
There wasn't as much enthusiasm for the elephant race in Devon street as we expected, but





### GVGULLG V




Nearly 1500 people supported the NPBHS at their annual gala day, which included some very interesting and remarkable side-shows and stalls.






#### YOUTH FOR CHRIST RALLY





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You want to know what the Gover Street corner of Devon Street was like 100 years ago? In the picture above, this was the corner which now houses the State Hotel. The picture was taken between 1867 and 1878, and the hotel was then called the Redhouse Hotel. 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









### MOON ECLIPSE






## OAKURA'S FIRST QUEEN'S GUIDES



Since it wasn't half full, then the Board did the right thing in closing this amenity, and shifting the nurses boarding there down to the main hospital nurses' home, which, like its Westown counterpart, was less than half filled. Point is, what is to happen to this £200,000 building? And the fine tennis courts in front of it? It would make an admirable old people's home. We know this is only a temporary measure, but with the majority of nurses now boarding out, it would seem that the use of this building as a nurses' home again would be well into the distant future. Second to get the axe was the Inglewood Maternity Home, below. The reason? Well to keep fulfy trained staff for an average of 1.3 patients per day does seem a bit of a waste, though we feel that this type of medical service is essential, especially in a country district. When cuts of over £50,000 are demanded by the government, something has to go, so don't blame the Hospital Board—they have the unpleasant job to do of making the necessary cuts.



#### IT'S JUST AN IDEA

The perimeter track could become another road circuit for motor racing, and used for all the important cycle races in the province without these sportsmen being a danger on our overcrowded roads.

One point raised regarding the council's proposal to sell this property as industrial land: it is right on the main road, a good place for industry, but, like the cover of a book, the entrance to the city must be attractive, to gain favourable first impressions for those visiting our city. This is important, and, added to the fact that this scheme could result in an influx of visitors on a far greater scale than the city has ever known, should do something towards the prosperity of our town.

Frankly, we think this idea well worth consideration and would like to see someone follow it up with a few more facts and figures that might convince. It certainly would be an asset to our city, as there isn't another area like this anywhere in New Zealand. 









### **Customs Haul**



# MOTORING WITH ROBBIE




YOU CAN replace the exhaust tail pipe without damaging the muffler if you place a block of wood between the car frame and the muffler, then place a jack directly under the block, below the muffler. Only put sufficient pressure on the jack to hold the muffler in place while you work.




IF YOU are ever short of a valve lifter when you're doing a valve job you'll find you can replace the springs without a lifter if you compress each one in a vice and keep it compressed by means of two short pieces of wire, one on each side. When the spring has been installed and the valve keyed, you can remove the wires with the pliers.



A SMALL funnel connected to a length of small diameter rubber or plastic tubing makes an effective stethe, ope for tracking down vacuum leaks around the carburettor and intake manifold where the noises made by such leaks are generally drowned out by other engine noises.



THE TOP dead centre mark on the timing pulley will be much easier to see if you clean the pulley thoroughly and paint it with black paint, then dab some white or aluminium paint on the TDC mark and pointer. The marks will show up well even with a low intensity timing light. When painting the pulley it is better to use a flat black paint rather than enamel.




A CALIBRATED gap simplifies testing engine ignition. Drill a hole through a block of clear plastic, thread it for screws, and scribe the interval marks as shown. Connect the spark plug wire to one connection and lip the other lead to the engine block.
