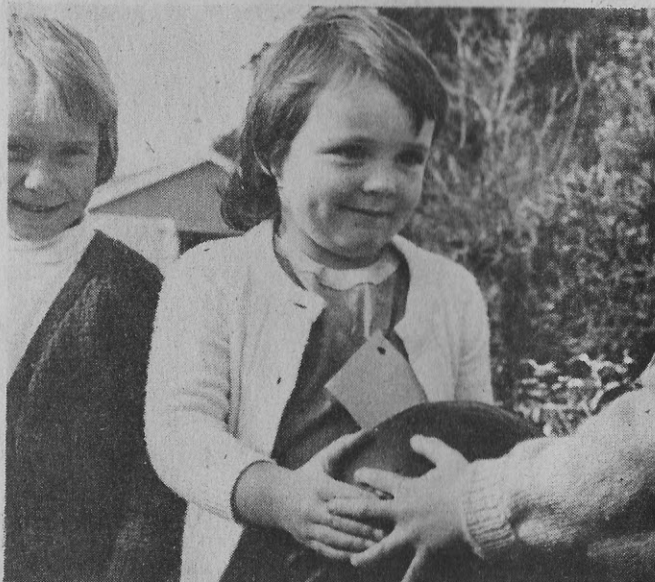

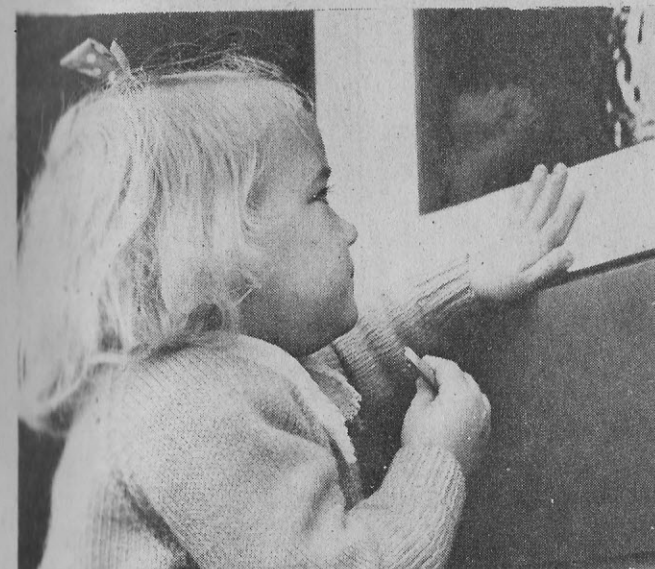

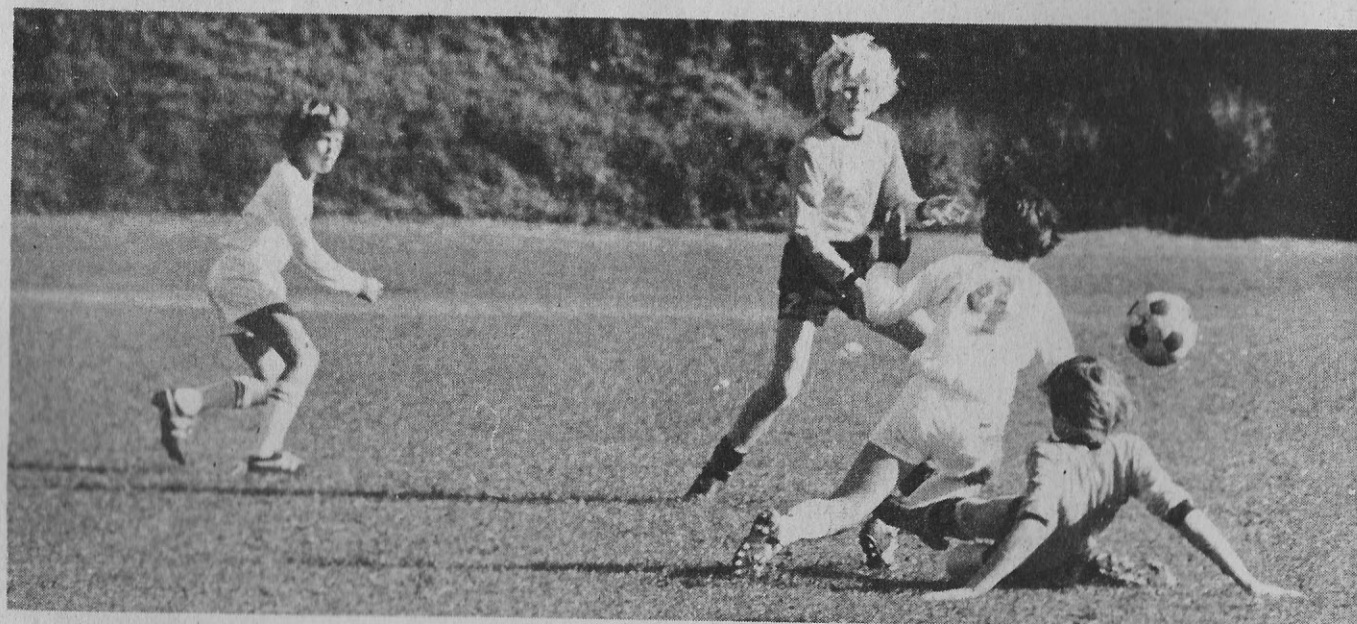

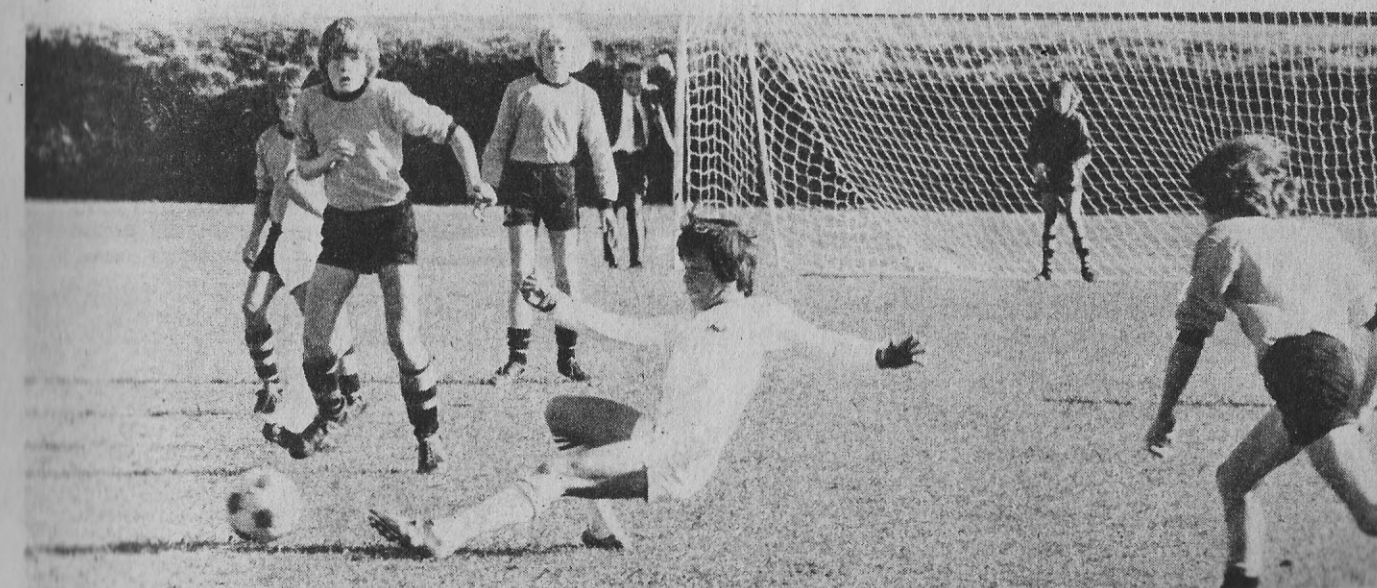

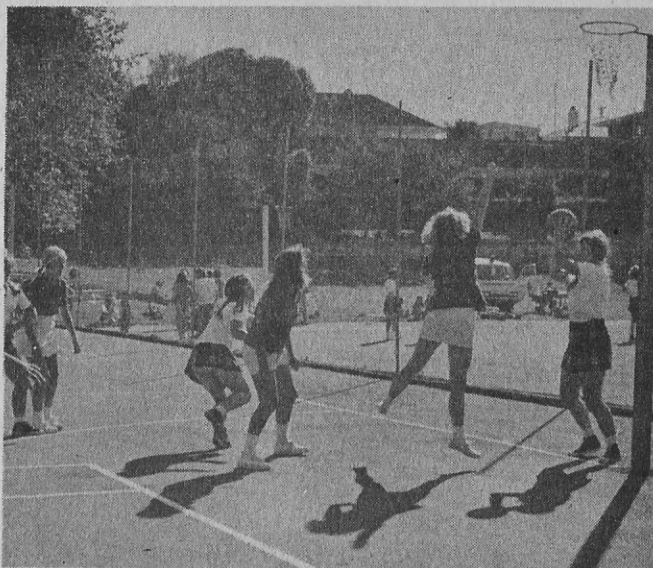

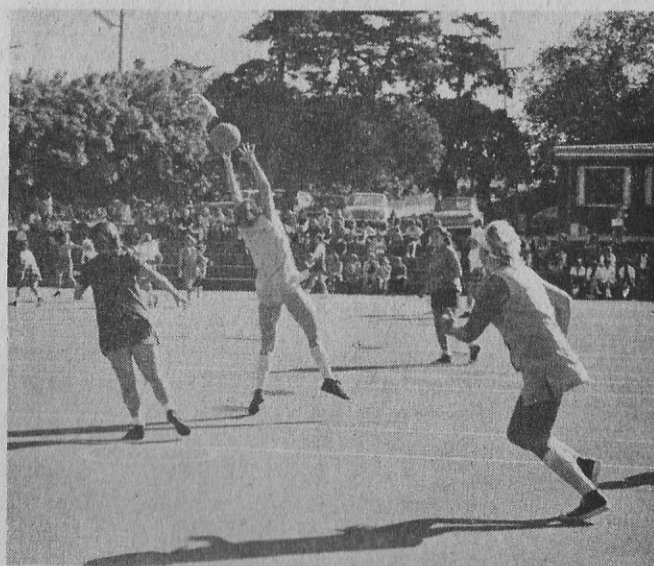

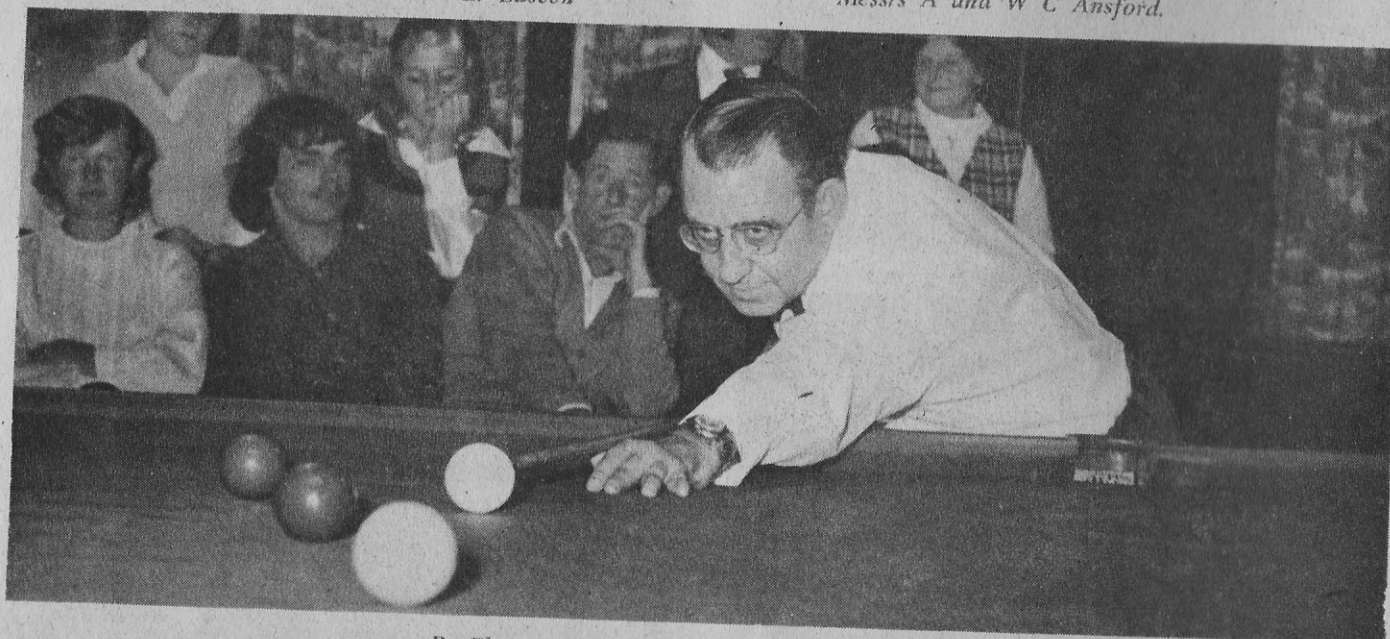

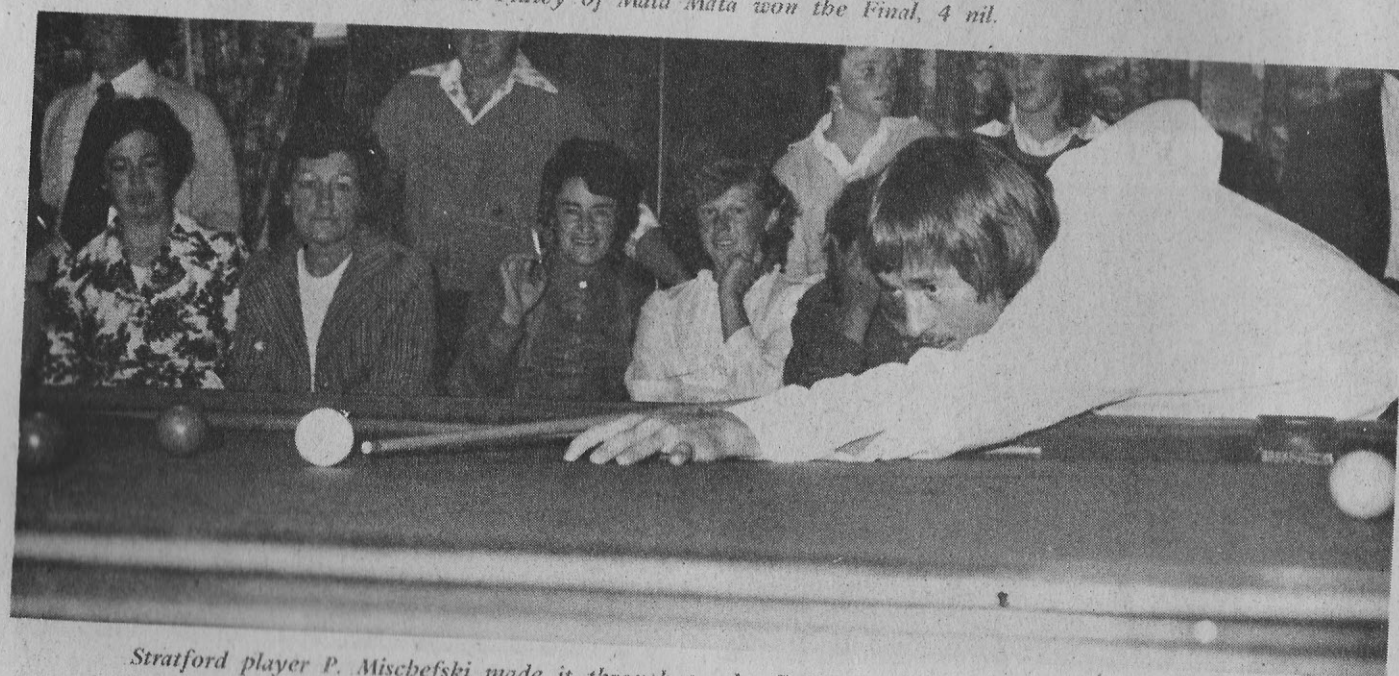

Lin Annabel, Editor of Photo News, says that South Pacific Martial Arts magazine fills a definite need in this particular area. "We have approached this venture purely from club level and have received fantastic response and support almost everywhere we have been."

"Of the hundreds of clubs that have been approached so far, only one has refused to support the venture. With this