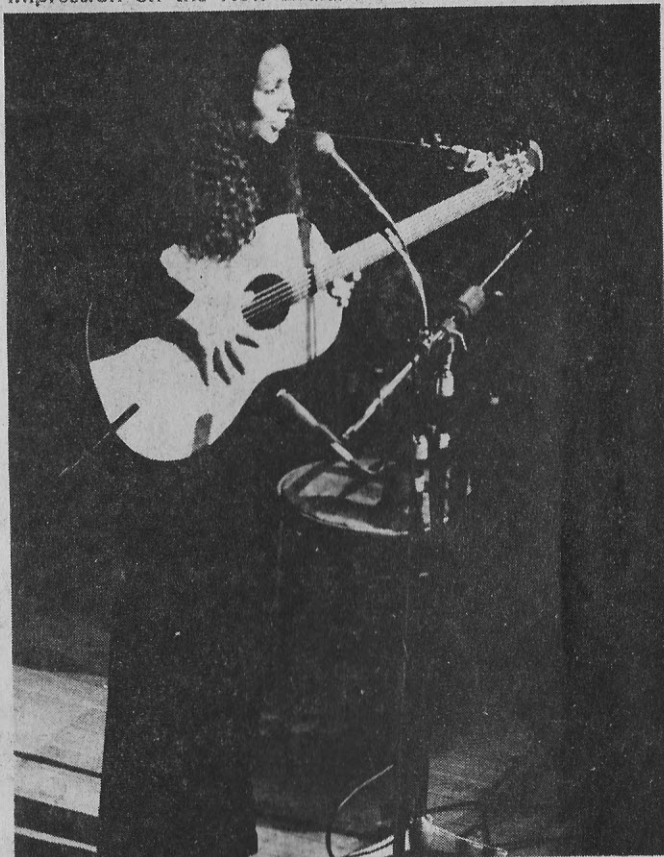

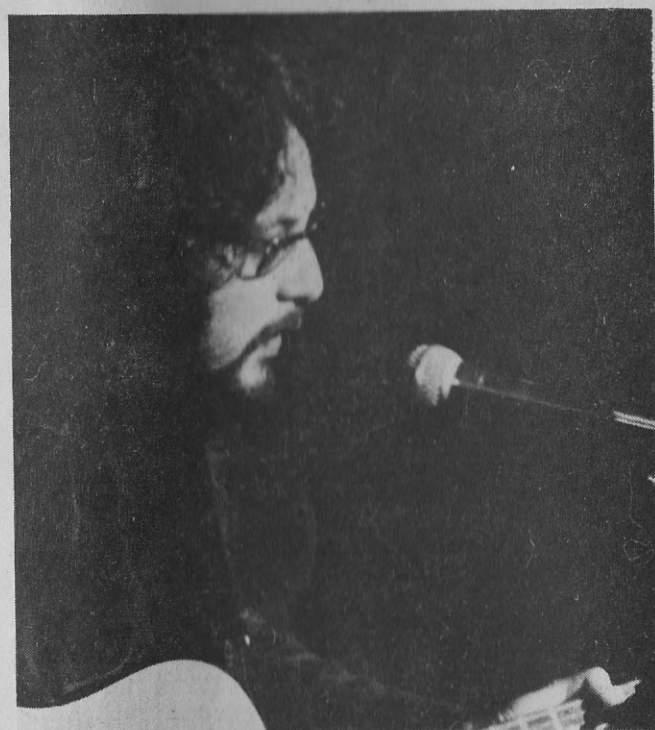


Julie Felix Show

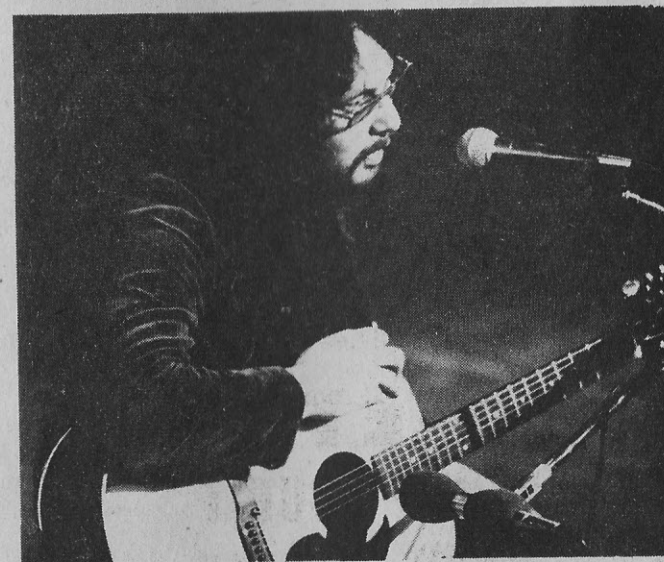

