






Wet Weather For Beach Races



vacht "Pleiades", complete with Father Neptune.






THOUSANDS AT WATTARA QUEEN CARNIVAL







Flannagan Cup Race







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


Old New Plymouth













Poor Conditions For Surf Champs











DEVON STREET IN 1859 AND 1925

Here are two pictures of old New Plymouth, loaned to us by an old resident. The top picture shows Devon Street, looking west from Liardet Street, taken in 1859, just 104 years ago. This was at the time of the establishment of the Taranaki Rifle Volunteers, who later fought at Waireka, and were the first volunteer company in the British Empire to be under fire. One wonders at the living conditions in those days. Below, is a photograph taken in 1925, from the roof of Hannah's building on the corner of Brougham Street. It appears that Brougham Street was much wider in those days than it is today, and shows one of the city's electric buses. The demolition taking place was to make way for the present King's Buildings. The old Bank of New Zealand can just be seen on the left of the photograph.



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
