## Teachers v. Pupils

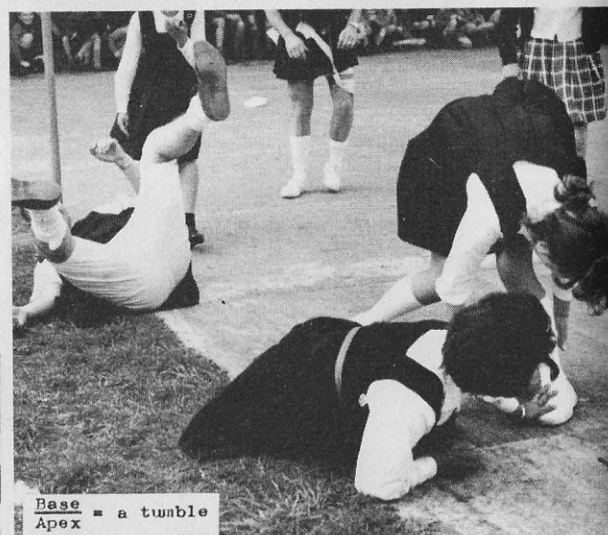

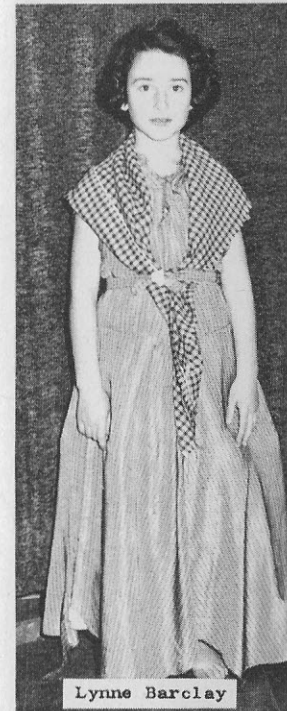
## R.S.A. Women Celebrate 21st Birthday

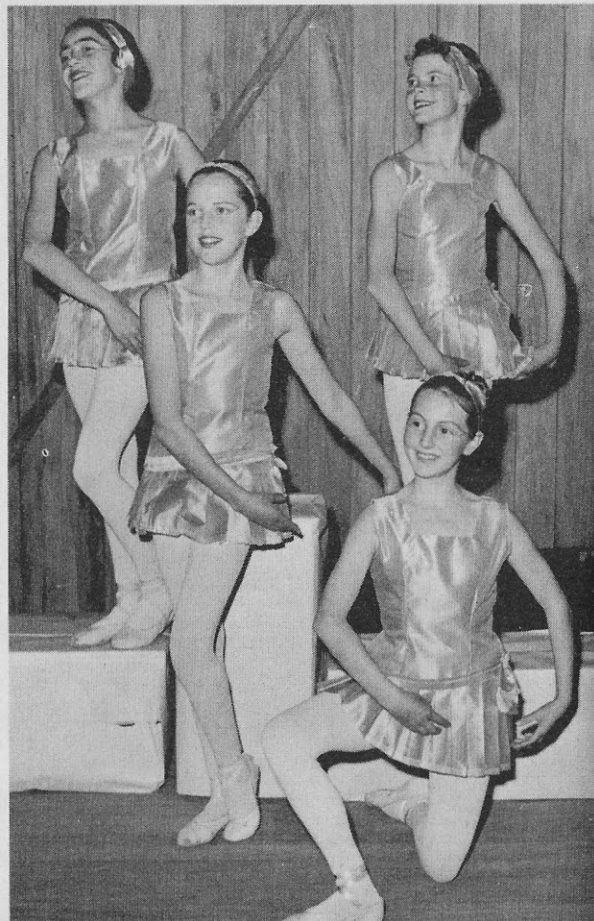

