

16-YEAR-OLD GIRL WINS FLANNAGAN CUP





Big but wonderful surprise came to spectators and competitors in Taranaki's only open-water swim, the Flannagan Cup, when sixteen-year-old Karoline Nodder, NPOB, took the lead on the second leg and maintained it to win by 100 yards from her nearest rival, Ross Byers of the same club. The start and finish of the race between the new Blyde and Newton King wharves turned out to be a great vantage point for the 1000 or so spectators. No other place that the royal tourists have visited could have given the Queen and Duke a more loyal and warmer welcome than they got in New Plymouth. At the airport when the royal plane arrived, there were upwards of eight thousand people waiting to catch their first glimpse of them, and as they emerged from their plane, cheers and flag waving broke out on every side. This was more noticeable because Taranaki people are usually reticent and slower than most in showing their approval.

We now know that the organisers of the tour were particularly pleased with the behaviour of the people of the district - a feather in our caps indeed.

As we now know, the visit was all too short, and was

perhaps a little less enjoyable because the Prince of Wales and Princess Anne weren't among the party. But we also know that there will be a clamouring for a longer visit when a royal party next comes to visit this country, and New Plymouth and Taranaki should be on the top of the priority list should this eventuate. Nowhere in New Zealand could the people have been more enthusiastic over the visitors, yet with the necessary amount of decorum they earned for themselves compliments from officials travelling with the royal party.






Interesting Art
