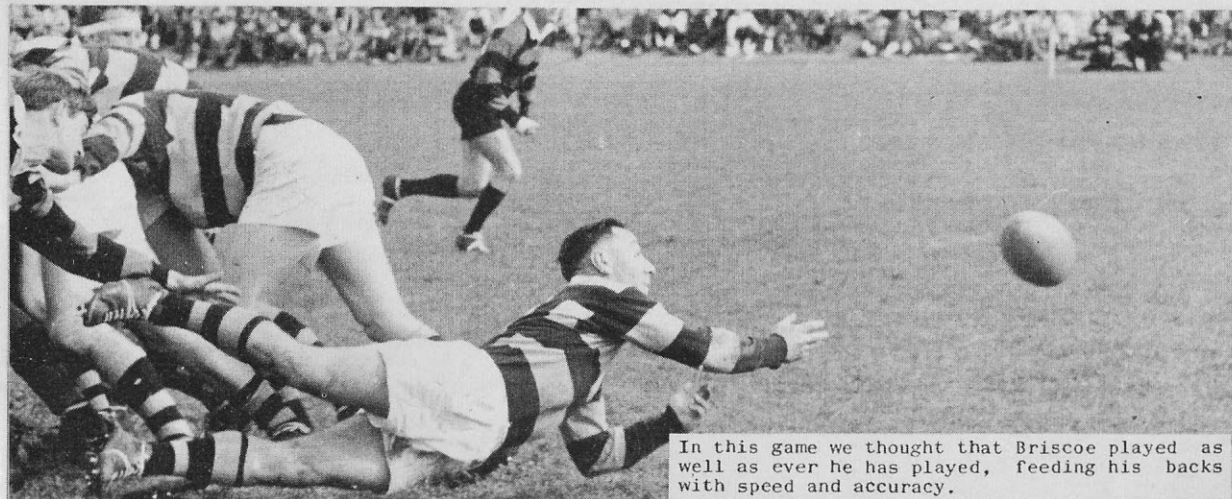
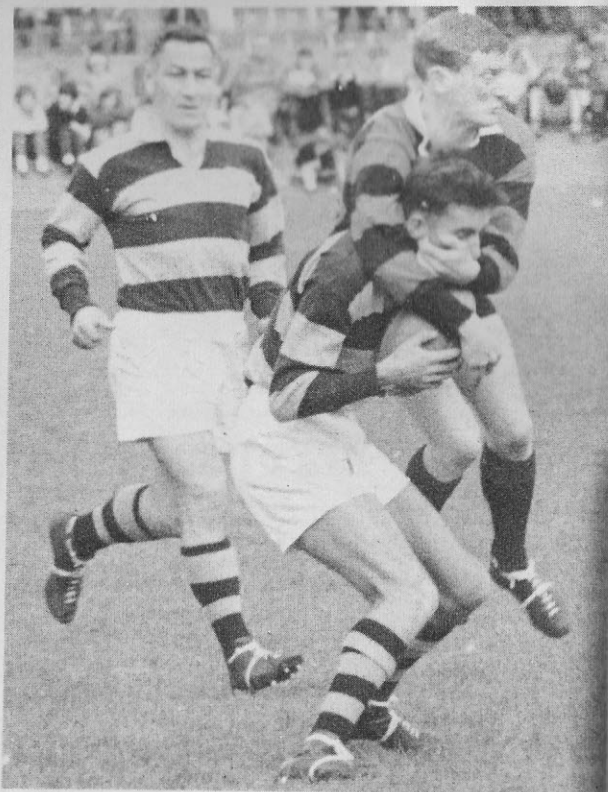