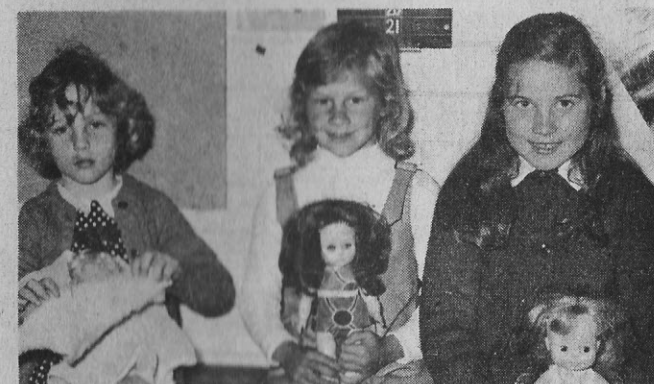

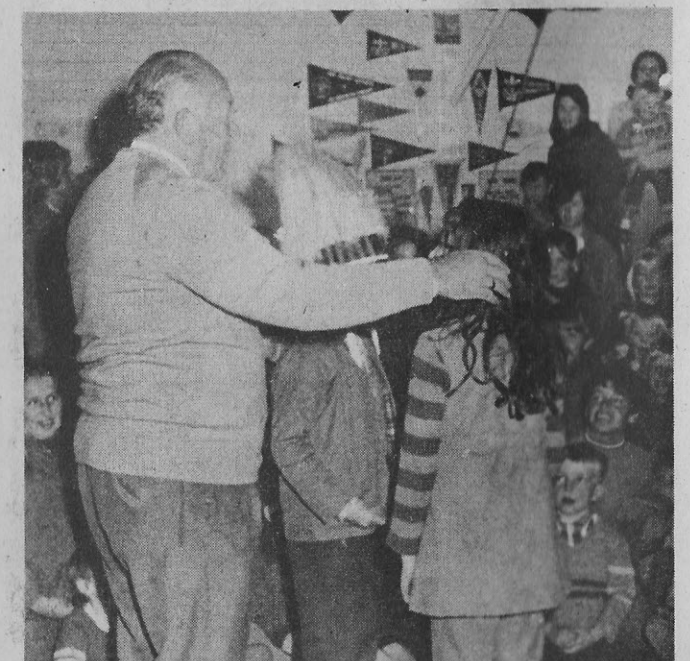

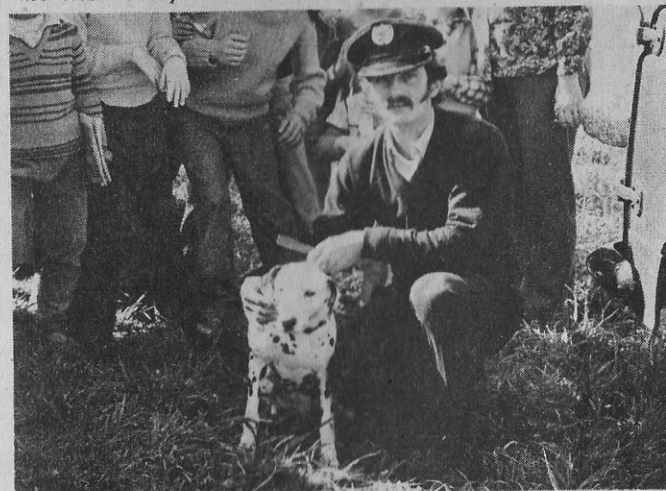

