

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


Easter Celebrations










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ANZAC SERVICE AT BOYS' HIGH SCHOOL

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N.P. BOYS' HIGH SCHOOL JUBILEE



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




WOODLEIGH JUNIOR F








CHILDREN'S DAY AT SPEEDWAY














TARANAKI V. WANGANUI