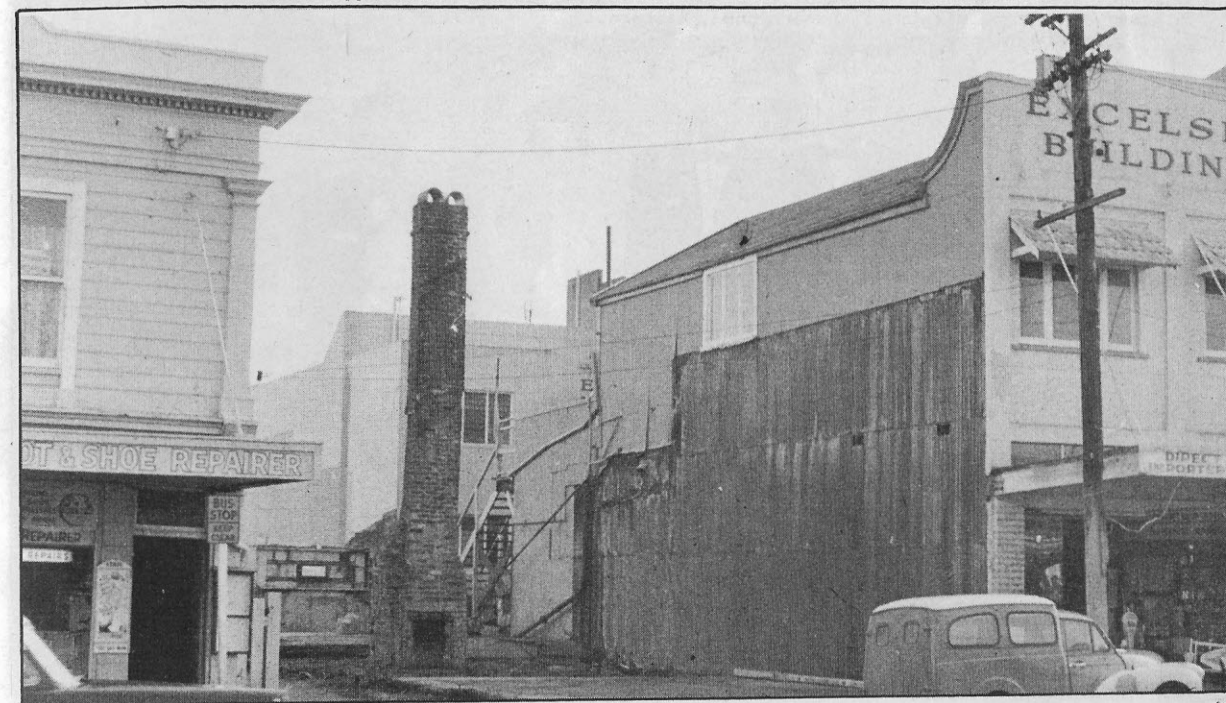
Changing Face Of New Plymouth

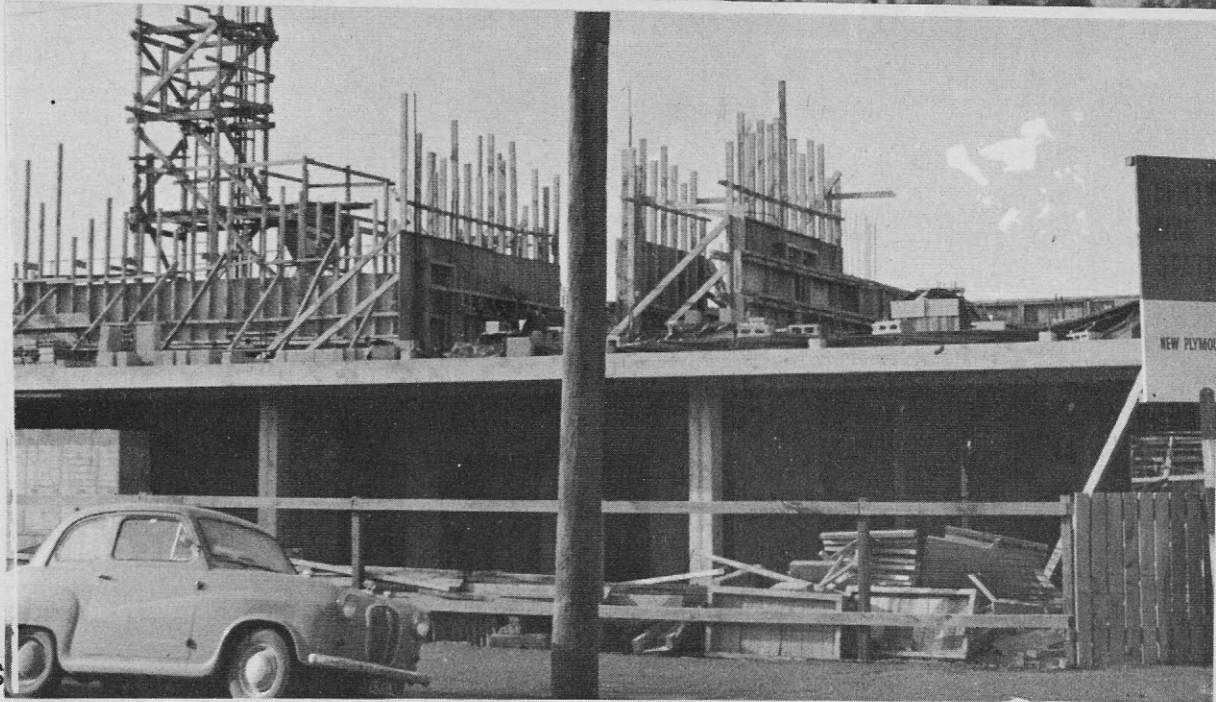
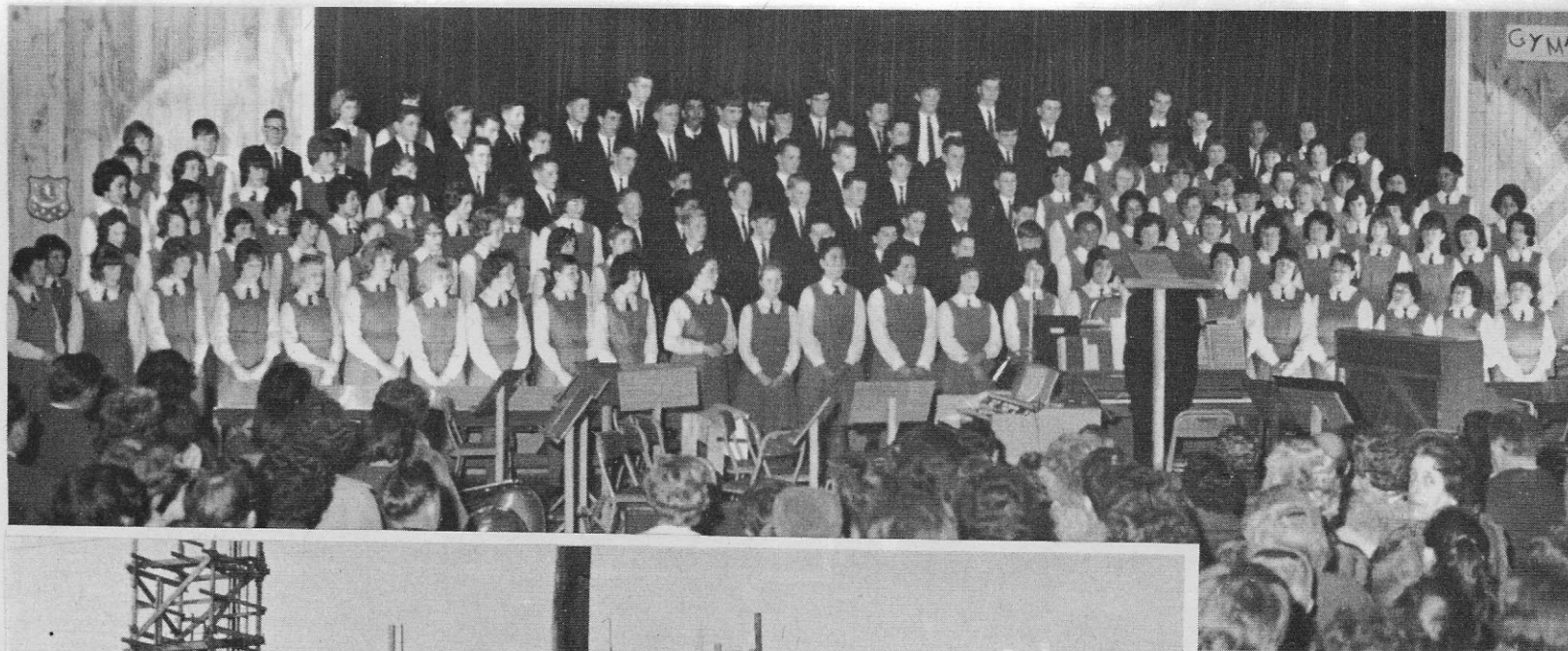

