


AA SERVICE IS A1


















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EXACTING HOBBIES












RODIN EXHIBITION

The controversial Rodin sculptures eventually came to New Plymouth and, despite the generous publicity, the response from the viewing public was disappointingly poor to the promoters.













More City Progress








Helicopters Over City


