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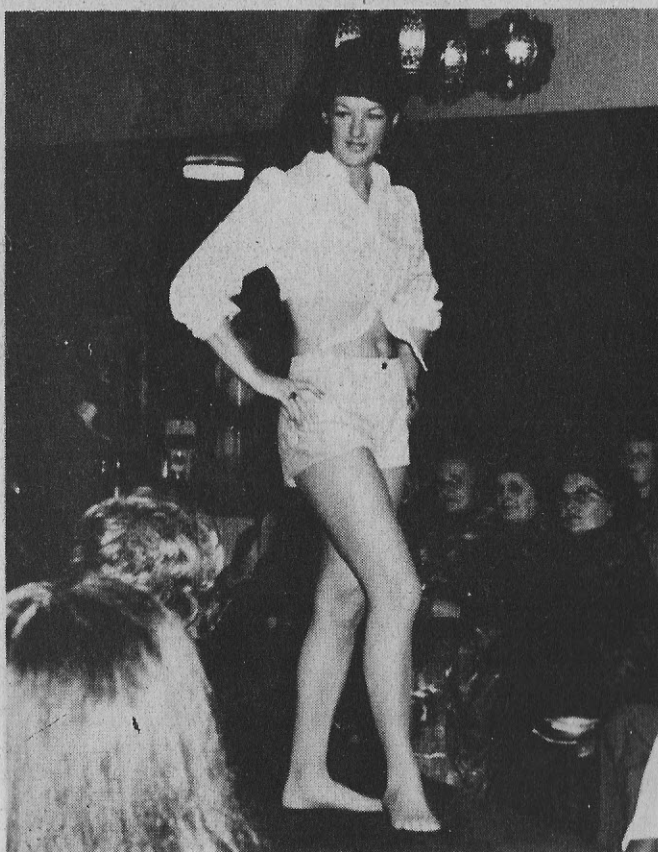