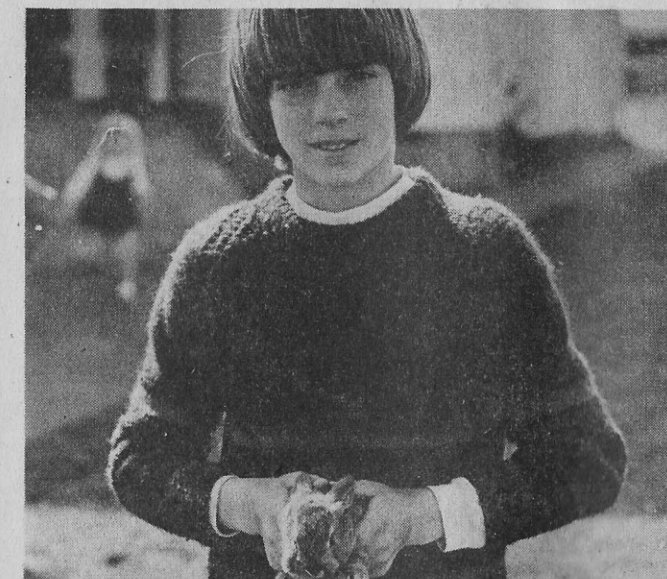

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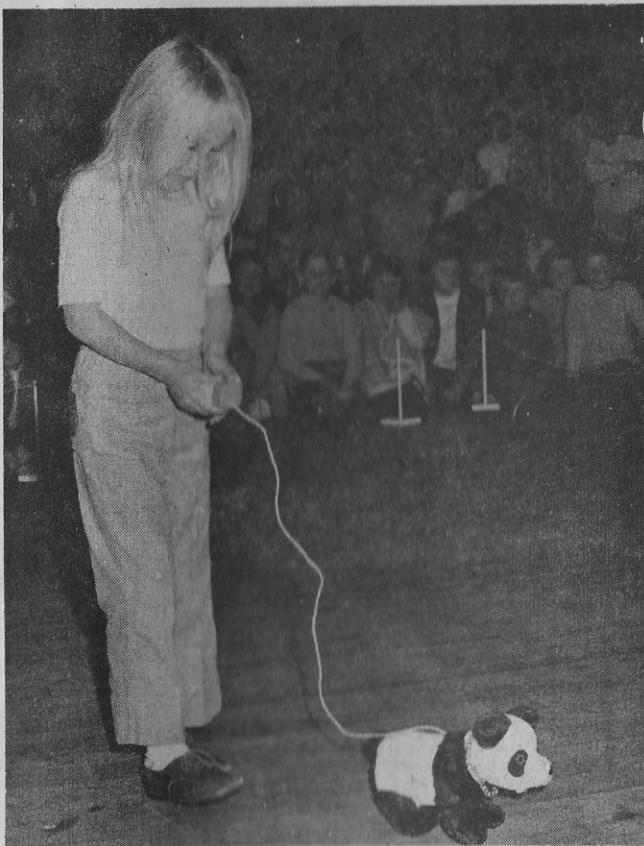

