










WALK-ATHON


The Waitara Rugby League Club staged a 'walk-athon' last month in order to raise funds.


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
TARANAKI V. NORTHLAND

T'was then we both saw what his right hand held in. Giving us a big smile he shrugged out of his pack, "I know what you're thinking, but she's right Jack".







ABOUT CHARLEY PRIDE

Country and Western fans in Taranaki were treated to a great night earlier this month when Charley Price performed at the New Plymouth Opera House.

Pride would be one of the most successful and popular Country—Western performers today. Not since Jim Reeves (whose records still tend to dominate some of the country charts) has there been a performer of this artist's calibre and popularity.

He has over twenty albums to his credit and something over nine of these have reached the Gold category. In addition his singles releases have seen incredible successes—take for instance his 'Kiss an Angel Good Morning'.

Charley Pride was raised in the Mississippi cotton-fields along with ten brothers and a sister. He was born in Sledge, some sixty miles south of Memphis. At the age of seventeen the young Pride was playing ball in the Negro American League with Detroit and with the Memphis Red Sox. Then came the Army's two year stint during which time he met and married his wife Rozene. With de-mobbing he returned to baseball and made it to the Majors in 1961. At this time he lived in Montana, and off season he worked for the Anaconda Minings Zinc complex and sang as a nightclub entertainer at night.

Towards the enri of 1963 country star, Red Sovine happened to catch Charley Pride's act and arranged for a Nashville recording session. Chet Atkins was so impressed with the session that he signed Charley to a long term RCA contract and Charley first released a single in 1965, called 'Snake's Crawl at Night'.

The following year, Pride's recording of 'Just Between You and Me' won him a Grammy Nomination for the 'Best Country and Western Male Vocal Performance'

LYNYRD SKYNYRD....Nuthin' Fancy.....MCA 7884

This third Album release by a solidly based Southern rock band (the one with the funny name) is certainly worthy of attention. The best track by far is their 'Railroad Song' but interest will be held in a comparison with their earlier work. It will be remembered that much interest was created by the release of their first album in New Zealand.

That album was an import and although the numbers brought into the country were not great but it was enough to create considerable national interest in the group.

THE MAORI VOLCANICS....Live...Revolution 1001.



Tanya is a new country and western singer. While we must describe her as a very competent singer we do not find anything terribly exceptional about her work. She performs excellent arrangements of material like 'Lizzie and the Rainman' the Everly's 'When Will I Be Loved' and 'The King of Country Music' If country is your bag, then she would be worth recommending to you, but as we said, we do not find anything rave about her, just good, well polished performances,




