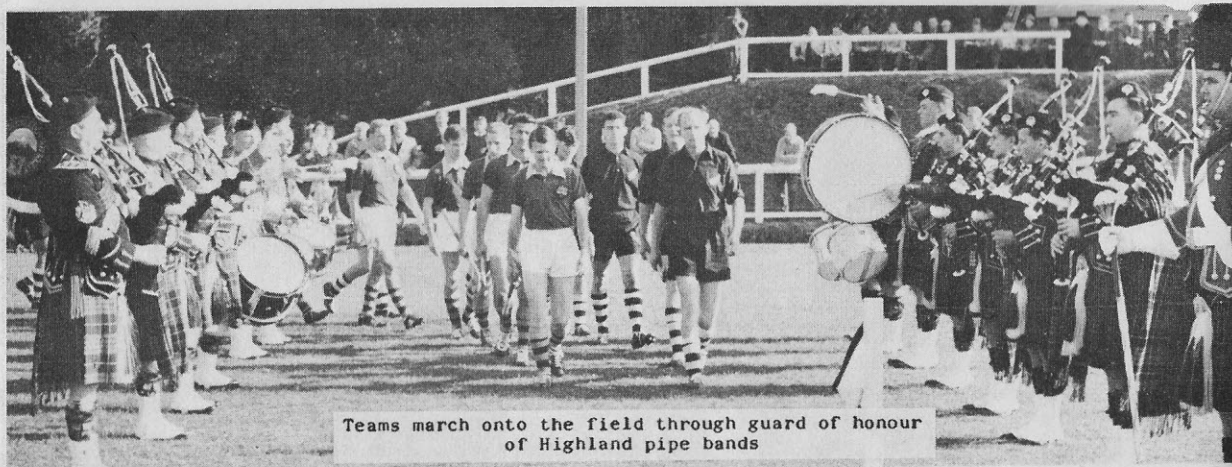

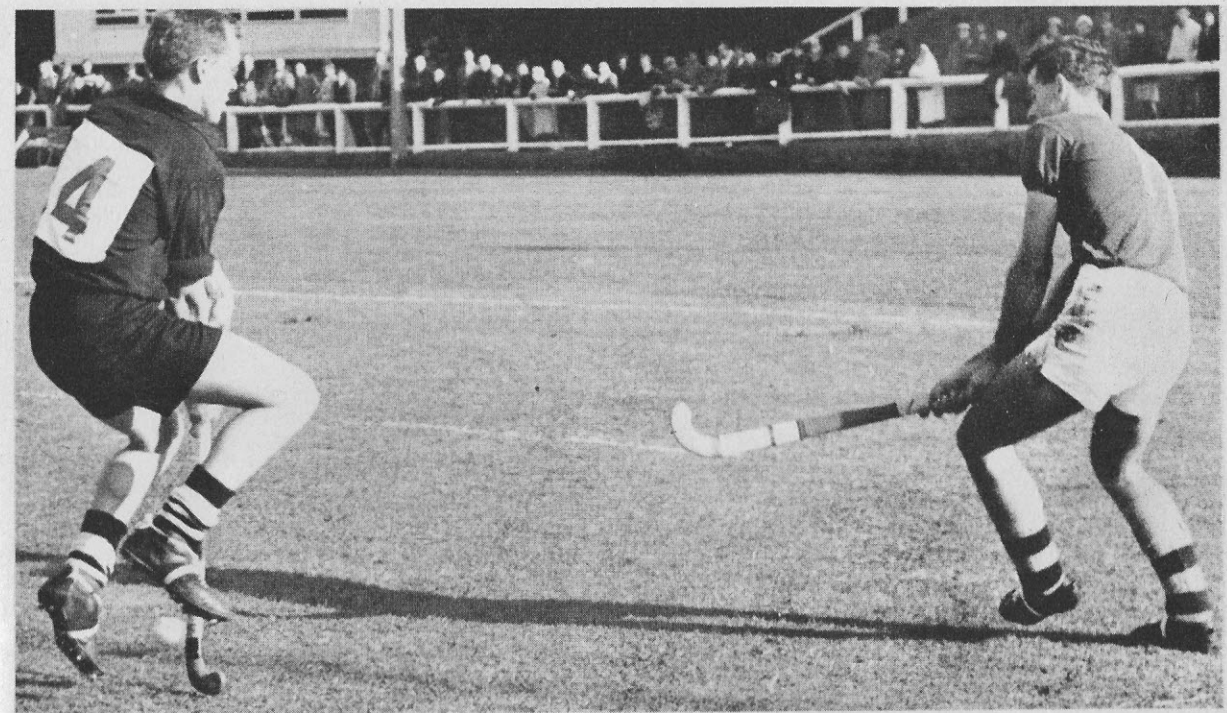

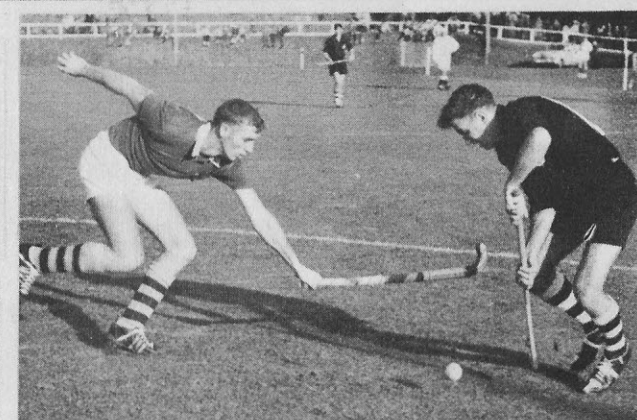

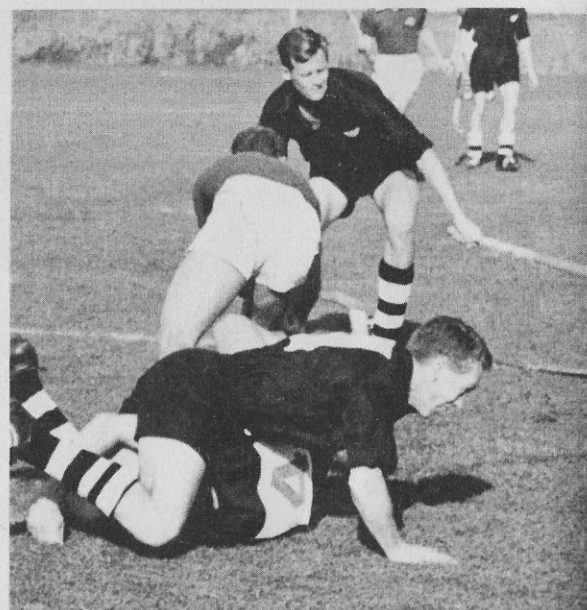
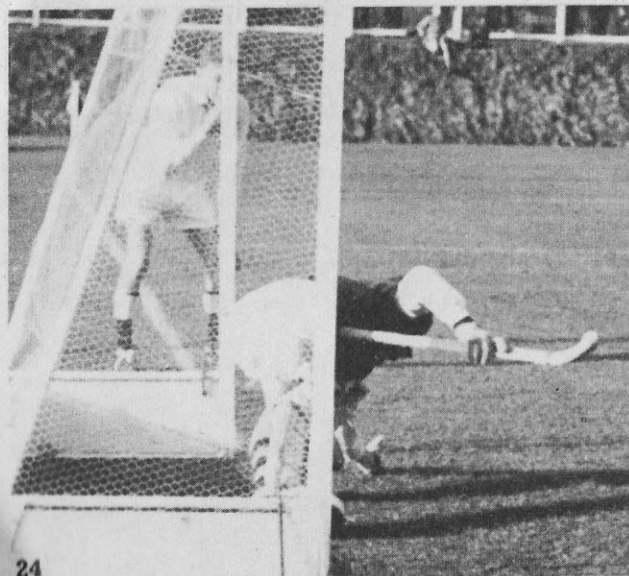