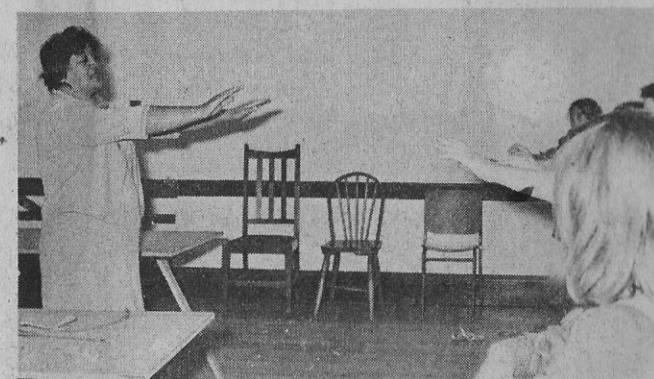

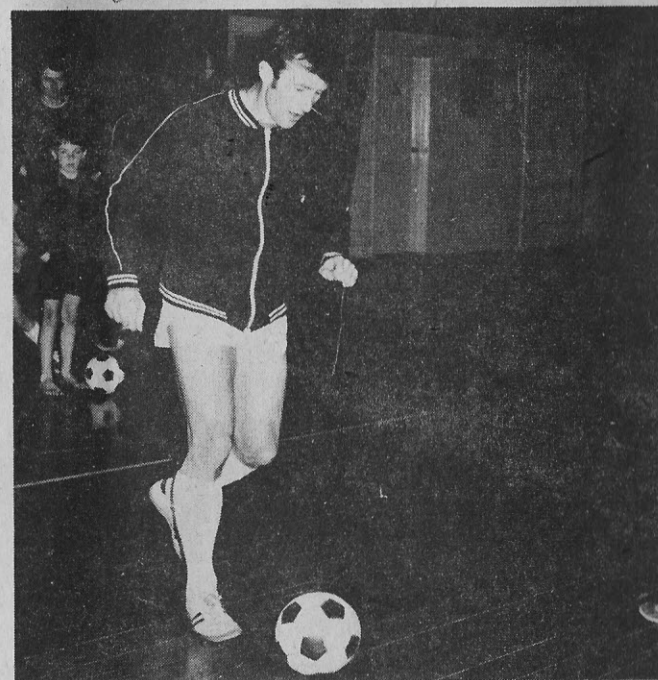

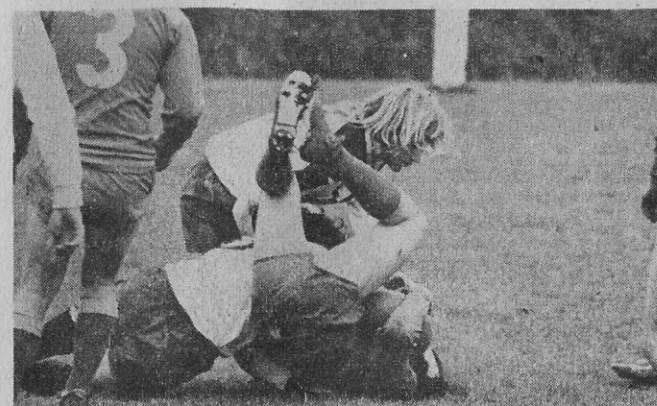

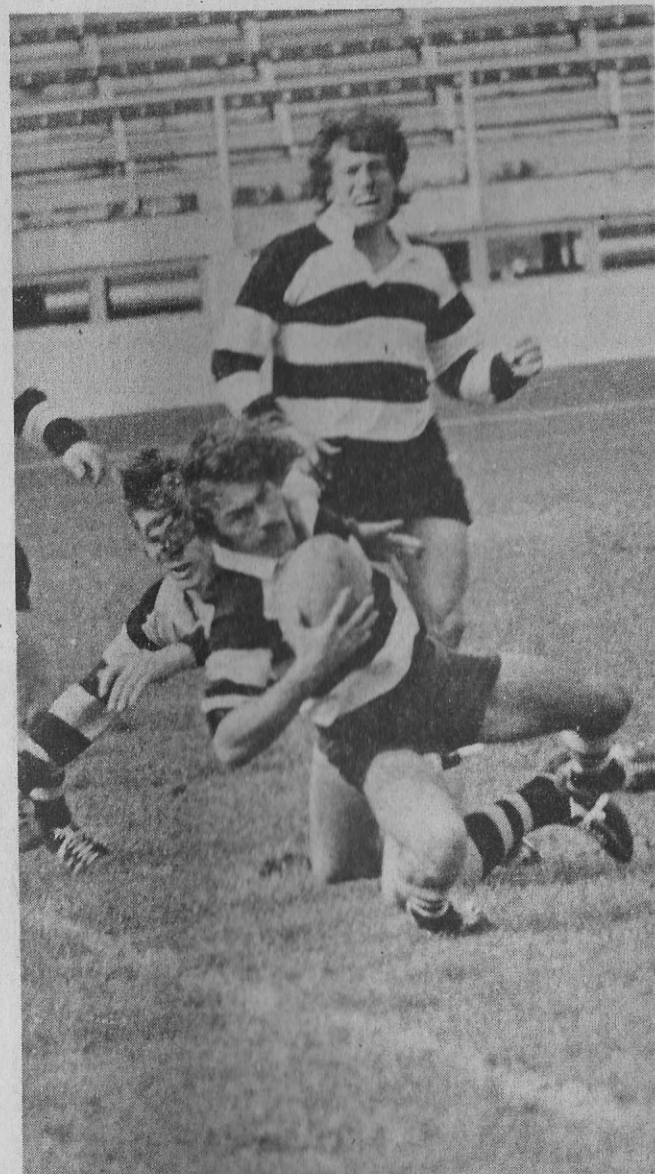