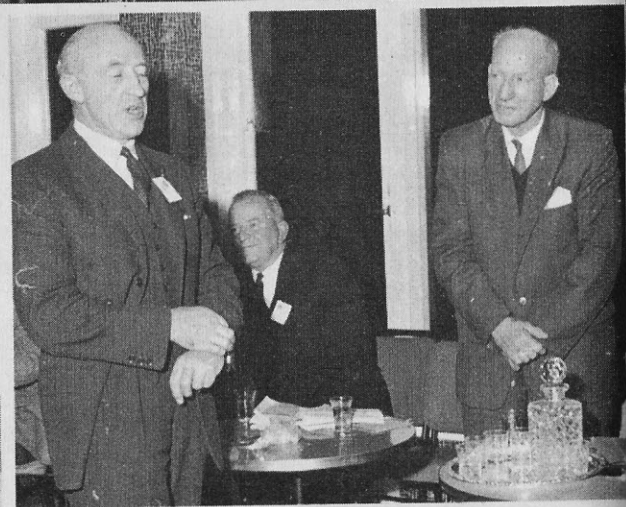
Accountants Honour Teacher

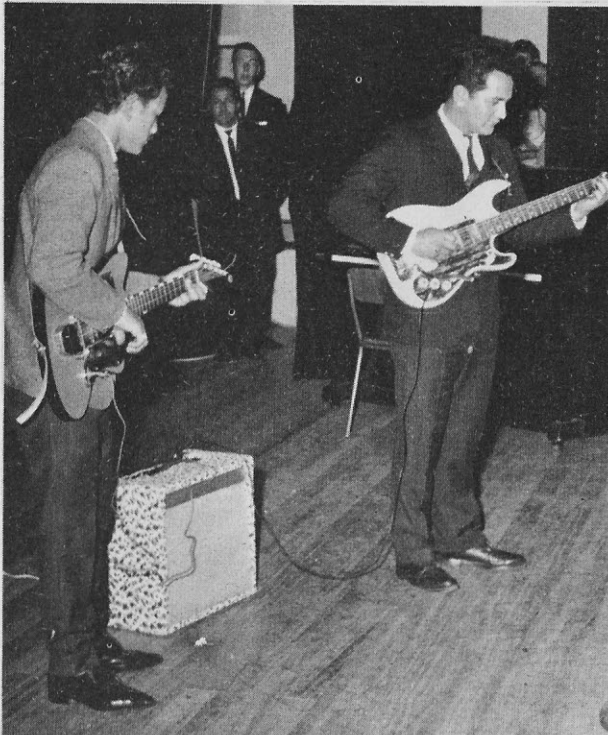

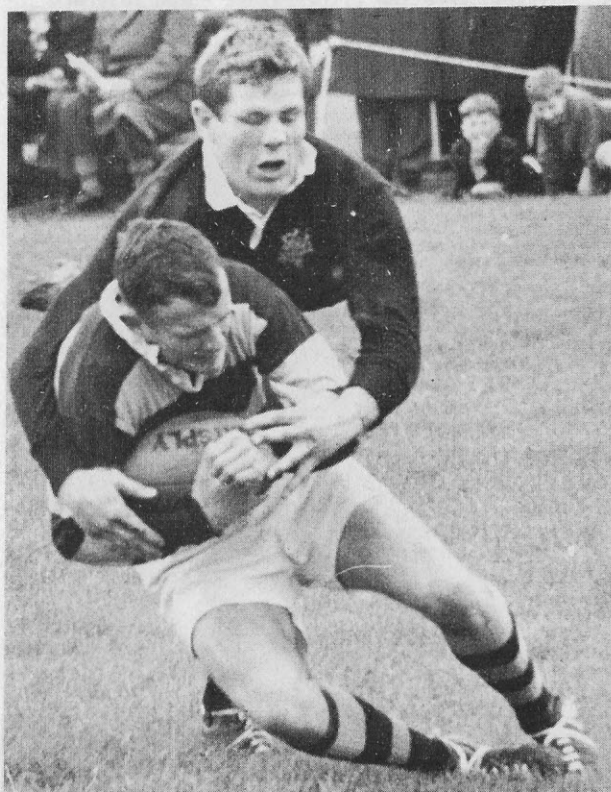

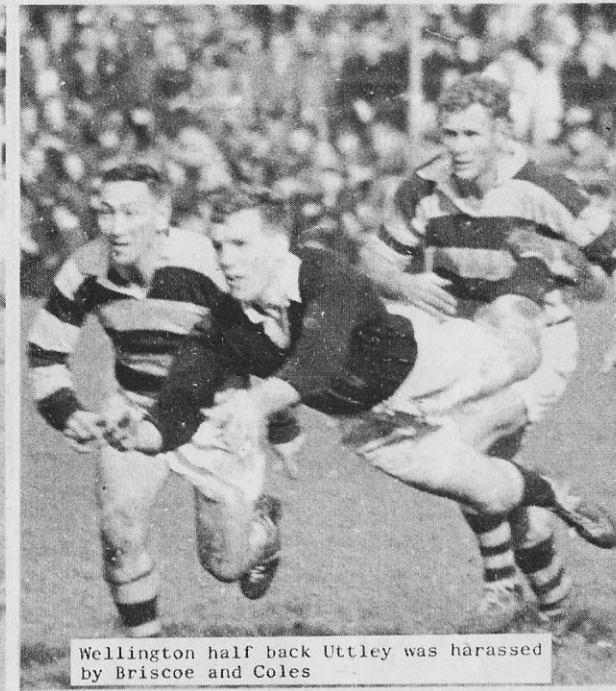