exception, all have welcomed the move and not only promised support but already provided much valuable assistance."

Mr Annabel is the Managing Editor of the new magazine and will look after the day to day operation and the business side of the venture.

Helen Upson, a black belt Karate student in the Kyokushinkai style has been engaged as News and Features Editor. Helen has just returned to New Plymouth after an eight month stint in Australia, during which she visited many clubs of various styles and greatly increased her knowledge of the Martial Arts.

"The appointment of a person with a specialised knowledge of the Martial Arts was imperative for the success of this venture" said Mr Annabel. "Helen is perfect for the position and has already achieved a great deal towards the success of the magazine."

With so many thousands of New Zealanders and citizens of neighbouring countries showing such enthusiastic interest in Martial Arts, it is unlikely that the new magazine can miss, even without the support that this venture now has from clubs.

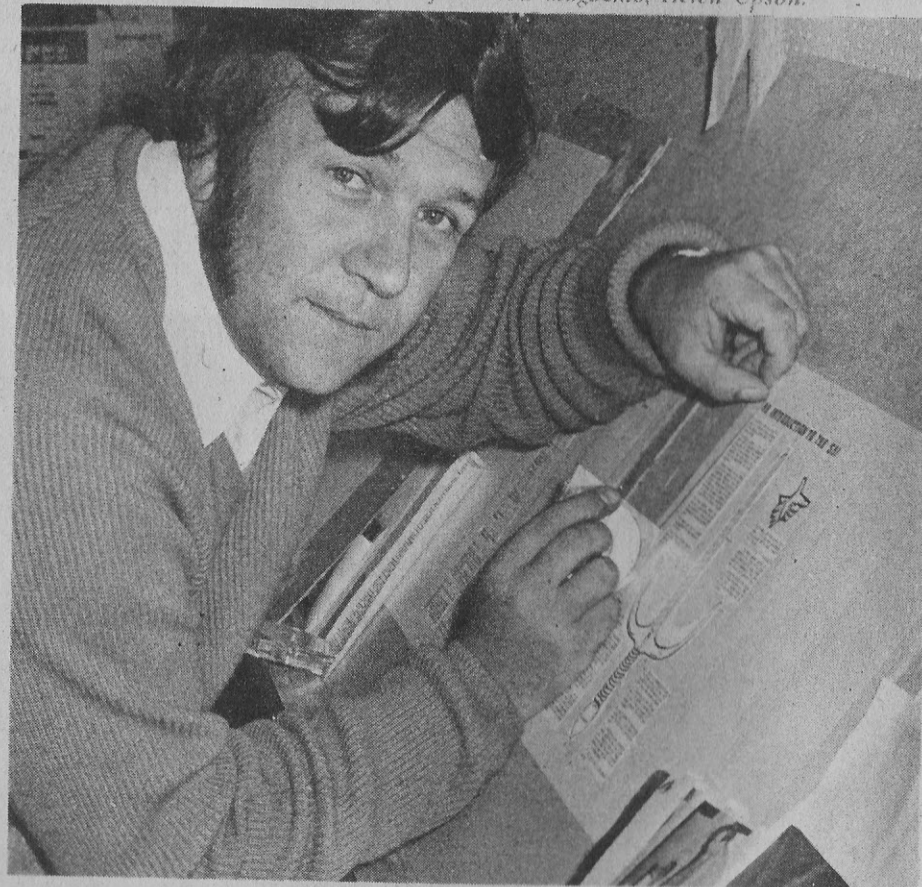

In what was almost a surprise result, Central beat Motoroa by 3 to 2 in a Chatham Cup match held last month at Western Park.

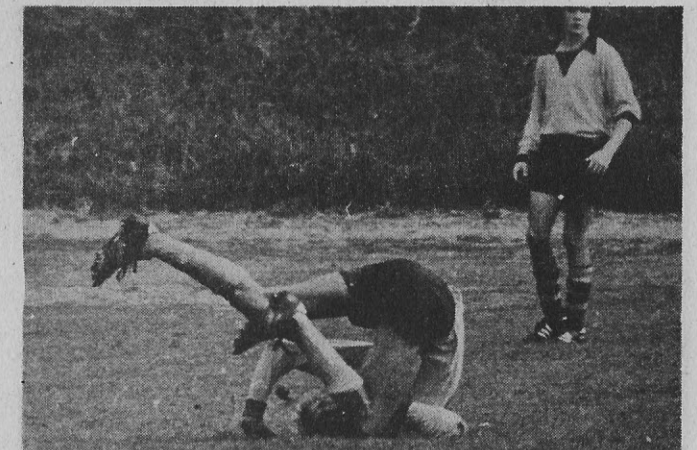
After being in such a strong position last season it was surprising to many that Motoroa were beaten in this match. However, in all fairness, Central did deserve to win the game.

