


Supreme Award




Her time of 14.6s in the heat and 14.8s in the final bettered the time of Susan Burnside, who held the title. Her time was 15.13s.






SNOW SNOW


SCENES FROM THE TV SCREEN



The Waltons (all eleven of them) is a long running and very popular TV show. Pictured is the whole gang clustered around the old time radio set. The show screens Saturdays.




Maude is one of those TV Shows that you either love or hate. Most viewers however tend to agree that regardless of Maude, the show is absolutely hilarious.