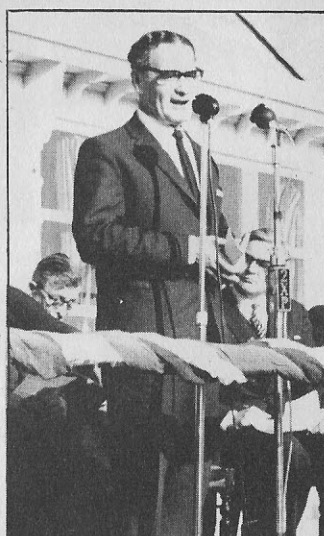
New Wing Opened At Calvary Hospital

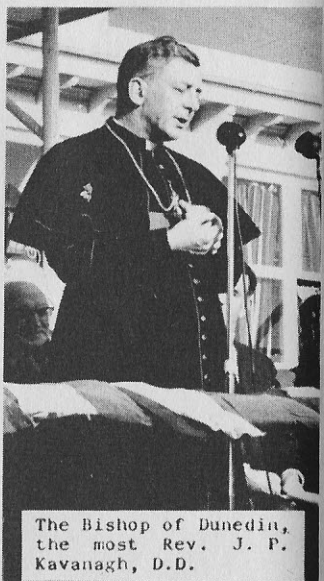

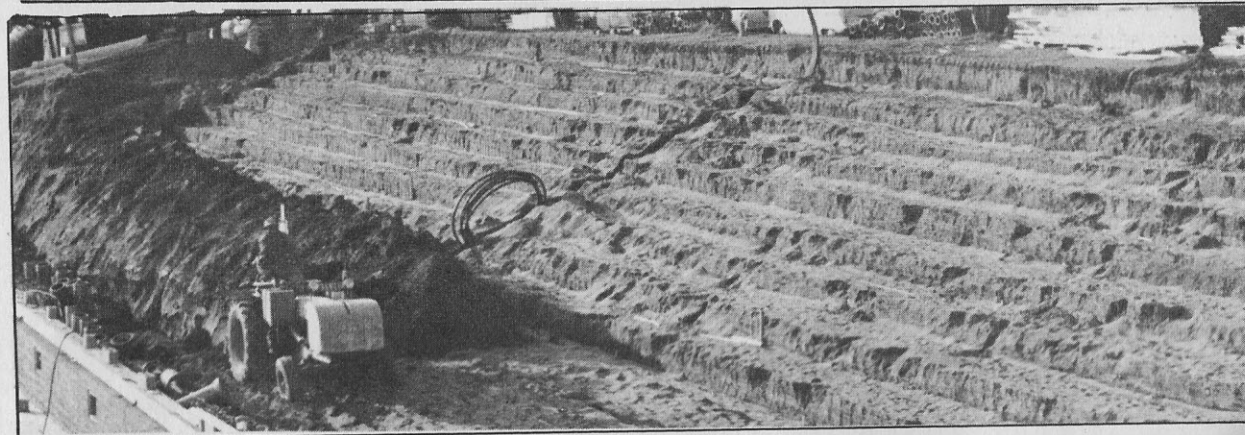
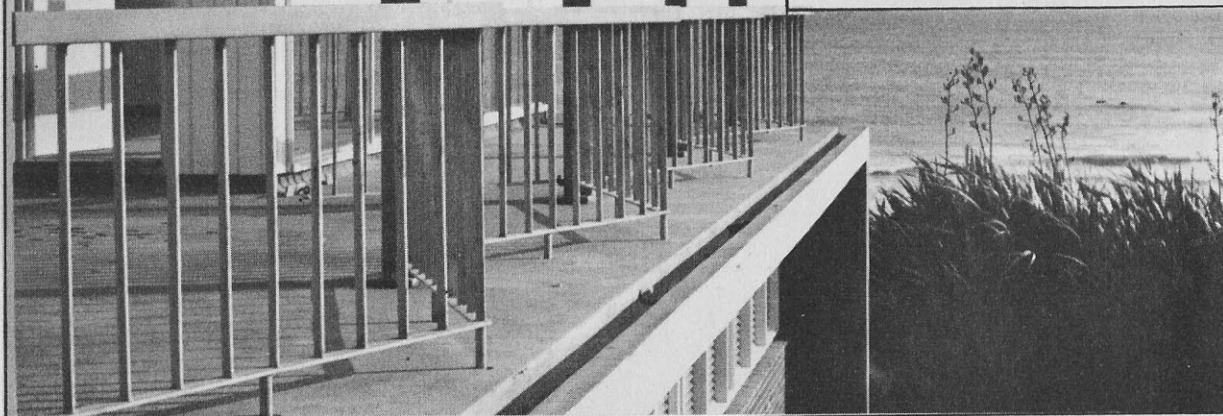