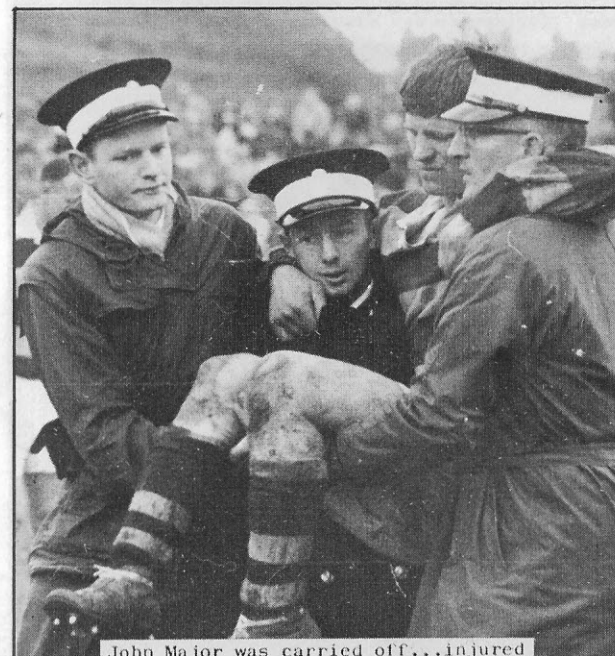

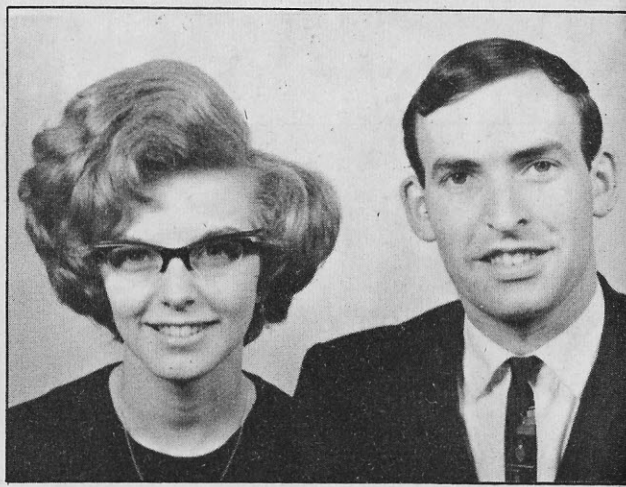

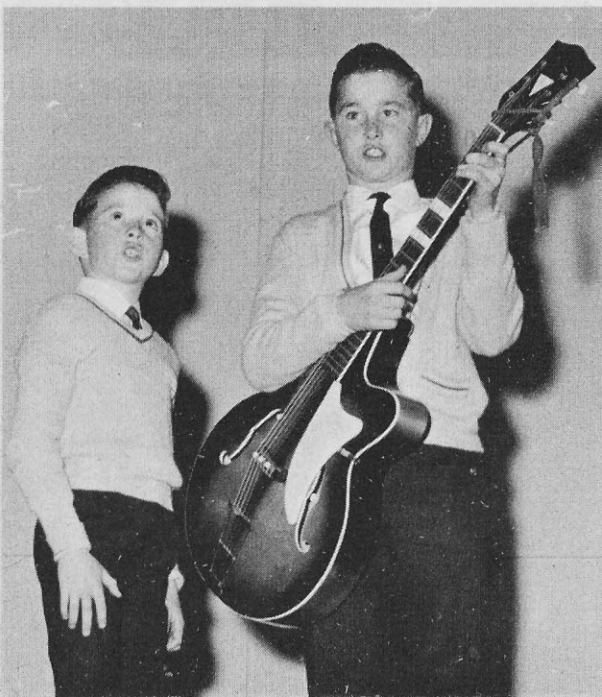

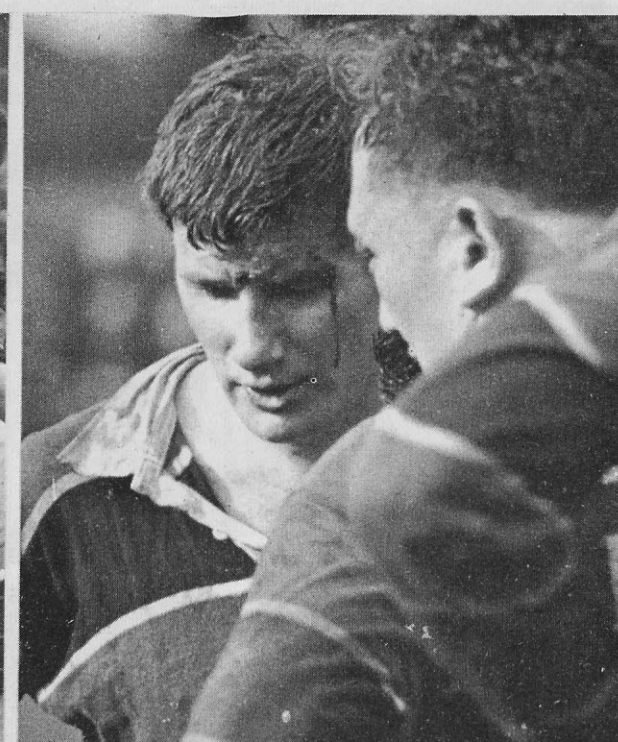

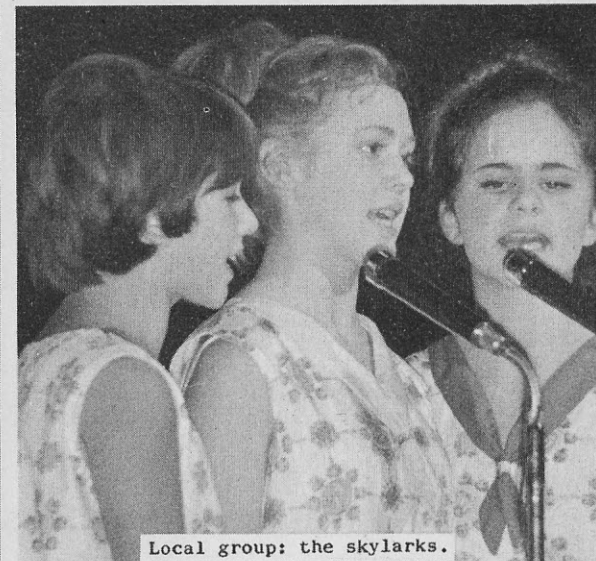


Johnny Cooper's Talent Quest