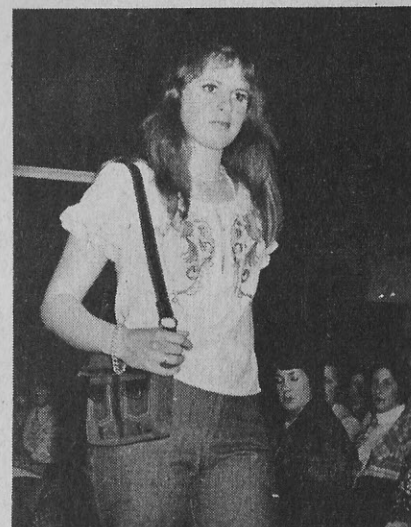

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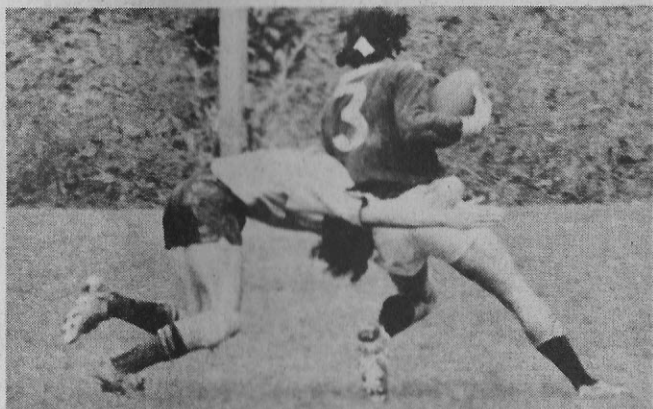