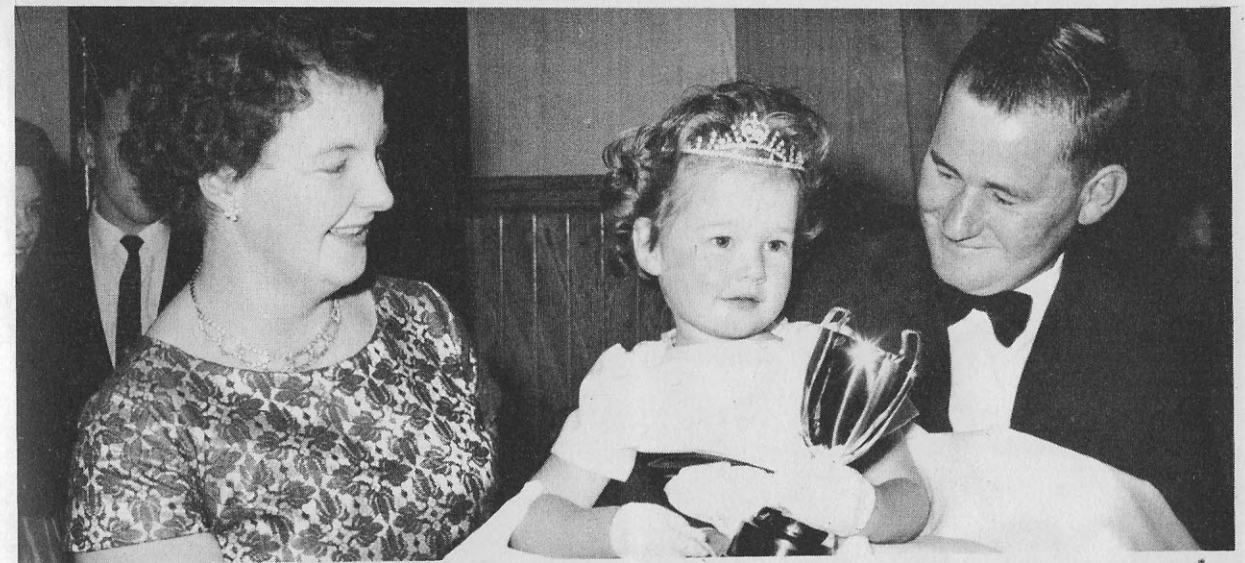

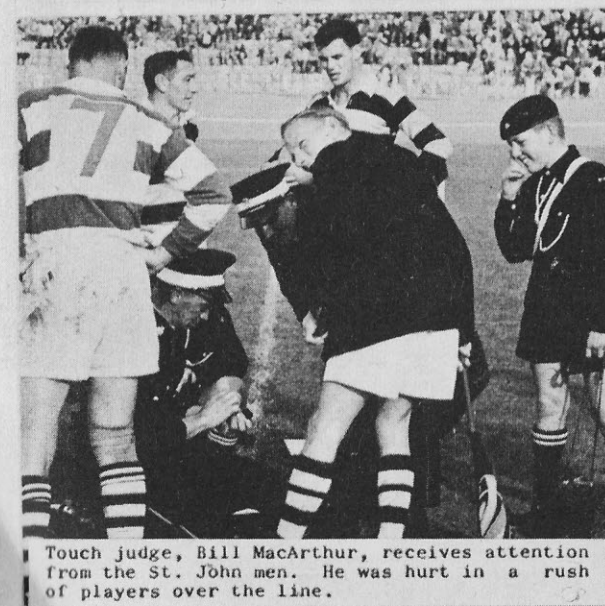

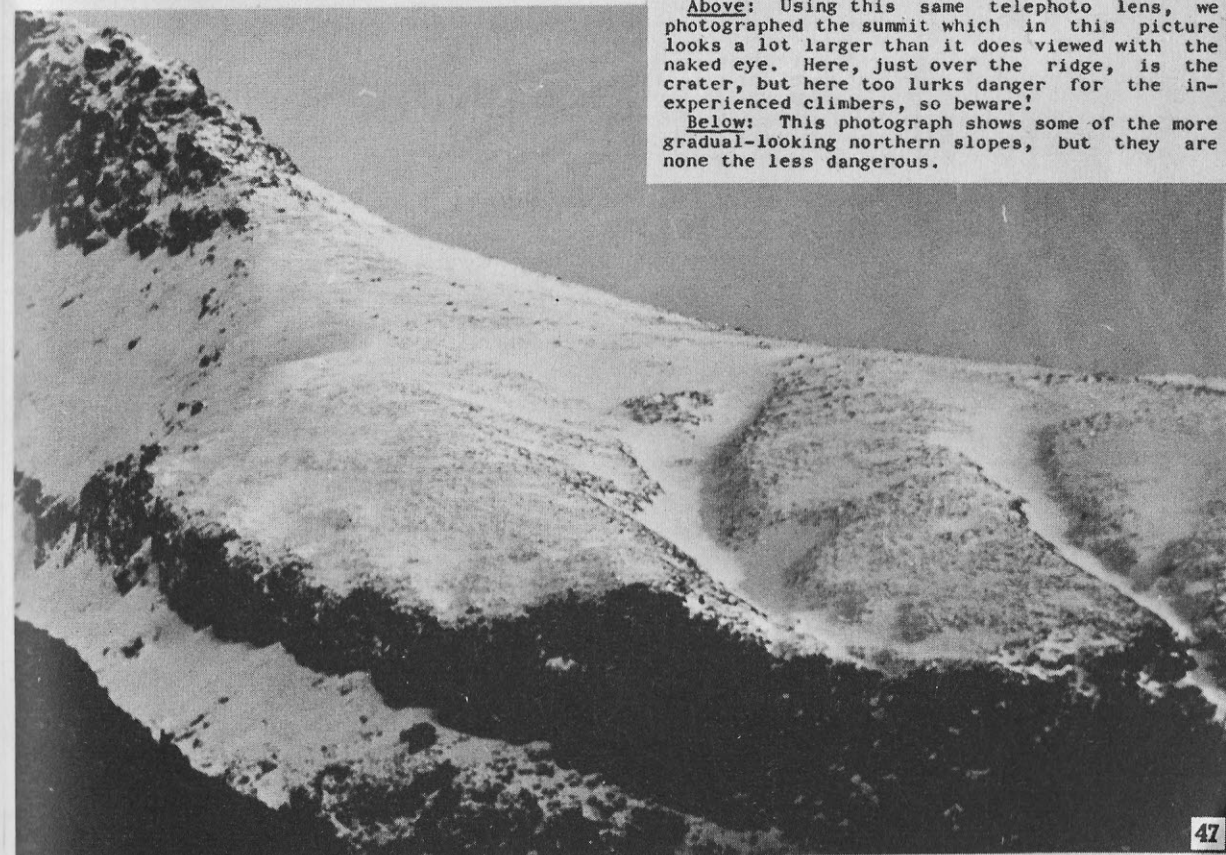
Close-ups of Our Mountain

These close-up photographs of the dangerous slopes of Mount Egmont were taken from the North Egmont Hotel with the aid of a 500mm. telephoto lens. In the picture above we show some of the dangerous cliffs just below Warwick Castle on the eastern slopes of the mountain. The castle is about $\frac{3}{4}$ miles from the North Egmont Hotel. Photographed below is Skinner Hill at an altitude of about 5,500 feet and 3 miles from the camera lens. These close-ups show the nature of the country, but give no idea of height of some of the cliffs and bluffs which have proved such a hazard to the unwary climber.