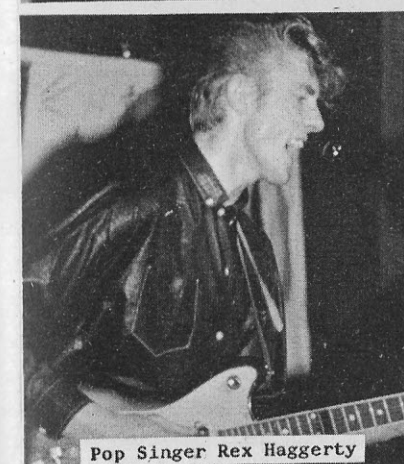

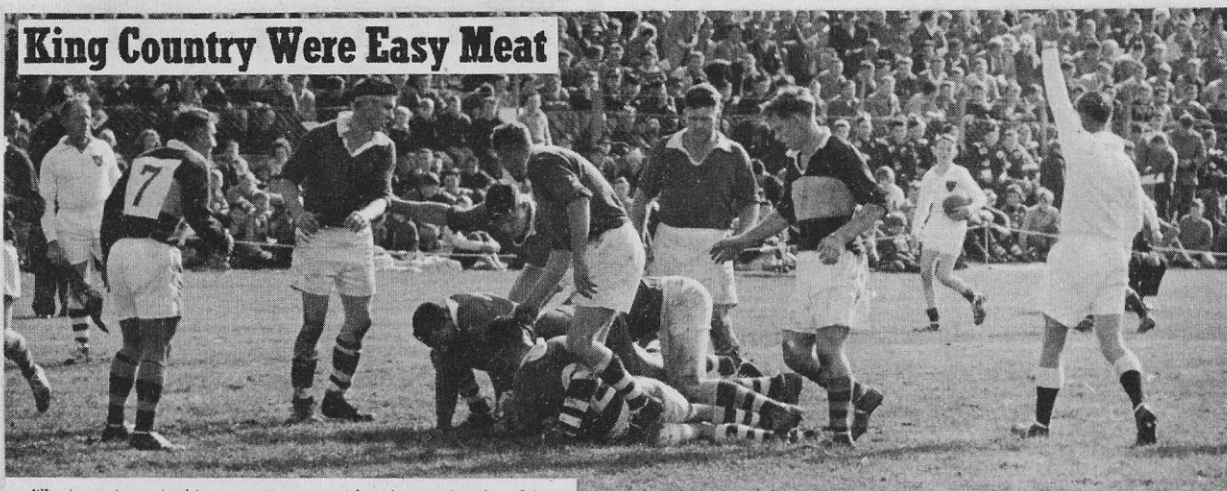

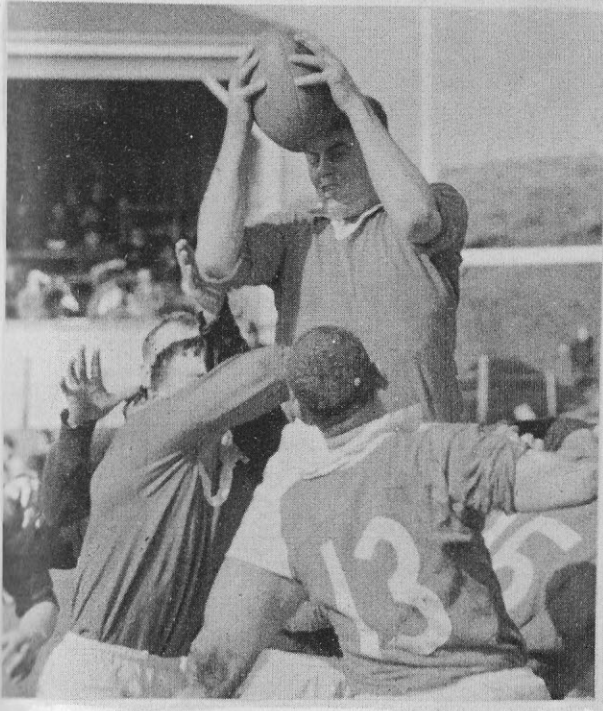

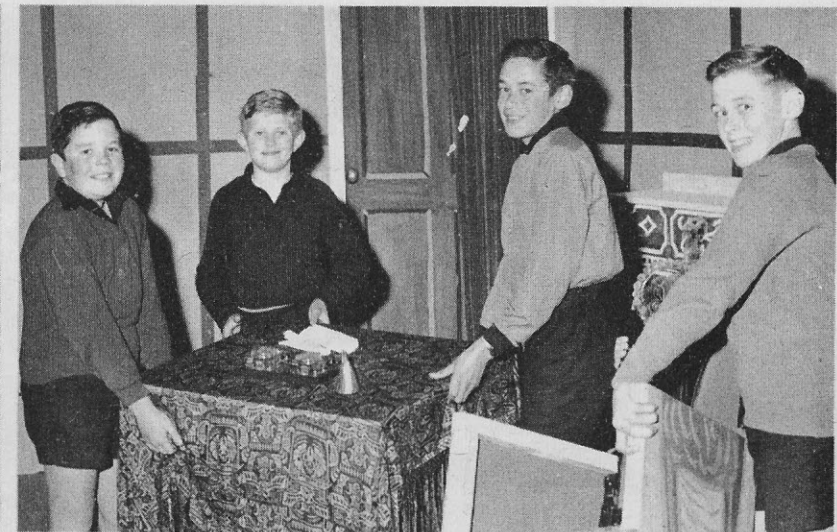
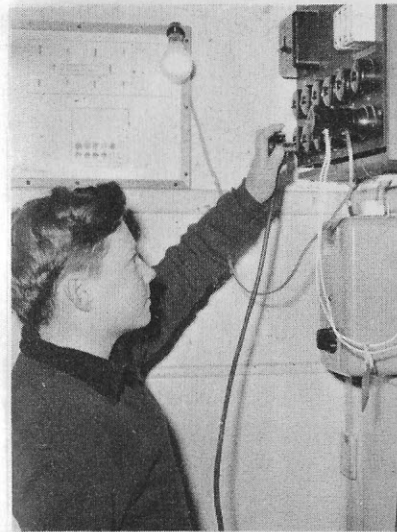