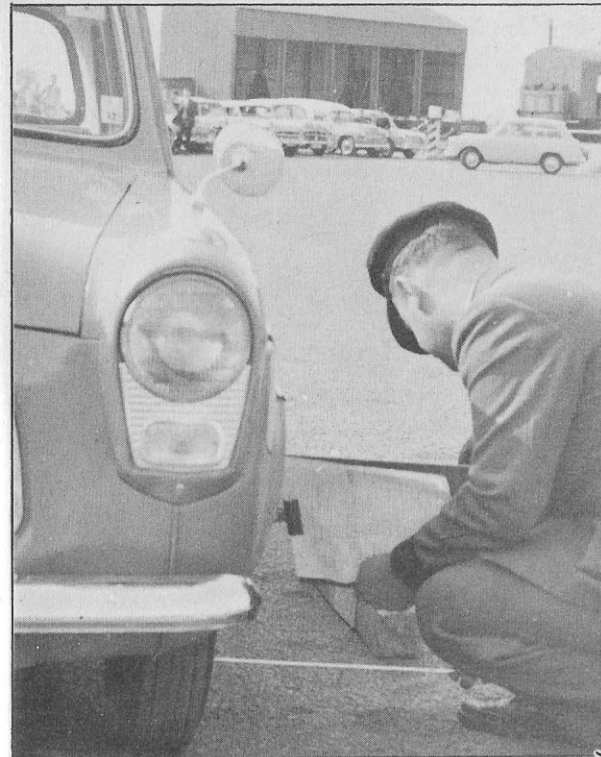

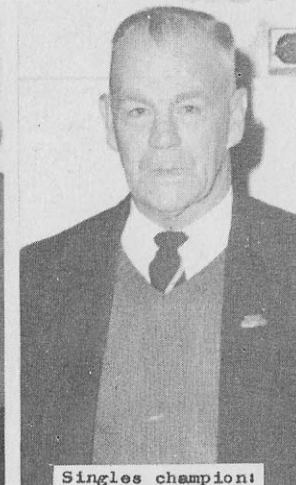

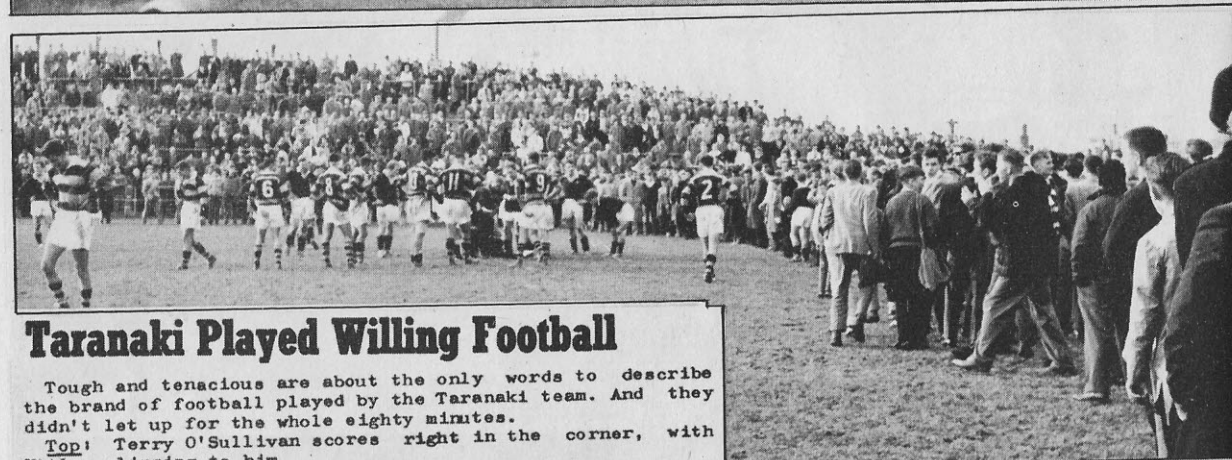

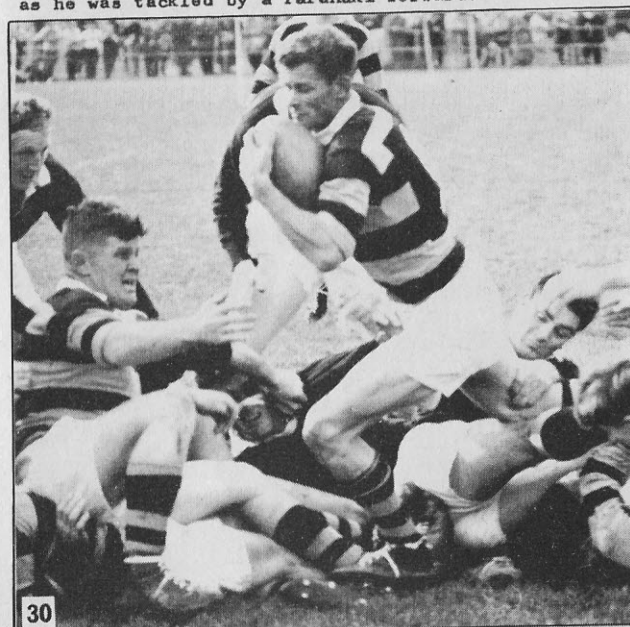

After the game, there were scenes of rejoicing in the Taranaki