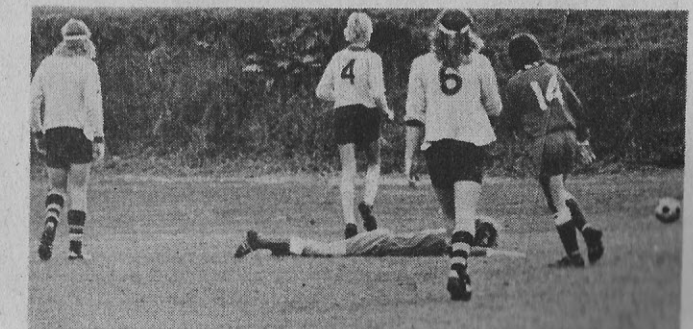

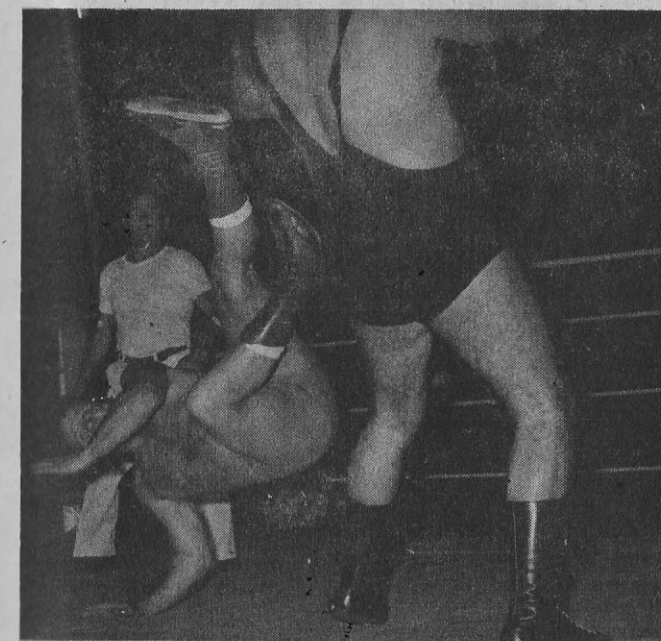

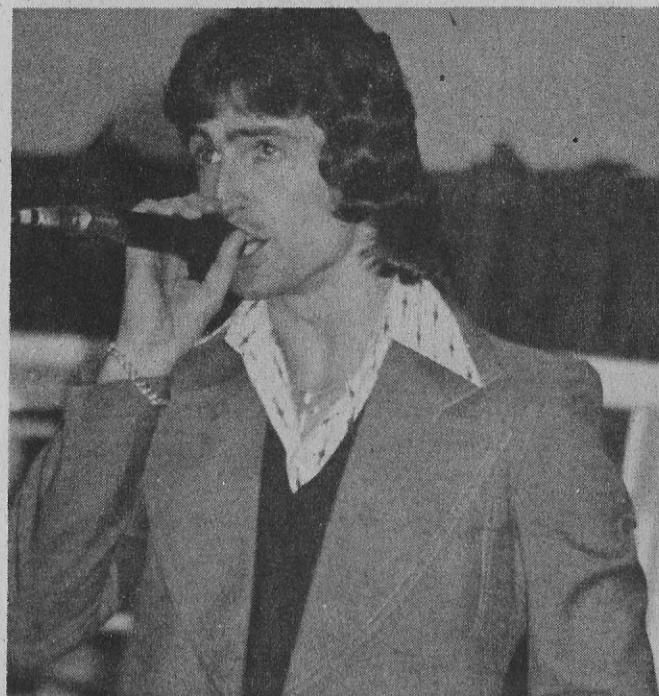

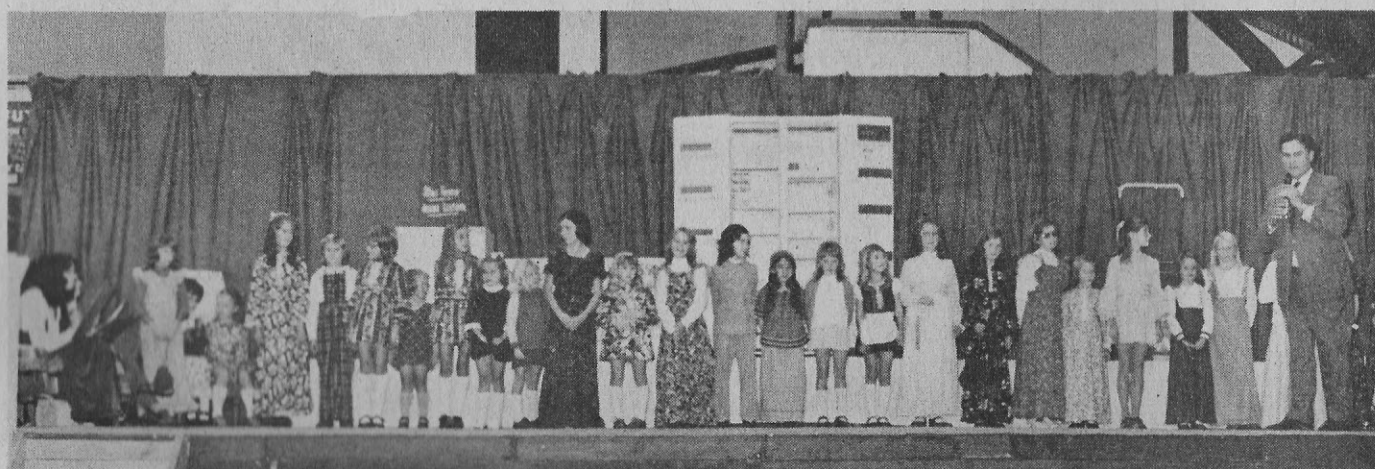

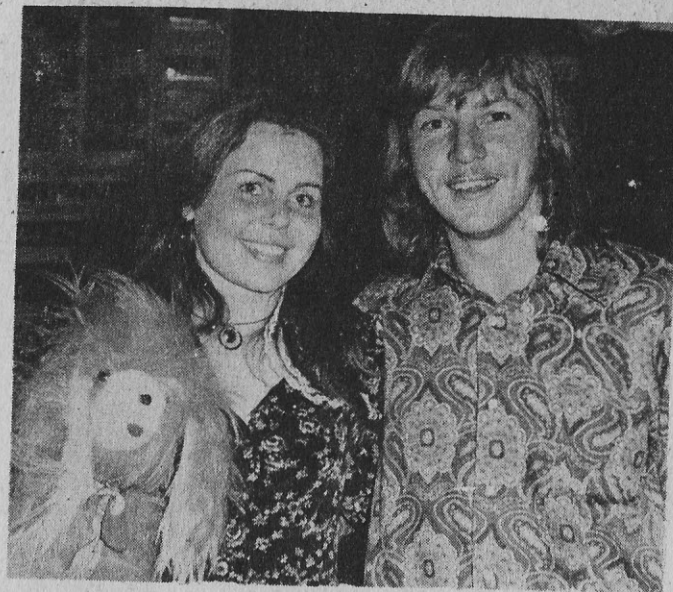

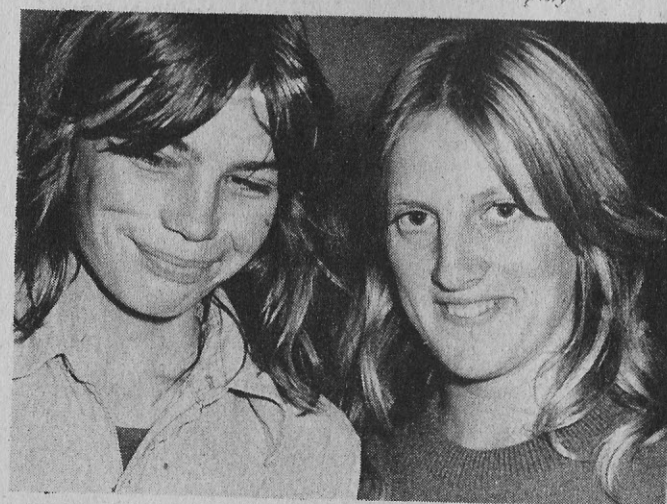

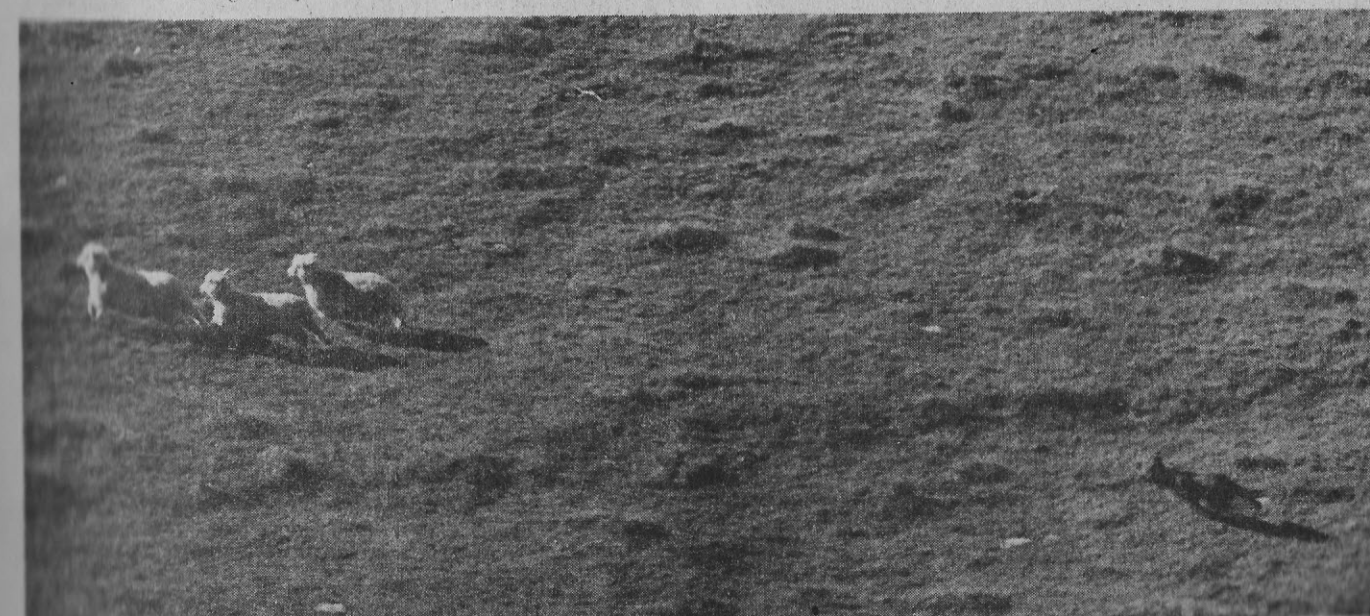

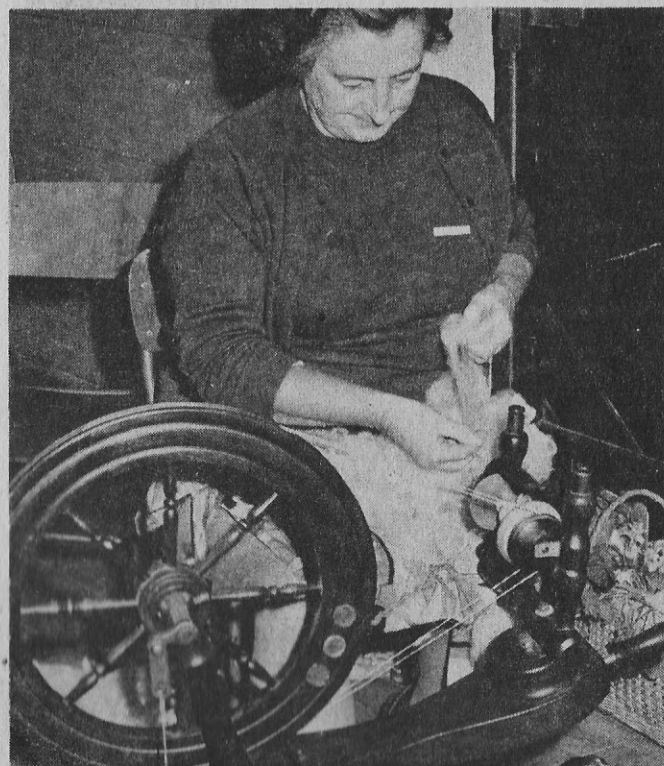

THE AUSTRALIAN ENZ

New Zealand group, Split Enz have been in Australia now for some three months. It is almost always a difficult job for an unknown kiwi band to make it in Aussie but Split Enz seem to be doing rather well so far. Their initial exposure has been appearances on most all of the major TV shows in the country and now they have the big break coming. The group have been signed by Mushroom Records to record an album in Festival's Sydney studios. The main point of interest is that it is planned to bring in a 'name' English producer for the sessions, which will be recorded on a 24 track machine. Split Enz have made a point of only performing at concerts in Australia and this seems to have paid off for them. They have toured on the Roxy Music shows throughout the country and have been acclaimed by Roxy members. Bryan Ferry has stated that the Enz are the best group ever to appear on the same bill as them. No mean compliment. After a recent appearance on the ABC Countdown, the station's switch board was jammed with calls from people raving about the group. The best publicity of all. The Enz toured Australia again last month; this time with Leo Sayer. Now of course they have the matter of recording the album on their minds. After the New Zealand release of the album a New Zealand tour is planned.