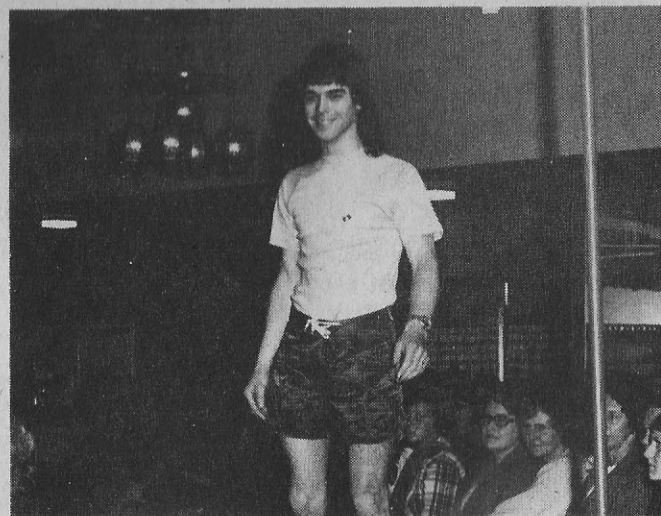

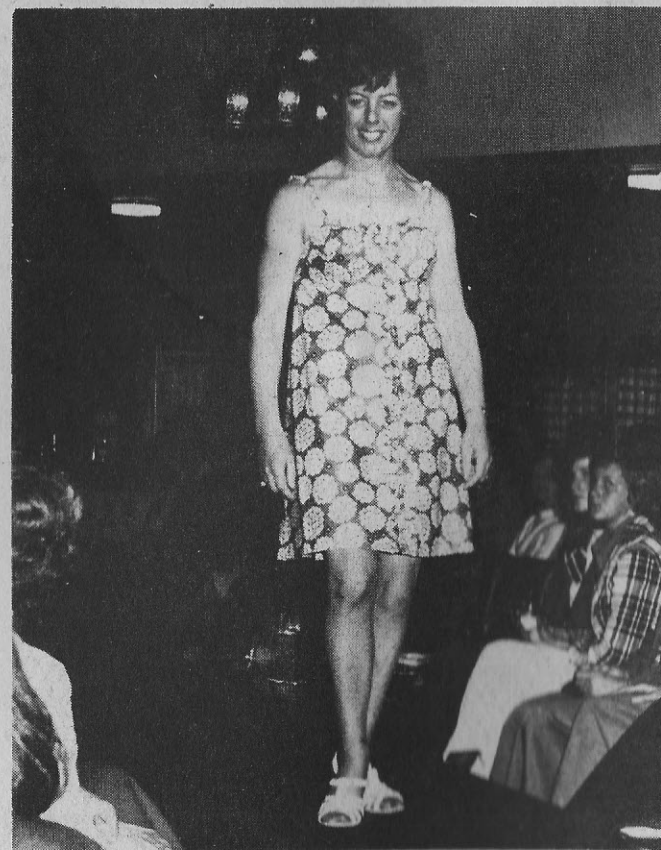

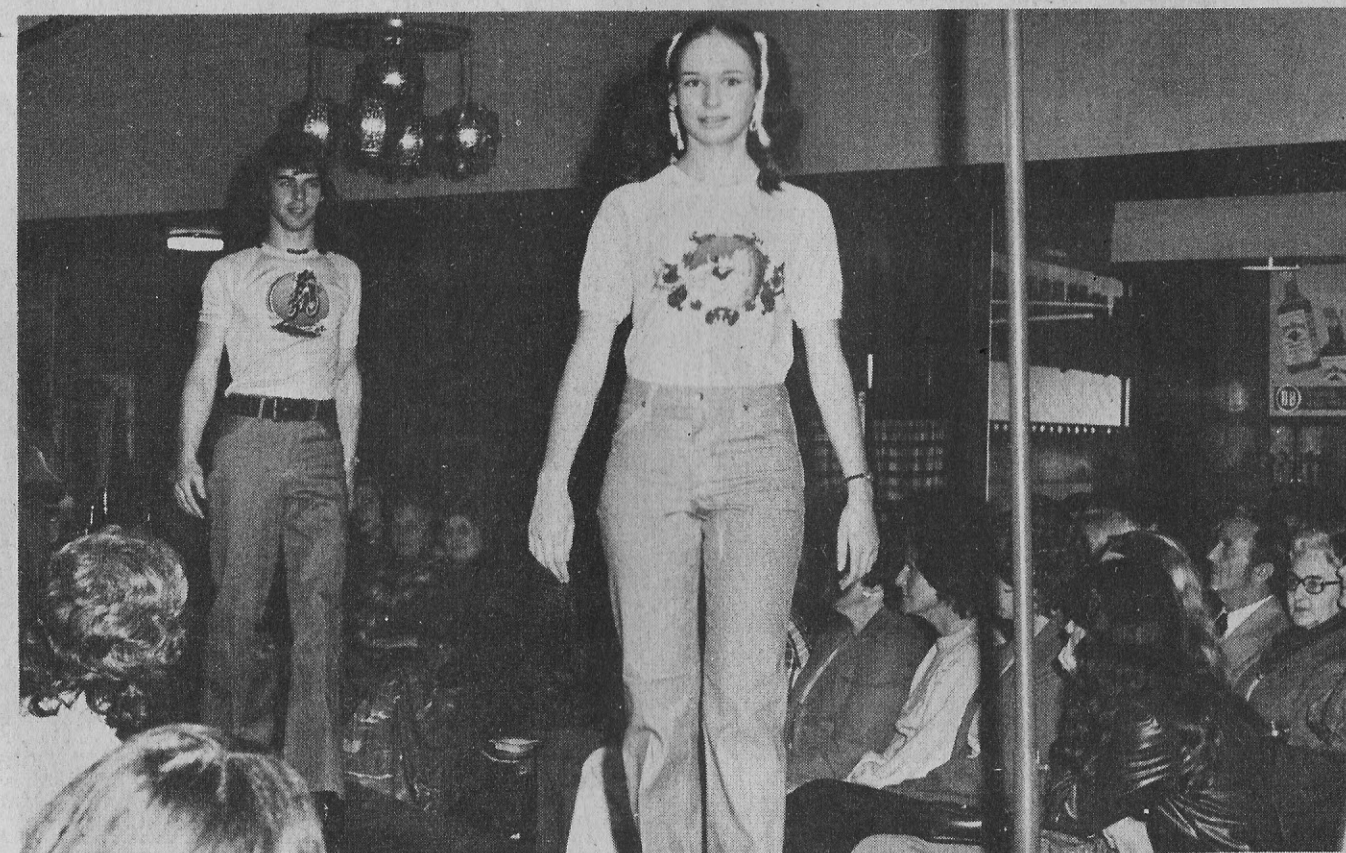

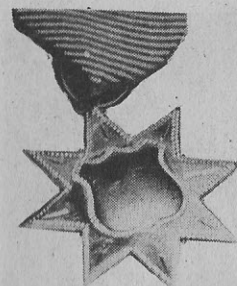

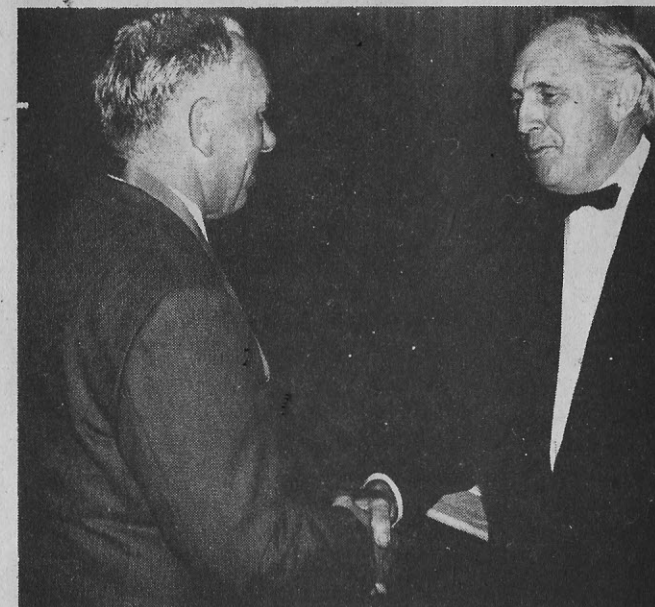


The New Plymouth City Band also received an Arts & Sciences Medal. They won the A Grade section at the National Championships.

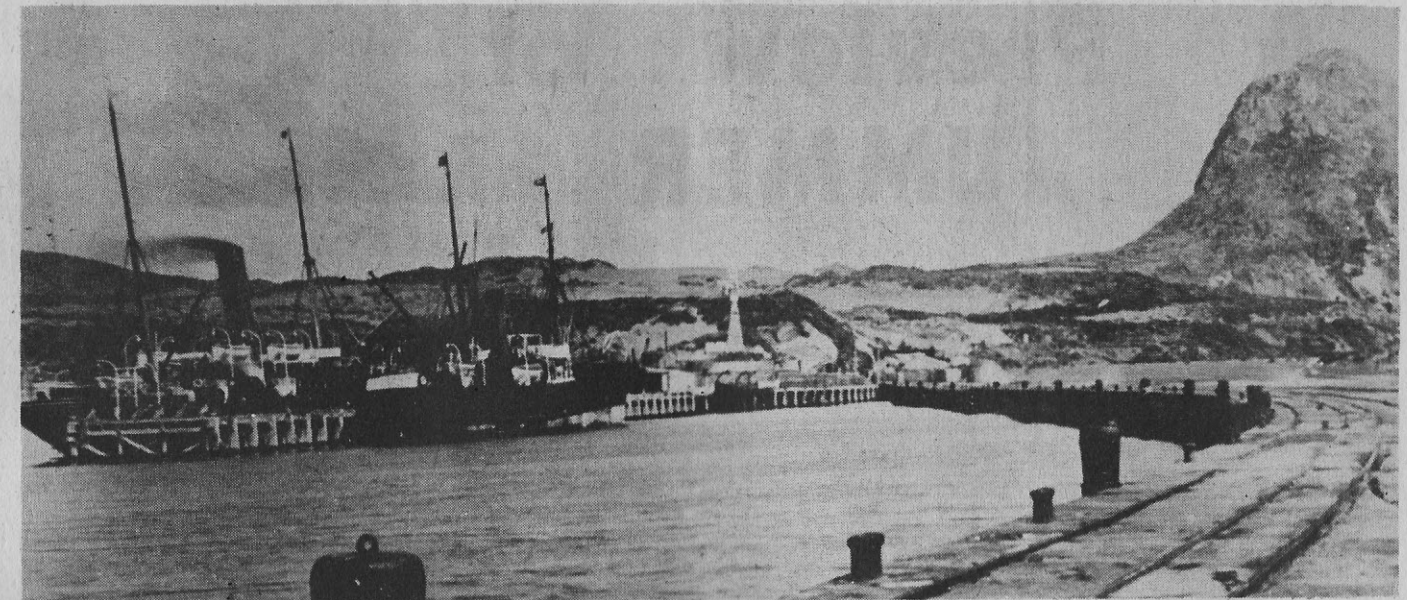

Perhaps people do "only see what they want to see, and hear what they want to hear" ????