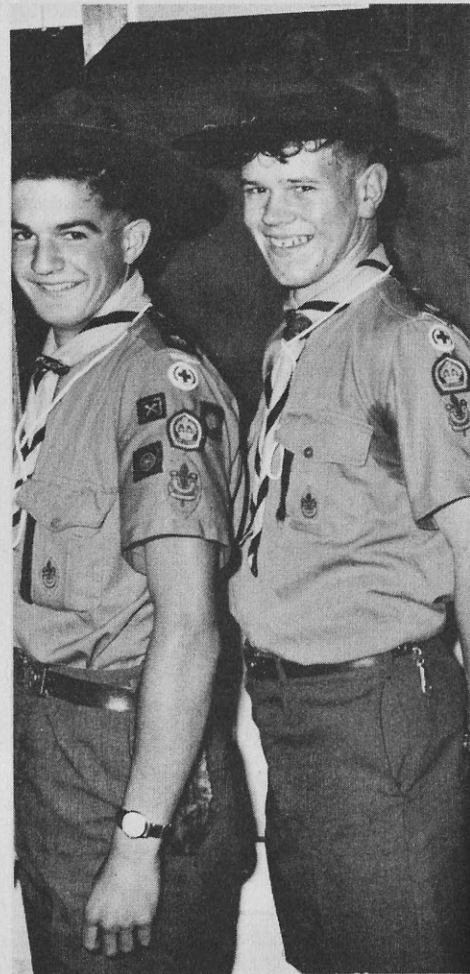

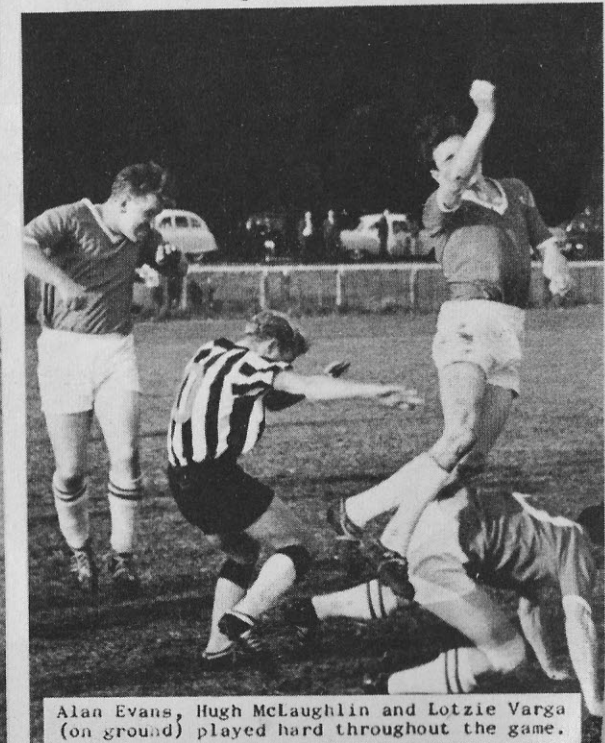

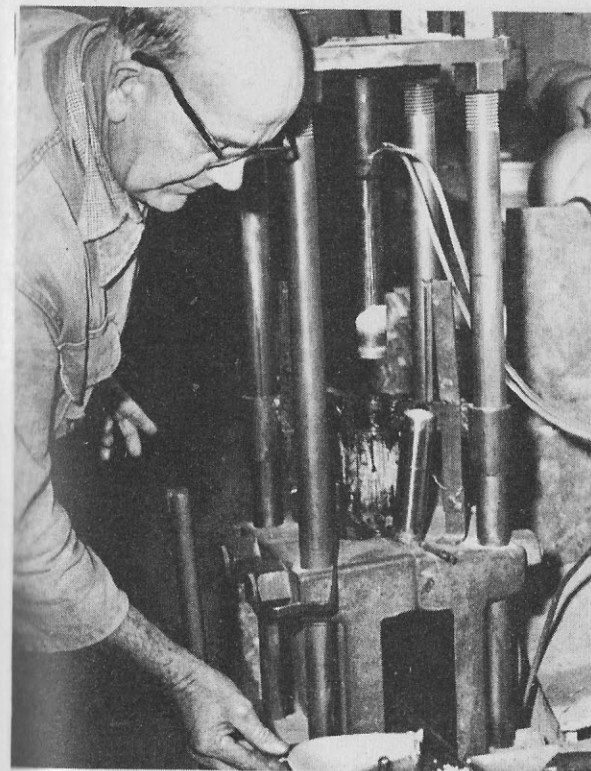
LOCAL INDUSTRY SAVES LIVES

Providing safety helmets for motor-cyclists and horse riders has been the work of Noel Daly for the past eighteen years. When the business was started crash helmets were made of compressed paper, but with the advance of synthetics, fibre glass now plays a big part in the manufacture of these articles. Keeping abreast of modern techniques and ideas, Noel is turning out hundreds of these helmets which are designed to save lives. Not only does he make helmets, but he also has to manufacture his own machinery, as machines for their manufacture are hard to get. On our recent visit, we were impressed with the efficiency of the factory and its staff. Each member had his or her own functions, and there seemed to us to be no bottle necks. The quality of the finished product is high enough to rate continued orders from the Transport Department for their traffic officers.

Here then, is an old-established New Plymouth industry that is keeping up with advances and is continuing to bring useful revenue into the city. There are only two factories in New Zealand engaged in the manufacture of helmets, and Noel can claim to be the only factory turning out other lines which he manufactures. Compressed paper was the forerunner to plastics and fibreglass, and Noel still manufactures articles made by this process.