BEECHED

On the New Zealand scene, a group that appear to be making a lot of noise (and not without reason) is Beech. They have been seen around the nation on tours like Chuck Berry, Little Richard, Clarence (Frogman) Henry and Osibisa. Their most recent tour was with Roxy Music and they have recently been given television exposure via the show 'Grunt Machine' with songs 'Ready to Run' and 'Country Man'. Beech make a point of not accepting any resident positions with clubs or hotels. They seem to enjoy the challenge of working in new places with new faces almost all the time. This of course is probably good for both the group and for their fans and fan club.

NEW ALBUMS

IRON BUTTERFLY.....Scorching Beauty.....MCA 7779.

I was of the opinion that Iron Butterfly were dead and buried, nothing but a pleasant memory in the minds of those of us with long memories. It was therefore a great shot in the arm to see a new LP release by Butterfly. It will be remembered that Iron Butterfly had several membership changes during their life. This album is recorded by an Iron Butterfly that consists of members from the early group and the one that replaced it, plus a couple of new members. They are still recognisably Iron Butterfly — hard, futuristic and non-compromising — yet their sound is not as dated as we might expect. The opening track '1975 Overture' has a very futuristic space feel to it and while some of the other tracks rely on the solidness of their sound, still others tend to remind of early Jefferson Airplane and early Iron Butterfly. The album is one that is going to find a ready space on the record shelves of many followers of rock music.