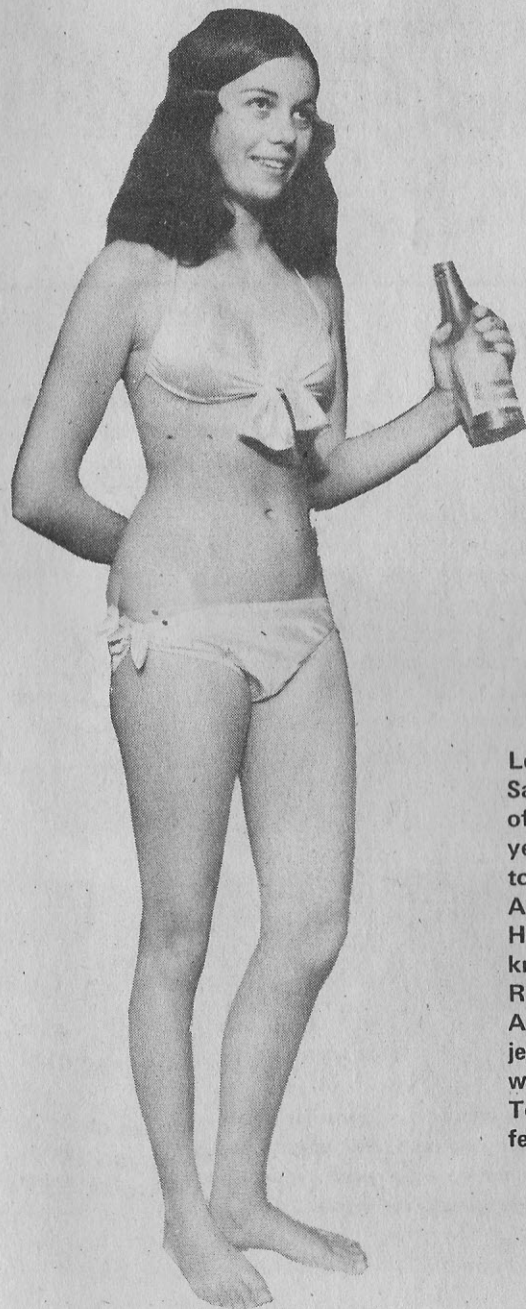

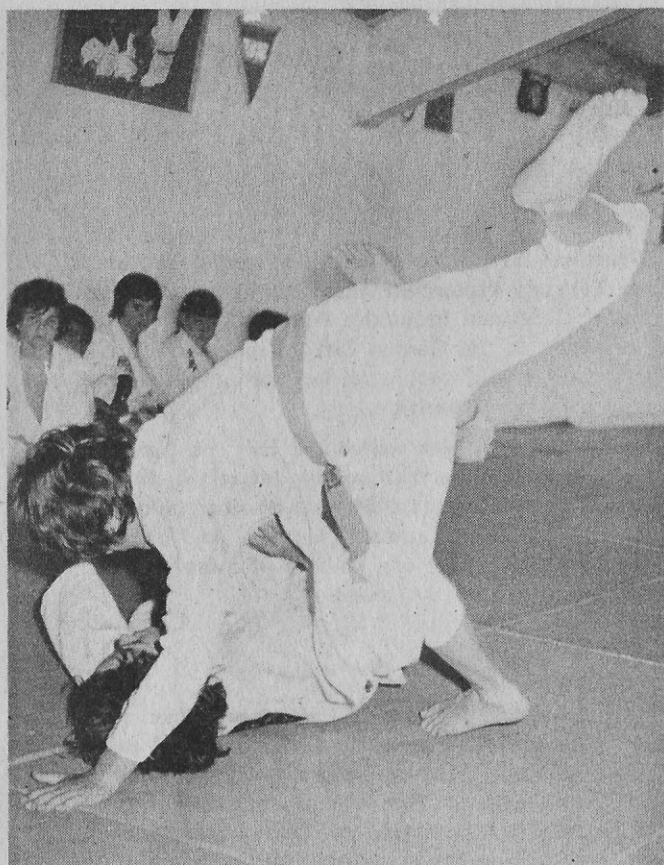

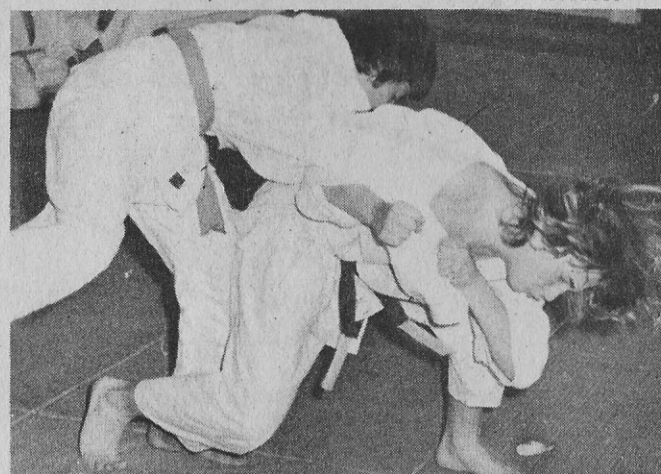

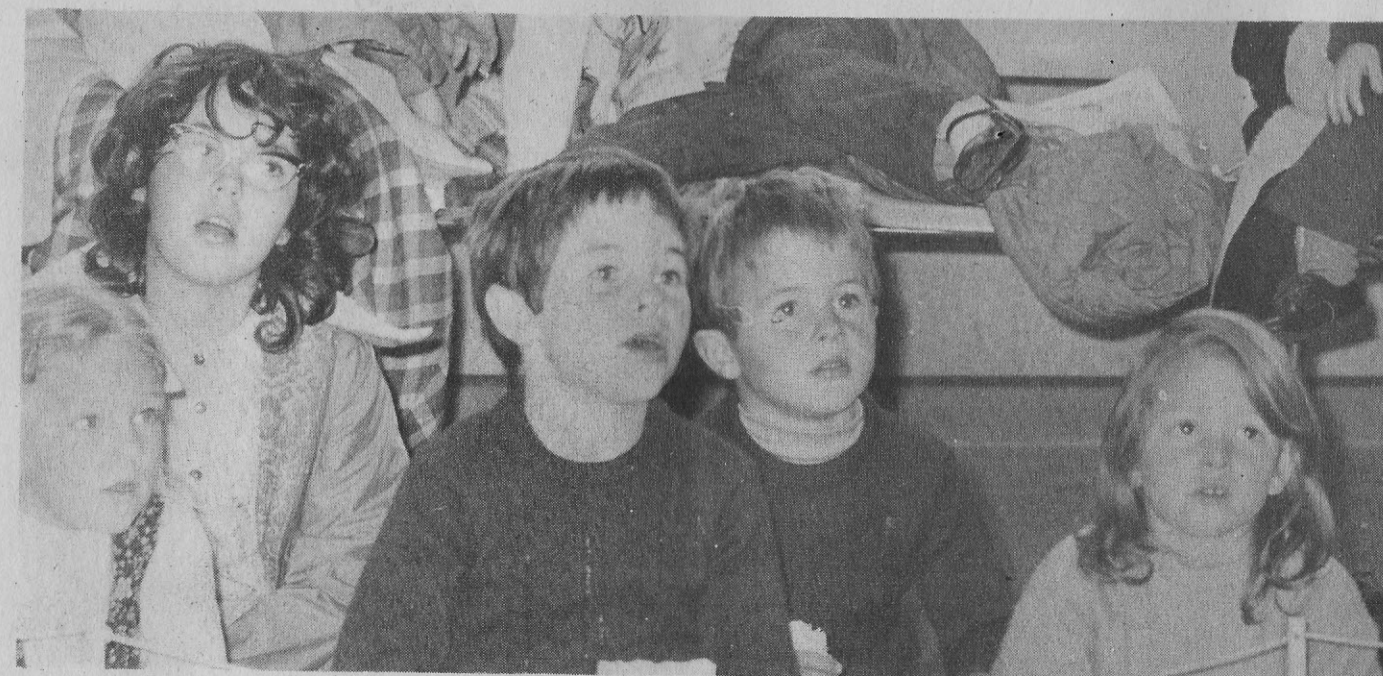