dressing room, with congratulations being showered on the boys from all sides.

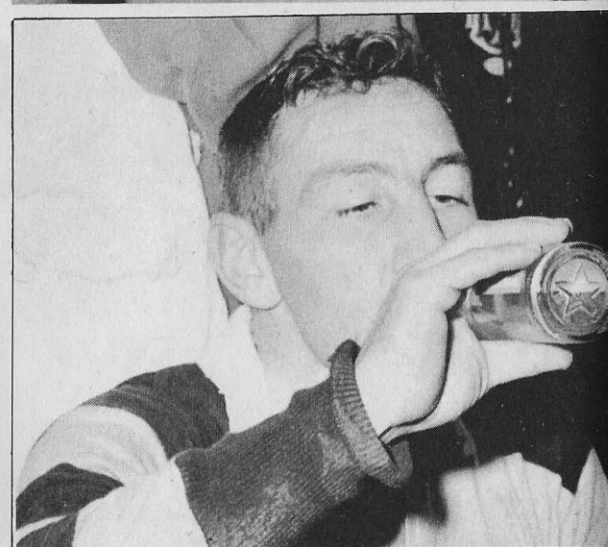
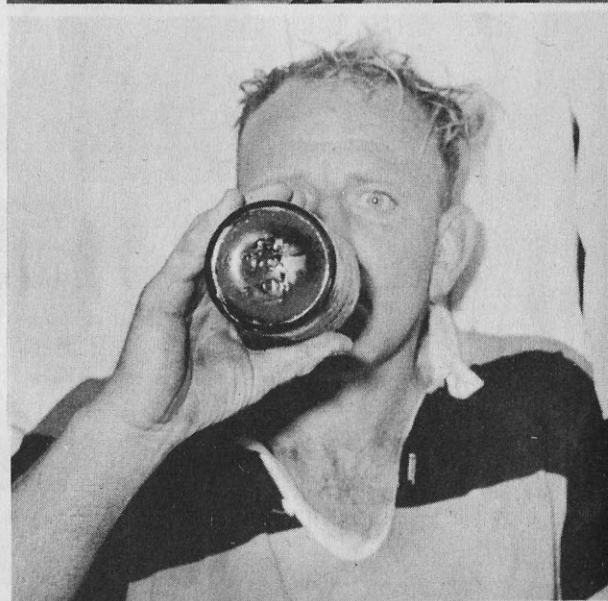
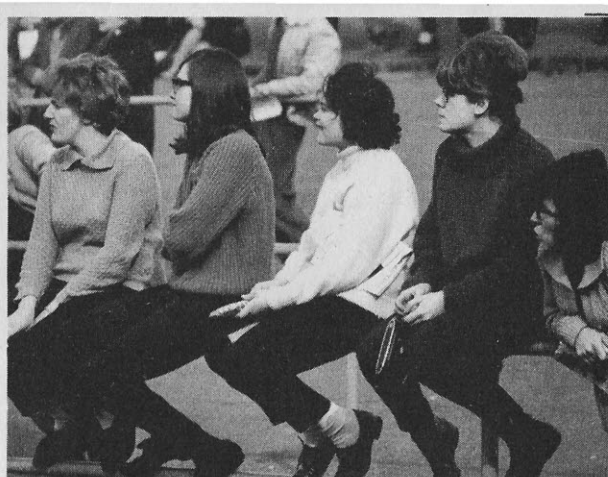