RONNIE MILSAP.....Pure Love.....RCA 1-0500.

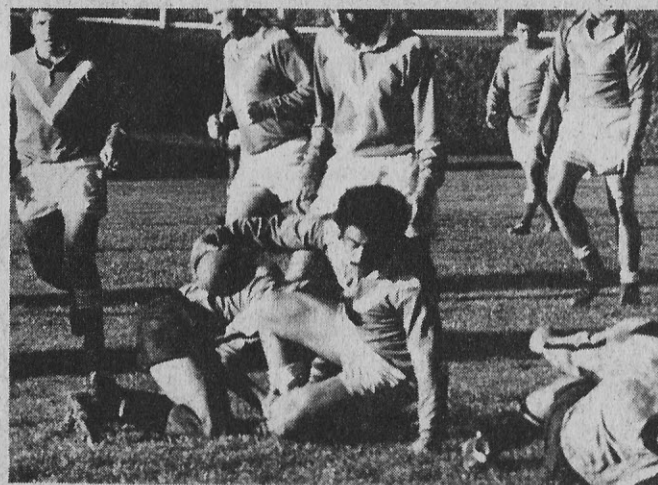
It is not really very often that country and western music fans get the chance to discover a new artist on record. This then, is such an opportunity. Milsap sings songs old and new, well known and not so well known. The singer is one of undoubted ability, Southern US in style, but one who deserves a place in every C & W fan's record library. I think you'll find he has a lot to offer. Sample the content on this album.....Pure Love (best track on the album) Four Walls, Behind Closed Doors, Amazing Love, Streets of Gold and Blue Ridge Mountains Turnin' Green.

THE KINKS.....Preservation Act 2.....RCA 2-5040.

This new double album from the Kinks contains a theme throughout of a fight between extreme right and extreme left political ideologies and a bid to take over the nation. There is commentary throughout by an assumed radio announcer who gives radio like comment on the take-over. How the story ends we shan't say. You'll have to find that one out yourself. The music itself is very much in the Kinks vogue, although it does relate to the theme of the commentary on the double-album. There's a song about Mr Black, the champion of the puritans and the other work all relates to the total theme. I found the work entertaining and different from previous Kinks work, though very much in their own tried a true style.

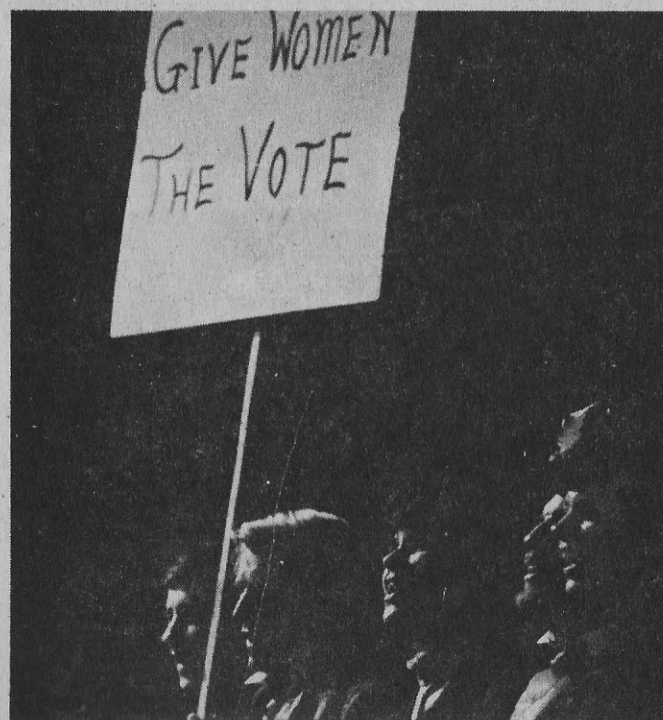

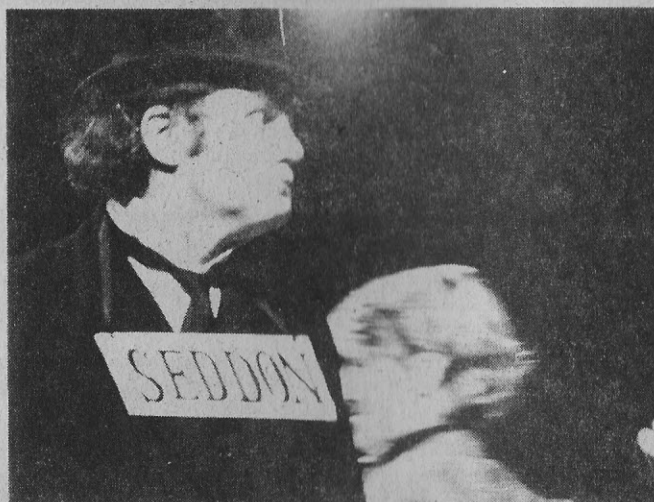

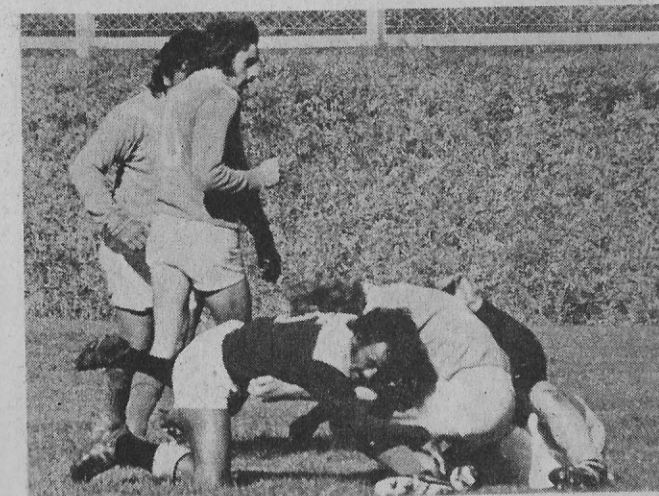
TARANAKI B. v. MANAWATU B.