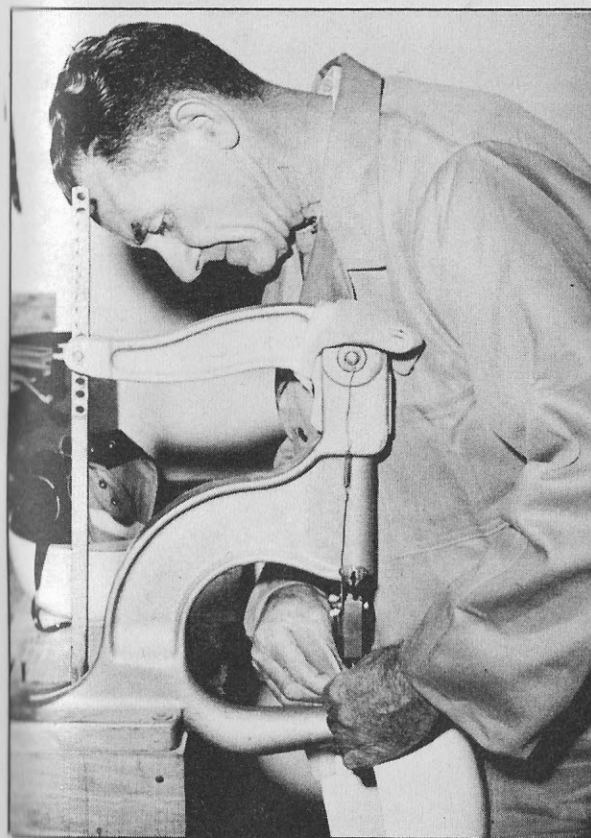

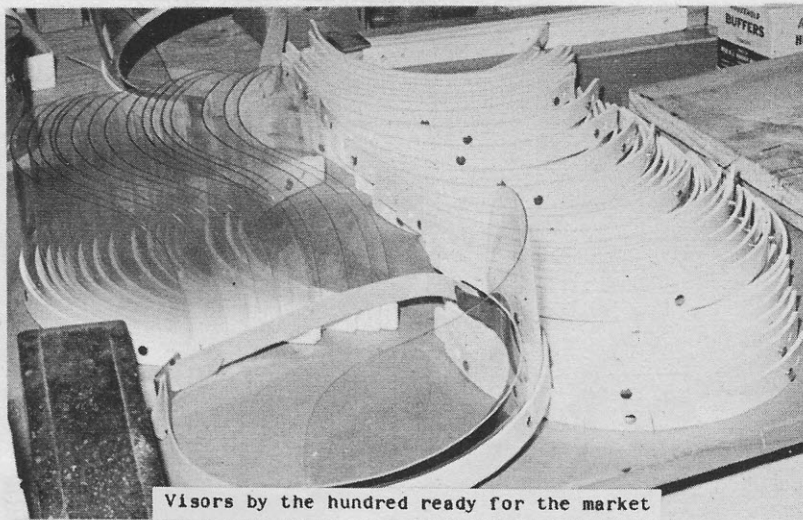

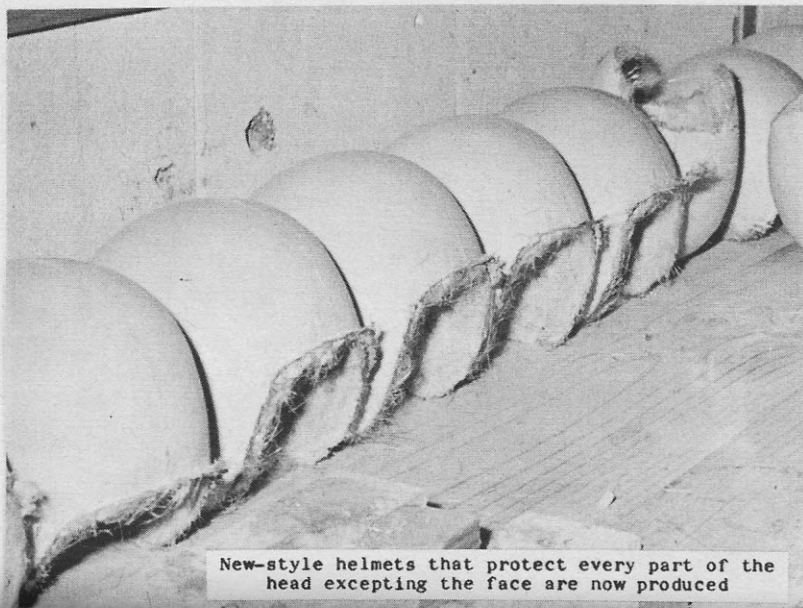

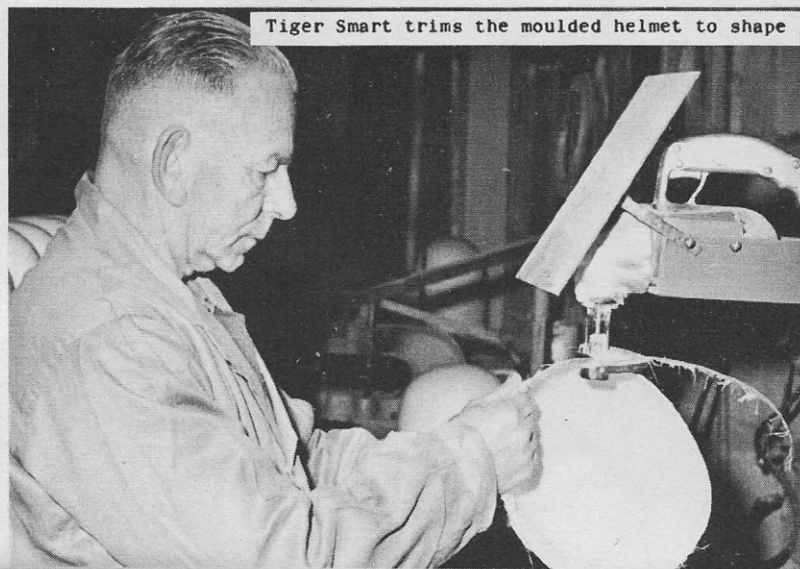