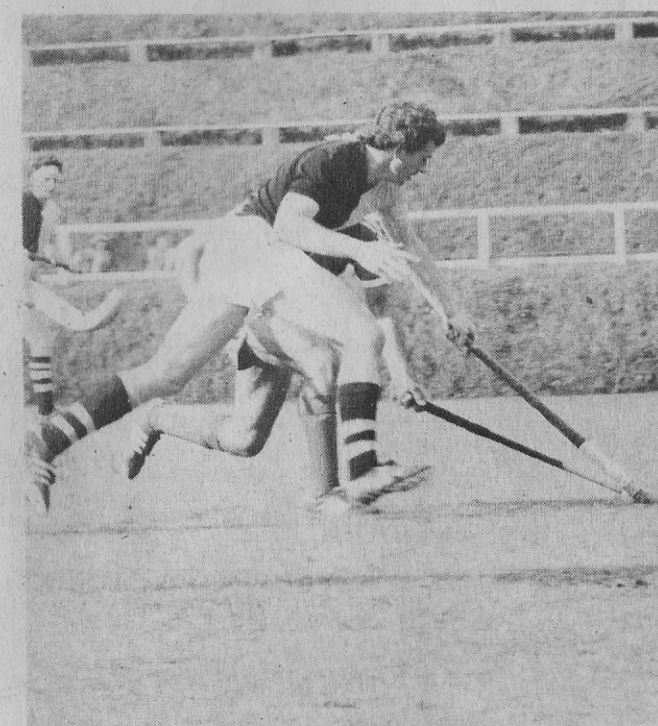

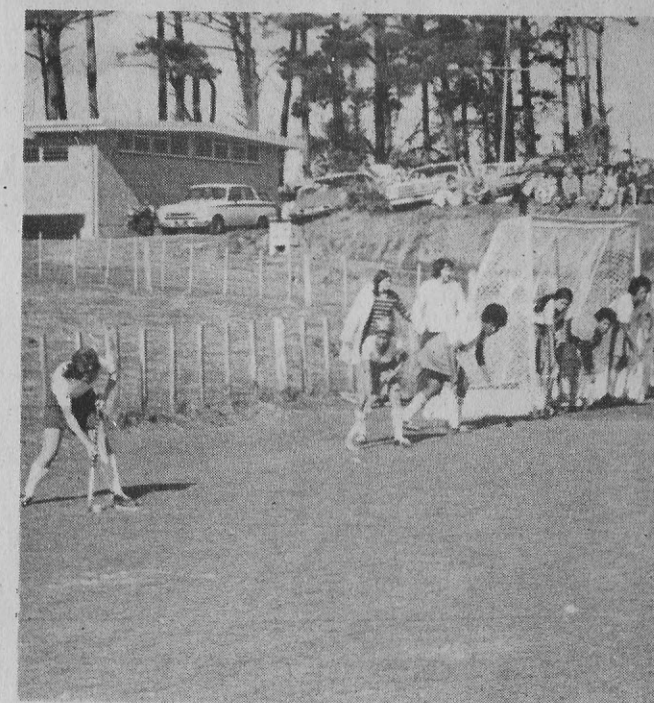
TARANAKI v. FIJI

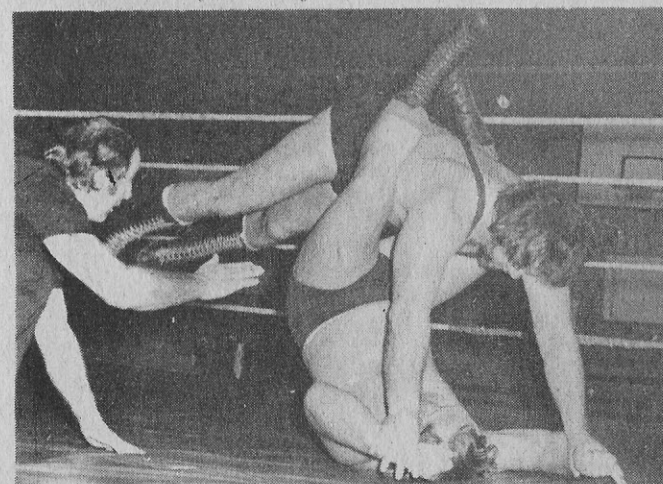