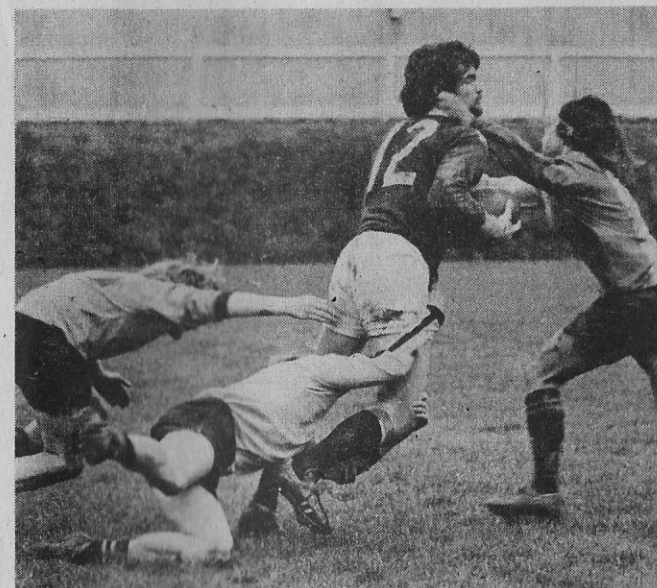

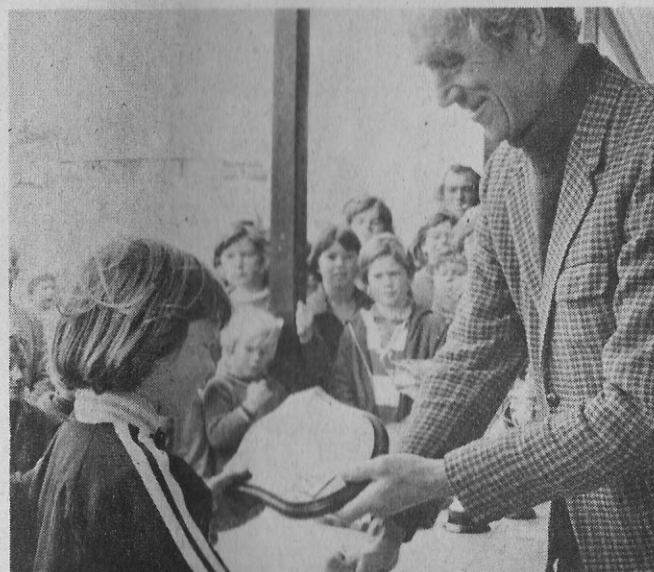

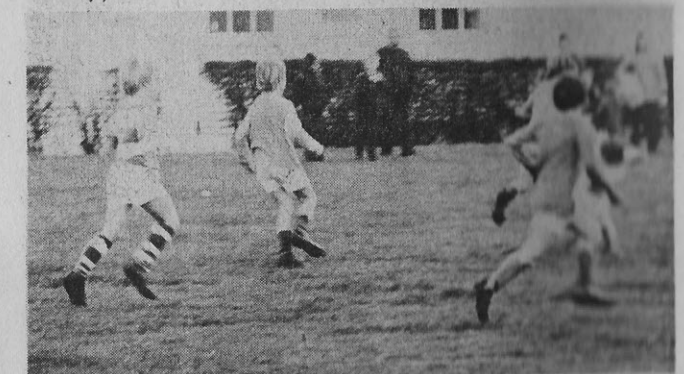

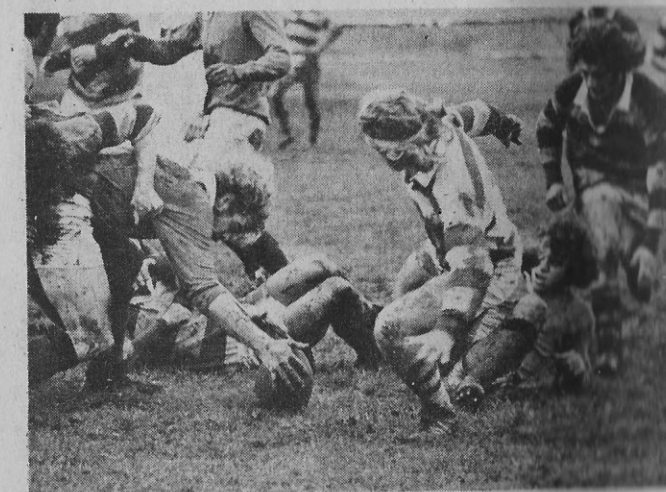

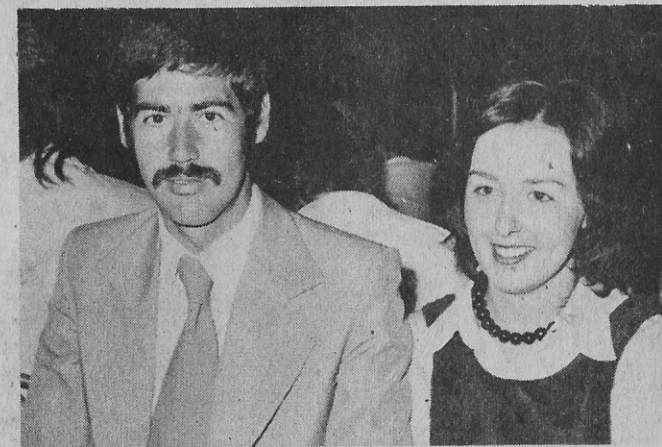

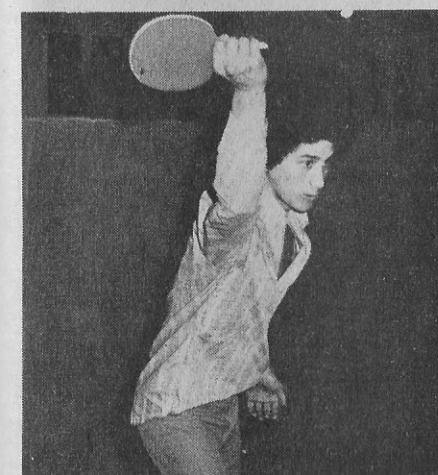

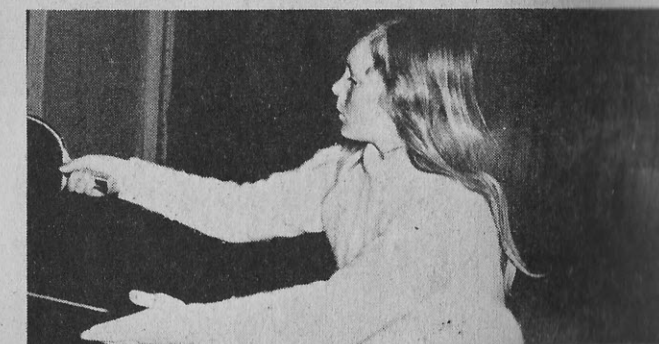

STATIC FREE

EMI in England are at present experimenting with methods to prevent that annoying static that is heard on records.

EMI in England are at present experimenting with methods to prevent that annoying static that is heard on records, and is caused by electrostatic charges. The company is experimenting with a device developed by 3M. The device is called a static eliminator bar and is a self powered machine with neither moving parts or wires.

Wire causes local ionization of the air and the new 3M instrument provides a conducting path which drains any nearby charges, it is reported.

EMI claim that even their present rigorous precautions which include total air-conditioning of vast production areas fail to eliminate dust that is prevalent in pressing and collating areas of their factories around the world, is not enough to totally free discs of static.

It is hoped that the 3M instrument together with certain new production procedures will totally eliminate that annoying static.

PRICE INCREASE

Two New Zealand record companies have raised their retail prices of records, effective last month.

Now Sound warned its readers some eight months ago to expect a price increase in records this year, a warning that has now become reality.

The companies however cannot be blamed for the increases for it relates back to the oil crisis. These companies are now paying a greatly increased price for the vinyl that is required to produce records and it is only natural that this increase has to be passed to the consumer.

Singles have increased from \$1-15 to \$1-25, EP's have not increased, Mid Price albums have increased from \$3-99 and \$4-00 to \$4-30, Budget albums have increased from \$2-50 and \$2-99 to \$2-99 and \$3-50 respectively, and Full Price albums have increased from \$5-75 to \$6-50. There are other changes too, but the above list covers the main record items.

The remaining record companies are expected to follow suit and increase their prices also.