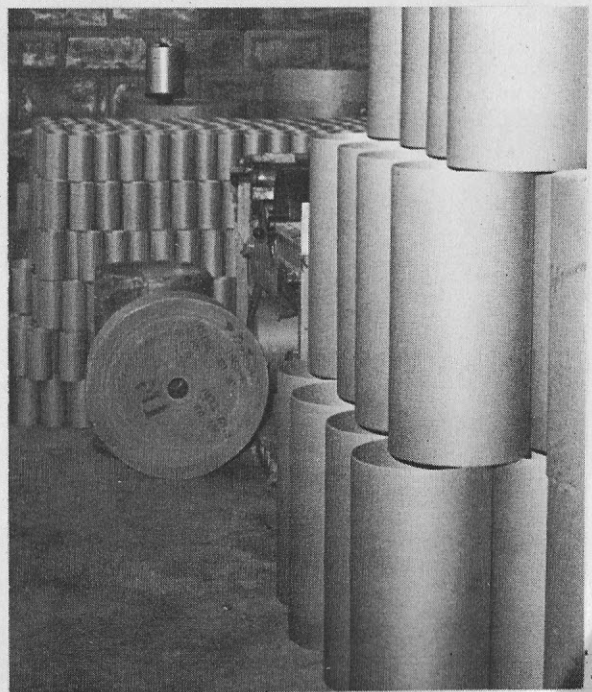

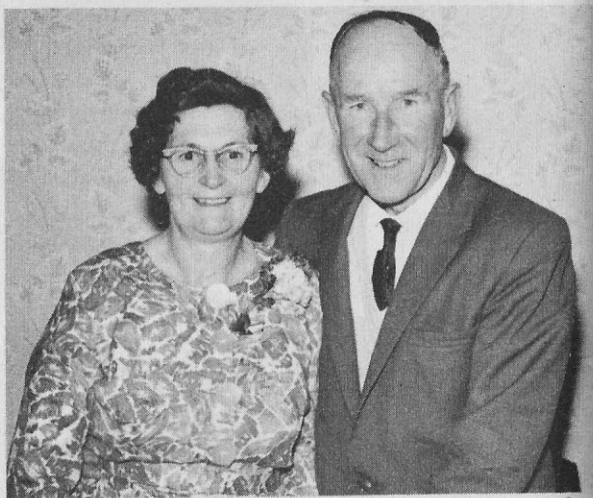

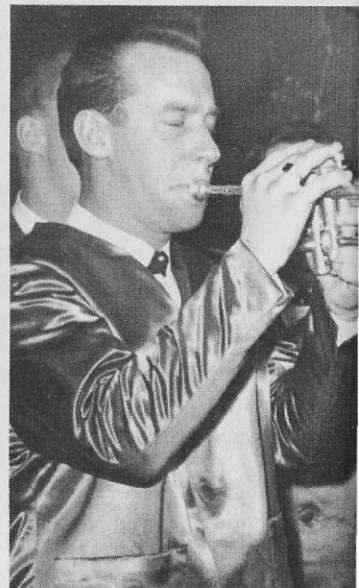

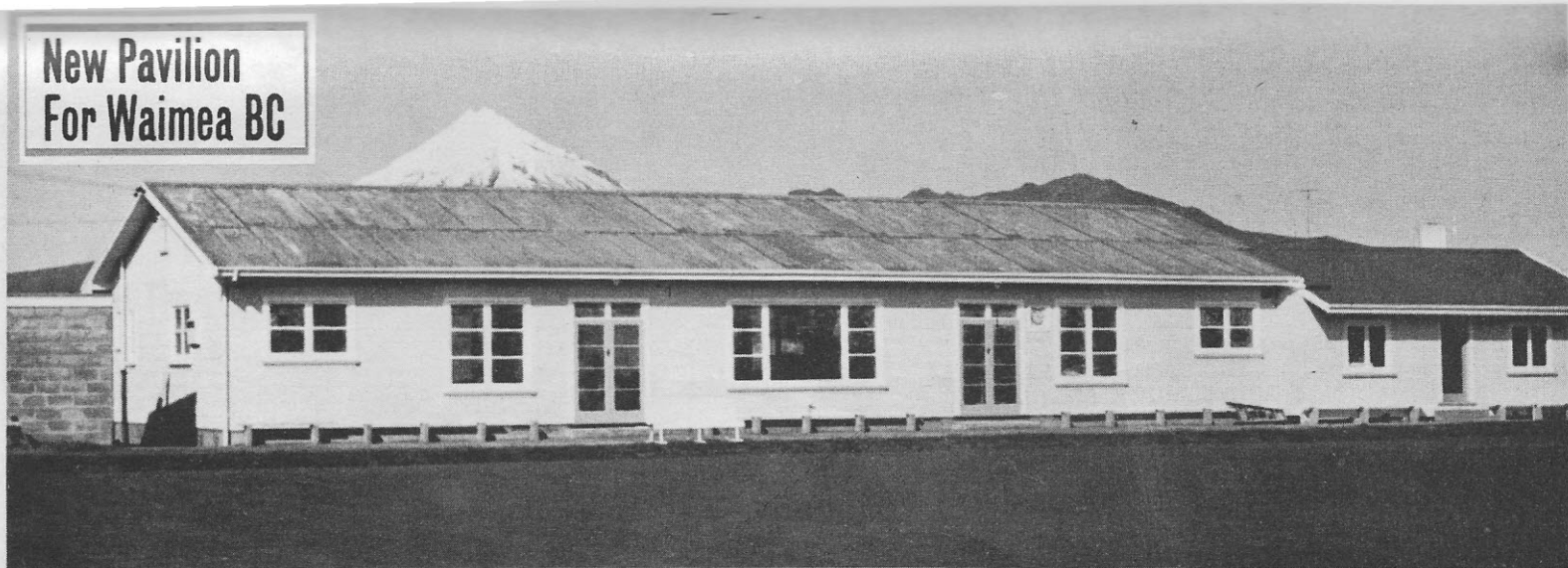