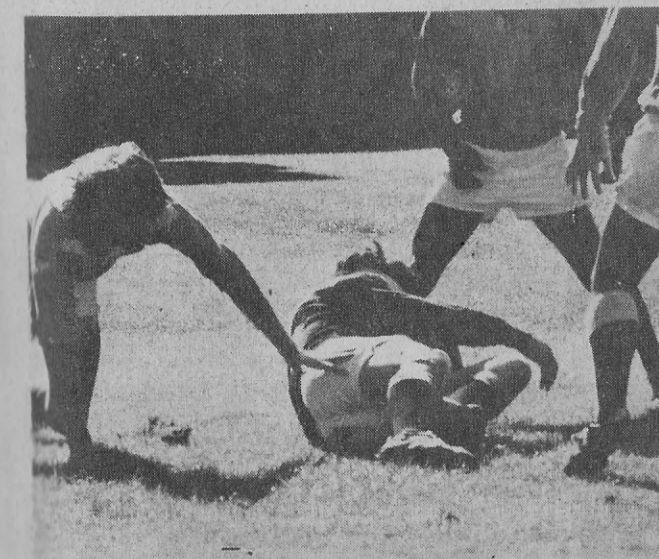

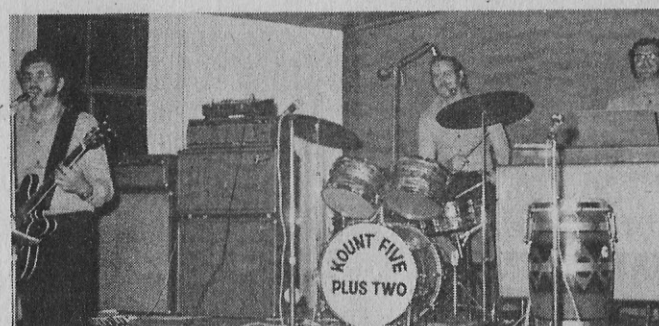

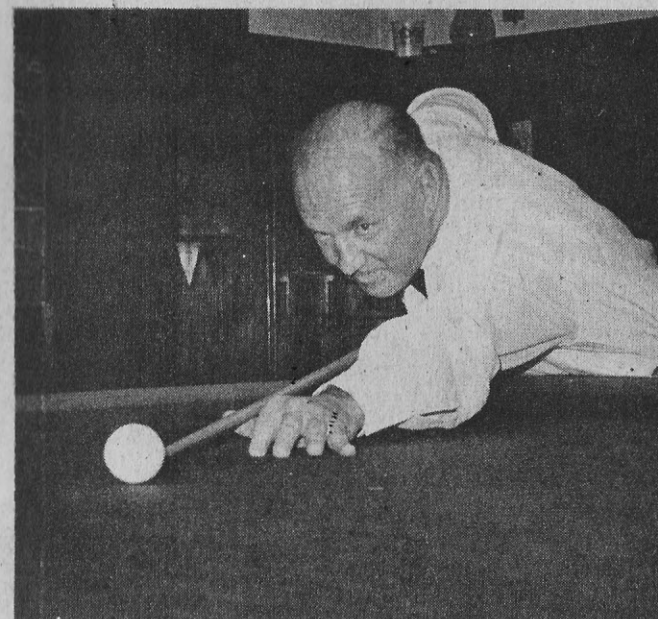

An estimate of the number of times the buttons have been activated in four exhibitions (Palmerston North, Auckland twice and Build Expo) is a staggering 3.5 millions, without one single failure.

Next stop for our rather unique promotional equipment is the NZ Industries Fair in Christchurch during the August school holidays.

