





The New Plymouth Old Boys staged their annual Swimming Carnival at Kawaroa Pool, New Plymouth, at the end of last month.


There were excellent entries in all races and a very high standard was observed with a few exceptional swimmers noted.


























Catamaran Champs.

The New Zealand National Catamaran Championships were held off the coast of New Plymouth over a one week period, early in the New Year.















Doctor....."For my professional advice". Hillbilly....."No sir. Made up me mind ah 'ain't goin' ter take it".


Taranaki was featured as part of Chris Carter's "Wonderland" at the Summer Carnival at the Auckland Showgrounds in January.























These pictures were taken on the first days racing when there were a total of seventeen races scheduled.

















Songs that fall into this category are 'Save the Last Dance For Me' and 'Rock Around the Clock'.

This new Budgie album does not differ greatly from the


groups previously offered work.