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New Pavilion For Waimea BC

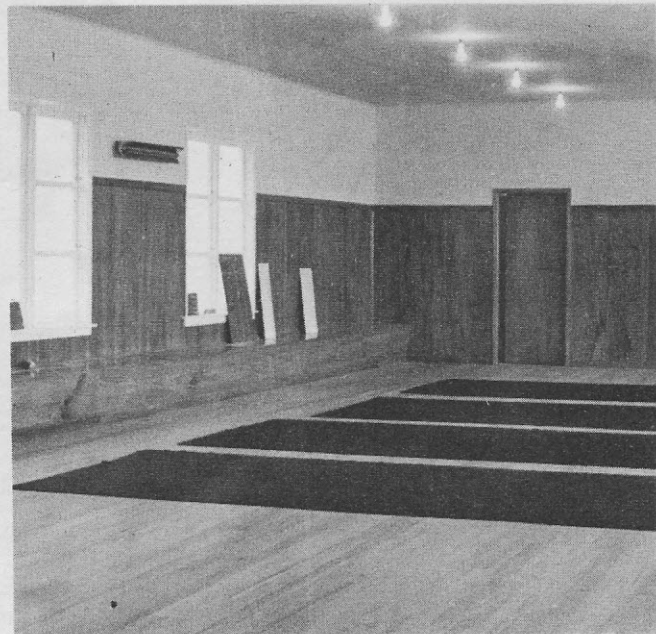

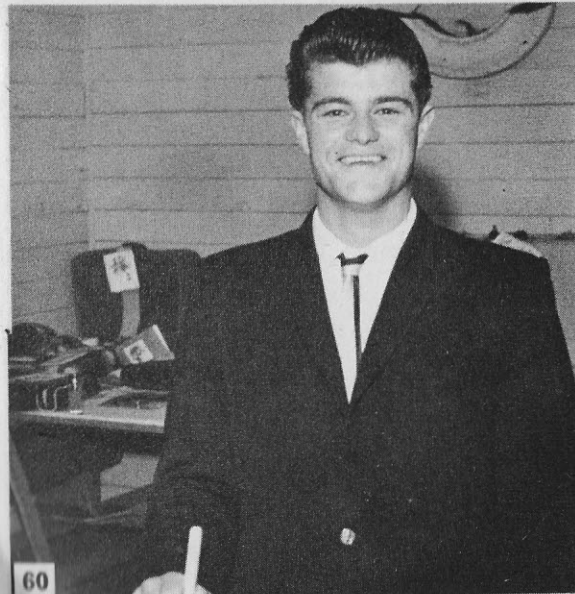