With the cooperation of New Plymouth Fire Officers, and Sparky, these photographs were taken to demonstrate the actual causes of fire in the home. So take heed, and never think that "This can't happen to us". Space heaters and electrical appliances are perhaps two of the major fire hazards in the home, so have that gear checked now.



Check Home Fire Hazards with a Fire Dept. Inspection

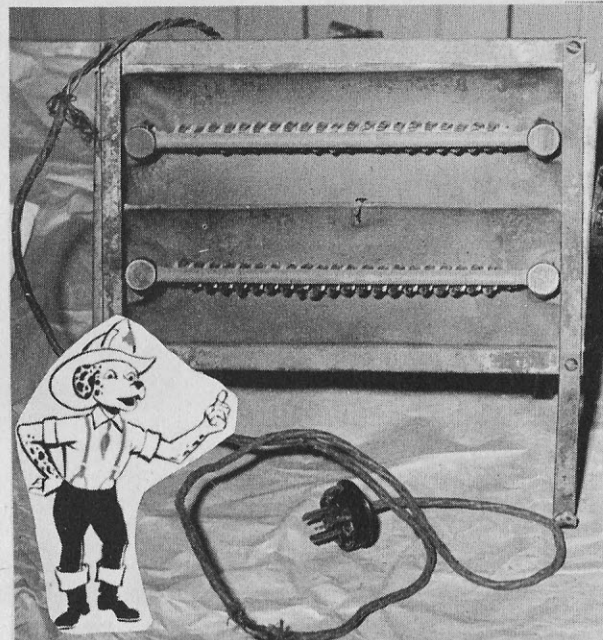

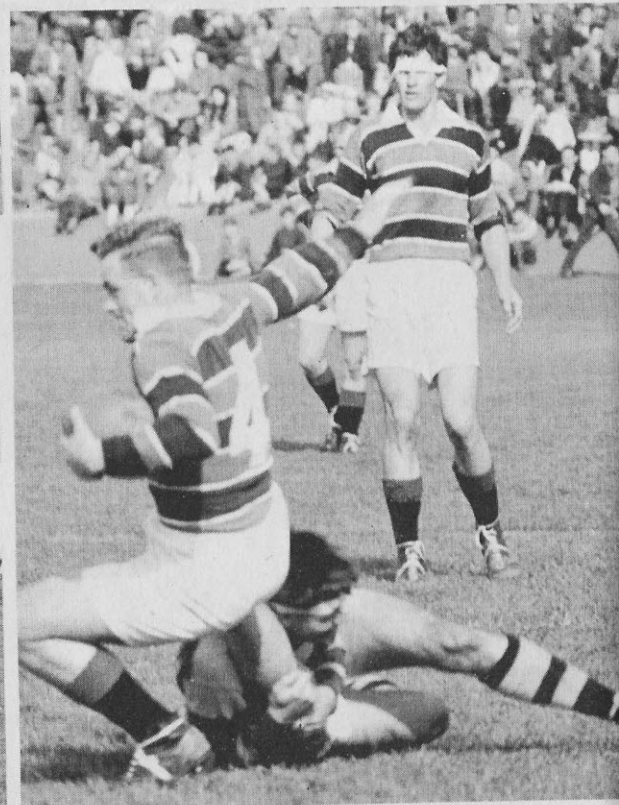

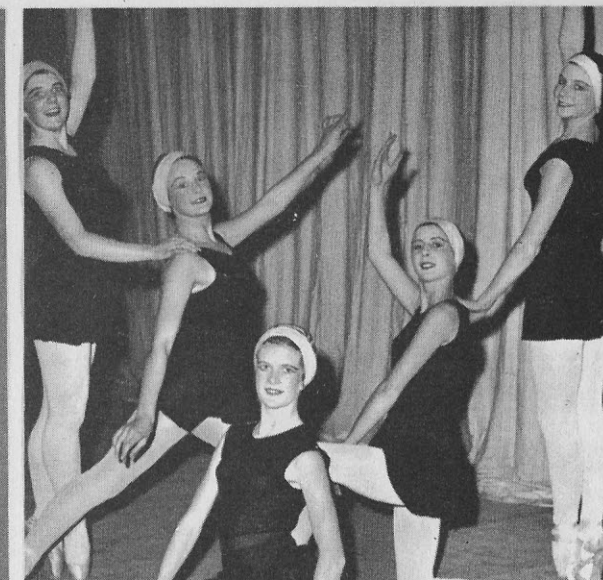

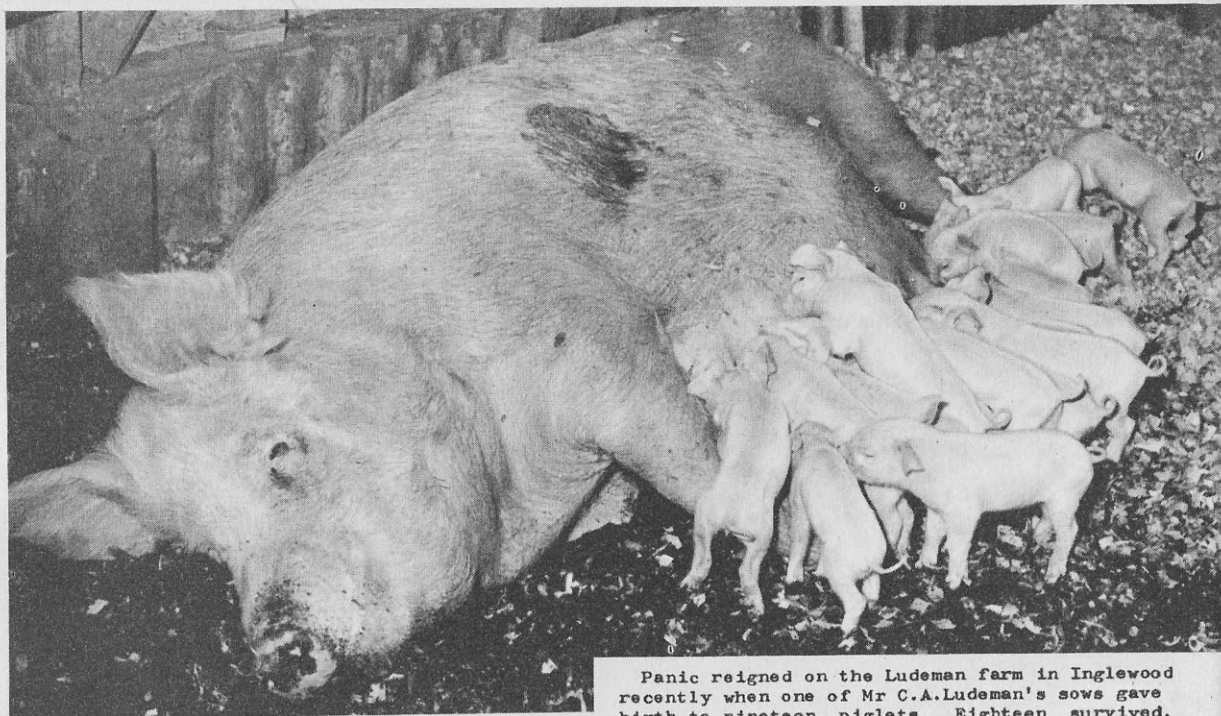

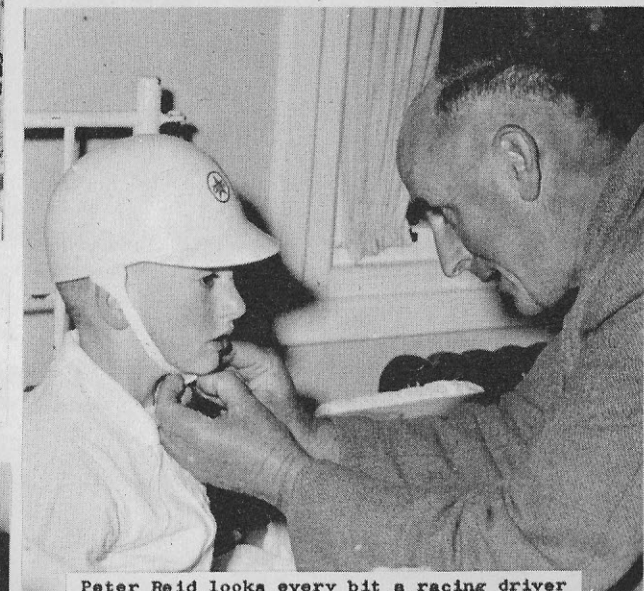