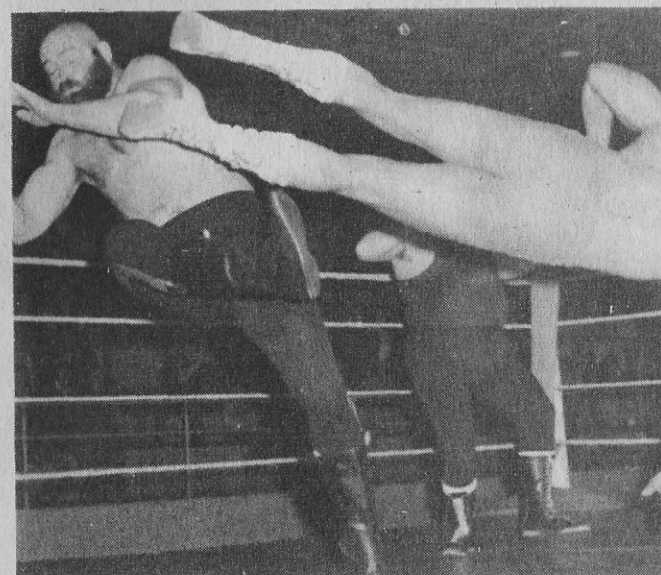

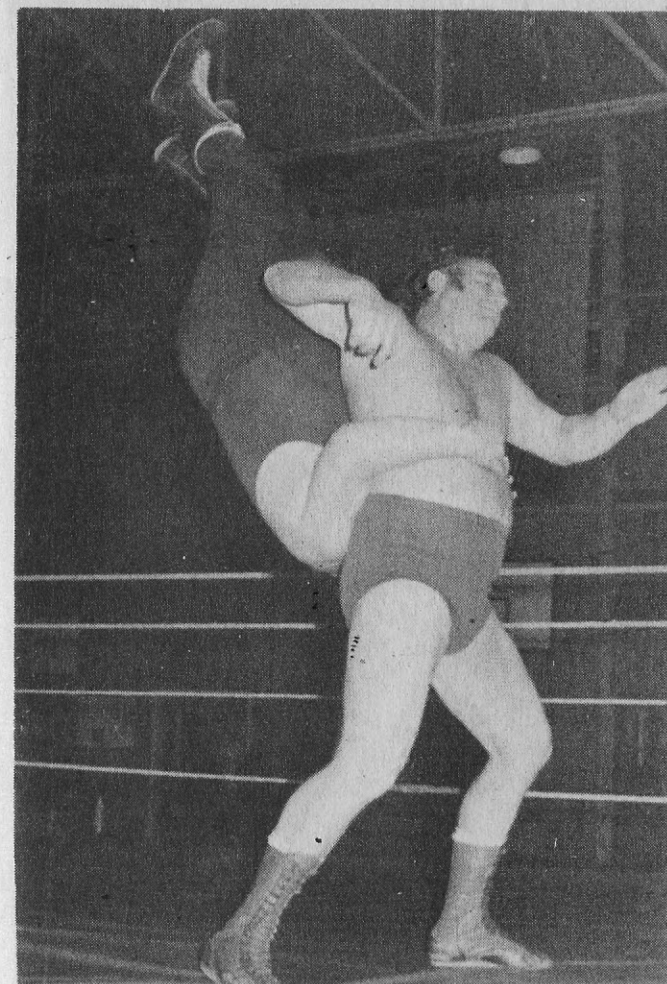

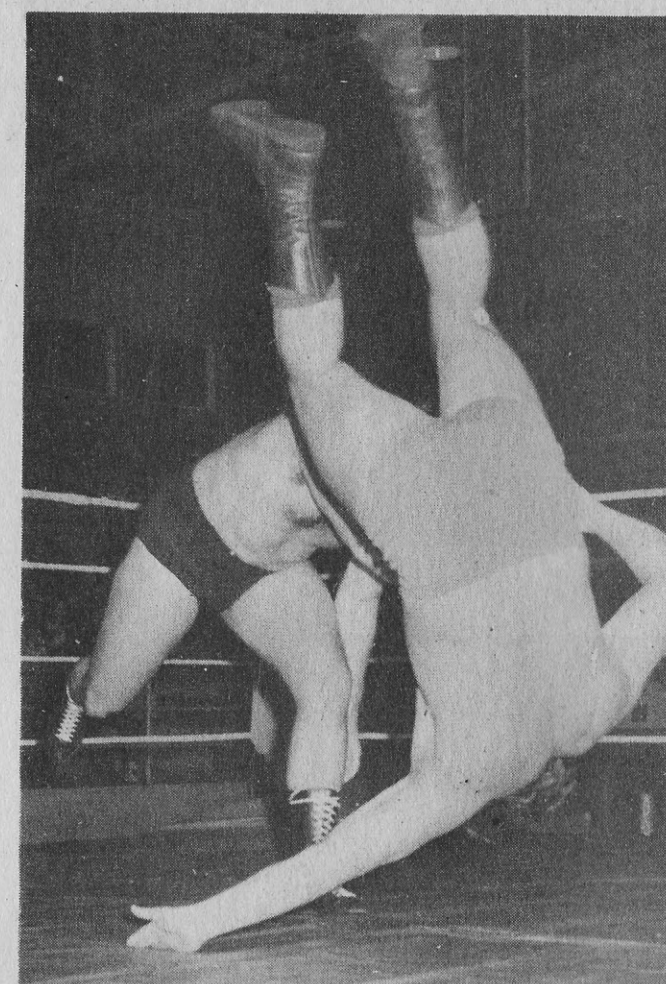

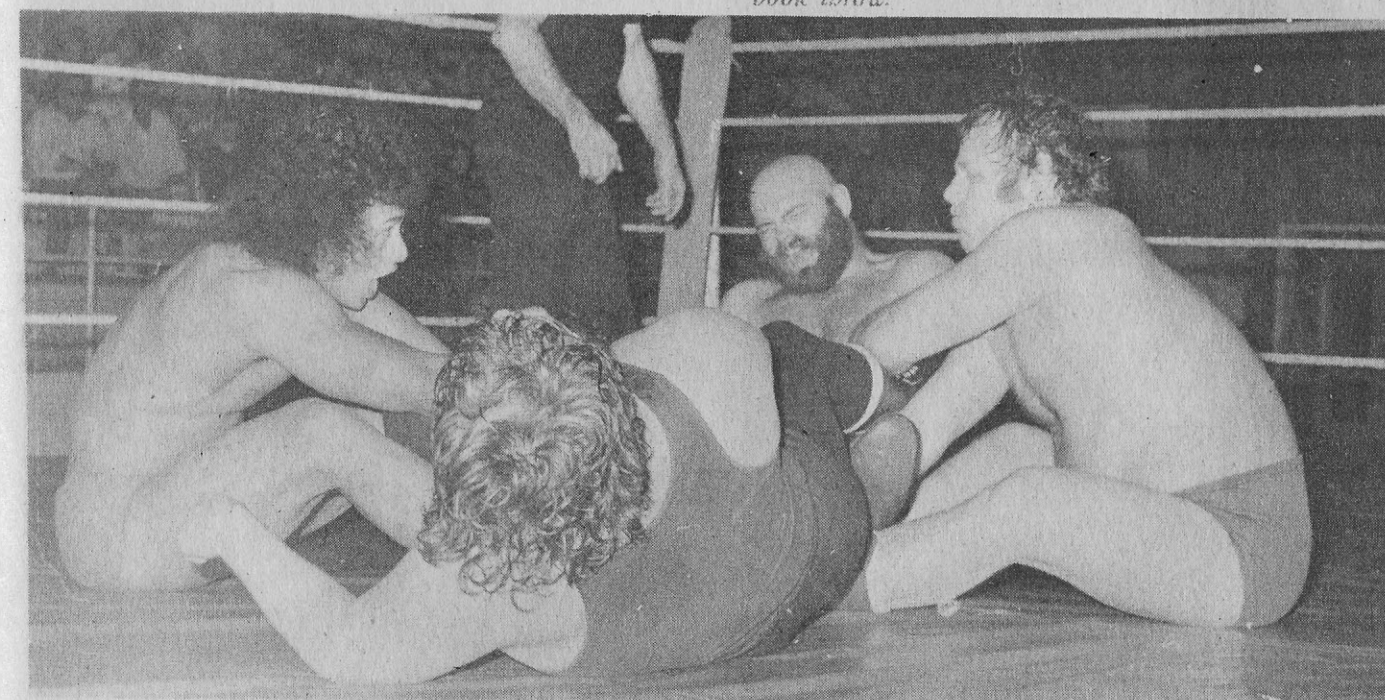