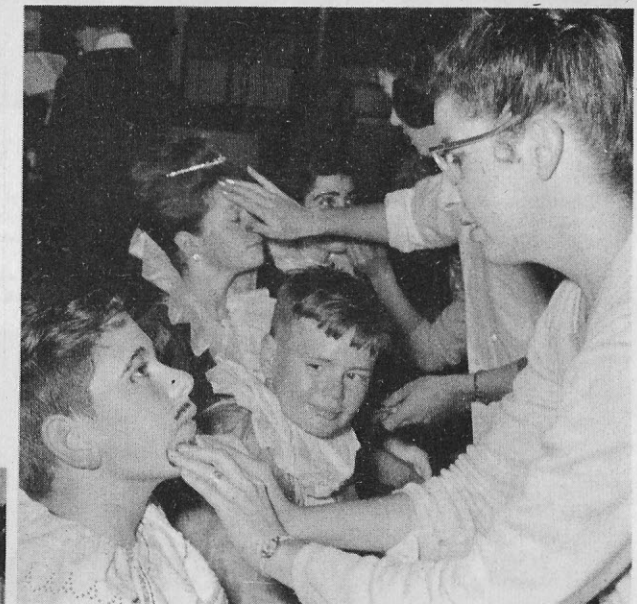

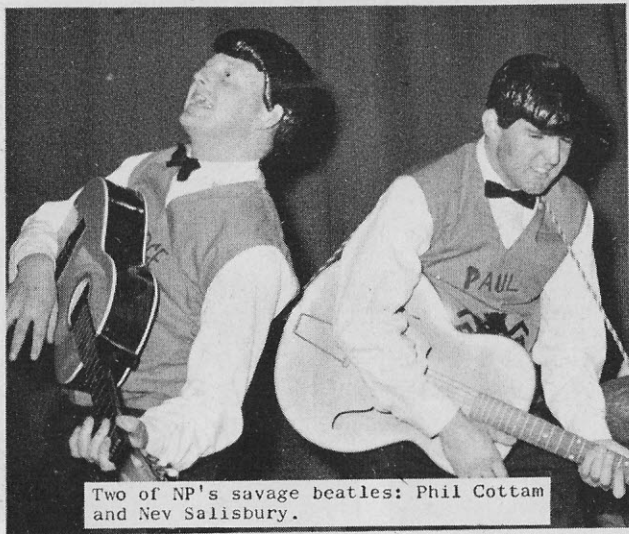

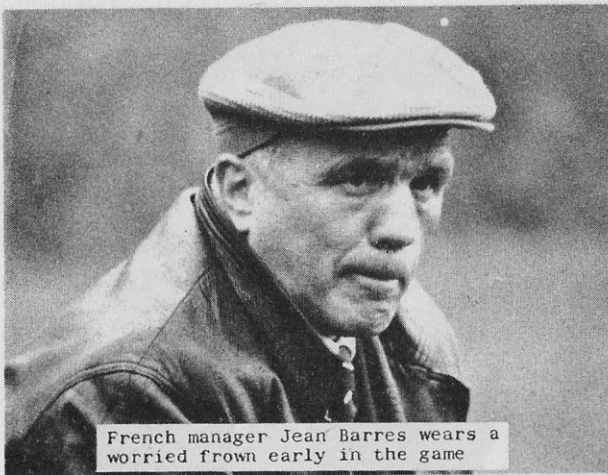

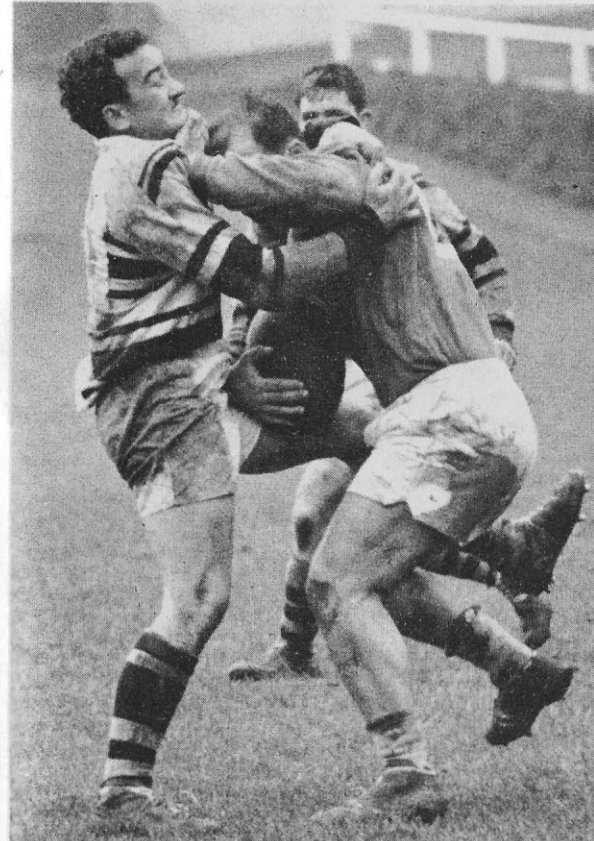

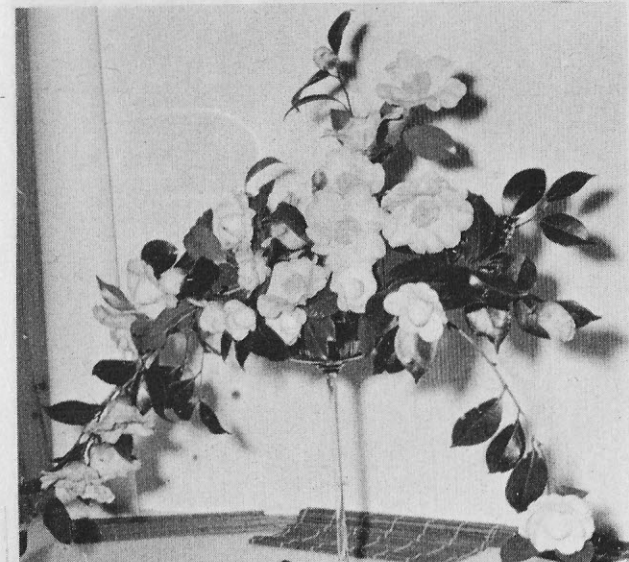
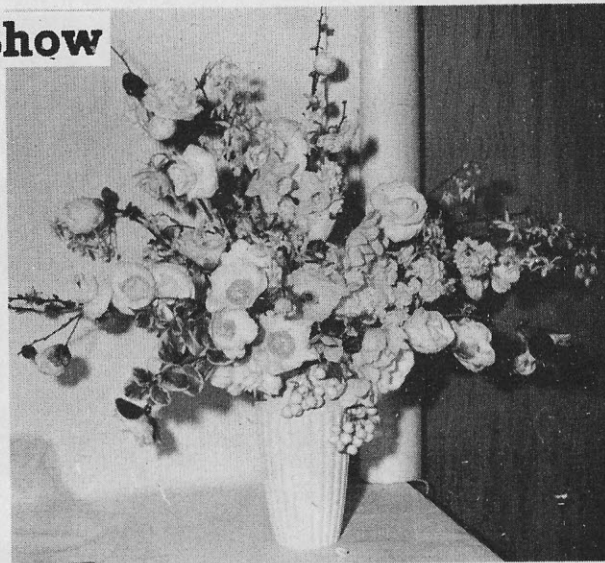

