





The largest sub-division ever to be cut up in New Plymouth is in the process of being levelled out now. The area covers thirty-two acres of land with fine views of both the mountain and harbour. When levelled, the land will provide 102 sections priced to suit the average man.

The land has yet to be roaded, and is situated between the Spotswood College and the microwave station at Windy Point. It stretches right back, almost to the Marfell Block, and ends behind the college and microwave station.






On this new sub-division at Spotswood, some very heavy machines are being used. They are certainly needed as thousands of yards of soil have to be shifted to take the brow off a hill. When completed, the machines will have altered the contour of the land from undulating hills to fairly flat and level suburban building sections. Despite the moving of this hill, most of the sections will have uninterrupted views of both mountain and sea.






N.Z.'s Best Axemen at Waitui Sports






