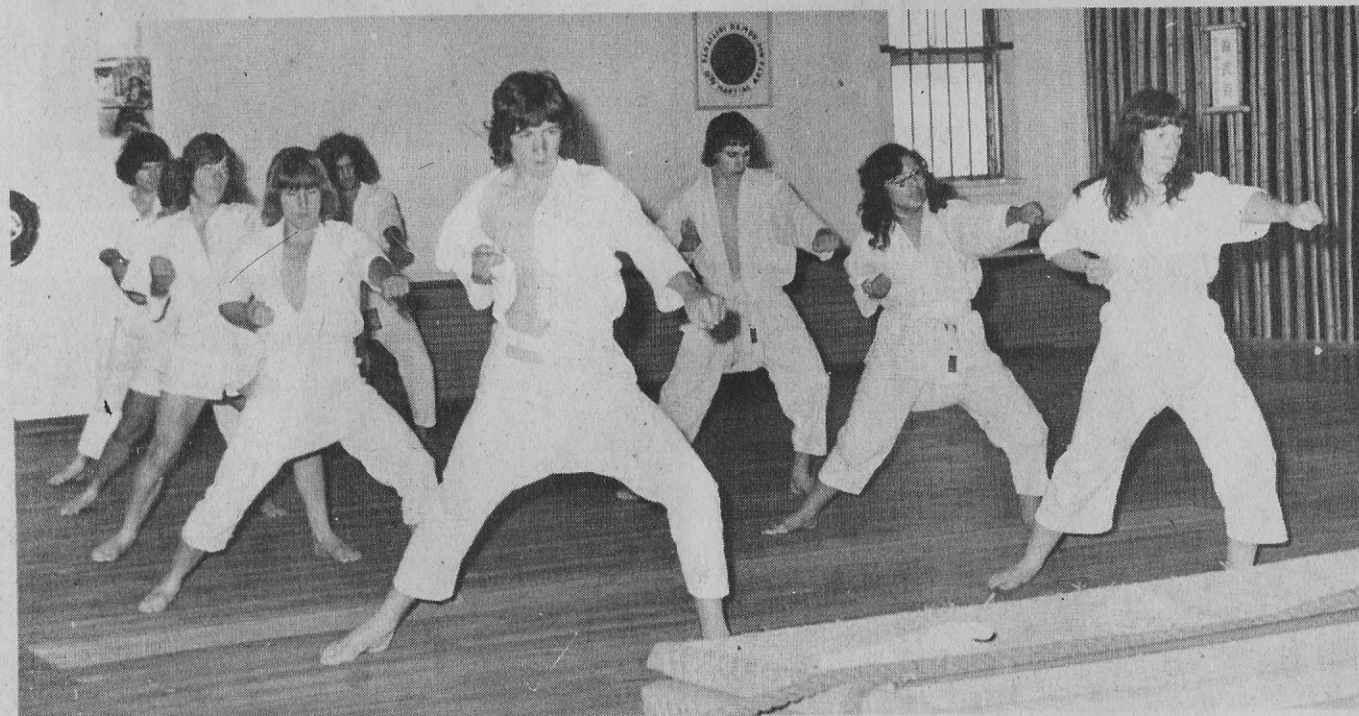


Karate Grading

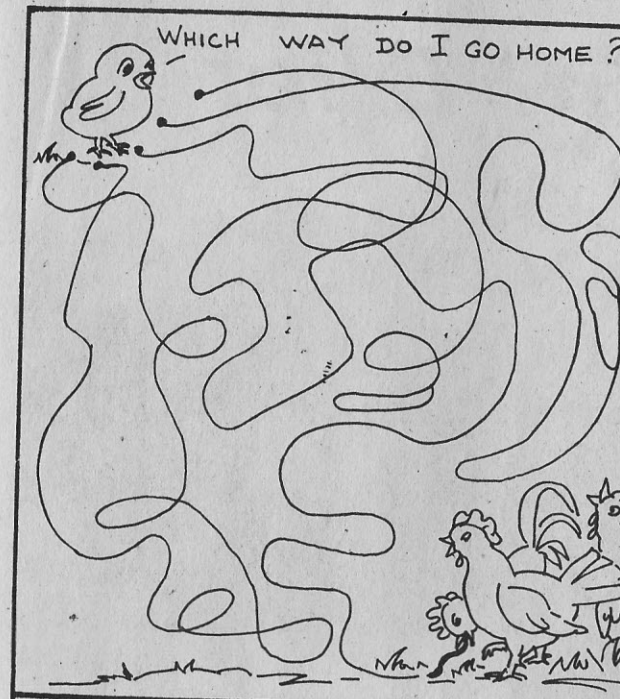

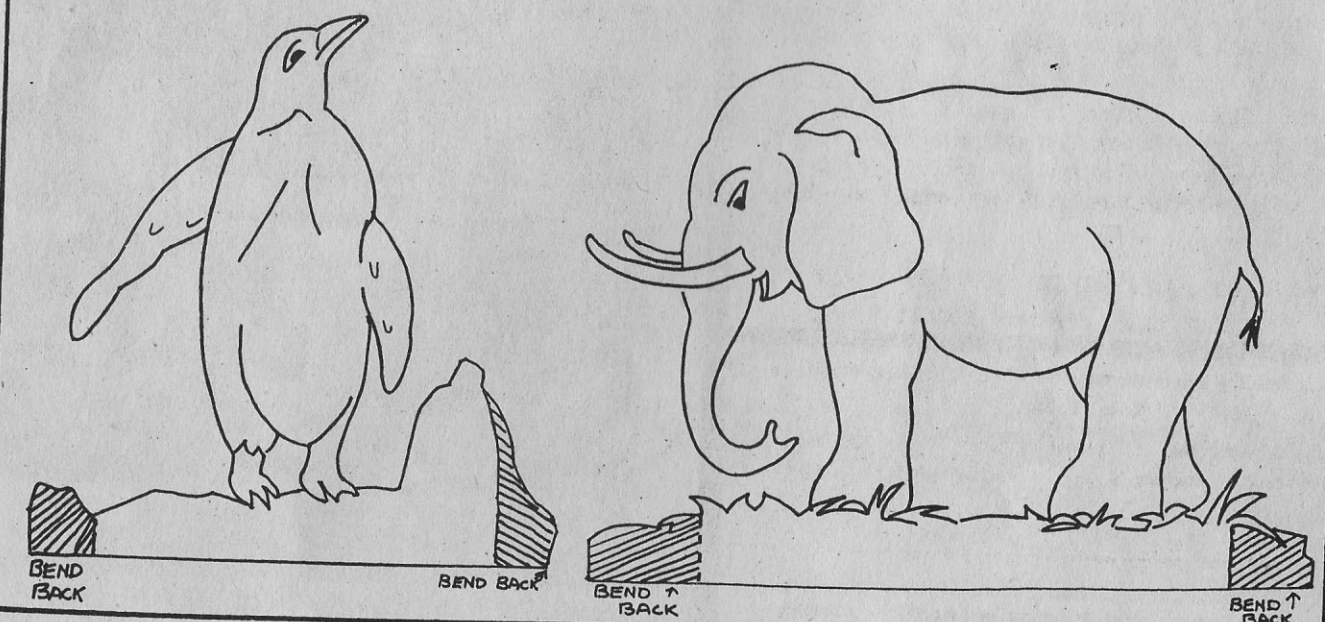