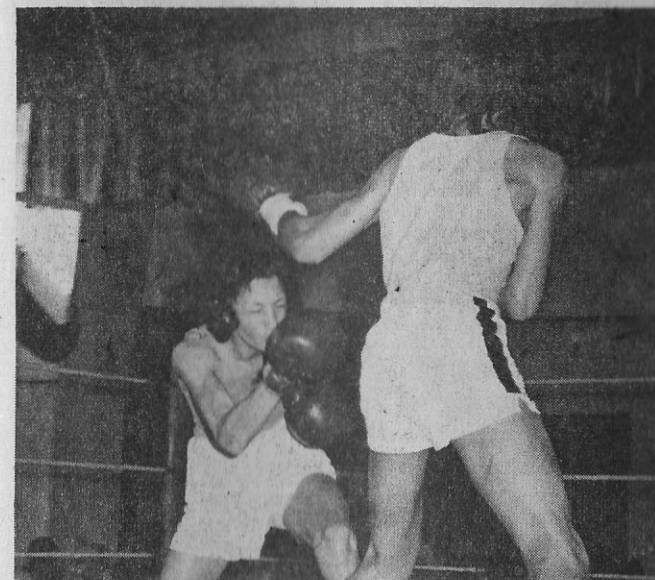

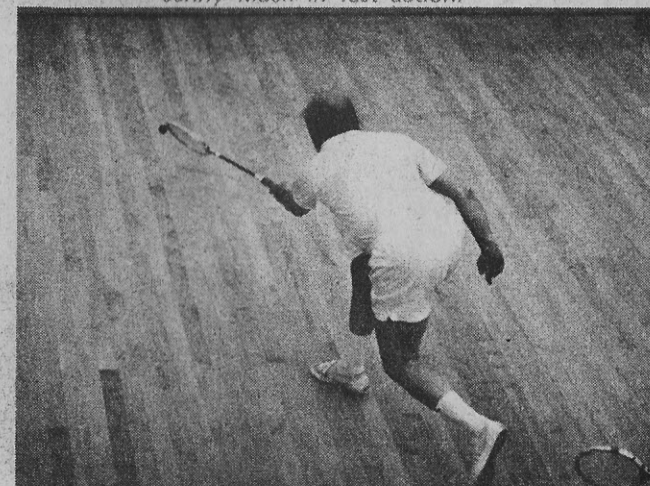

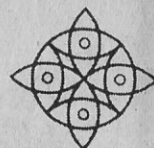

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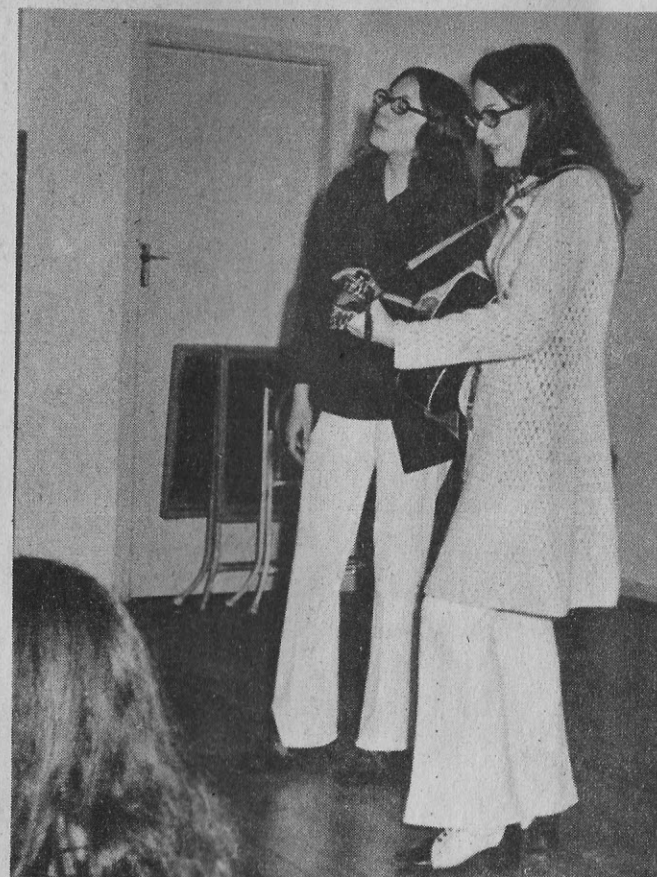