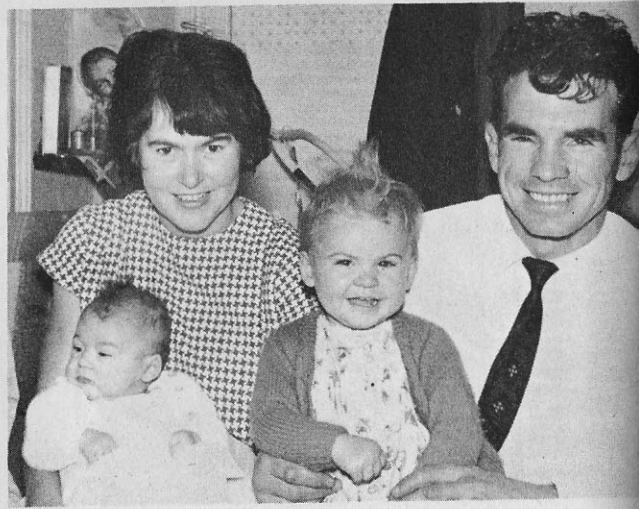

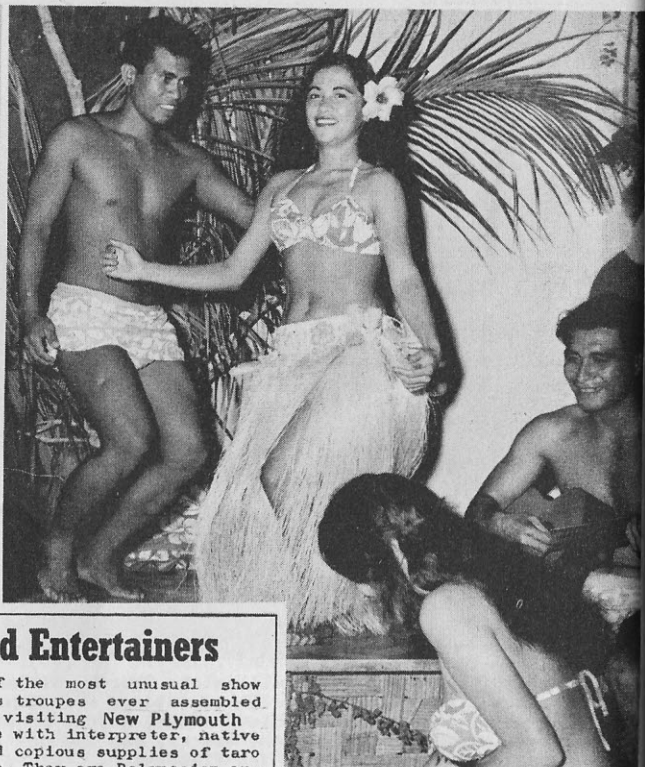

Island Entertainers

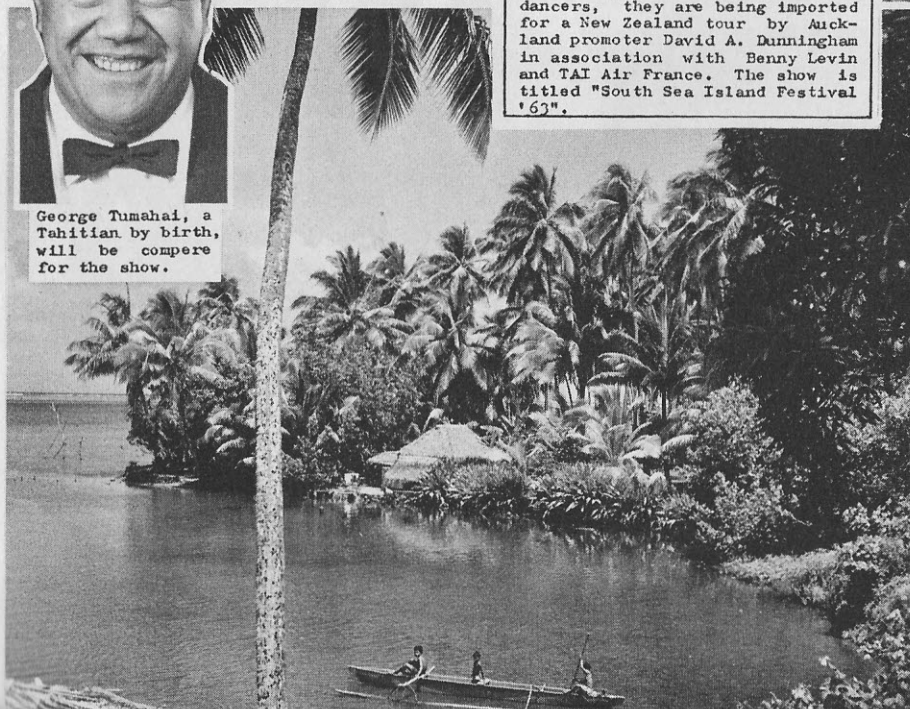

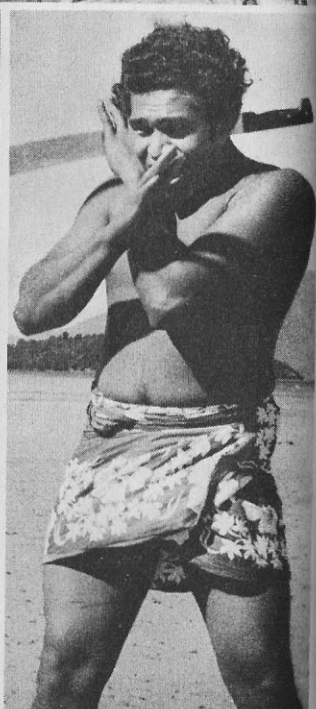