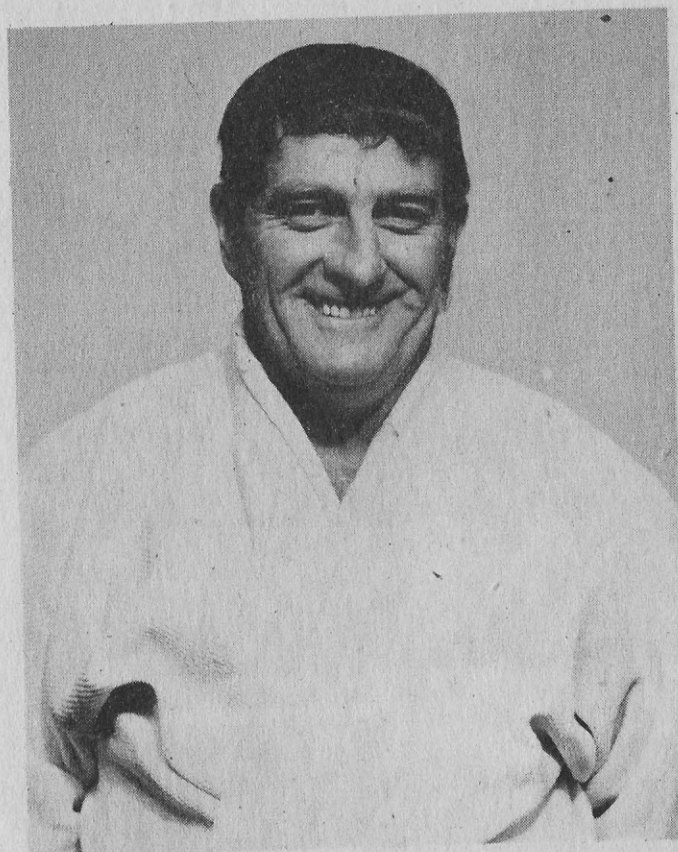

It has been said that if 'Fred Dagg' were to run for Parliament, that he would become our next Prime Minister.

