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







First Release of Partridges In Taranaki Province

The first release of partridges in this part of the country recently took place from a farm a few miles out of New Plymouth. Considered a delicacy in the U.K., this game bird should stand up to the conditions of this country, and provide, in the not-too-distant future, some varied fare for the table of the sporting shooter. About twice the size of quail, these birds are brown in colour and are natural habitants of the open country.










NPBHS Beat Mt. Albert Grammar






Russell Grace Teams Tournament




