



# Where Have Our Beaches Gone?

Now that the water is warm enough for us to go swimming, we thought a trip to the beach would be a good idea. But where are the swimming beaches? Unless you are a veritable channel swimmer, strong enough to swim against the rips, there's not much scope around New Plymouth these days. So we left the togs in the boot and went looking for somewhere to drive to and just sit in the car and take in the view. Another disappointment. Our better-known beaches, Fitzroy and East End, were far from being aesthetic masterpieces. New Plymouth is famous for its parks, and rightly so, but visitors who want to be beside the sea will soon give us a bad name if something isn't done about our beaches.

Pictured here is what is left of Ngamotu beach, once one of the famous watering places in New Zealand. The march of progress, we agree, is more important; we can't stand in the way of progress and prosperity, and eventually the whole beach will have to go. Which only makes it more important to upgrade our remaining beaches. At Fitzroy there just isn't anywhere to park a car and gaze at the beach activity. East End is just about as bad, with piles of driftwood making an untidy sight. Most summer visitors are looking for somewhere to swim, surf and sunbathe, but this year we have been sending them away with a poor impression of this part of our beautiful city.

On the other side of the stream is an open area, and one of the best skating rinks in the country. Surely this area of beach could be made into something more beautiful than it is at present? Below: Standing in this same spot, one has to turn the head only  $190^{\circ}$  in an easterly direction to be greeted by a rather attractive sight. Why stop here with the beautification? Go right on down to the water's edge, add a few rowing boats for hire, and open a nice tea kiosk with tables and chairs under coloured umbrellas. There's no end to what could be done with this virtually derelict spot.










# Sig Bowling Tournament


# NO TIME LEFT!




Parking A-Plenty... If you're a Govt. Servant



On The Good Ship "Veranima"