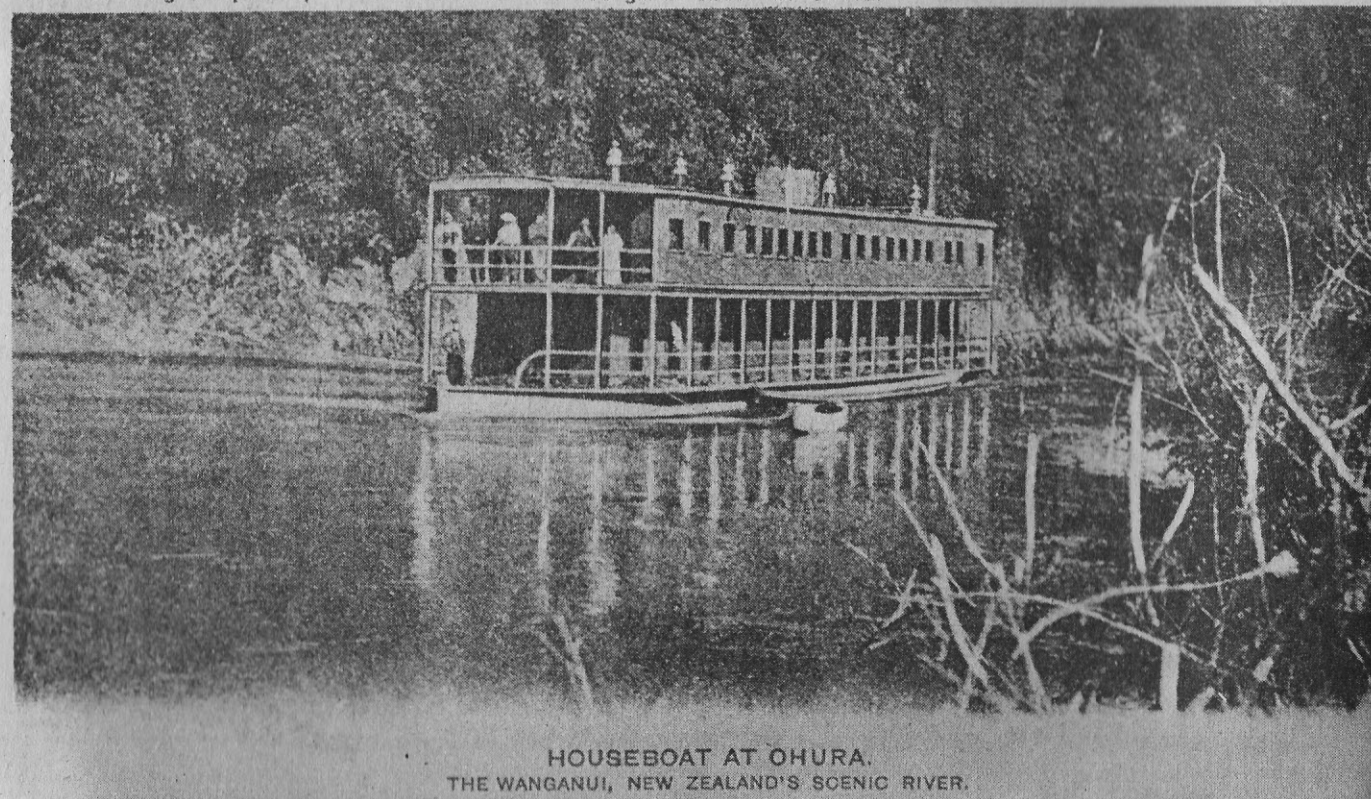

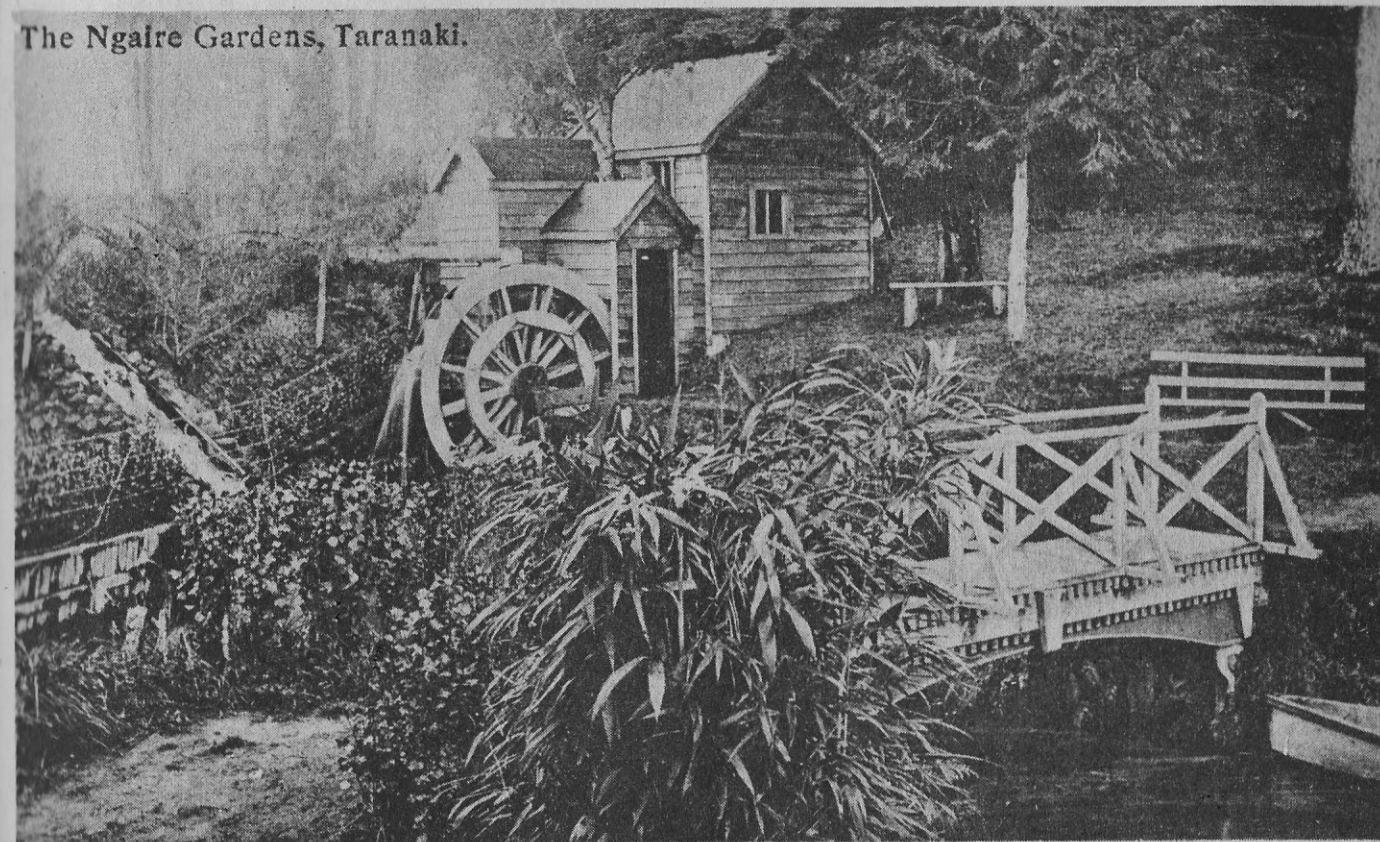

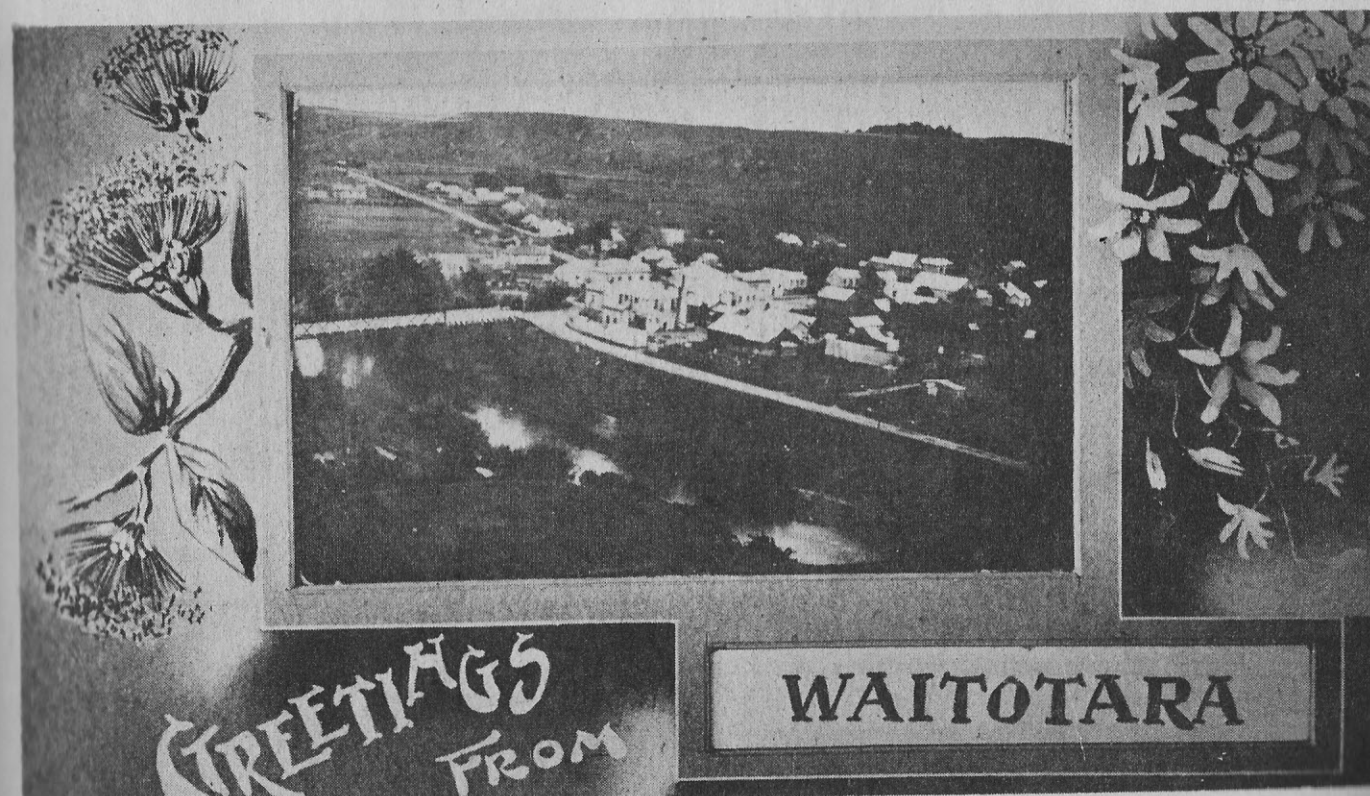

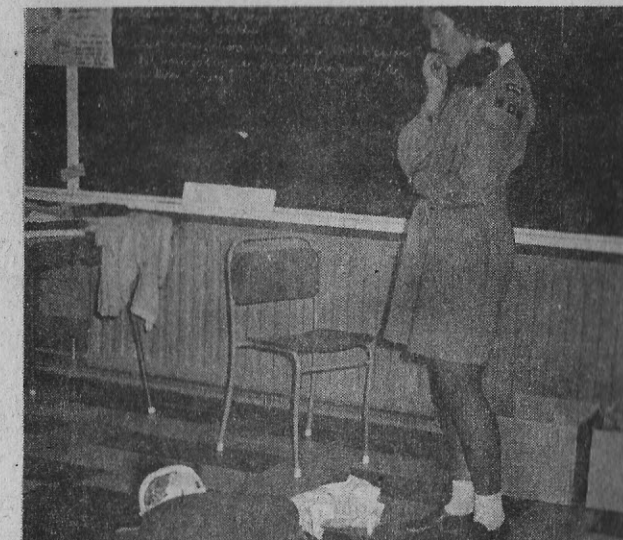