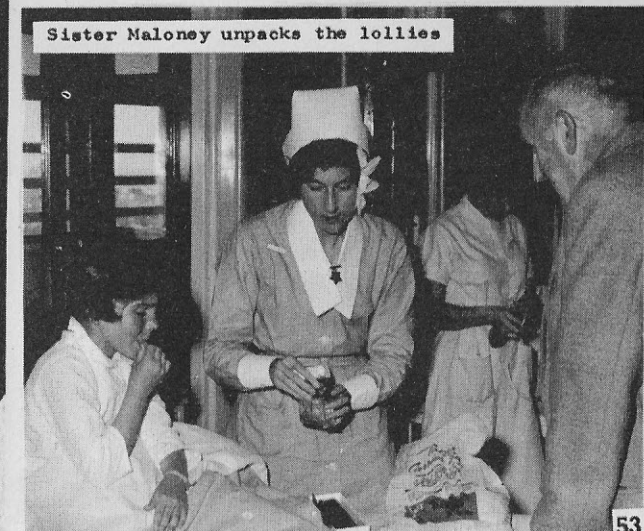

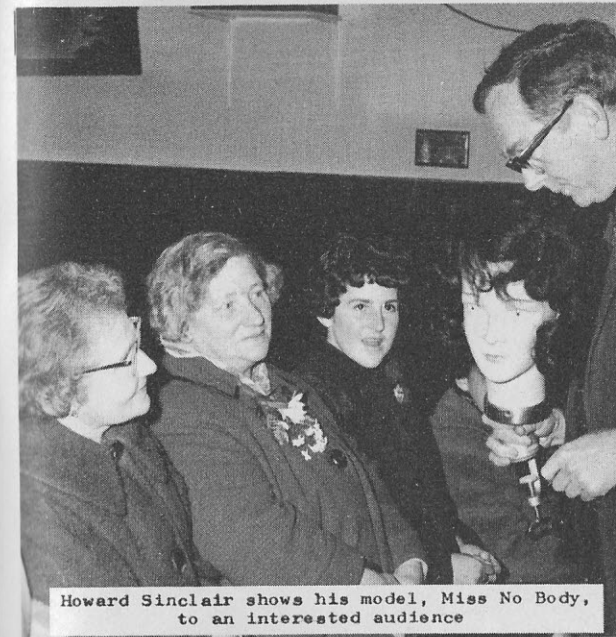

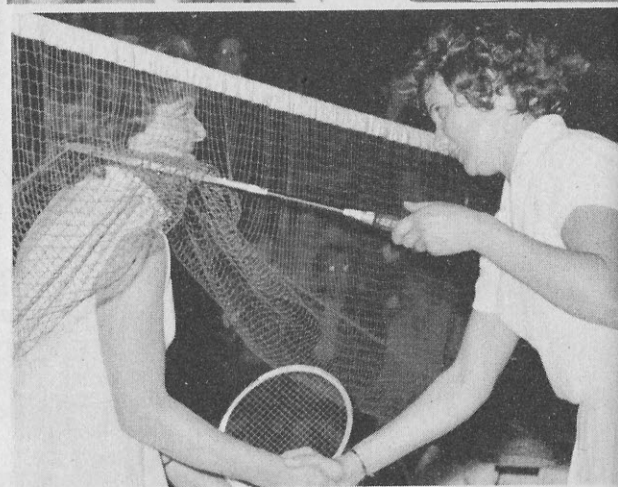

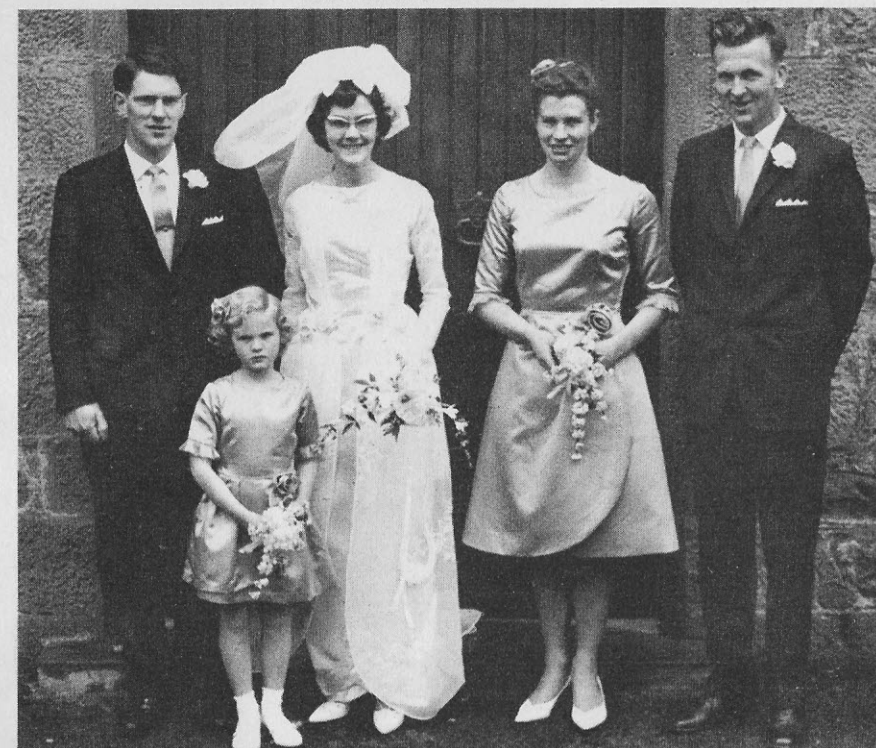

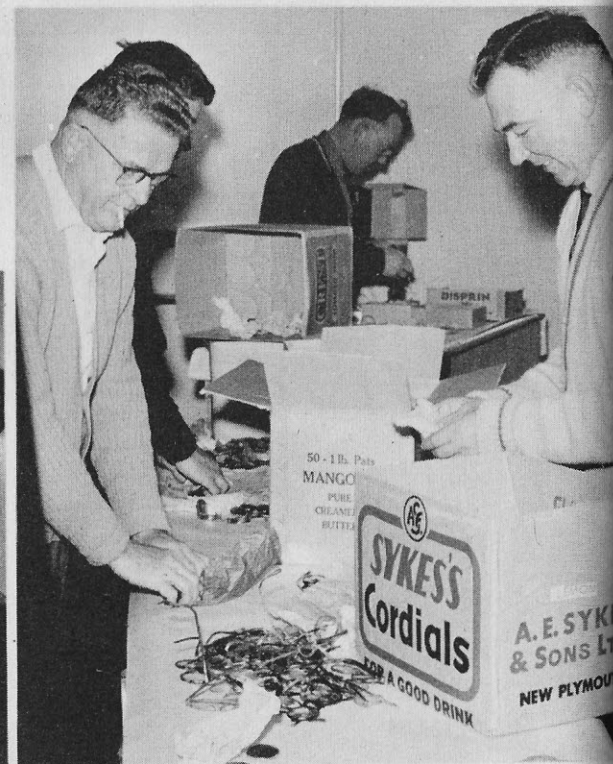