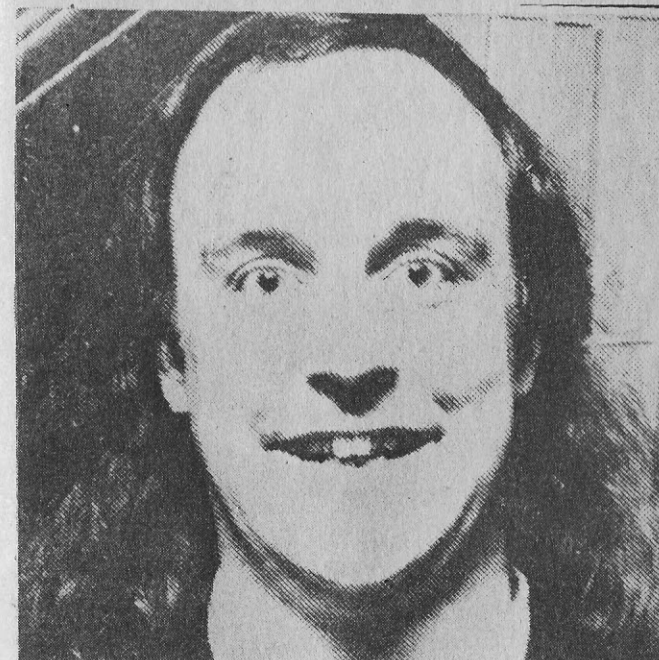
However ridiculous that comment may appear to be it does indicate the way in which John Clarke (alias Fred Dagg) has won the hearts of almost all of New Zealanders.

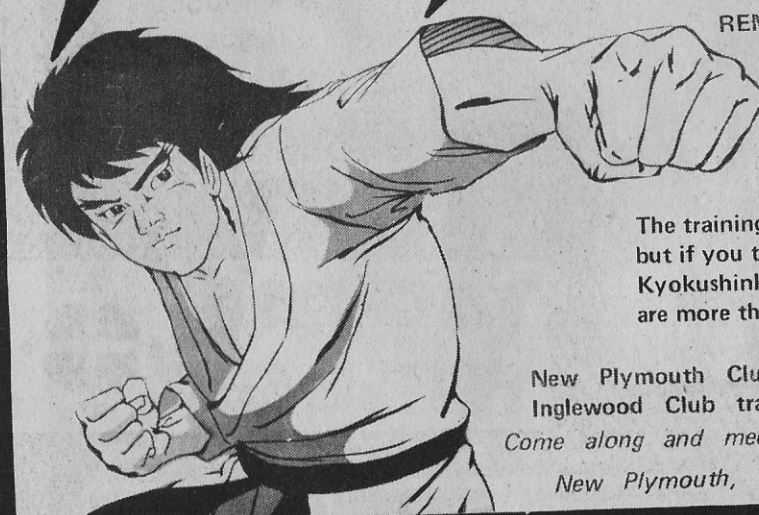

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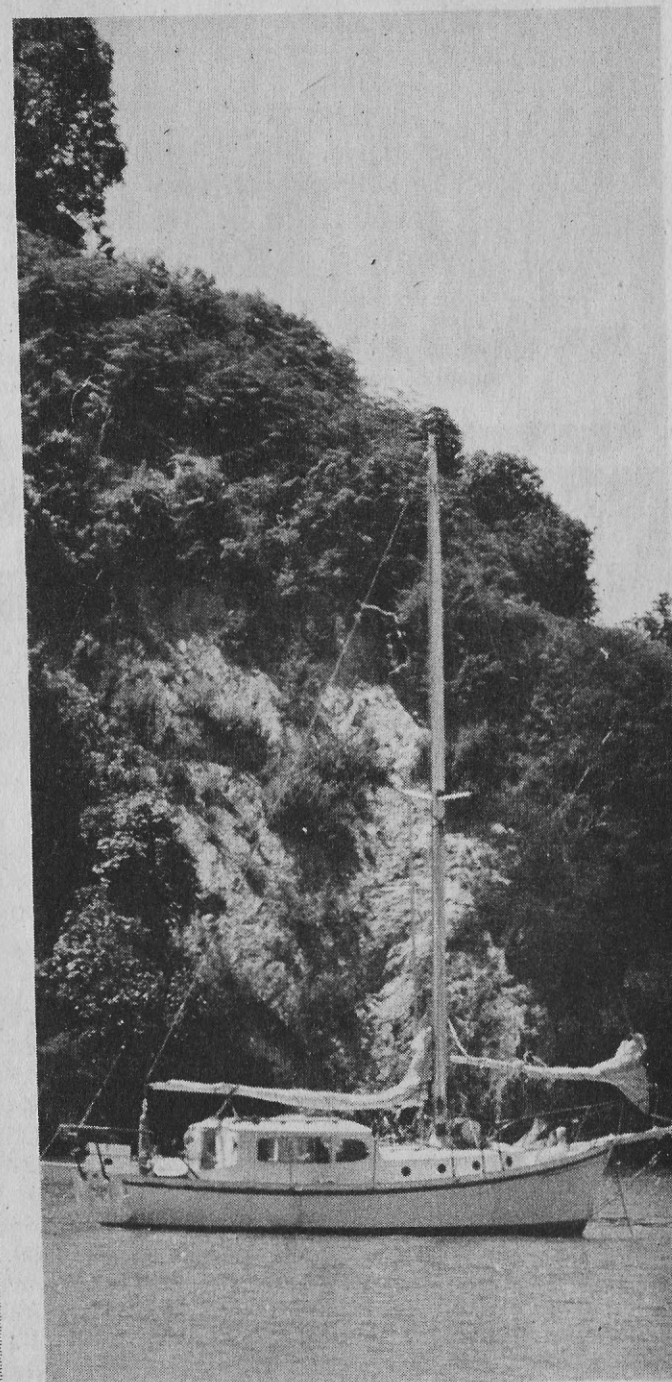