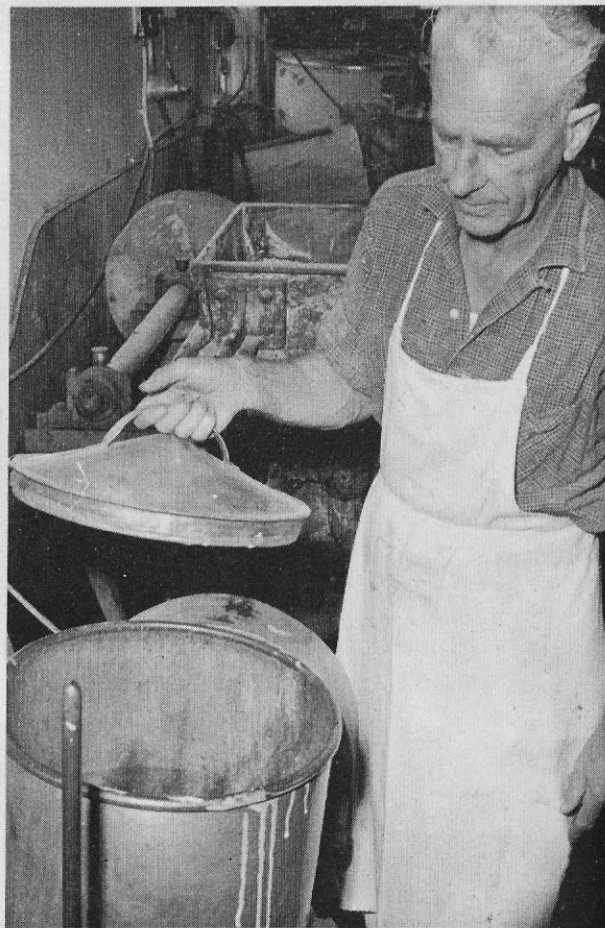
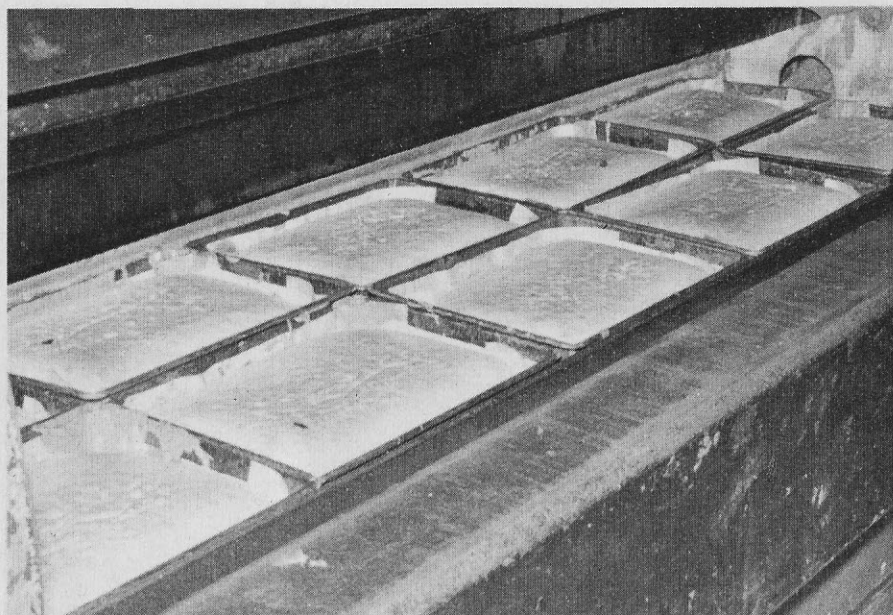
CAKES BY THE TON

We recently enjoyed the privilege of a visit to Neville's Bakery in New Plymouth where hundreds of cakes of about thirty varieties are baked every day. Starting in the weighing room, where the ingredients are prepared prior to mixing, we were amazed at the accuracy with which the ingredients are weighed. In 50lbs of cake mix, every ingredient is right to within 1/2oz. Below is Trevor Sommerton who is factory foreman and is also responsible for the weighing of the ingredients.

With about 30 varieties of cake to be made each day, naturally Trevor is a busy man.

In the next stage, eggs and sugar are passed on to the giant whisk (below, right) operated by Ray Jury. This whisk gets the mixture to the right consistency before being added to the other ingredients in one of the many big mixing machines.

The thing that impressed us most was the accuracy with which each cake is made. The mixture is passed into the baking tins, but not before it is checked for weight, and here there is only 1/2oz. tolerance. Shown at the top of this page are some of the block cakes in the process of being baked in the giant oven.

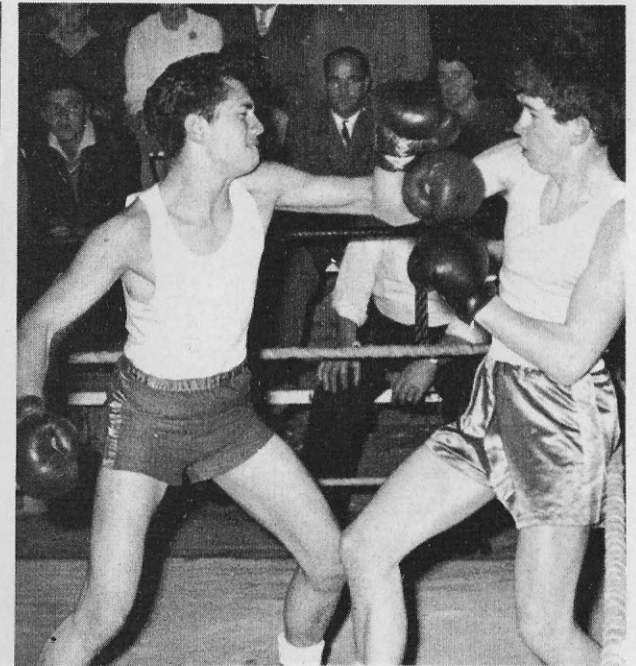
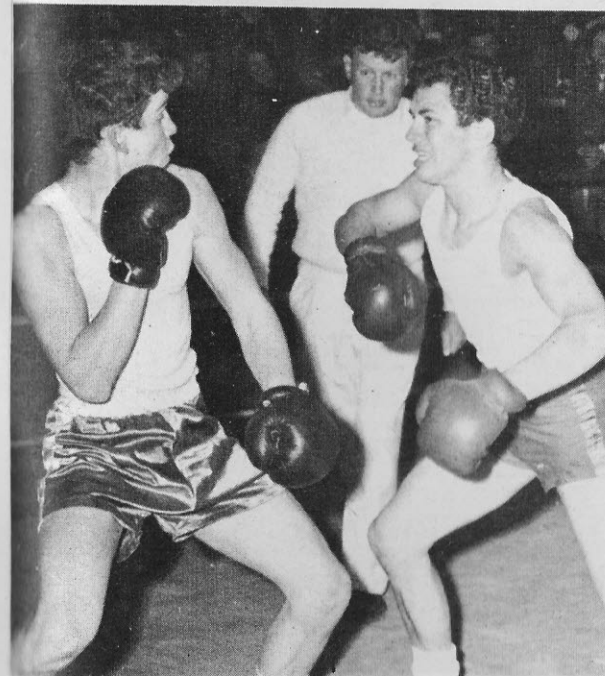
Taranaki Boxing Champs

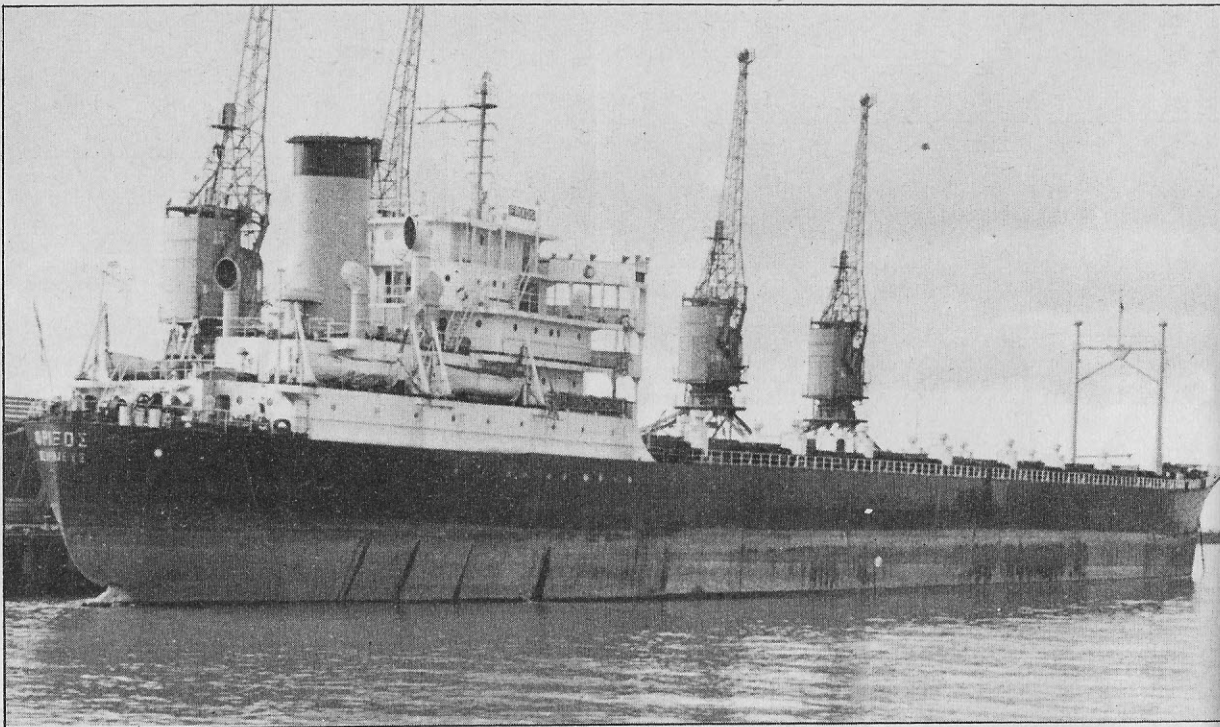

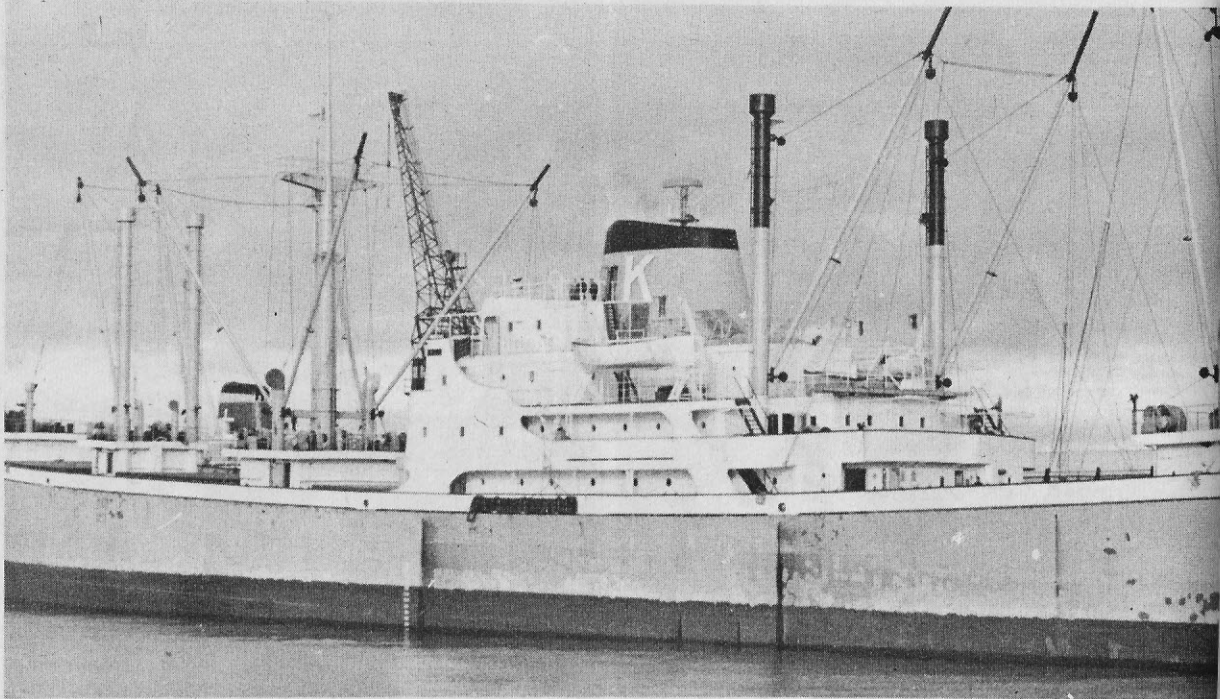

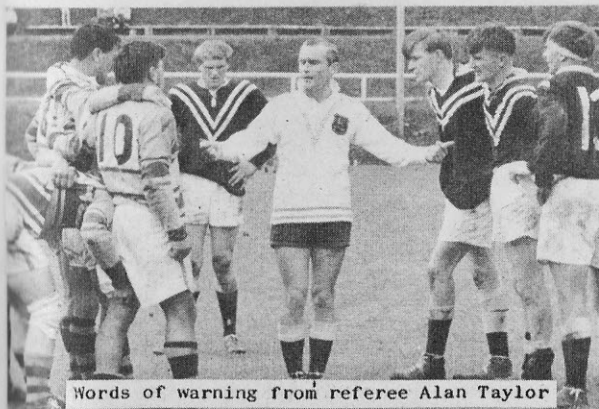
